The Student Government Association Senate accepted without reservation on Wednesday night President Shea Chaney's trimmed budget proposal for this year.

After about an hour of deliberation, the Senate voted to accept Chaney's \$191,300 proposed budget for 1995-96. 



"An Evening with Arlo Guthrier begins at 8. Tickets are \$17.50 and \$19.50. The number for ticket and concert information is (606) 233-3535.

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
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
