Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, June 5, 1962.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the Fresident's Office on the campus of the University at 10:00 a.m., EST, Tuesday, June 5, 1962, with the following members present: Governor Bert Combs, Chairman; Harper Gatton, Aubrey Brown, Robert H. Hillenmeyer, Judge James H. Sutherland, T. D. Clark, Dr. H. B. Murray, Dr. R. W. Bushart, Sam Ezelle, Dr. Paul B. Hall, Clifford Smith and Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci; absent, W. F. Foster, Emerson Beauchamp, Wendell Butler, Smith D. Broadhent, Jr., and Floyd H. Wright. President Frank G. Dickey and Secretary Frank D. Peterson, Vice President, Business Administration, met with the Board.

A. Meeting Opened.

Governor Combs asked Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci, Vice Chairman of the Board of Trustees, to preside. Dr. Angelucci took the chair, expressed a welcome to the press and the public, and called upon Dr. Ross Webb, member of the University of Kentucky Department of History and ordained minister in the Episcopal Church, to lead the meeting in prayer.

B. Approval of Minutes.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the minutes of the Board of Trustees of April 3, 1962, were approved as published.

C. Financial Report.

The Treasurer made a financial report for the ten months ended April 30, 1962. He read the transmittal letter and the balance sheet; whereupen the Chairman recalled that the financial report had been in the hands of members of the Board of Trustees for the past ten days and asked if there were any questions concerning the report.

The Current General Fund budgetary operations for the period reflect income realized for educational and general purposes in the amount of \$ 21,305,107.16 or 99% of the budget estimate of \$ 21,517,100.93. The expenditures, including encumbrances outstanding amount to \$ 17,390,056.35, This represents 81% of the total Current General Fund Appropriations of \$ 21,463,943.58.

Members of the Board being familiar with the procedure, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the requisitions and orders listed in the letter were ratified and approved.

D. Contract with United States Armed Forces Institute Approved.

Mr. Peterson presented a new correspondence course contract between the United States Government and the University for the fiscal year 1962-63. He explained that the contract is a negotiated one and provides for charges that may be made by the University for college courses by correspondence taken by members of the United States Armed Forces. Mr. Peterson explained that the courses are those contained in the catalog and the charges those heretofore approved by the Board of Trustees, and that this contract is necessary in order that charges may be paid by the United States Government. He recommended that the contract be approved and authorized executed; whereupon a motion was made, seconded and carried approving the contract and authorizing same executed.

E. Contract for a Loan and Use of Radiation Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted a contract between the University and the United States of America providing for a loan and use of radium by the University of Kentucky Medical Center. The contract is referred to as No. 37. It covers the loan of 156.192 mgms. of radium with a value of \$3,896.29. The loan is made by the radium loan program, National Cancer Institute, United States Public Health Service, for the period May 1, 1962, through April 30, 1963. He further stated that the University will pay the transportation charges involved in shipping the radium to and from the National Cancer Institute and see that proper insurance is carried in full value.

Members of the Board being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was approved and authorized executed.

F. Contract between the United States Atomic Energy Commission and the University of Kentucky College of Engineering Approved.

Mr. Peterson reported a contract with the United States Atomic Energy Commission providing that a grant of \$25,000.00 be made by the Atomic Energy Commission to the University of Kentucky College of Engineering to be used for the acquisition of equipment to be used in a nuclear and/or engineering program. He stated that the grant will enable the University to purchase part of the equipment needed, that the University will agree to use the grant for the exclusive purchase of equipment and materials, and it will comply with all of the provisions contained in the contract. Mr. Peterson recommended that the grant be accepted and that the agreement be approved and authorized executed.

Members of the Board being duly advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the grant was accepted and the agreement approved and authorized executed.

G. Agreement with Department of Finance Purchase of Fcod Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted a Memorandum of Agreement between the University of Kentucky Food Service and the Department of Finance, acting for the Medical Center. He stated that, since the food purchased for use by the University Hospital cafeteria would be paid for in the main from appropriated funds, the Department of Finance desired to enter into a contract whereby the University of Kentucky Food Storage Center would acquire food products for the Hospital cafeteria from April 1, 1962, through June 30, 1962. He stated that the Agreement had the approval of the Department of Finance, the University Hospital and the University of Kentucky. He recommended its approval.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Agreement was approved and authorized executed.

H. Automatic Vending Service Food and Beverage Contract.

Mr. Peterson submitted a proposed Agreement between the University and the Automatic Canteen Company of America for automatic service of food and beverages for a period April 1, 1962, through June 30, 1963. The contract was a negotiated agreement providing for graduated percentage based upon volume of sales in various categories.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was denied with the direction that open bidding be received for vending service at the University and that a determination be made at that time, based upon the ability of bidders to supply services required.

