UK could save \$29.3 million through restructuring plan

After months of internal study and recommendations from various committees, UK President Charles Wethington yesterday released his restructuring report, which outlined changes that could save UK more than \$29.3 million.

Wethington's plan, released during yesterday's Board of Trustees meeting, listed more than 85 recommendations for change in the University, including the decision to hire an outside consultant to review UK's administrative structure.

programs, eliminating positions, assessing admissions policies and establishing an advising center.

The total money saved from the plan would account for the \$26.7 million in budget reductions that UK has received the last two years.

The remaining money would be carmarked for another possible budget reduction. State officials told university presidents in September to prepare for a possible 2 percent cut in appropriations.

But the cut hasn't come, and if it doesn't the money would be used to chance academic programs, Wethington said.

Foon, who received his medical degree from Wayne State Universi-ty in 1972, has been published in medical journals and serves on five medical boards. He currently is principle investigator on several projects funded by the National In-stitutes of Health.

"I hope to make University of Kentucky Markey Cancer Center a world-class player in the develop-ment of gene therapy."

Foon said he plans to bring many new specialists to the cancer center to build up the program.

"I hope to build up the progra "I hope to build up the program by adding more manpower to what we already have," Foon said. "I am confident that after people are shown the outstanding facilities, they will want to remain here."

Speaker to propose spending limits

FRANKFORT, Ky. — House Speaker Joe Clarke said yesterday he will propose a spending limit on legislative elections when the General Assembly convenes to take up ethics bills.

ethics bills.

Clarke acknowledged that courts have said absolute limits on campaign spending are unconstitutional, but he said the time may be right to raise the issue again. Additionally, Clarke said the public pressure of limits may be enough to persuade some candidates to curb spending and observe the cap even if it is thrown out by the courts.

Clarke, a Danville Democrat,

political action committees as a way to eliminate the influence of money in the legislature is mis-placed.

With PAC money, it is easy to point to the special interest behind the bucks. "I've always had the feeling that the other contributions are a lot more insidious," Clarke said. "It tends to conceal the real motive."

Opposition to spending limits could come from challengers to incumbents, Clarke said.

But a leading Republican law-maker said the minority party could look favorably on spending limits in legislative races.

House Minority Whip Danny Ford of Mount Vernon said GOP candidates almost always find themselves at a financial disadvan-

"If we're all playing on the same field, I think the Republicans will fare well," said Ford.

But another Republican disagreed.

Rep. Don Farley of Ashland spent nearly \$30,00G to win re-election against former Democratic Rep. Clarence Jackson in 1992. Farley said spending more than his opponent was the only way he could overcome the Democratic registration advantage.

"If you do that, you're going to ake it a one-party situation in cern areas," Farley said.

There may be other opposition Senate President John "Eck" Rose, D-Winchester, said he would have to be convinced there is a chance the courts would approve before the General Assembly

November opposing tuition increase

The student member of the state The student member of the state Council on Higher Education and UK's Student Government Asso-ciation president have said they are prepared to fight against a pro-posal to raise next year's tuition for state universities.

for state universities.
University presidents endorsed a plan in November that would allow the council to set utilion annually and raise utilion ranes — as much as \$180 at UK—already set for next year. The presidents' request came after two years of severe reductions in state appropriations for universities.

The council in turn decided to hold three public hearings on the issue. The last is set for tonight at 7 in the University of Louisville's

Hassold Auditorium.
Student CHE member Clay Edwards, a UK graduate, said he will keep an open mind throughout the hearings. However, after last week's hearing, he said he is leaning toward voting against the tuition policy change and increase.

"Two you can ge and many concerned."

"I'm very concerned that we're switching to an annual review strictly because of budget cuts. And I think that's a fiscally irresponsible policy," said Edwards, currently a U of L law student.

currently a U of L law student.
"I'm real concerned that if we increase tuition annually, ... it's going to be almost impossible for student financial aid to keep pace. It's really going to hurt some folks."

Meanwhile, SGA President Pete November said yesterday he will speak against the increase at

tonight's hearing. November had declined to take a stand on the issue last week.

November said one of the influencing factors in his decision was his attendance at last Thursday's hearing at EKU when nearly a dozen students unanimously spoke out against an increase.

"Il listened hast week to some of the comments, and I think a lot of the students are concerned that the increase is brought about by budget cuts," November said.

