

when I think you went with me -


I am glad to hear you have been pro-

It seems that we are only on the A.B.C. stage of hygiene and sanitation. I trust the State Com. of N.Y. has succeeded in having a system of cold water mains instituted and the main reason urged is that there shall be a plentiful supply of water for fire purposes but really ~~Waterbury's~~ object is to procure a plentiful supply of water to wash the asphalt streets.


