

PC LEARNERS GROUP FOR LIBRARY EMPLOYEES

MEET THE MATHEMATICAL SCIENCES LIBRARY (by Joanne Goode)

The Mathematical Sciences Library houses collections in the areas of mathematics (pure and applied), computer science and statistics. collection have been developed with the primary focus of supporting the research and instructional needs of faculty and graduate students in these departments, as well as related departments on campus. collections also contains materials for undergraduate use as well as materials used to provide general reference service to the campus and community. The collection total 28,389 volumes and the library subscribes to 455 journal titles.

Collections which may be of special interest are a permanent reserve collections of programming languages titles and a textbook collection which is especially useful to individuals who would like to review areas in Algebra, Geometry, etc. We also have some guides to locating and buying software in the reference collection. Come over for a tour! We are located in the basement of the Patterson Office Tower right

near the elevators.

MEET THE COMPUTER SEARCH SERVICE (by Karen Cobb)

Among the advantages of computer-based reference services are rapid retrieval from large, comprehensive online files; the ability to combine concepts or impose limits in ways unavailable in conventional printed sources; and the day-before-yesterday currency of the information Computer Search found. Services (called Data Services until 1984) are offered at a dozen or so searching sites in the library system, with librarians in the various departments and branches accessing those commercial databases appropriate to their subject specialization and their patrons' needs. As a unit within Reference, the CSS thus concentrates on the disciplines in the social sciences and humanities served by King Library, and in general, news-oriented, interdisciplinary databases.

Most of the databases searched are bibliographic in nature, and what results from a search is a list of references customized to a patron's topic of interest. Some of the databases we enter may provide statistical data, directory information, or the full text of a source document rather than citations to a particular literature. Patrons must absorb the direct costs of the search performed, which typically includes the following: telephone charges for access to a vendor's remote computer (DIALOG, BRS, and VU-TEXT are the vendor systems we use most often); the connect time to a particular database is usually only minutes,

charged at rates ranging from \$15 to \$300 per connect hour; any fees for printing the information found (either during the search session, or in offline mode to be sent through the mails); and a 10% surcharge for our overhead. Any reference librarian can schedule a search; we do prefer a day or two lead time to think about the topic, the appropriate database(s), and an efficient online strategy. The requester should be present during the search, since one of the advantages of computerized retrieval is the ability to modify a search strategy while one is interacting with the computer.

The CSS coordinator Reference has the responsibility for leading the effort to promote the service; for unit recordkeeping and system-wide invoice processing; and for keeping the documentation for the various systems and databases current, well organized, and widely circulated. (Each of the several hundred databases available has its own peculiar features in terms of contents, coverage, and indexing practices.) The coordinator also represents Reference's searching center on the Literature Searching Committee, which advises on overall system policies, contracts, marketing, training, and the like.

LIBRARY JOURNALS ROUTING SERVICE

The Library has subscriptions to certain periodicals (see below) for the purpose of keeping library personnel informed and up-to-date in their areas of librarianship. A list of people desiring to see a particular title is attached to each issue of that title upon receipt. The issue is then routed to the first person on the list, who, in turn, routes it to the second person,

The journals routing service is available to all staff members in King, branch, associate libraries, and the Medical Library. The only requirement for receiving the service is that Library to hold issues no longer than 3 days before routing you agree to hold issues no longer than 3 days before routing them to the next person on the list. In consideration for the others on the list, PI.EASE do not keep the journals more than 3
