Students on South Campus who are tired of driv-ing to a video store to rent a movie or who don't have a car may be in luck.

The Residence Hall Association wants to build a video store inside Pond Library of Commons Mar-

video store inside Pond Library of Commons Market.

The video store would provide mostly freshman and out of state students with an opportunity to rent movies without leaving campus, said Brandon Tosti, president of RHA.

RHA wants the video store open by August.

"Thave three numbers (of video store owners), but only one has contacted me," Tosti said.

Though it's only in the planning stages, everything seems to be running smoothly. James Kuder, vice chancello for student affairs, and Allen Rieman, director of auxiliary services, have given their support of the project. Tosti said.

Little work would need to be done to open the video store, Tosti said.

"The only work would be bringing in the movies, setting up the computers, and as well as getting the legal procedures out of the way," Tosti said.

The video store could house about 300 movies. Students would be able to rent movies using their Plus Account and the store would also feature a drop off box.

With the funds, RHA wants to increase the stipends of the executive members.

They also would like to increase the programing. For example, have more Blanding beach movies, which run more than \$400, Tosti said.

The revenue would also allow RHA to send more members to conferences.

"We'd like to proportionally distribute funding for conferences, so we could send more people and bring more ideas back to campus," Tosti said.

Tosti explained that the ideas for the distribution of funds were not final and would be brought before the executive board-elect after the elections in March, "Hopefully we can make (the video store) a reality," Tosti said.

Growing into research

If you have a class on or near Washington Ave., you may have moticed the greenhouses that sit in front of the University Medical Plaza parking structure.

Leslee Roberts, principal laboratory technician at the Insectory Building, said students have stopped by and asked what type of plants they grow and if they give any plants away.

"The answer is always no," Roberts said. "They wouldn't want them. The plants we have we infest with insects."
Roberts, a UK graduate, works in the entomology department and breeds mittes, predator mittes, a variety of aphids, and other insects. Their purpose is to destroy plants.

Her purpose is to develop plants resistant to pests. Roberts said she spends hours looking at thy insects under a microscope and counting them.

The temperature in the greenhouses ranges from 75 degrees in the day to 65 degrees at night.

Roberts said that her greenhouse "... is ancient" and has no cooling system, making the temperature climb to 100 degrees or more in

system, making the temperature climb to 100 degrees or more in the summer.

"Most of the plants are recycled," Roberts said.

After the plants are used for research, they are steam-sterilized before being discarded, Roberts said. The plants and soil are separated and placed in a trailer, where they are taken to the South Farm and placed in a sink-hole.

UK also has greenhouses located at the Agricultural Science Center and at the South Farm.

"Basically, the greenhouses are for research and teaching," Dwayne Ingram, chair of the Department of Horticulture and Landscape Architecture said. "Plants are not given away."

Ingram said that due to the emphasis on research, students rarely work in the greenhouses and there are no real tours.

The greenhouses are divided between different departments at UK and each has different activities, said Jack Buxton, director of undergraduate studies in horticul-



ture at the Department of Horti-culture and Landscape Architec-ture at UK.

NATION House agrees to keep agencies working

WASHINGTON — With Republicans bruised by two government shutdowns, the House overwhelmingly approved legislation yesterday to keep federal agencies running through March 15. The White House said President Clinton would sign it as the yearlong budget fires cooled on all fronts.

After settling an impasse with the White House over abortion restrictions and spending levels, the House voted 371-42 for a stopgap measure that would temporarily finance dozens of federal agencies, though at lower levels than 1995. The Senate was expected to approve the legislation today.

After taking a dribling in public opinion polls for their combative tactics, Republicans were no longer wowing to halt government's most basic functions unless their demands for a balanced budget in seven years were met.

viding free health care for Johnson's 270 students, the majority of which come from low income families.

nations, dental screenings, treatment and health education. Pat Michaux, Johnson principal, said the center is necessary at Johnson since many of the students do not have access to proper health care. Michaux said students who do not have adequate medical care are not able to do as well in school. "We have to take responsibility for these children and part of that is keeping them healthy," Michaux and the community involvement in tun-

and part of that is keeping them healthy," Michaux said.

Young said the community involvement in running the center shows that "it takes a village to raise a child."

"Poverty is associated with poor health and poor health access," Young said. "We should expect excellence from each student but we have to level the playing field the best we can."

The center operates during regular school hours. Parents sign a consent to authorize care for their children. Eventually the center hopes to treat the siblings of Johnson students.

Dimon said the center is an effective service since many students come in with problems such as ear infections and sore throats, illnesses previously requiring parents to take them to a doctor's office. Now they can be cared for by the school clinic's medical staff.

"It's hard for some of these parents to call and make appointments for their children and many of them don't have cars," Dimon said.

The center is modeled after one incorporated last year at Harrison Elementary School, where 99 percent of the 220 students have now used the clinic for health care.

"We're not here to only instify a healthy outcome."

Debate team prepares for top competition

In a corner office on the fourth floor of Paterson Office Tower is the headquarters of one of the University's least-known competitive teams—the UK Debate Team.

Last year the team was the top-seed going into the National Debate Tournament for the second year in a row, outranking schools like Harvard and Wake Forest.

In 1995, the team also set a record for winning the Top Speaker Award more times than any other college in the country.

Debate is much more than talking about an assigned topic for a few minutes, and it takes more than an eloquent delivery to win a tournament.

