John T. Scopes '24, head of the de-partment of science at Dayton and Rhea central high schools, was bound over to action of the grand ury May

Professor Scopes was given a hearing in the courthouse at Dayton before Magistrates C. H. Benton, Walter C. Green and W. S. Sanborn. The defendent did not deny he had taught from a textbook which makes references to evolution, but insisted that the new state law is unconstitutional. He was released on bond of \$1,000. While he was a student at the University he majored in the science departments, taking advanced courses in physics, chemistry, and mathematics.

Many Lectures on Scientific Subjects Delivered

Chamberlin, of the University of Chicago, will deliver a lecture on earthquakes today at the twelfth annual meeting of the Kentucky Academy of Science, in the Physics lecture room of Science Hall.
