

## Wildeat Gridiron News

#### KENTUCKY vs. VIRGINIA TECH

Former Kentucky Wildcat player and assistant coach Jerry Claiborne brings dangerous Virginia Tech to town tonight seeking a first victory over ex-teammate Charlie Bradshaw that would give his Gobblers a big boost in prestige.

The invading Techmen (1-1-1) look to the Kentucky encounter as a pivotal game in their quest for a winning campagin and doubtless will hold little back in an all-out effort to top the Blue Grass contingent, which has to keep one eye cocked warily toward next week's conference test against Louisiana State.

Claiborne, once a teammate of Bradshaw's at UK, is guiding Tech for the sixth year and gives every indication of a winner. After dropping their opener to Tulane in New Orleans by a 13-0 count, the Gobblers swamped George Washington, 49-0, and last week flexed powerful muscles to tie West Virginia, 13-13. The ambitious Techmen were kept off balance throughout by the fired up Green Wave but powered their way past George Washington's Generals by scoring six of the first seven times they had possession of the ball.

In the match against the West Virginia Mountaineers last week, VPI displayed surprising balance in rolling up more than 300 yards offensively while limiting their opponent to just 69 rushing yards and 40 through the air. Leading the Gobblers offense again was senior quarterback Tommy Stafford, who scored twice but lost credit for the second after fumbling and seeing a teammate recover. The

extra point kick following the closing minutes drive to a TD failed and cost Tech a chance for an upset victory.

Scouting reports point to an all-out defensive battle between Kentucky's heralded defenders and Tech's experienced unit. VPI lost only two hands off its defensive outfit of last season. Heading the group scheduled to square off against UK's light and inexperienced offensive line are senior tackles Sands Woody (210) and Andy Bowling (6-3, 220). The VPI offense is built around quarterback Stafford and tailback Tommy Francisco.

Kentucky counters with an aggregation virtually devoid of "stars." The Wildcats, now 2-1 on the season after topping Auburn last week, have shown improvement as a harmonious team unit with every game. While the muchimproved defense has received deserved credit, the 'Cats displayed a consistent offensive punch in defeating Auburn and should come to the forefront in even more important fashion this week. Tailback Larry Seiple leads the ground gainers with 203 yards while alternating quarterbacks Terry Beadles and Roger Walz show a ledger of 12 completions in 39 attempts for 160 yards.

UK holds a slight edge (3-1-2) in the series with Virginia Tech, which got underway 40 years ago this month with a game in Lexington that wound up in a 13-13 deadlock. Kentucky won the last meeting, 33-14 in 1963—which was Claiborne's only previous match with his former teammate and Alma Mater. The Gobblers' only victory in relations with Kentucky came on a 7-0 count at Blacksburg in 1932. They have never won in three visits to Lexington.

#### Alumnus Governor Boosts Wildcat Gridders . . .

Edward T. Breathitt, at 41, is the nation's second youngest Governor. A Hopkinsville attorney, he continues a family record of distinguished public service that dates back to pre-Civil War days when an ancestor, John Breathitt, served as the state's chief executive.

Governor Breathitt, who in his capacity as Governor, also serves as chairman of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees, began his career as a lawyer and public servant immediately upon graduation from the University of Kentucky College of Law in 1950. At the age of 27, he was elected to the State House of Representatives. Later he was State Personnel Commissioner and a member of the State Public Service Commission before being elected to Kentucky's highest office in 1963.

While a student at the University of Kentucky, where he also obtained a degree in Commerce, he proved his capacity for leadership. While there, he was president of Lamp and Cross, senior men's honorary, and ODK, men's leadership and scholarship honorary fraternity.

His distinguished background also includes three years in the Army Air Force during World War II and the state presidency of the Young Democratic Clubs of Kentucky.

A native of Hopkinsville, he is married to the former Frances Holleman of Mayfield. They have four children—Mary Fran, who is 16; Linda, 15; Susan, 9; and Edward III, who is 7.

Governor Breathitt continues to be one of the most enthusiastic boosters of his Alma Mater and its football team.








- 3. ILLEGAL MOTION Offensive player illegally in motion when ball is snapped —Loss of Five Yards.

#### University's President Knows Value of An Athletic Program . . .

John Oswald's background reflects the highest standard of excellence in educational preparation and also includes experience in athletics at both the player and coach levels.


The 49-year-old educator, who was born in St. Paul, Minnesota, received his education in the public schools of La Grange, III., and at DePauw University where he was a Phi Beta Kappa graduate in 1938. He also did graduate work on the Davis and Berkeley campuses of the University of California, receiving the Ph.D. Degree in plant pathology in 1942.

Following a World War II stint in the Navy as a PT boat captain and division commander, he returned to UC as a professor in his special field and later rose through the administrative ranks to the position of Vice-President for Administration.