I. Air Flight Training Contracts Approved.

Mr. Peterson presented a request for authorization to renew the United States Army Flight Training contracts for the Air Force ROTC unit and the Ground Force ROTC unit. He stated that the contracts are the same as those now in effect and that the University will contract with the Bohmer Flying Service for flight training. The Government will pay all costs incident thereto, and all insurance protection for University personnel and trainees as now in effect will be renewed to cover the new contract. Mr. Peterson recommended that the contracts be approved and authorized executed.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contracts were approved and authorized executed.

J. Budget Adjustment for Furniture Purchase.

Mr. Peterson related that Residence Hall No. 6 for women needs furniture and that this will cost approximately \$50,000. He recommended that this sum be appropriated and authorized transferred from the unappropriated surplus of the University, which amount over a period of years has been built up from operating gains of the residence halls. He stated that the equipment should be placed on order at once in order to have it here for September use.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the dormitory equipment was authorized purchased and the sum of \$50,000 was authorized appropriated and made available for purchase of the equipment.

K. X-ray Equipment Purchase Authorized.

Mr. Peterson stated that Dr. Harold Rosenbaum, Lexington, Ky., now a full-time staff member of the Medical Center, has offered x-ray equipment formerly used by him to the Medical Center, to be purchased

from funds of the Kentucky Research Foundation. He stated that we thought the offer was reasonable. Request for quotations for similar equipment having been taken, and the bid of \$8,386.00 submitted by Dr. Rosenbaum being low, Mr. Peterson recommended that the equipment be purchased. Because we are dealing with a staff member of the University, we thought it best to bring the whole matter to the Board of Trustees. Dr. Willard explained what the equipment would be used for and that he thought it was a good buy.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the purchase was authorized and approved.

L. Approval of HHFA Loan.

The Vice President for Business Administration, Mr. Frank D. Peterson, was then called upon to report on the status of negotiations with Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government relative to the financing of the proposed enlargement of the Student Union Building on the main campus at Lexington. Mr. Peterson referred to the Minutes of the Board Meeting of April 3, 1962, and reminded the Board that on such occasion he had reported on this subject. Prior to that time negotiations with Housing and Home Finance Agency (HHFA) had culminated in the submission to the Board of Trustees of a proposed Loan Agreement dated as of July 1, 1961, in anticipation of financing in the amount of \$1,350,000.00. Subsequently construction bids were received after solicitation by public advertising, and it was determined that the aggregate cost of the Project, including Architects' fees and the HHFA field expense fee (but excluding moveable furnishings and equipment) would be \$2,600,000.00. ascertained that \$575,000.00 could be obtained from the capital fund allotment of the Commonwealth, and negotiations were opened with HHFA looking to an increase in the HHFA loan commitment to \$2,025,000.00.

In order to support financial feasibility, it was necessary that the Board increase the Student Activity Fees (also referred to as "Special Fees"), effective September 1, 1962, by the amount of \$12.00 for each full-time student for each semester of the Regular Term of two semesters, and \$6.00 for each full-time student for the Regular Summer Session; such increased amounts to be pledged for deposit in the "Revenue Fund" in addition to the Faculty Club Fees of \$15.00 per year for each Faculty Club Member, and the previously agreed rentals for the Cafeteria and Grill in the sum of \$30,000.00 per annum, the Book Store in the sum of \$25,000.00 per annum, the Faculty Club in the sum of \$12,000.00 per annum, and the Barber Shop in the sum of \$1,500.00 per annum.

Mr. Peterson reported that HHFA had recently submitted a new Loan Agreement, dated as of May 1, 1962, contemplating issuance by the Board of \$2,025,000.00 "University of Kentucky Student Union Bonds of 1962," to be dated July 1, 1962, consisting of Series A Bonds in the amount of \$1,350,000.00 for which the Government would bid par and accrued interest at a coupon rate of 3-1/2% per annum, and Series B Bonds in the amount of \$675,000.00 for which HHFA would bid par and accrued interest at an interest coupon rate of 3-3/8% per annum - subject, as in the past, to the acceptance by the Board of any equal or better bids which may be received when the bonds are publicly advertised and offered for sale. The Series A Bonds would mature serially in various amounts on July 1, in the years 1965 to 1994, inclusive, and the Series B Bonds would mature serially in various amounts on July 1, in the years 1995 to 2002, inclusive. After pointing out these salient features, Mr. Peterson read in full to the Board the mimeographed Loan Agreement and the mimeographed Exhibit B attached to and made a part thereof, setting forth the Special Conditions relating to the HHFA commitment. Reading of the printed Exhibit A attached to the Loan Agreement was omitted by reason of the fact that the same sets forth standard "Terms and Conditions" applicable to all HHFA Loan Agreements, and familiar to the Board from similar transactions in the past.

