

Senate rejects Lewinsky testimony

WASHINGTON — The Senate yesterday rejected 70-30 a last-dlitch request by House prosecutors to summon Monica Lewinsky for live testimony in President Clinton's impeachment trial. Republicans also shrank from a plan to declare the president guilty without ousting him from office. With support from several Democrats, though, Senate Republicans approved the House prosecutors request to show at the trial this weekend "all or portions" of the videotaped depositions of Lewinsky, presidential friend Vernon Jordan and White House adviser Sidney Blumenthal.

U.S. may send troops to Kosovo

WASHINGTON — President Clinton said yesterday he is seriously considering sending U.S. troops to enforce the peace if a settlement is reached in Kosovo. Clinton said he was concerned that the violence, if unchecked, could spread to Abbania and Macedonia, and even draw in Greece and Turkey.

Secretary of State Madeleine Albright said, "Our contribution will be no more than several thousand troops," with Europeans providing the bulk of any peacekeeping force.

Serbs to attend Kosovo peace talks

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — Serbia's parliament voted yesterday to send a delegation to Kosovo peace talks, but it insisted Belgrade won't budge on Western demands to give broad self-rule to the province. The one-sided vote — 227-3 with three abstentions — was the last hurdle to an internationally brokered peace conference starting tomorrow outside Paris.

King Hussein's transplant fails

AMMAN, Jordan — A bone marrow transplant performed on King Hussein failed, and the Jordanian leader decided to fly home yesterday from the United States. He is in critical condition. A statement issued by Hussein's private physician said the 63-year-old monarch's condition "has become critical due to the failure of the function of internal organs."

Richard Ashby's trial on 20 counts of involuntary manslaughter began one day after the first anniversary of the tragedy that happened when the wing of his EA-6B Prowler sliced through cables supporting the Mount Cermis gondola in Cavalese, Italy.

One-fifth of Iraq air defense gone

WASHINGTON — American and British mis-siles and bombs have destroyed about one-fifth of traq's air defenses, most in the past five weeks of cat-and-mouse clashes between western war-planes and Saddam Hussein's pilots and anti-air-craft batteries, Pentagon officials said. Mean-while, the Clinton administration appears to be expanding from simply firing at anti-aircraft sites in self-defense to launching more offensive attacks like Tuesday's strike against three Iraqi anti-ship missile launchers near the Gulf.

States to divide \$5B tobacco trust

RALEIGH, N.C. — Tobacco states reached a tentative agreement yesterday on dividing a \$5.15 billion trust fund for farmers that would be financed by the major cigarette makers. North Carolina, the largest flue-cured tobacco state, and Kentucky, the biggest burley tobacco producer, would receive the biggest shares under the proposal — 38.34 percent and 29.97 percent, sources said.

Dow ends down 62.31

NEW YORK — Stocks ended lower after a day of wide swings, as aggressive profit-taking in technology shares overwhelmed strength in industrial names. The Dow lost 62.31 to close at 9,304.50. NYSE decliners led advancers 1,888-1,083. The Nasdaq ended down 82.87 at 2,410.54.

Tyson's fate in judge's hands

WASHINGTON — Former heavyweight champion Mike Tyson once again faces jail time and the possible loss of his boxing license. Tyson goes to court tomorrow to be sentenced on two counts of second-degree assault stemming from an altercation after a minor traffic accident in August. The sentence will help determine whether Tyson will have to return to jail in Indiana for violating probation.
