

# PRESIDENTIAL LETTER

Well, 1983 is finally over and it's time to reflect. The past year has been an interesting year for the gay community in Kentucky. The Gay Rights issue made its way into the Commonwealth and raised many eyebrows. Sam Dorr, a Louisville banker, was fired from his job because he would not resign his position as president of Dignity/ Louisville. He went to court charging a violation of his constitutional rights and lost. On the surface, this seems like a great set-back in our struggle for equality, but this was the first gay rights case ever brought before the courts in this state and Dorr's loss is not too surprising. What is important is that there was an attempt made to challenge the Kentucky legal system. In the coming years we hope to see more challenges of this sort. establishes a history on this issue and sets the stage for precedent-setting victories for us in the future.

In 1983, we had our first Gay Pride Week Celebration, which was a success. It is interesting that it took 13 years for Lexington to join with the nation in celebrating this event. My hope is that 1984 will see a larger and even more successful Gay Pride Week.

The past year saw some members of the Gay community opening lines of communication with the Governor's office, the Mayor's office, the police and the media. These liaisons were crucial in establishing the gay community as diverse human beings with concerns about the state and city in which they live and work. This forces elected officials to seriously listen to our problems, and makes them accountable for the continued discrimination directed at Lesbian and Gay individuals and our community.

Finally, the new year will see the end of my presidency of this organization. I am leaving GSO to form a more politically oriented group to fight on the front lines, so to speak, of our rights. I have enjoyed my term in office tremendously. In the past 14 months, I have met and worked with some wonderful, beautiful human beings in this community and to them I want to send my continued love. I have made my mistakes, but I feel I have also contributed at least a little to the quality of life that we can look forward to as members of the gay community.

Go out and make 1984 a banner year for yourselves. I love you all.

# NEWS FROM NGTF New York Leaders Meet With Glenn

NGTF Executive Director Virginia M. Apuzzo; Peter Vogel, Co-Chair of the National Association of Gay and Lesbian Democratic Clubs; and six leaders of New York City gay/lesbian community met December 13 with Presidential contender Senator John Glenn (D-OH). The meeting, arranged through the offices of Glenn's New York campaign chairman, State Senate Minority Manfred Ohrenstein, came six weeks after the candidate had expressed his opposition to the Federal gay/lesbian civil rights bill in response to a question from an NGTF representative at a New York forum. After the meeting, Apuzzo and Vogel asserted that Glenn "remained intransigent" on issues of special concern to the lesbian/gay community.

The meeting, which lasted for over an hour, did not center around the civil rights bill as a "litmus test", but rather addressed a broad spectrum of issues especially important to lesbians and gay men, including immigration, AIDS, violence, social service delivery and discrimination against gays and lesbians in the military. The group also challenged Glenn's contention, made earlier in the day, that lesbians and gay men were unfit to work as "teachers or YMCA directors."

While the dialogue was cordial, the Ohio Senator continually focused on the idea of sexual orientation as a choice rather than a pre-existing condition like race or gender. "The Senator acknowledged the existence of discrimination," Apuzzo noted, "but was unwilling to supporting any remedy for that discrimination. This intransigence is unacceptable."

"He offered no new departure from his previous positions," added Vogel. Glenn himself stressed that he wanted a "continuing dialogue with the gay and lesbian community," and conceded that "this issue [gay and lesbian civil rights] has become an item on the national agenda."

On December 15, State Senator Ohrenstein announced his resignation from the Glenn campaign. Ohrenstein's district includes one of the largest gay and lesbian constituencies in the nation.

I hope. I'll find. My heart