Thereafter Board Member Harper Gatton introduced, caused to be read, and moved adoption of a Resolution, as follows:

"BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, that the Loan Agreement dated May 1, 1962, tendered to the Board by the United States of America, acting through its Housing and Home Finance Agency, Community Facilities Commissioner, identified by HHFA as its Project No. CH-Ky-50(S), Contract No. H-302-637, is hereby approved and accepted by this Board, with all of the terms, provisions and conditions thereof; and the appropriate officers of this Board are hereby authorized and directed to execute the requisite number of copies thereof and transmit the same to HHFA for execution; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in the event it should become necessary or desirable that implementing action be taken from time to time between meetings of this Board, all necessary power and authority is hereby vested in the Executive Committee, including but not limited to the formal and detailed authorization of the bonds, approval and authorization of the requisite "Trust Indenture" and public advertisement and sale of the bonds in conformity with the Loan Agreement and the prescribed practices and procedures of HHFA,"

The motion for the adoption of said Resolution was seconded by Board Member James Sutherland. Full discussion followed, and thereafter the Chairman put the question and the following voted:

Voting "Aye": Governor Bert Combs, Harper Gatton, Robert H. Hillenmeyer, Judge James H. Sutherland, Dr. H. B. Murray, Dr. R. W. Bushart, Sam Ezelle, Dr. Paul B. Hall, Clifford Smith and Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci.

Voting "Nay": None.

The Chairman then announced that the Motion had been carried, and the Resolution adopted. The Secretary was authorized to furnish certified copies to HHFA as evidence of the authority of the officers of the Board to execute the Loan Agreement.

M. Application for \$10,000,000 Loan from HHFA Approved.

Mr. Peterson read the following letter:

June 4, 1962

President Frank G. Dickey University of Kentucky

Dear President Dickey:

Currently the University has facilities to house a few more than 1400 women students and about 1400 men students. Our enrollment for the current year now closing made it necessary to house women in one dormitory heretofore used for men. We are now considering the feasibility of putting 300-500 additional women in Men's Residence Halls in September 1962. It can be predicted fairly well that we will have 700 to 1000 more women in 1963 than we can house. We will have 1000 to 1500 more freshman and sophomore men than we can house by this date. I think it can be safely predicted that we will have an increase of more than another 1000 for the year 1964.

Therefore, we desire to request the Board of Trustees for authority to apply for a loan to construct dormitory facilities that will house between 2000 and 2500 students plus kitchen and dining facilities for these people. It is estimated that the construction cost, site development, utility facilities, built-in furniture, heating, ventilating and air conditioning, plumbing and electrical work will approximate \$9,250,000.

We are hopeful that these facilities can be constructed at a cost of about \$3700 per occupant. The kitchen and dining room facilities will cost in the neighborhood of \$800,000. We, therefore, suggest an aggregate loan approximating ten million dollars.

It seems undesirable at the present time to build additional dormitory facilities north of Euclid Avenue in the vicinity of our existing women's residence hall housing. The University does not own sufficient land area to accommodate additional students on or near this location. We are, therefore, suggesting, with the concurrence of the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women, that 15 to 18 acres of land be set aside near fraternity row, south of Huguelet Drive, as the site for the new dormitories. We are thinking in terms of housing men students in one large facility and women students in another, with these students using a combined kitchen and dining room to feed both men and women.

After conferring with the Campus Planner, we are of the opinion that the area east of Haggin Hall should be used for recreational facilities rather than attempting to build another structure on this site. The desirable density of housing area would dictate 100 persons to the acre. I feel, however, that not more than 130 individuals should be planned for per acre in the new location. This would indicate 15 to 18 acres for the area.

We need to start as quickly as possible planning for site development and utility facilities to accommodate these dormitories.

Members of the Board asked some questions, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was approved and the Vice President for Business Administration, University of Kentucky, was authorized to make application to the Housing and Home Finance Agency for a loan of \$10,000,000 to construct dormitories and feeding facilities to house students at the University of Kentucky and to proceed as promptly as possible to consummate the program.

N. Purchase of Property.

Mr. Peterson read the following letter:

May 30, 1962

President Frank G. Dickey University of Kentucky

Dear President Dickey:

Three pieces of property, located in the immediate vicinity of the campus, have become available for purchase since the last meeting of the Board of Trustees. I would like to submit these to the Board at the June 5th meeting and recommend that these properties be authorized purchased at the prices indicated, aggregating \$33,675.

424 Rose Lane is offered for sale by Louise B. and James A. Farra at a cost of \$15,475. The lot is 50 feet by 230 feet and contains a one-story brick residence.

446 Columbia Avenue belongs to Mrs. Lulu S. Hahn. The lot is 53 feet by $185\frac{1}{2}$ feet, contains a one-story frame house, and may be purchased for \$13,000.

139 Colfax Street is offered for sale by Maybelle and Jesse English, Sr. for \$5,200. The lot is 40 feet by 100 feet and contains a one-story frame dwelling.

