The class barely escaped paying \$50 more for the orchestra when its president, acting with the approxal of the Dean of Men, contracted with the band directly instead of through the Union's centralized booking agency. This has been ex-plained as a misunderstanding. In regard to last year's report, shy should the junior class be charged for gasoline? Why should one doorman be paid \$8.00°. Why wan't the whole business handled so that receipts would rell their own story.

Again referring to this year's Prom, is it wise
to purchase only 375 dance programs — not
enough to go around — at over 26 cents each,
and without pencils? The Union charges \$10.00

for furnishing guards. Guards this year were selected otherwise and paid \$12.00, yet allowed breakage amounting to \$6.50. And why should the class pay for a picture of the president, and for yest, study glores—all amounting to \$10.00. On the hasis of two years only, even a confirmed optimist could not be fully satisfied at the wax in which financial matters were handled. And who is to blame? Regardless of the individuals involved, the junior class has itself to blame for not requiring a public account, for not setting up an adequate system of control for its officers. If there was ever a crying endefor a better form of student government, that need is certainly screaming its justification now.