Asking the prayers and support of friends and foces alike, Clinton said,

Iraq proposes cease fire if allies stop bombing runs

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Iraq sought cool its confrontation with the to cool its confrontation with the West by promising yesterday to stop firing at allied aircraft in "no fly" zones if bombing attacks halt. It also appealed to President-elect Clinton for talks.

It also appealed to President-elect Clinton for talks.

Under attack for a third straight day, Saddam Hussein's government also got a promise of help from the Vatican in putting its case before the United Nations.

Iraq said it wanted to give Clinton a calmer atmosphere after his inauguration today to study the confrontation, which liraq has blamed on what it calls President Bush's personal animosity for Saddam.

At the United Nations, Iraqi Ambassador Nizar Hamdoun said Bagbdad also would inform the U.N. that its weapons inspectors will be allowed to fly into Iraq from Bahrain. Iraq's blocking of the flights was one factor that prompted

the recent allied air attacks.
Earlier in the day, an "open letter" to Clinton from Saddam's
spokesman urged the incoming
president to stop allied bombing
raids and to adopt a more conciliatory approach to Iraq.
Clinton has supported Bush's
handling of the dispute.
Pentagon spokesman Pete Wilcliams welcomed the cease-fire offer,
but said Iraq had to remove weapons that threaten American, British
and French planes over the air exclusion zones in northern and southren Iraq. The Iraqis also must stop
hindering U.N. weapon inspections
under the Gulf War cease-fire, he
said.

Even before Iraq's announcement, the U.N. Security Council had scheduled a private meeting for late in the day to discuss the situation. The U.S.-led air raids have drawn criticism from Arab states and some Western nations, such as Russia and the Netherlands.



Fine. So comic Denis Leary has built himself quite a reputation on MTV spewing his overheated comedy and Cindy Crawford fantasies. Bully for him. However, the question still remains: Can be pull off a whole show by himself, or does he only have "two words" for us because he can't think of anything else to say?

Judging by his new comedy album, No Cure For Cancer, Leary is no Yahoo Serious — he's got some bankable talent. In a whirtwind 45 minutes, Leary militantly defends his love of smoking and eating red meat, fills us in on all the cool drugs we can try (No. 1 for Leary? "NyQuil and Sudafed"), and takes potshots at disco music, "Shiny Happy People," Jim Henson, and so many other scattered targets that No Cure For Cancer is guaranteed to offtend virtually anytone who listens to it.

Leary jokes freely about the cancer that his smoking habit may cause him. He even looks forward to throat cancer, because he wanto get one of those keen little voice boxes that tracheotomy patients receive — they're fun, says he, for scaring people on the street.

He's completely invulnerable to those annoying factoids about smoking that nonsmokers like to dig up out of newspapers and magazines. You say smoking takes 10

smoking that nonsmokers like to dig up out of newspapers and magazines. You say smoking takes 10 years off your life? So what, counters Leary, with a sneer that could slice through solid concrete. Those are the worst years — the bother-some "adult diaper, kidney diays" years at the end that we'd all sooner be rid of anyway.

Leary also muses giddily on another sensitive topic: death (which



goes hand in hand with smoking, I guess). Live for the moment, he advises, since some old lady might one day nudge her pet poodle off the ledge of her apartment and send it racing down toward the ground at 175,000 mph straight into your head. It sure makes smoking a lot less troublesome when you consider the threat of rapidly descending poodles is all around us, doesn't it?

Disco music takes a well-deserved beating in No Cure For Cancer. According to Leary, the best thing about the 1980s was the removal of one Gibb brother— and y— from active circulation. Hell is disco, where you'll find Mr. Gibb "singing "Shadow Dancing" for cons and cons, and you have to wear orange plaid bell bottoms and sit next to the Bay City Rollers."

No, this film is awesome because
of its incredible direction, its subde
telling of the original tale by Bram
Stoker (1896), its wonderful cast,
its scenery and its blood-chilling
score.

This film was directed by Werner Herzog in 1979, Herzog is a brilliant German director, who started in 1972 with "Aguirre, the Wrath of God," starring klaus Kinski.

Herzog made no other film of note until "Nosferatu," and then, in 1982, he made his epic master-piece, "Fitzcarraldo." This was the high mark of Klaus Kinski's career. This tale is told in a subtle way, making Count Dracula look as old as he is. Kinski suited the role to perfection. He brought a true creepiness to the character, fearing light, garlic and crosses.