Dr. Oswald's athletic experience, that now stands him in good stead as president of a university boasting an ambitious athletic program, came as a player in his collegiate days at De Pauw as he played guard on the football team for three years and later at California's Davis campus—where he tried his hand at coaching (by avocation) the grid team for a brief period.

In 1962, he was named by Sports Illustrated on its Silver Anniversary All-America team, composed of former football players who achieved special prominence in their chosen professions.

Dr. Oswald is a staunch supporter of Kentucky's athletic teams and advocates a fairminded approach that lends proper emphasis to the athletic program. UK athletics flourish within the proper perspective as an equal part of the total university.







#### Bernie Shively — A Veteran Administrator . . .

Behind every successful athletic program in the country today is a capable administrator who diligently attends the many and varied responsibilities connected with a big business operation.

University of Kentucky is fortunate to have the services of one of the nation's most widely-respected Directors of Athletics in the person of Bernie A. Shively. A veteran of 28 years on the job, "Shive" (as he is familiarly known to thousands of sports fans) is a tall, silver-haired, former football All-American who has gained widespread respect and recognition for his fair-minded guidance of a harmonious program that today features September to June activity in 10 different sports and involves the use of facilities valued at several million dollars.

In addition to a fair-minded policy direction that has resulted in "big time" stature for the school's athletic teams, Shively during his 28-year tenure has directly supervised major expansions in the physical plant designed to keep pace with the growing patronage by a sportsminded public. Among these have been the doubling of the seating capacity of Stoll Field, construction of a four-million-dollar coliseum and preparation of a spacious sports center to

provide top facilities for spring sports teams and football practice.

Shively's first claim to fame came during undergraduate days at University of Illinois as he achieved All-America recognition as a guard on the 1926 grid team made famous by teammate Red Grange. The future UK Athletic Director also won the Big 10 heavyweight wrestling title and lettered in track.

Following graduation in 1927, he accepted a position at UK as a line coach in football to start a long-time association. In the days since, he has served as head football coach for one year (1945), track and baseball coach and headed the physical education department.

Shively also has found time to be active in civic and alumni affairs and has attained national prominence through dedicated service in national athletic organizations. He currently holds membership in the powerful NCAA Executive Committee. Only recently, he completed a second term as chairman of the University Division NCAA Basketball Tournament Committee and formerly served with the NCAA Summer Baseball group.



## Wildcat Coaching Staff

RAY CALLAHAN (Kentucky '56)—No stranger in state grid circles, Callahan is a former Kentucky back and guard from Lebanon who enjoyed a highly-successful coaching career in prep ranks following graduation . . . Prior to joining Bradshaw staff in 1963, he assisted at Versailles and Manual High and guided Danville to state AA title.

**WALLY ENGLISH** (Louisville '58)—A former quarterback for the U. of L. Cardinals, English works with the offensive backfield. He has a background of playing and coaching experience in Kentucky and Texas. First joined Bradshaw staff in 1965 as graduate assistant.

**LEON FULLER** (Alabama '61)—This new addition to the UK staff, who tutors the defensive backfield, played his final two seasons at Alabama when Bradshaw was an assistant. He won All-SEC honor as a defensive back and was named on the Academic All-America.

PHIL OWEN (Georgetown '53)—Like five other current Wildcat assistants, Owen entered collegiate coaching ranks by making Kentucky his first stop . . . Joined Bradshaw staff in 1964 after successful, nine-year tenure at Mt. Sterling High . . . He directs talented frosh team this season.

**CHARLEY PELL (Alabama '63)**—Entering his second season on the Kentucky staff, Pell enjoys the confidence of his new boss stemming from a three-year player and coach relationship while both were at Alabama . . . Works with the defensive interior line.


JIM POYNTER (Kentucky '61)—One of four former Wildcats on the staff, Poynter had a great high school coaching career before returning to UK early this year. In five seasons at three schools, his teams posted composite record of 40-10-1.

**GEORGE SENGEL** (**Kentucky '48**)—Louisvillian Sengel's career as a Wildcat wingman overlapped that of Coach Bradshaw by a couple of years and his former teammate asked Sengel to stay on the staff he had joined in 1961 . . . The 44-year-old Air Force vet had nine years of coaching schoolboy ranks in Florida and Kentucky prior to becoming UK end coach.

**DOUG SHIVELY** (**Kentucky** '59)—A youthful veteran of seven years in the coaching profession, Shively is a former Wildcat wingman and son of UK's Athletic Director. After one season at a Texas high school, Doug moved to Virginia Tech—his point of departure in coming to UK.