We would like to acquire the property at 424 Rose Lane for one of the fraternities. The other two pieces of property would be retained for the future use of the University.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the property was authorized purchased and paid for out of the Haggin Fund.

O. Property Purchase Committee.

Mr. Clifford Smith asked, in connection with the preceding recommendation, who appraised property acquired by the University. He was advised that Frank D. Peterson, the Vice President for Business Administration, generally did the appraising; whereupon Mr. Smith stated that he thought there should be a committee to appraise the property and to approve its acquisition. Mr. Peterson stated that he had no objection to such a committee. A general discussion ensued. Mr. Sam Ezelle stated that he did not think that the acquisition of property should be encumbered by a committee, that at times it was necessary to act quickly, and that Mr. Peterson was thoroughly competent to deal with the situation. Mr. Peterson advised the Board of Trustees that all property purchased at the University, while appraised by him, received the approval of the President and oftentimes had the judgment of other people involved.

After a general discussion, action was taken on the motion made by Mr. Smith, which was seconded and defeated, with only Mr. Smith voting for the motion.

P. Short-Term Investments Approved.

Mr. Peterson read the following letter:

Dear President Dickey:

The Business Office has made the following short-term investments:

\$500,000 of 181 day notes, maturity November 5, 1962, 3-1/8%

Group Investments Agency Funds, Agency Account 5056A

\$40,000 of 30 day notes, maturity June 7, 1962, 3%

These are operating funds and we can only accept short-term securities. I would like for these to be reported to the Board of Trustees for confirmation.

Last year we picked up some \$78,000 through short-term investments of operating monies. This year will not be as good because the interest rate is lower, but we will do pretty well.

Q. Dawson Springs Timber Contract Sale Approved.

Mr. Peterson read the following letter:

Dear President Dickey:

In the interest of good forest management Dean William A. Seay has recommended that the University sell 389,850 board feet of various species of timber located on the Western Kentucky 4-H Club Camp site at Dawson Springs, Kentucky.

Bids for this timber have been issued and received. The best and highest bid was \$8,750.00 from J. W. Bryant & Son, Providence, Kentucky. Three other bids were received in the following amounts: \$8,280.00, \$5,750.00 and \$6,598.50.

Contracts have been prepared and are enclosed for the sale of this timber. This is the same general contract which we have used in the past for selling timber. A total deposit of \$4,500.00 has been made by J. W. Bryant & Son, which complies with the terms of the invitation to bid and with the contract terms.

If you concur, I recommend that this sale of timber be approved by the Board of Trustees at their meeting June 5, 1962, and that the timber sale contract be authorized executed.

R. President Frank G. Dickey Reports.

President Dickey reported that the University is completing one of its best years and that progress has been made on all fronts. He told the members of the Board of Trustees that the University has made great progress academically and that greater emphasis is being placed upon learning than, possibly, ever before. We have made significant advances in various fields, and an atmosphere of learning is gradually becoming evident on the campus. He cited overheard conversations of various groups to illustrate the seriousness of group discussions, such as talk about the Common Market, the Freedom Riders and the Carpenter space flight. He reported that the University has found it possible to increase salaries to some extent and to become more nearly competitive with other institutions. He said that marked progress has been made and that the University has a faculty of quality, with many of its teaching staff attaining eminence in their fields.

President Dickey then turned his attention to the progress being made at the University with buildings and reported on major construction projects, such as the addition to the King Library, the nearly completed Chemistry-Physics building, the starting of an addition to the Student Union Building and the near completion of the Women's Residence Hall No. 6, which contains a kitchen and dining room to accommodate approximately 1,200 students.

He closed his report by expressing his delight in the accomplishments of the faculty and student body and his faith in the future of the University. He gave to each member two pamphlets, one entitled Recommended Reading for College and University Trustees and Regents, and the other Quality and Equality in our State and Land-Grant Universities.

The President then called attention of members of the Board to the 95th Baccalaureate and Commencementexercises to take place at the University on June 10 and 11, and invited the Board members and their wives to be present and to attend the Alumni functions held in connection with the Commencement exercises.

S. Candidates for Degrees Approved.

President Dickey submitted the list of candidates for various degrees and asked approval of the Board of Trustees, subject to the approval and recommendation of the University Faculty, which would not meet until the seventh. He further explained that the delay was necessary to give the faculty an opportunity to give examinations, grade the students and report the results to the Registrar's Office. T. Change-of-Work Status for Robert Dawson Hawkins.

President Dickey submitted a request for change-of-work status for Professor Robert Dawson Hawkins, head of the Department of General Engineering and Applied Mechanics, College of Engineering. He stated that Professor Hawkins has been continuously employed at the University since August, 1918, and is completing his 44th year at the University. He reported that Professor Hawkins is entitled, under our change-of-work policy, to 64% of his annual salary at the age of 65. He recommended that the change-of-work take effect July 1, 1962, and that Professor Hawkins' duties be to make a survey and study of all new material developed in the field of Engineering Mechanics, together with a careful examination of new textbooks in this field, for the purpose of recommending the adoption by the Department of Engineering Mechanics for the classroom and for references for the instructor.

