A NEW HOME for MCC

Faith Metropolitan Community Church announces its new location at 145 Burt Road, Suite7. The new site is part of a continuing journey to a "new vision" for this church, formerly known as Lexington's Metropolitan Community Church. Since March of 2000, the church been pastored by the Reverend Mel (Melody) Bailey, an ordained minister in the Universal of Metropolitan Fellowship Community Churches. UFMCC is a worldwide Christian denomination of over 300 churches in fifteen countries.

In the last year, Faith MCC has undergone changes in its worship style, leadership, bylaws, and even its name. Changing its name to "Faith" MCC, the church strives to invite and include all people seeking a loving relationship with their God. "Faith" defines the people who come together for worship. Faith MCC is a unique church with a special message and ministry. The church invites others to share in the quest to help all people feel included in God's love.

As a member of UFMCC, Faith Metropolitan Community Church shares a rich Christian history and tradition dating back to 1968, when Reverend Troy Perry met with twelve others in the denomination's first worship service. Faith MCC, as a member of UFMCC, is a church with a purpose. UFMCC celebrates life in a manner combining diverse Christian traditions. A three-point gospel empowers people to Christian salvation, Christian community and Christian social action to the world.

UFMCC takes risks for human rights and has served as a vanguard of civil and human rights movements including efforts in the mid-1990s to end the ban on lesbian and gays in the U.S. military, respond to human rights violations in Brazil, and fight the radical religious right. Since its earliest years, UFMCC led marches, promoted demonstrations and staged sit-ins to gain justice for lesbian and gay people.

UFMCC offers love and healing. Compassion is at the heart of every Metropolitan Community Church. Christian love is embodied through the ministry of Faith MCC. Health and wholeness of spirit, mind and body are fostered. The Pastor conducts Holy Union ceremonies as a way to celebrate and bless the joining of same-sex cou-Metropolitan Community Churches have risen to meet the unforeseen challenges presented by the AIDS/HIV health crisis. UFMCC has been at the forefront in development of networks to provide education, care, comfort and hope.

On Sunday, February 11, Faith MCC will offer a "Blessing of Relationships" to all couples living in loving, committed relationships. The Vagina Monologues

In The Vagina Monologues. playwrite Eve Ensler gives voice to a chorus of lusty, outrageous, brave and thoroughly human stories. This Obie Award-winning play, a lively and liberating series of monologues, combines painful subjects with sharp, incisive humor. This hilarious, groundbreaking play has rocked audiences around the world and will be featured in Lexington for one night only, Monday, Feb 12 at the Singletary Cener for the Arts, 7 pm. Tickets are available for \$15 from the Singletary Center Box Office 257-4929. Proceeds will benefit the Bluegrass Rape Crisis Center & Actor's Guild.

Directed by Deb Shoss, this local production stars Debra Hensley as playwright Eve Ensler; with Kathy Stein, Rev. Kelly Flood,

Cathy Rawlings and Missy Johnston. This play is a celebration of women through the looking glass of the vagina. The audience will leave with the sense that 'vagina' should no longer be a taboo word. A post-play discussion moderated by Nikky Finney, and featuring the cast and UK Women's Studies Director, Joan Callahan will follow the performance.

You do not want to miss this production. Ensler digs into the heart of what it means to be a woman, an individual and a survivor. Writing in the Village Voice, Blanche McCrary Boyd said, "The brilliance of The Vagina Monologues lies in its ability to bring every woman to a common identity, like an international AA meeting for vaginas."

A galaxy of stars, including Whoopi Goldberg, Glenn Close,

Susan Sarandon, Winona Ryder, Calista Flockhart, Rosie Perez, Amy Irving, Julie Kavner, and Kate Winslet have performed the collection of intimate vignettes -- culled from interviews with scores of women -- that make up the 46-year-old playwright's script.

Last year, Ensler joined the V-Day College Initiative, in which colleges across the country stage the monologues as part of a V-Day of awareness about violence against women. Even the most educated, established feminists wake up to their own encoded hypocrisies when they see the play. They also laugh very, very hard.

Focus on GLBTQ Youth and Young Adults

Youth Support Needed

It is no surprise to our community that it is difficult to be young and gay. Middle and High Schools are rampant with homophobia. social intolerance and harassment puts a lot of pressure on young people who are questioning their sexual orientation, weather they are the object of the harassment or not. It use to be easier to stay in denial, to put off the internal struggle for a few years, or to know but pass as straight during difficult adolescent years. Now, our entire culture is more familiar with what it means to be gay, lesbian, or bisexual and for some kids this means increased support but for others it means verbal and physical assault, low selfesteem and other psychological problems.

Last month we printed an article from the Stop Youth Suicide Campaign. That organization has also printed a flyer recently that has more information specific to GLBT youth. A 1997 Univ. of Minnesota study reported that gay and bisexual male youth are 7 times more likely to attempt suicide than their heterosexual peers. Another study the same year found that this group was 14 times more likely to attempted. Lesbian or questioning young women are also at increased risk but the statistics are not as high for them.

In addition to suicide there are other damaging outcomes. Studies indicate that LBGTQ youth are more at risk to be victims of family violence, to be homeless, to drop out of school, to abuse drugs, and for girls, to become pregnant. (Trying to

prove they are not gay perhaps?)

The news is not all bad. Many of our young people are coming out at an earlier age because they are proud of who they are and ready to join our community. They are organizing support groups, becoming social activists, and looking for jobs, colleges and careers that will support their intention of being proudly queer.

All of the youth, proud, ashamed, or most commonly somewhere in between, need our support. What can you do? Here are some suggestions.

