

SEEING SPORT STUFF

For those who believe in the "old Indian sign", however, there is ample justification. Here are one or two specific examples. Dartmouth meets Yale every year in the huge Bowl and lime after time the Indians came out of the hills of Hanover with an apparently superior team but could never defeat the Elis. One year we saw the two teams stage the wildest scoring-fest we have ever witnessed and wind up in a 32-33 deadlock. Last season, Dartmouth finally broke the lee and registered a 14-6 triumsh.

To bring the story back to Lexington it might be well to mention the famous jinx that Wallace Wade-coached teams have held over our own Wildcats. According to the rumors, when Wade was rejected by the University in favor of Harry Gamage for the position of head football coach, he accepted an offer at Alabama and vowed that Kentucky would never defeat one of his teams. And since that time, many years ago the 'Cats have never done so. And since Wade left Alabama the Tide has done pretty well on its own account, under Frank Thomas, to carry on the beat-Kentucky tradition.

With the Wildcats ready to trot onto Grant Field tomorrow against, Georgia Tech's Ramblin' Wreck, that old jinx talk is bound to come up again. For Kentucky has never lost to the Engineers, although their football history has been a short one. The teams have met but four times and three of the contests have gone to the 'Cats and one was tied.

In 1932, again at Atlanta, the Kentuckians triumphed, 12-6, when Pug Bach's disputed lateral to Dutch Kreuter was carried over the goal for the deedling points. The next year it was Ralph Kercheval's great kicking that kept Tech in hot water and his placement-after-fouchdown that provided the 7-6 victory.

Last year, as most of you know, Kentucky played one of its best games of the season to subdue the Techsters, 25-6. The seeming deci-siveness of the score was somewhat deceptive as Tech had a powerful squad, led by Dutch Koneman, and most of that team is back again this

Which brings us up to the moment. Just as Tech has many returning veterans, so has Kentucky. Very few of the team which started against the Engineers in 1935 are absent. And we took them that time.

One difference between the games may cause some difficulty. For years, now, Kentucky has been unfortunate on the road, although always a great home club. But when the boys start to travel they seem to suffer mentally for some reason and fail to give their top performance. One outstanding exception of the past few years was their exhibition against Ohlo State last season at Columbus. The 'Cats were keyed up that day and would have been a winer against any other team.

Tomorrow's game means a great deal to the Wildcats just as it does to Georgia Tech. Each team needs a victory to keep in the conference running and the winner will receive a goodly share of the national spotlight.

Coach Wynne stated a few days ago that he thought Tech would But when such a confirmed pessimist as Captain Stanley Neverseves that Kentucky will win, who are we to doubt it?

Without any further ado, then, we nominate Kentucky as the winner of tomorrows classic of the South, but refuse to name the score. Just look what happened to us last week.

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
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