To complete successfully with schools include a large and UK, lot of preparation is required. Starting from the moment the year's topic is announced in mid-July, the UK debaters begin their research. From then until nationals around the first of April, they must constandly update their research files, analyze and reanalyze the topic, plan their arguments and practice their speeches, said J.W. Patterson, director of debate. Political science senior Paul Skiermont said team members can spend 20 hours per week on debate-related activities.

This time does not include a week and a half in August and a week in January when they return to campus before classes begin to get in extra practice.

Debaters must spend long tournament weekends that last Thursday afternoon through Monday evenings.

Although political science freshman Jason Teagle admits it can be "tough to balance" debate, activities with academic responsibilities, he said that it is worth the effort.

"Because of debate, I am much more confident speaking in front of people, and I have gained an appreciation of different points of view," Teagle

Madison's fire still burns

Breakthroughs into the future are expected, however breakthroughs into the past are rare and by nature precarious.

UK history professor Lance Banning is one of those who have successfully broken ground with the past.

Branching away from the accepted scholarly thoughts on James Madison, the fourth President of the United States, is Ban-

ning's Pulitzer Prize nominated biography The Sacred Fire of Liberty: Junes Madison and the Founding of the Federal Republic.

"The Sacred Fire is a somewhat new view of James Madison's contributions, and Madison was one of the four or five most important figures and part of one of the most important generations of public men," Banning said.

Taking advantage of the standard historical documents, Banning re-read and re-evaluated in his own terms the evolution of

thought of one of the most significant figures in American history.

"When I came to the original sources, his papers, letters and other writings, what I saw there, is something that led me to different conclusions," Banning said.

As a prime player in the Constitutional Convention, Madison aided in the drafting of the Constitution and through co-authoring The Federaliti Papers, he thoughtfully advocated state ratification of the Constitution.

Madison continued his educated persuasions at the first Congress where he supported the Bill of Rights. His resumé was exemplary.

However, Madison may be most well known as a defender of a strong national government during the 1780s. As well, accepted is the idea that his nationalist view shifted to an anti-federalist stand-point 10 years later.



Argument for death penalty ignores facts

This is in response to David Samford's recent essay on the "uncomfortable necessity" of capital punishment on Wednesday. I will ignore for the purposes of this letter that Mr. Samford relies purely on rhetoric and provides no factual justification for his viewpoint. I focus on three issues: First, a factual error; second, the irrevocable nature of the death penalty; and third the caprice or discrimination involved in use of the death penalty.

Samford states that "crime is on the rise," however this statement is not supported by the evidence. According to the FBI "Preliminary 1995" Uniform Crime Report, "violent crime is down 5 percent, amurder down 12 percent, and forcible rape down 7 percent in the first six months of 1995.

crime has decline in three of the past four years.

My second point refers to Mr Samford's comment that capital punishment is the "ultimate form of discipline."

I am not sure I understand what this statement means, but believe it makes a point which is actually the biggest problem with the death penalty, the irrevocable nature of the sentence. A study published by the Stanford Law Review showed that there have

been 350 capital convictions within the past century in which the defendant was later proven innocent, and of that number, 25

were executed.

The authors state that "Our criminal justice system cannot be made fail-safe because it is run by human beings, who are fallible. Execution of innocent persons is bound to occur." Seventy-five of the cases mentioned in the study occurred between 1970 and 1985.

To close this point, I quote from a 19th century member of the French government, "I shall ask for the abolition of the punishment of death until I have the infallibility of human judgment demonstrated to me."

My final point is that in practice, the application of the death penalty is discriminatory for at best capricious). In Kentucky, our black population makes up 7.1 percent of the total, yet 52 percent of the total, yet 52 percent. The authors state that "Our

cent of those executed in this state over the past century have been black. In another study, a person accused of killing a white was found to be 4.3 times more likely to be sentenced to death than a person accused of killing a black person. These types of statistics prompted the Kentucky State Legislature to put forth the Kentucky Racial Justice Act (which is up for a vote in the house soon) to put an end to such inequities.



UK enrolled 77 National Merit Scholars in the fall 1995 semester, placing UK in the top 10 among America's public uni-

versities.

UK ranks eighth of public institutions nationwide, and 20 among all college and universities in the U.S. Texas had the most Merit Scholars in the nation with 221.

Among the benchmark institutions, schools that UK compares itself to, UK ranked second in National Merit Scholars. Ohio State University ranked first among benchmarks with 91. Merit Scholars.

UK also ranked second in Southeastern Conference schools, Florida with 129 was first.

UK enrolled more Merit Scholars than all other Kentucky private and public institutions combined. The University of Louisville had 11.

Abortion clinic violence not part of direct conspiracy

WASHINGTON — An 18month investigation of violence
against abortion clinicis gathered
evidence toward solving a handful
of arson cases but found no direct
evidence of a nationwide conspiracy, law enforcement officials said
yesterday.

ment's clinics task force is shifting strategy: to focus on regional arson prosecutions instead of on the single grand jury sitting in suburban Alexandria, Va., since late 1994. The grand jury is dis-banding March 26, when its term ends.

Abortion protesters said the change in tactics vindicates their criticism of the investigation. Advocates of abortion rights worried that the federal effort might be dwindling but expressed hope that arsonists would indeed be prosecuted soon.

"We found a lot of cheerleaders for this activity, but no national conspiracy," A senior law

enforcement official said. "How-ever, we have managed to virtually wrap up a handful of unsolved arsons."

Evidence is to be presented within months to federal grand juries where the arson fires occurred, said the official.

He would not identify the loca-tions

tions.

The regional approach is more in line with traditional Justice Department investigations than empaneling grand juries with national responsibilities.


