

### World Aids Day December 1, 2011

Nearly 1.2 million people in the United States are living with HIV infection, with approximately 50,000 Americans becoming infected with HIV each year. The United States has made tremendous progress against HIV infection, preventing hundreds of thousands of new infections and helping people live longer, healthier, more productive lives with effective treatments. Although new infections are stable and people with HIV are living longer, greater effort is needed. growing population of people living with HIV will lead to increases in new HIV infections if current prevention efforts are not intensified. Too many people do not know they have HIV and too few people with HIV are receiving proper prevention, treatment, care services. To reduce new HIV infections, CDC is investing in proven interventions that will have the greatest possible impact on reducing the spread of HIV in the United States.

CDC and its partners are pursuing High-Impact Prevention to reduce new HIV infections, a strategy guided by the National HIV/AIDS Strategy (NHAS). Released by the White House in 2010, NHAS calls on the nation to intensify HIV prevention efforts in the hardest-hit geographic areas and populations, using the interventions that will have the greatest impact.

The key components of High-Impact Prevention include:

 Prioritized programs that will have the maximum impact on reducing new HIV infections We have more proven prevention tools than ever to help stop the spread of HIV. Proven tools include HIV testing and retention in care; access to condoms and sterile syringes; risk reduction programs for HIV-positive and HIV-negative individuals; antiretroviral therapy for infected individuals to reduce the risk of transmission; and screening and treatment for other sexually transmitted infections.

Testing is the only way to identify the nearly 250,000 Americans currently living with HIV who do not know they're infected – that's 1 in 5 of all Americans with HIV. HIV testing and diagnosis are the first steps toward connecting people to life-extending treatment, as well as helping to prevent the spread of HIV to partners.

HIV testing should be a routine part of health care. CDC recommends:

•Everyone ages 13-64 get tested at least once.

•Gay, bisexual, and other men who have sex with men (MSM) be tested for HIV and STIs at least annually. CDC data show that sexually active MSM might benefit from more frequent testing (e.g., every 3 to 6 months).

•Others at high risk for HIV should also get tested more often (at least annually). This includes injection-drug users and their sex partners, persons who exchange sex for money or drugs, and sex partners of HIV-infected persons.




Lexington Drag Legend Jon "Juice" Nolan

### Nolan passed away a few days later

NOLAND Jon "Juice", 66, died Sat, Nov 26, 2011 after a courageous fight with an extended illness. Jon was born Jan 23, 1945 in Bicknell, IN. Jon was known for living life "his way" and is considered to be a legend by bringing to life the character Jeanette Wylde primarily in Evansville, IN, Louisville and Lexington. In the 60's, Jon began performing and continued with great popularity and success throughout the early 90's. He would often tell stories of the struggles and battles that he experienced as he entertained at a time where diversity was discouraged and not celebrated. Over the years Jon inspired many young performers and helped them to perfect their talents and has mentored and been a role model to hundreds of others. Jon was choreographer, show director and emcee/performer for years at a local nightclub. Anyone that was lucky enough to have seen "Juice" perform still remembers how great he was on stage and what an amazing comedic drag artist he was. A celebration of life memorial will be held at a later date.



### Domestic Violence in Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Relationships

Domestic violence in the GLBT community is a serious issue. The rates of domestic violence in same-gender relationships is roughly the same as domestic violence against heterosexual women (25%). As in opposite-gendered couples, the problem is likely underreported.

Facing a system which is often oppressive and hostile, those involved in same-gender battering frequently report being afraid of revealing their sexual orientation or the nature of their relationship. Others who do not identify as GLBT may not feel that their relationship fits the definition but may still be in an abusive and dangerous relationship.

In many ways, domestic violence in lesbian, bisexual and gay relationships is the same as in opposite-gendered (e.g., heterosexually-paired) relationships:

No one deserves to be abused.

Abuse can be physical, sexual, emotional, psychological, and involve verbal behavior used to coerce, threaten or humiliate.

Abuse often occurs in a cyclical fashion.

The purpose of the abuse is to maintain control and power over one's partner.

The abused partner feels alone, isolated and afraid, and is usually convinced that the abuse is somehow her or his fault, or could have been avoided if she or he knew what to do.

You are not alone!

The Brenda Cowan Coalition will be providing a domestic violence support group to members of the GLBT community. This is provided free of charge and confidential. Support group will start meeting in January. For more information please contact Samara


