Experts see record-high divorce rate

WASHINGTON — Nearly six of very 10 married women now in neir 30s probably will experience a ivorce at some time, according to a ew study by Census Bureau ex-

reveree at some time, according to a new study by Census Bureau experts.

That would be a record high proportion, according to the study of marriage and divorce patterns by Arthur J. Norton and Jeanne E. Moorman. Their findings were being presented at a meeting of the Population Association of America in San Francisco.

San Francisco and the study of the Population Association of America in San Francisco and the study projects that "by the time they and women five years younger complete their divorce experience, nearly six in 10 of the ever-married women in each group will have been divorced." "The projection for this age group is greater than that for women 10 years older or 10 years younger." The projections for women in their 48s was for an eventual 45 percent divorce rate, and the rate was set at 50 percent for those now in their 20s. The projections are included in a detailed study of marriage and divorce which also said that, after rising to record levels in the 1970s, divorce seems to have leveled off in the first half of this decade.

"It appears that divorce, remarriage and redivorce may have been always and the province in the U.S. will likely remain among the highest in the world," the researchers concluded.



Sunday liquor vote is a better solution than legislative fiat

The Kentucky House of Representatives decently let an amendment die last week that would have sidestepped popular feelings and introduced Sunday liquor sales, not, however, without approving a compromise that would put the issue back on the ballot in November.

The move, the brainchild of Lexington Sen. Jack Trevey, was an unpleasant example of "piggybacking" — attaching an amendment to a bill with otherwise no connection to the amendment. The main bill in this case would have affected licensing of liquor-selling establishments with an established pattern of prostitution.

The move was an equally unpleasant example of legislative bullying, a cruel reversal of the ideal relationship of people the rulers and legislators their servants. Clearly Trevey didn't think the 54 percent of Lexingtonians who rejected Sunday liquor sales in 1982 knew their own minds.

He did realize that enough of them would be mad enough that he tried sneaking it in on a Friday afternon. And he was right. The weekend passed with angry lobbying by Lexington Mayor Scotty Baesler, who succeeded in getting a compromise.

All in all, it was damn decent of the General Assembly: to let the citizens of a community make decisions about the quality of that community's life. Of course, one could question the necessity of another referendum only four years after the other. But if you have people vote on something often enough, chances are they'll see it your way eventually.

But whatever your sentiments on the issue, there's no

But whatever your sentiments on the issue, there's no question that a referendum is the only fair way to approach it.

ASHLAND — An unsuccessful takeover bid left few lasting scars at Ashland Oil Inc., nor did it cause much anxiety, says John R. Hall, chairman of Kentucky's largest

"We will have to be a little more conservative," Hall said. "We will keep moving in the same direction that was planned before the struggle."

It ended last Tuesday when Ashland agreed to buy stock held by First City Financial Corp. Ltd. for \$134.1 million, or \$51 a share. In return, the corporation, controlled by the Belzberg family of Canada, agreed to purchase no more shares of Ashland for a decade.

Somerset among top economical areas

SOMERSET — The Somerset area is the most economical place to live in Kentucky and the fourth best in the nation, according to a survey by the American Chamber of Commerce Researchers Association.

Only Cleveland, Cookeville and McMinnville, three Tennessee cities, had cost-of-living indexes lower than Somerset nationwide in the fourth quarter of 1985, the period during which the latest ACCRA study was done. About 249 cities nationwide participated in the survey.

The ACCRA cost-of-living index measures intercity differences in costs of consumer goods and services, excluding taxes and non-consumer expenditures. It is based on 59 tiems for which prices are collected quarterly by the chamber of commerce or some similar organization in each participating city.

American population tops 240 million

WASHINGTON — There are now more than 240 million Americans, the most in the nation's history.

Updated Census Bureau figures — not yet made public by the agency — indicate that the U.S. population reached 240,123,000 as of Nov. 1, according to Population Today, a publication of the private Population Reference Bureau.

In 1790 the nation's first Census counted 3,929,214 people, slightly less than now live in the metropolitan Boston area.

At the current rate, the United States should reach a population of a quarter-billion people by 1990, Population Today reported.

JERUSALEM — Prime Minister Shimon Peres told his Cabinet yesterday he believes the United States plans to step up its involvement in the lagging Middle East peace efforts, a senior official said.

Cabinet Secretary Ossi Beilin told reporters that U.S. Secretary of State George Shultz was expected in the region in the coming months to help mediate a border dispute between Israel and Egypt and spark contacts for a dialogue between Israel and Jordan.
