Pitino will sign a six-year contract for an undecided amount of money. The amount will probably be much less than the millions he earned as head coach of the Boston Celtics. Pitino admitted during nesday's news conference that L Athletic Director Tom Jurich didn't promise a huge salary.

# Lexington's 'Limestone Mile' still thriving

Taking care: Limestone merchants, entrepreneurs say the street is 'still in its heyday as a cultural haven'

Lever wonder what those odd-looking structures are on Limestone Street, where the street intersects with Euclid Avenue and Third Street?

Retired UK history professor Ray Betts calls them "the defining equivalent of archways," and they're part of a project he came up with a proposal for last year.

The project, called the Millennium Mile, was intended in part to highlight the history of Limestone as a longstanding cultural haven in Lexington.

Officially, this project is over; it culminated in a festival last July.

Limestone, however, continues to

there say they think the street is still in its heyday as a cultural haven.

If a defining characteristic of a college town is a "campus strip," then Lexington has at least that much.

From obscure media and CDs, eccentric decorations and Indian cuisine to just a couple of beers, you can get it somewhere on Limestone Street between UK and Transylvania University.

And the connection between UK and Transylvania is something else Betts wanted to highlight with the Millennium Mile project.

"It would be great if we could pull te two-schools together," Betts said.

Currently under construction where Main and Vine streets intersect Limestone are two new courthouses and an adjoining plaza.

"I think it'll be quite gorgeous once the court-houses are finished," Pat Gerhard, owner of Third Street Stuff, said.

Area businesses have also been working to improve the appearance and appeal of Limestone Street.

rne South Lime-stone Association was formed as a mer-chant's organization, including most of the businesses from Kennedy's Book-store to the corner of Limestone and Maxwell.

The basic goal of the association could be described as "cleaning up" the area and making it more inviting. Call Behr, de facto president of the association and owner of Kennedy's, said the businesses were trying to improve the area.

"We're trying to provide a safe, nice

link between here and downtown."
While the association meets without a regular schedule or formal constitution, it has been able get some things done since it was formed about a year and a half ago.
With the help of Dick DeCamp, third district council member, and public and private funds, the association has brought in such improvements as better lighting for the street and more trash bins.

While DeCamp denied that the city has refused any assistance to the association's efforts, Behr did say that the city has refused matching funds to repair the sidewalk curbs and for other projects.

#### Discovery returns crew to Earth

Discovery returns crew to Earth

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Space shuttle
Discovery glided to a predawn touchdown
Wednesday, bringing home the first residents of
the international space station and ending their 4 1/2-month voyage. Bill Shepherd, space station
Alpha's first commander, and his two Russian
crewmates rode back from orbit in reclining
seats to ease their reintroduction to gravity. A
team of doctors rushed aboard the shuttle to assist Shepherd, Yuri Glüzenko and Sergei
Krikalev. The physicians expected the space station pioneers to be weak, wobbly, dizzy and possibly nauseated after months of weightlessness,
but all three men walked away from the shuttle
and shunned the gurneys waiting for them.

#### Fed signals it's ready to intervene

WASHINGTON — The Federal Reserve is
sending a strong signal that it stands ready to do
whatever is necessary to keep the economy from
falling into recession. That could include another
interest rate cut before the Fed's next meeting in
two months. Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan and
his colleagues slashed a key interest rate again
Tuesday, the third half-point reduction this year,
in an effort to keep the ailing economy afloat. In
doing so, the Fed worried about "substantial
risks" of prolonged economic weakness. Specific
cally it said production cuts by manufacturers
could continue for some time and that weak
economies around the world could become a further drag on U.S. growth.

