### GLSO On The Move

The GLSO Board and its committees have been working overtime during the last few months to develop plans for expansion, to write grants to help fund our vision, and to encourage more individuals to become involved in our work. This entire page is about our progress.

In mid November we had a visit from Rick Jung of the Gill Foundation. He made some good recommendations to us and gathered information for the Foundation's consideration of our grant request. We would like to thank all of you who were able to join us for dinner with Rick that evening. We appreciated the community support and we also had a great time together.

We will not know until mid January if we will be awarded that particular grant. We have learned from this visit and from other sources that granting agencies look closely at local fund raising efforts and expect us to demonstrate local support for our work. Accordingly, we are sending out a letter to GLSO members requesting donations for the Pride Center with this issue and hope some of you will be able to respond.

### GLSO Awarded Grant

GLSO has been presented with a grant from the Colin Higgins Foundation of San Francisco. The money will be used to support GLSO's mission "to improve the quality of life for GLBT people and their families" in central and eastern Kentucky. GLSO will be undertaking new efforts to increase outreach to youth, and to provide more information and services to GLBT persons in Eastern Ky.

A portion of the funds will also be used for the operation of the Pride Center. Grant funding includes stipulations for matching funds to be generated in the community. Therefore, your continued financial support is crucial.

This marks a turning point for GLSO which has served the greater Lexington GLBT community since 1977. There will be many opportunities for involvement and support. We hope that you will follow and participate as GLSO moves into the 21st century.

The Pride Center Committee will be meeting at 7 pm on Thursday, Dec. 7 at the Pride Center on Waller Avenue. meeting will focus on the priorities that have been set for the future of the Pride Center and our continuing search for a new facility. ### Helen Keller and Anne Sullivan Macy - Lesbians? by Kelly O'Ferrell

Join me as I take my mind out for a little walk. Sometimes it's just plain fun to make my mind think about things other than food, work, the house...

When I heard that Helen and Anne were together for 50 years - until Anne's death - my first thought was "I wonder if they were lesbians". Then, my vibration shifted and I knew that I had to decide what "lesbian" meant

I remember when I was writing about "Me as a sexual being - alone". I had to define sexual and substituted the word 'passion' for the word sexual. I had the same experience when I wrote "Transgendered - Are You The Woman I Married". I had to define the word 'transgender'.

In both of these cases the definition began with Webster and was incorporated into my experiences.

So, once again, we begin our warmup exercises with Webster:

**Lesbian:** relating to homosexual relations between females

**Homosexual:** atypical sexuality characterized by manisfestations of sexual desire toward a member of one's own sex

**Sexual:** related to the sphere of behavior associated with libidinal gratification

Libidinal: belonging to the libido

Libido: emotional or psychic energy that in psychoanalytical theory is derived from primitive biological urges and that is usually goal-oriented

Urge: to rouse from a dormant state or into life

"We walked down the path to the

well-house...my teacher placed my hand under the spout. As the cool stream gushed over one hand she spelled into the other the word water...I stood still, my whole attention fixed upon the motions of her fingers. Suddenly I felt a misty consciousness as of something forgotten - a thrill of returning thought...That living word awakened my soul, gave it light, hope, joy, set it free!" from The Story of My Life by Helen Keller

So, could the definition of lesbian be "an emotional or psychic energy that awakens the soul and is usually goal-oriented"? A bit broad? I fear I'm standing on the very cliff from which JoAnn Loulan was tossed upon her infamous cross[over].

Opening up the word lesbian to include any woman who has the ability - nay the courage - to experience intimacy with other women takes us (lesbians today) closer still to being more and nothing less. My relationship with Tammy truly is nothing more and nothing less than my friend Annie's relationship with Bob.

Many of my female friends are lesbians who are married to men. I seek, with these women, an emotional and psychic energy that will awaken my soul.

So, what's the difference between Tammy and me and Cathy and me? In both of these relationships I seek intimacy, passion, honesty, shared time in crises and joy, tears and laughter.

It cannot be that the thing that makes my relationship with Tam different from Cathy is genital or orgasmic experiences.

Maybe an answer is at the end of the open definition of lesbian - "and is usually goal-oriented". My

goal's with Tam became different than my goals with Cathy or Jean or any other woman or man. We mutually wanted the same things - the same goals. Whereas my other friends wanted some of what I sought but not all.

So, we return to Helen Keller and Anne Sullivan Macy. Clearly one of their initial goals was to set Helen's mind free with the concept of language. And, at some point - perhaps spoken or unspoken - their mutual goal was to remain together, even through marriage and subsequent divorce (Anne's husband John Macy moved in with Helen and Anne).

They indeed embodied the very essence of the word lesbian.

Once our man-made system of laws catches back up and we cease to have to fight for equality, perhaps the word lesbian will no longer exist as to set us apart from.

Imagine when Tam and I will exist as no more and no less than; when there will be no heterosexual or homosexual.

Were Helen and Anne lesbians? Not today, but someday.

Well, we're back where we started our walk. I can really feel that stretch. It's not quite as much as I want it to be, but at least it's a start. I kept hearing the words of John Lennon's *Imagine* ... all the people, liv-ing in har-mony ...