Motion was made, seconded and carried that the recommendation of the President be concurred in and Professor Robert Dawson Hawkins was given change-of-work status, effective July 1, 1962, at the salary permitted under the University's change-of-work policy.

The President stated that the grant to Ning-Kwok Chow, China, would be paid from the Haggin Fund and the other grants would be made in the usual manner.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was concurred in and the grants authorized.

X. Women's Residence Hall No. 6 Named.

President Dickey reported that Women's Residence Hall No. 6 containing slightly fewer than 200 beds for women students and kitchen and dining facilities to accommodate about 1,200 students, would soon be ready for occupancy. He stated that Mrs. Georgia M. Blazer, Ashland, Ky., had been a

member of the Board of Trustees from April, 1939, to December, 1961, that she had faithfully served the University as a Board member, and that she was regular in attendance and helpful in all Board matters, as well as at other times. He called attention to the fact that Mr. and Mrs. Paul Blazer had been donors to the University for a long period of time and, in many ways, had evidenced their great concern and their interest in the welfare of the University of Kentucky. He recommended that this hall be named the "Georgia M. Blazer Hall". Whereupon, members of the Board enthusiastically moved, seconded and unanimously passed a motion to approve the recommendation and name the hall the "Georgia M. Blazer Hall" in honor of Mrs. Blazer.

Y. Budget Adjustment.

President Dickey called attention to the fact that he had previously appointed a Council on Aging and that it was desirable to give the Council a modest budget for the fiscal year 1962-63. He submitted a budget and recommended its adoption in amount of \$8,300.00.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the budget was approved, the sum of \$8,300.00 was appropriated from the unappropriated surplus of the General University Budget and the Treasurer was directed to make the necessary budget adjustment.

Z. Classification Study Committee Reports on Salary Schedules, et Cetera.

President Dickey stated that a Committee composed of Dr. W. W. Haynes, Dr. V.A. Musselman, Dean Stanley Wall, Mr. George Kavanaugh, Dr. James Calvin, Mr. Richard Wittrup, Miss Jane Earle Middelton, Mr. E.B. Farris and Mr. D.L. Sproull was appointed by him in 1961 to make an evaluation study for clerical, office and junior administrative positions (non-academic) at the University. He called attention that a copy of the report of the Committee had been mailed to each member of the Board of Trustees, giving the member an opportunity to read and study the report. He called attention that the report contained recommendations and salary schedules, as well as job classification material and policy statements.

Members of the Board commented favorably on the report and Mr. Clifford Smith moved: First, that the Board express to the committee its appreciation for a very thorough, outstanding service that they have rendered to the University in completing this report; and second, that the committee be continued to keep the report in balance with the other departments and the others that they have not brought within the scope along the same lines; and third, that the report be approved subject to the understanding that if and when the Board adopts retirement or pension system that may be adopted.

The motion was seconded and unanimously carried. The report was adopted and the salary schedule approved, effective July 1, 1962.

A-1. Governor Combs Excused.

Governor Combs asked to be excused from further deliberations of the Board of Trustees, stating that he regretted that he had found it necessary to miss some of the meetings of the Board. He wished to attend as many as possible. He said that the people of the State were acutely conscious of the needs of higher education and that he, personally, felt that President Dickey and his colleagues were doing a fine job at the University of Kentucky. The Governor left the meeting.

B-1. Food Service Salary Schedule.

President Dickey stated that a part of the report of the Evaluation Study Committee concerned a salary scale for food service personnel, but he desired to submit it as a separate item. He called attention that copies of this study had also been mailed to members of the Board of Trustees for reading and study. He explained the differential between Hospital food service employees and those persons employed in food service for the rest of the University, and that uniforms and meals were furnished to one group and these items charged to another group. He thought that the 10¢ differential would just about take care of the raw food costs and the cost of uniforms. He recommended the schedule for approval, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, same was accepted, authorized, approved and made effective July 1, 1962.

C-1. Dr. Brown Makes Statement.

Dr. Aubrey Brown, faculty member of the Board of Trustees, complimented the work of the Evaluation Study Committee and expressed the thought that this work was being well received on the campus as being something desired by the staff.

D-1. Work Schedule for University Adopted.

President Dickey read a letter from the Staff Personnel Policy Committee and concurred in the recommendation of that Committee on work hours and special Christmas holidays.

