If the environment had been different, it would have seemed like a nice family get-together. Mom and Dad sat with their grown children, giving encouraging words and sharing their thoughts. They smiled and sometimes laughed, but in their eyes, there was a different story. This was a time of mourning.

The family waited for Judge Tom Lively to call the case of Melanie Hope Gonterman, a 22-year-old who, along with Randy Whitehead, 45, is accused of manufacturing methamphetamine. In shackles, she entered the courtroom. Local men run in Boston Marathon

"People ask me why I run," said Rick Corman, one week after finishing his second Boston Marathon.

One would expect his answer to contain the phrases, "Keeps me in shape" or "gives me time to think." Corman's response, however, is a little different.

"If and when I have to use a wheelchair, I want to look back and know that I ran all that I could," he said. In 2001, Corman was diagnosed

with multiple myeloma, a cancer affecting bone marrow. In many instances, patients with bone cancers may eventually be confined to a

from made him want to make the most of his physical abilities.

Within a year, Corman and friend Ben Taylor had run in their first

For a race that long, you have to be in great physical shape, and you have to have a mental toughness. If you are lacking in either of those, you just won't make it, Corman said. That year, Corman and Taylor's physical and mental toughness got them across the finish line in four hours and seven

"He is unbelievable. He can just get people to exceed what they thought was possible," Taylor said.

Following the race, Corman decided that he was no longer going to run. This year, however, that decision was swayed by David Cravens, an assistant principal at the Lexington Christian Academy High School.

In the summer of 1996, Cravens had fallen off his roof while cleaning the gutters, which resulted in multiple serious injust.

"The ladder slipped out from under me. I fell approximately 20 feet to the blacktop, onto face. I had I 4 screws in my face, and I also broke my femur," said Cravens. "They put seven screws in my legs."

Cravens spent five days in the trau-ma unit and said that he had two

major surgedes to "put me back together." At the time Cravens was told be may never run again. "It was a thrill to come back and do this when there was a possibility that I may never be able to run again. It was a challenge," he said.

He had run in one marathon prior to the accident, but after healing up, ran eight more His tenth was to be the Derby City marathon in Louisville on April 24.

April 24.

"I just thought his tenth ought to be in Boston," said Corman.

"I think we have been good for each other, because I want to run all the time, and when I am with him, he pushes me to do it even harder," said

Cravens. "It is just super to be with someone like him."

The Boston Marathon is a closed race, which means that runners must qualify by posting a certain time in a previous marathon. Corman and company, however, qualified through Dana-Farber, the cancer research center affiliated with Harvard University, where Corman receives treatment. "Dana-Farber is allowed so many entries for people who don't qualify. Five-hundred forty-five people ran with Farber this year," said Corman. Corman and his fellow runners had nine weeks until the starting gun fired, a very short time to train for a