- Attend the GLSO Youth

The Midwest, Bisexual, Lesbian, Gay, Transgender, Ally College Conference, held annually at universities throughout the Midwest since 1993, focuses on issues that GLBT persons continually face.

This year's conference, under the theme of "Out and About: Breaking the Silence, Breaking the Boundaries, Breaking the Labels," is being held at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign Feb. 16-18. Topics to be discussed include sexuality, HIV/AIDS, gender issues, sexism, racism, classism, ageism, albeism, and homophobia.

Keynote speakers will include actor Wilson Cruz; Shane Windmeyer, coeditor of "Out on Fraternity Row: Personal Accounts Being Gay in a College Fraternity;" and Deirdre McCloskey, author of "Crossing: A Memoir," among others. Entertainers will include Pansy Division, Laurence, Amasong, Annie Chey, HIS Kings, and Staceyann Chin.

One World Films

This year the One World Film Festival will focus on the lives of women in a variety of cultures. All the viewings will be free and open to the public. Check the March GLSO for five more films to be shown.

On Tuesday, Feb. 27, at 7 pm, Seven Sisters will be shown in the State Theater inside the Ky Theater. Seven Sisters is a new vision of Appalachia which powerfully evokes the coming of age of seven women through their rural to urban migration. This is a story of heroism, not in a grandiose, earth-shaking way, but through a collection of small acts of sacrifice, courage and generosity. At the center of it all are seven strong willed and colorful women-one family and the fierce bonds that hold them together.

Patrick Donohew, the director of this documentary and a native Lexingtonian, will be joining us to discuss his work after the viewing. A number of the sisters in the film will also be present to answer questions. A reception will follow the film.

On Sunday, March 4, Voyages will be shown at 2 pm at the Central Library Theater, downtown. This film

was voted best Feature Film at the Jerusalem Film Festival, 1999.

Voyages is set in the present and concerns itself with the after effects of the Holocaust. It tells three linked stories focusing on the lives of three elderly Jewish women who find themselves facing new situations and struggling to make sense out of their history.

On Wednesday, March 7 Mississippi Masala will be shown at Lexington Community College at 7 pm. This story centers on a Indian family that lives in Greenwood, Mississippi managing a road side motel and participating in a community of other Indian families. Growing up in this country and feeling more a part of the american culture than her parents, the daughter Mina becomes interested in dating Demetrias, an African American. Both families struggle to come to terms with this blossoming relationship.

This is a love story that also gives the viewer a glimpse into the lives of Indian immigrants to this county. The film raises questions about the relationships among minority cultures within the United States, and about the various guises of racism.

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Now that the Election is Over: A Call to Reflection-and Action!

Well, it was one for the history books, but now it's over! By the time you read this, George W. Bush will have become, deservedly or otherwise, our president. Although he won a substantial minority of the lesbigay/transgendered vote, for most of us, myself included, his election represents one that we lost. I'm not surprised. The White House has been going back and forth between Democrats and Republicans long before we were born, and probably will still be long after we are gone.

Despite some voices of alarm and borderline (?) paranoia raised from within our community, we are NOT going to concentration camps. Folks, Vice President Cheney has an openly lesbian daughter with whom he maintains a good relationship. The gradual move toward a more secular society will continue, and we will eventually catch up with Western Europe as a more tolerant, inclusive society. The only reason we are behind them to begin with is that Europe for centuries dumped its unwanted religious fanatics here.

Here are some suggestions for weathering the next few years. I am endeavoring to present a variety of alternatives appealing to lesbigay/trans individuals of varying theologies, ethical systems, and political affiliations.

First of all, look out for number one. If you are living in an intolerant community which looks likely to get worse, get out! You are ultimately responsible for your own well-being. My partner and I have agreed never to move to a state with an antisodomy law.

LBGT indeviduals tend to be urban, well-educated, and childless, we have some disposable income. Take some of that money and send it to your local lesbigay/trans organization. Then join the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, the American Civil Liberties Union...If all you do is bellyache about the current political situation while doing nothing about it. don't expect me to waste my time listening to you! While our community will weather the storm, reproductive rights are probably in much more trouble. Would you be willing to give money each month to ensure that women wishing to terminate a pregnancy can afford to travel to where they may do so safely and legally? There are many minority communities outside our own who represent potential allies, and now is the time to start reaching out.

If you TRULY feel that your life is in danger, then buy a gun and bullets and learn to use your firearm responsibly and safely. You have a right to defend yourself. If it became widely know that lots of us had concealed-carry permits, you can bet the gay-bashers would think twice. OK, I just

came out of the closet; I'm NOT a pacifist and I'm against gun control! Plus, if things get REALLY ugly, an armed community is a much less attractive target.

As for the ongoing AIDS epidemic, I suspect research will continue unabated, if for no other reason than that it is rapidly moving away from being a "gay disease" in this country. In the meanwhile, protect yourself and your partner(s) by practicing safer sex, and encourage others to do likewise. Many young gay males are engaged in high-risk behavior.

Finally, quit supporting the bigots. If every gay or bi Catholic priest and bishop, celibate or otherwise (and before I turned Heathen I knew plenty in both categories), put down his chalice, walked away from the altar, and told why, that institution, arguably one of our biggest and most powerful enemies, would lose much of its power. If every lesbigay/transgendered member of an anti-gay religious group resigned and took his/her money, time, and talent elsewhere, those denominations would lose a LOT and get a HUGE wake-up call

Dare to live as an openly lesbigay/trans and civic-minded individual in what is still and almost certainly will remain one of history's freest and most prosperous nations. You will not only be contributing to your own wellbeing, but also be passing on the precious gift of greater freedom to those who will come after us!