Dear President Dickey:

The Staff Personnel Policy Committee has reviewed in further detail our working schedule situation that is in current operation on the campus in an attempt to clarify this problem area. With regard to the varied working schedules that are now in operation for our clerical and office personnel, the Committee has searched for and discussed many possible approaches to the problem of adopting a uniform work schedule for this group. The Committee has come to the final conclusion that it would be to the best interest of the institution and its personnel in these work categories to adopt the kind of working schedule that would apply in a uniform manner to all departments campus-wide and would be effective for all personnel in those offices.

The specific recommendation the Personnel Policy Committee would like to present at this time is that, effective as of July 1, 1962, all offices would be placed on a five-day working week schedule with office hours from 8:15 a, m, to 5:00 p.m. daily with one hour for lunch. This working schedule will amount to a 38 3/4 hour work week which is the same number of hours that a great majority of our offices are now operating under. principle that has been in existence on the campus previously concerning the matter that offices remain open on Saturday mornings will still prevail, but that the procedure will be to keep these offices functional and operational on Saturday mornings by use of a skeleton staff for this Saturday morning duty. Committee unanimously feels that this is the only clear-cut approach that will clarify our "muddled" working week situation that now exists on the campus.

The Committee unanimously feels that such a modification of working schedules for this group is a practical solution and that it would be, in fact, highly beneficial to have one uniform working schedule on the campus. The Committee, therefore,

wishes to recommend that the working schedule as just outlined above be presented to the Board of Trustees for their approval at the meeting scheduled to be held on June 5, 1962. If this recommendation is officially adopted by the Board of Trustees, we will immediately distribute a revised statement on our working schedule policy bulletin for distribution to all personnel to be inserted in the policy manual.

If any further information or explanatory material should be desired, the Committee will be most happy to provide the requested data.

President Dickey emphasized that offices would continue to be open on Saturdays but that a full complement would not be required to be present.

President Dickey also stated that classes would continue to be scheduled on a five and one-half day week basis.

Members of the Board having had the recommendation prior to the meeting, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, approved the schedule of 8:15 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. They also approved four special Christmas holidays, to be granted to all full-time staff members, in addition to Christmas Day and New Year's Day holidays.

E-1. I.D. Cards for Part-time Students Approved.

President Dickey stated that the University had for some time been considering giving approval to a change in our policy relating to ID Cards and ID Card refunds. He stated that the present practice is as follows:

- 1. An undergraduate student is not eligible for an ID card unless he carries 12 or more credit hours; a graduate student must enroll for 9 or more credit hours.
- 2. Whenever a student withdraws from the University he must return his ID card to us before we approve a fee refund.
- 3. A full-time student must surrender his ID card at the time he drops below 12 credit hours.

The President then stated that our major objection to these practices is that they tend to cause misunderstanding and misrepresentation. He stated that the question had been studied by several people; that he was prepared to recommend ID Cards for part-time students; that when ID Cards were granted to full-time students who later became part-time students, the students would be given their choice of returning the ID Cards; that if full-time students changed to part-time students by dropping a course after the refund period was closed, they, too, would be given a choice; and he recommended that the policy be changed to the following:

- 1. Whenever a full-time student becomes a part-time student during the refund period he should be allowed the choice of either retaining his ID card without receiving a refund or taking whatever refund is due him. Of course, we would require the student to sign a statement that this was his choice so that the University could not be embarrassed at a later date should anyone say he didn't know about the possibility of a refund.
- 2. Should any full-time student become a part-time student after the close of the refund period he shall be allowed to keep his ID card.
- 3. Should any part-time student desire an ID card at the time of registration he shall be allowed to pay the student activity fee in addition to the part-time fee and receive an ID card.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President.

F-1. Policy on Professional Fees Earned by Non-Physicians on the Medical Center Faculty Approved.

President Dickey read the following letter:

MEMORANDUM

May 24, 1962

TO:

President Frank G. Dickey

FROM:

William R. Willard, M.D.

SUBJECT: Professional Fees Earned by Non-physicians on the

Medical Center Faculty

As you might anticipate, there are some non-physicians on the Medical Center faculty who are earning fees for professional services rendered to patients in much the same way that physicians earn such fees. In every case they are working under the supervision of a physician. At the moment, the clinical psychologists are the group in question, but there are other groups which from time to time also may earn fees. (In this discussion I am excluding consideration of the dental clinical faculty because you will receive, in due course, a special memorandum relative to a dental service plan.) We do not have a suitable method for handling these fees and, therefore, I would like to recommend to you what I consider to be appropriate action in this matter.

In addition to professional fees, these faculty members sometimes earn stipends for consultation services to various agencies and for other professional activities which are part of the Medical Center's program. I believe that this money should be handled in the same way as fee income from patients.