#### Macedonia ends artillery barrage

TETOVO, Macedonia — An ominous calm settled over Macedonia's second-largest city Wednesday after government forces handed ethic Albanian rebels an ultimatum giving them 24 hours to end their insurrection or face all-out assault. Ahead of Tuesday evening's ultimatum announcement, artillery pounded the hills outside in a joint army and police counteroffensive against the insurgents camped outside Tetovo. The military stopped its assault later in the evening, and the calm held overnight and into Wednesday morning. The army's ultimatum demanded that the "terrorists" stop fighting and surrender or leave Macedonia. The military said it would refrain from "offensive" actions until midnight Wednesday, whought is add it reserved the right to shoot in self-defense.

#### **Bush repeals workplace regulations**

WASHINGTON — President Bush signed a
repeal Tuesday of ergonomics rules. The measure sailed through Congress earlier this month
with help from business interests that criticized
the rules' cost and scope. The rollback was a big
political loss to labor unions, which had worked
for a decade in support of the regulations and
were caught flat-footed by Republicans' attack.
The regulations, issued late in the Clinton administration, were aimed at preventing carpal
tunnel syndrome, tendinitis and other health
problems associated with repetitive motion,
awkward postures and contact stress.

## Males not a problem for feminists

#### A journey: Professor says students learn the importance of understanding feminism

Each semester Pat Cooper passes out a questionnaire to her introductory women's studies class to find out what preconceptions students have about feminism. Without fail, Cooper, an associate professor of history and women's studies, said the students define the theory "as a group of white women who hate men and who are out for their own careerism."

But, by the end of the class Cooper said the initial negative thoughts change drastically for both women and men.

"They see that feminists

"They see that feminists e not man haters," she said of ciety's pervasive ideology

about feminism. Instead, Cooper said feminists are people against racism, sexism, homophobia and any other type of human oppression.

And they don't hate men. In fact, Cooper said the quest for human liberation helps everyone.

"Feminists wouldn't say the problem is men, because it's not like they sit around and calculate how to oppress," she said.

Instead, the calculate ways to make everyone understand the importance of feminism to the world.

And Cooper strives to bring this awareness to students through the journey of her course. On this journey of she said students learn the im-

# **Discipline: A** time for paddles?

Corporal punishment: Effective or ineffective?

Bend over and kiss that fanny goodbye. Some of us have heard this phrase before but in a completely different context. Corporal punishment.

A little paddling goes a long way in enforcing discipline and rules in today's school system. However while corporal punishment is mostly limited to the elementary level, within the state of Kentucky most schools have long since abolished paddling as an effective method.

According to Louisville's Courier Journal, the number of pad

According to Louisvine's Courier Journal, the manner of paudings in Kentucky dropped by 58 percent from 1988 to 1998. But 51 percent of our schools continue to allow the practice.

The practice of corporal punishment currently faces controversy, and both opposing views make valid points, Maribeth Thomas, head of the Louisville Christian Academy's middle school, said, "It's not effective. Discipline needs to be a time to learn from mistakes and learn gontle and kinds ways to respond to things."

On the other hand, those in support of paddling, such as Dr. Dubose Ravenel, a pediatrician in High Point, N.C., said, "A school, rather than being prohibited from spanking, should be required to protect kids from the potential of violence or abusive practices."

Such systems as those in Adair County are making cases to keep corporal punishment available. The use of parental notification after the fact, rules governing only same-sex punishment and options including no student being used as a warning or punishment display for others are strictly enforced to ensure the child's safety. Corporal punishment is also a last resort or to be utilized only when every other method of discipline has failed.

We are also divided on this issue. Some of us have and have not faced a stinging paddle walloped against our fannies. Those of us who did endure such punishment fully acknowledge that we definitely learned a lesson and did not commit the same mistake again.

It is safe to say, however, that we all agreed that no matter what punishment is to be inflicted the parents must be notified beforehand.

The parents must be aware ahead of time and give consent to allow their little one to bend over and kiss their fanny goodbye.



WINCHESTER, Ky. — A
Clark County man considered
the suspect in a series of shootings in Lee County apparently
committed suicide in his mobile
home in rural Clark County, according to Kentucky State Police spokesman Mike Coyle.