Her husband, Jonathan Harker, already had been bitten by the vamp. Jonathan rides back home to stop the Nosferatu from reaching his wife, whom the count had taken an interest in, after seeing her picture. Klaus wanted a vamp bride.

Adjani declines the count's offer of termal necking, and realizes she is the only person who can stop the count. Mina gives the count access to her room, not playing hard to get. The fanged, buck-toothed count jumps on the offer, kicking back with some blood on tap. Nosferatu, enchanting by her beauty and the purity of her blood, falls prey to the sunrise. The crow crows and the death knell has sounded for the evil one.

Now, if you're one to appreciate scenery in a film, this will be a film for you. The count's crib is set on the other side of the Carpathian mountains. Harker originally had to go to meet the count for a land proposition. Along the way, the audience gets a glimpse of the natural beauty of the place. It's too cool.

The music in this film is so chilling that you feel like you've been buried alive. The opening scene show long-dead corpses, rotted with time and age. UK began to turn on the pressure once again and after buckets from Mia Daniel and Tedra Eberhart, free throws from Karri Koach and Jocelyn Mills, the Lady Kats held a 51-53 lead off of a Mills basket in the paint. At that point, Pauletta Monroe of Western tried to gain control. Two minutes later, a pair of free throws tied the score at 57-57.

The score was knotted again at 59-59 who scored a game-high 18 points, to the line.

DALLAS — In the beginning, 260, America's Team was just 1960, America's T barely Dallas' team.

Back then, the Cowboys weren't even the only team in town. Re-member the old Texans of the fledgling American Football League and the zany Dallas foot-ball wars?

In 1963, Lamar Hunt took his Texans to Kansas City and re-named them the Chiefs.

In 1960, the Cowboys were just long-suffering coach named Tom andry with Eddie LeBaron at uarterback and 40-some castoffs rom around the NFL.

The Cowboys were 0-11-1 that first year, the highlight a 31-31 tie with the New York Giants.

with the New York Giants.
In the long ago loneliness of Cotton Bowl Sundays, a crowd genercusty estimated at 10,000 showed
up to see the 1960 Cowboys lose to
the San Francisco 40ers, 26-14.
Last Sunday, a sellout crowd of
64.920 and millions of television
viewers watched the Cowboys
splash to a 30-20 victory over the
49ers in Candlestick Pend.
That exemped America's house.

That earned America's heroes a Super Bowl date with the Buffalo Bills.

Roughly 16,000 folks rattled around the Cotton Bowl as the Los Angeles Rams trimmed the Cowboys, 38-13.

Another 18,500

Another 18,500 were there when Philadelphia beat Dallas, 27-25. Only 23,500 witnessed the team's first victory, a 27-24 thriller over Pittsburgh in the '61 season opener.

charisma contributed mightily to the emerging Dallas presence but more important were events dating back to 1964.

That was the year Landry, Tex Schramm, Gil Brandt and Co. drafted defensive back Mel Renfro and wide receiver Bob Hayes, who, with linebackers Chuck Howley and Lee Roy Jordan,

would make Danias a powerhouse for years to come.

But 1964 was also the year they named quarterback Roger Stau-bach as a future draft choice.

Staubach did not join the Cow-boys until 1969 after completing his naval career.

But before retiring in 1980, "Captain Comeback" would lead "Captain Comeback" would pallas to six NFC championship games and four Super Bowls, win-ning two.

In 1985, he followed Lilly into

In 1985, he followed Lilly into the Hall of Fame. Landry and Schramm would be so honored in the 1990s.

With his health on the decline. along with his team's fortunes, owner Clint Murchison Jr. sold the Cowboys in 1984 to a group head-ed by Dallas businessman H.R. "Bum" Bright.

Dallas won its 13th division title in 1985, but lost to the Rams in the

playoffs and began a steady slide toward NFL obscurity.

The Cowboys were 3-13 in 1988, Landry's last season. Arkansas multimillionaire Jerry Jones bought the team in 1989 and brought in his pal Jimmy Johnson as coach.

Jones and Johnson survived the shakiest of starts, including a public relations fiasco and a 1-15 season, and guided Dallas back into the playoffs in 1991.

Quarterback Troy Aikman, run-ning back Emmitt Smith and wide receiver Michael Irvin, three of six Dallas players headed to the Pro Bowl, have helped create a new Cowboys mystique.