The special considerations which surround the handling of physician fees, and other income by physicians for professional services, and which necessitated the Physicians' Services Plan, do not apply, in my opinion, to the non-physician group. Therefore, I do not see the need for nor would I favor establishing the equivalent of a PSP for handling the professional fees and other income for professional services of non-physicians on the faculty. This group, however, must feel that this money if turned in as it should be, contributes directly to the program of the appropriate college or comparable administrative unit of the Medical Center. purposes for which this money is used, therefore, should go for salaries or for defraying other expenses necessary for the conduct and development of approved program activities of the appropriate Medical Center unit. In short, the general principles underlying the charging of fees and policies governing the use of money should be similar to those in the Physicians' Services Plan, but the somewhat complex organizational structure would not be necessary.

It is my recommendation, therefore, that these moneys be deposited in a special account in the Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center

and expended in accordance with an approved budget in a way similar to the expenditures of PSP money in the Medical Services Account. Although I cannot project the potential amount of income from non-physicians, in my opinion it will not be large.

The following suggested resolution, if approved by you and the Board of Trustees of the University, would provide the necessary authorization for the collection of patient fees and a mechanism for handling this and other income from nonphysician professional services.

"The Board of Trustees recognizes that it is appropriate for charges to be made to paying patients for professional services rendered by certain non-physician members of the Medical Center full-time faculty such as clinical psychologists. Therefore, the Board authorizes the billing and collection of such charges by the Medical Center in a manner similar to that for professional services of physicians and in accordance with such policies and procedures as are established in the Medical Center with the approval of the President. The Board authorizes the President to arrange with the Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center for receipt by the FUND of income from such charges and of other income as may accrue from professional services rendered within the program of the Medical Center by nonphysician members of the full-time Medical Center faculty, with the understanding that monies received are to be used for the payment of salaries established in the approved Medical Center budget and other purposes as recommended by the Vice President for the Medical Center with the approval of the President."

This resolution as drafted would be applicable to fee earnings by dentists on the full-time staff of the Medical Center. But in its implementation, I would propose that payments received for professional services of the dentists on the faculty be placed in a separate account in the FUND in the anticipation of the establishment of a Dentists' Services Plan similar to the PSP. This is currently under development and in due course will be submitted to you. Upon adoption by the Board of Trustees of a specific plan for the dental clinical faculty, the provisions of the resolution would continue in effect for other non-physician faculty.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the policy for professional fees earned by non-physicians on the Medical Center faculty was approved.

G. Gifts.

From: National Merit Scholarship Corporation, Evanston, Illinois--\$300.00.

President Dickey presented check for \$300.00 from the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, given to be used as assistance to students who are not Merit Scholars. He expressed his appreciation for this grant and recommended that the check be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$300.00 was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to write a letter of appreciation to the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

From: Sears-Roebuck Foundation, Chicago, Illinois -- \$1,000.00.

President Dickey reported that the Sears-Roebuck Foundation had given to the University \$1,000.00 for use in the International Summer School Program. He recommended that this be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to thank the Foundation.

From: Commercial Solvents Corporation, New York--\$750.00.

President Dickey stated that Commercial Solvents Corporation had given to the University check for \$750.00 to be used as a grant-in-aid for support on zinc bacitracin work with swine. He expressed his appreciation for the interest shown by this Corporation and recommended that the grant be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President and requested him to thank officials of the Corporation.

From: American Suppliers, New York--\$4,500.00.

President Dickey stated that American Suppliers had given to the University \$4,500.00. He explained that American Suppliers is a division of the American Tobacco Company and desires the grant used to enable the University to use color printing in a circular on "The Preparation of Burley Tobacco for Market". He recommended that this check be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check for \$4,500.00 was ordered accepted and the President was requested to express to American Suppliers the appreciation of the Board and the University.

From: International Business Machines Corporation, Lexington, Ky. -- \$67.50.

The President reported that International Business Machines Corporation had given to the University its check for \$67.50, which matches gifts made to the University by its alumni who work for IBM. He recommended that this be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to make acknowledgment of the same.

From: Lexington Herald-Leader Company, Lexington, Ky.--\$100.00.

President Dickey reported that the Lexington Herald-Leader Company had given to the University check for \$100.00 to furnish the Ernest B. Ellis Prize which is awarded each year to the graduating senior in Engineering who has maintained the highest standing during his freshman and sophomore years. He stated that the recipient of the award for this year has maintained a record of 4.0 and 3.9 and will graduate with "high distinction". He recommended that the grant be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift of \$100.00 was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to write a letter of appreciation to the Lexington Herald-Leader Company.

From: Distillers Feed Research Council, Cincinnati, Ohio--\$2,000.00.

President Dickey presented check for \$2,000.00 from the Distillers Feed Research Council which the Council wishes used in support of research dealing with the testing and development of economic supplements for steers fattened in dry lot. He recommended that this be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the request of the President and asked him to thank the donors.

From: Cumberland Valley Graded Milk Producers' Association -- \$50.00.

President Dickey presented check for \$50.00 from the Cumberland Valley Graded Milk Producers' Association, which represents a contribution to the Kentucky Dairy Educational and Scholarship Fund. He recommended that the Board accept this gift and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check was accepted and the President was requested to thank the Association.