William Bolough, 36, who
was estranged from his wife, apparently broke into the home of
his father-in-Jaw at Primrose in
Lee County about 2 a.m. EST

Tuesday and went room to room shooting occupants of the structure, Coyle said.

The victims were identified as Bolouph's father-in-law, mother-in-law, brother-in-law, brother-in-law day, brother-in-law, bro

center spokeswoman.

Coyle said a search for Bolough was conducted throughout the morning hours after the shootings and when information was received on his possible whereabouts, officers found him in a mobile home in rural clark County.

"We tried to talk to him and

"We tried to talk to him and talk him out and found out there were two females in the mobile home, which ended up being his sisters," Coyle said.

"After a time of negotiating, the two sisters walked out of the trailer about 10 a.m. EST and just seconds later he fired a sin-gle (shotgun) round into his chest."

Bolough's sisters were not injured, he added.
Indications were that Bolough drove to Lee County in a leased vehicle reported stolen sometime Monday night. The vehicle was recovered at the suicide scene in Clark County.



# Man acquitted twice of same crime

Off the hook, again: Discrepancies in witnesses testimony and physical evidence led to acquittal of former KSU student

FRANKFORT, Ky. — A man acquitted on a federal carjacking charge was found innocent of a state murder charge early Tuesday in the same case — the kidnapping and execution-style shooting of an elderly man during a cur heist.

Court jury of seven men and five women deliberated 12 1/2 hours before returning the verdict in favor of Gary Benton, a former student at Kentucky State University, about 1 a.m. EST.

Benton also was acquitted

of kinapping and roobery charges.

The victims were William Bonner, and his daughter and son-in-law — Rhenda and Doyle Mills. Bonner, 77, of Vanceburg, was visiting the couple in Frankfort.

All three were kinapped when a gunman forced his way into their car in a Wal-Mart parking lot on the night of Dec. 15, 1965.

Bonner was in the back

seat. The Milless were terrorized and forced to drive around miles of back roads. At the end, all three were forced to lie on the ground. Bonner was shot in the head. Police theorized that he was killed because he alone saw the gumman's face.

Benton was arrested five months later. He was indicted for murder, robbery and three counts of kidnapping.

The case was unusual because Benton, of Saint Louis, was acquitted of federal carjacking charges in the case in 1997.

The Kentucky Supreme

1997. The Kentucky Supreme Court ruled a year later that he could not be tried on state charges in the same case. The court later reversed itself and allowed the prosecution to proceed.

Benton Calimed he was framed by two crack cocaine dealers — Frank Warfield and D'Von Jago — who stole a car for use in a drive-by shooting or a drug deal that night, afterward duping him into taking a ride home from a party. That's how his fingerprints were taken from the car, Benton claims.

The jury reviewed viden was a framed of Mrs. Milis' call to an emergency police dispatcher the night of the crime.

Defense attorney Mark Bubenzer said FBI and Kentucky State Police investigators explained away the absence of

prints on the driver's side by saying the car was "wiped down." Yet, Benton's prints were found on the passenger side. If he had been the gunnan, he would have wiped the car completely, Bubenzer said. Cleveland said Benton's defense team, during trial testimony, "never, ever got around to explaining his fingerprints on that car because there's only one Benton drove the car to a party at Warfield's apartment. Bursting to show off, he missed some prints. Cleveland said.

"He's excited. He's at a party with his buds, the people he committed crimes with," Cleveland said.

Bubenzer seized on discrepancies in Mrs. Mills' descriptions of the gumman. Immedia police the attacker was "fairly muscular" and "atthetic looking," like a basketball player.

The 5-foot-11 Benton weighed 315 pounds at the time. "He is a rotund, obese person," Bubenzer said.

"He does not look like a basketball player." Only after seeing Benton in court did Mrs. Mills describe him accurately, Bubenzer said.