From: National Association of Artificial Breeders, Columbia, Missouri--\$2,700.00.

President Dickey reported that the National Association of Artificial Breeders had given to the University its check for \$2,700.00 to be used in support of the Experiment Station's research project, "Reproductive Problems in Dairy Cattle". He recommended acceptance of this grant, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board authorized acceptance and requested the President to thank the donors.

From: Kentucky Seed Improvement Association, Cobb, Ky. -- \$1,200.00.

President Dickey stated that the Kentucky Seed Improvement Association had given to the University check for \$1,200.00 to be used as a grant-in-aid in support of the livestock research program at the Western Kentucky Substation. He explained that this program is very important in improving the income of Kentucky agriculture through best utilization of feed and forage by fine livestock, and this grant will be of great help. He recommended its acceptance.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift was ordered accepted and the President was requested to thank the Association.

From: Carnegie Corporation of New York, New York--\$10,900.00.

President Dickey stated that Carnegie Corporation of New York has made available to the University of Kentucky the sum of \$10,900.00 to be used for a seminar on creativity in college teaching. He recommended that this be accepted and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the grant was ordered accepted and the President was asked to thank Carnegie Corporation of New York.

From: Delta Tau Delta Fraternity -- \$1,062.00.

President Dickey reported that the Kentucky Research Foundation had received check for \$1,062.00, which represents an endowment, the income from which will be used to give an annual award to a member of Delta Epsilon chapter of Delta Tau Delta. He recommended that this be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift was ordered accepted and the President was requested to thank the Delta Tau Delta Fraternity.

President Dickey reported that the James B. Beam Distilling Company had given to the Kentucky Research Foundation its check for \$900.00 to cover three scholarships for the 1962-63 school year. President Dickey stated that Shell Chemical Company had given to the University \$1,500.00 to be used for livestock insect research. He recommended acceptance and on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check was ordered accepted and the Board asked the President to thank the donors.

From: Amsted Industries, Chicago, Illinois -- \$500.00.

President Dickey stated that Amsted Industries had given to the University check for \$500.00 to be used by Dr. Roy Swift to promote the education and development of young men in the Department of Mining and Metallurgical Engineering. He recommended that this be accepted and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check was ordered accepted and the President was requested to write a letter of acknowledgment.

From: Kentucky Distillers' Association, Louisville, Ky. -- \$2,600.00.

The President announced that the Kentucky Distillers' Association had given to the University \$2,600.00 to be used to purchase a truck to house and transport a Sonoscope and related equipment. He stated that this would make it possible for the College of Agriculture and Home Economics to render more efficient service in their beef herd testing program, and recommended that it be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check was ordered accepted and the President was requested to thank the Kentucky Distillers' Association.

From: Dr. A. J. Whitehouse, Lexington, Ky.--\$105.00.

The President presented check from Dr. A.J. Whitehouse, in the amount of \$105.00, to furnish the A.J. Whitehouse Pre-Medical Award. He stated that, through the years, this award has meant much to its recipients, and recommended that this check be accepted.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the gift was ordered accepted and the President was requested to thank Dr. Whitehouse.

From: The Ford Foundation, New York--\$6,110.00.

President Dickey stated that The Ford Foundation had approved a grant of \$6,110.00 to the University under the Program in Economic Development and Administration. He explained that, of this grant, \$4,110.00 is to furnish one doctoral dissertation fellowship in economics, and \$2,000.00 is to be administered at the discretion of the University for support of doctoral candidates in economics. He recommended that this grant be accepted and administered in accordance with the wishes of The Ford Foundation, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation and requested the President to thank the Foundation.

From: Mrs.W. G. Duncan, Jr., Greenville, Ky.--\$750.00.

President Dickey stated that Mrs. W.G. Duncan, Jr., had given to The Kentucky Research Foundation the sum of \$750.00 to be used in support of the W.G. Duncan, Jr., Scholarship for the school year 1962-63. He recommended that this gift be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check for \$750.00 was ordered accepted, and the President was requested to thank Mrs. Duncan.

From: Martha White Mills, Inc., Nashville, Tennessee--\$858.00.

President Dickey reported that Martha White Mills, Inc., had given to the University \$858.00 to be used to give awards and recognition in the Girls' General and Breadmaking Demonstration in the Experiment Station's 4-H Club work. He expressed his appreciation for this grant and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the check was ordered accepted and the President was requested to thank the denors.

From: Merck Sharp and Dohme Research Laboratories, Rahway, N.J.--\$1,500.00.

President Dickey presented check of Merck Sharp and Dohme Research Laboratories for \$1,500.00 to assist in research with Thiabendazole to detect its effect on parasitic larvae in ponies. He recommended that this be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the grant was ordered accepted and the President was requested to thank the donors.