CLARENCE UNDERWOOD (Marshall '38)—Back "home" after 10-year absence, this tough-but-popular veterans has responsibility of shoring up UK defense. Spent 8 years here prior to successful 10-year stint at Jefferson High in Port Arthur, Texas. Compiled 77-26-6 record and was state "Coach of the Year."

RALPH BERLIN (Iowa State '62)—This 30-year-old Marine Corps veteran serves as head football trainer for the Wildcats . . . He's a veteran of six years in training field.





#### Wildcat Coach Sets Winning Tradition . . .

After four hectic years, Charlie Bradshaw stands high as a coach and gentleman fully vindicated in his promise to rebuild the shattered foundations of Kentucky football into a solid front and re-establish a winning tradition.

Exemplifying the faith placed in his hard work philosophy and procedures is the unique "lifetime" contract tendered the youthful and determined ex-Wildcat upon the successful (6-4) completion of an adversity-plagued 1965 season. The new pact, believed unique to college-coach relationships, assures Bradshaw of tenure similar to that given academic personnel. At such time as he ceases to perform his current coaching duties, he will have the opportunity to take another position on the University staff.

Bradshaw, a 41-year-old former UK end and assistant coach, returned to his alma mater in 1962 to take on the difficult task of repairing a sputtering Kentucky football machine that had not run well since the early fifties Bowl Era.

The magnitude of the repair job never will be fully understood by anyone less closely connected with it than the self-sacrificing Bradshaw. Only

he could take a positive approach to the almost impossible problems—and, more importantly, stick with it in the face of increasing odds. How he tackled the assignment of producing a winner out of the meager raw material reflects the type of person Charlie Bradshaw is—the personification of qualities of inner fortitude, outwardly serious demeanor, ability, confidence, integrity and quiet determination. He is an inspirational leader possessing the valuable trait of exuding enthusiasm and confidence to a degree that inspires those around him—players and assistants —to get the job done in a way that pays off with success. He demands great effort of himself and others in the belief that success cannot be purchased easily.

Bradshaw's influence not only is paying off with success on the gridiron—his 1965 team posted the school's best record since 1956—but also is being felt around the state. Coaches, alumni, general public and prospective Wildcats are rallying to the side of Bradshow's long-range program in a fashion never before seen in the State of Kentucky.

## The Four P's of College Football

HEN Northwest ern spoiled "Hurry-Up" Yost's unbeaten Michigan season of 1925, 3-2, more than one writer inquired, "Who pitched?"

Last fall, after West Virginia out-touchdowned Pitt, 63-48, one disbebelieving editor wired back, "Get that Western Union operator off the bottle and give me the correct score!"

A great many changes have been taking place in college football over the years, and those two divergent results certainly point it up.

'Way back in the Depression Days of the '30's, money was not the only hard thing to come by. Touchdowns were mighty scarce, too. Now, they often come in bunches.

How come?


There are several theories, but most of the nation's finest football brains agree that the old "Punt-Pass-and Prayer" era has given way to four new "P's."

"Passing, Platoons and Pictures," they say, "add up to Points!"

West Virginia and Pitt were not the only college teams busy scoring last fall. The National Collegiate Athletic Bureau reveals that a 32.1 points-per-game average was posted in major contests during 1965. That's better than two and a half touchdowns per team.

Paul (Bear) Bryant, who's been cranking out championship teams with regularity at Alabama was always known as "Mr. Defense" until recently when Joe Namath and Steve Sloan began authoring a bushelful of touchdown passes. 'Bama's 39-28 conquest of Nebraska in the last Orange Bowl game emphasizes this dramatic turn of events.

"The past couple of years," Bear feels, "we have scored a lot but haven't played much defense. Probably because we have used our best

football players on offense and have had great quarterbacks.

"Two-platoon football definitely should make it a higher scoring game, since the offensive specialists should be further advanced than the defensive men most of the time."

Syracuse's Benny Schwartzwalder believes that scores have gone up "because quarterbacks have become so good. They come to us from the high schools today better prepared. There are so many good passers. They're so skilled, so accurate. And they're throwing to more skillful receivers.

"As a result they've simply opened up the game. It's sideline to sideline now, and this puts the offense ahead of the defense. You can't defend from one sideline to the other. And remember," says the veteran Orange mentor who's been reluctant to throw the ball, "excellence in the passing game helps the running game. The defense just can't crowd you . . . Films have helped us. too."

"A few years ago," observed Texas' Darrell Royal, "it was nothing unusual at all to see a tight formation with no backfield men flanked. Most all of us now are using at least one flanked receiver. Not only does this added passing and loosened-up formation give more striking power, but it also is dangerous in that the ball may be intercepted, which in turn gives up an easy touchdown. In most cases you find the better ath-

letes playing offensively, rather than defensively. It is plain to see how this works to the advantage of the offense."

Notre Dame's Ara Parseghian feels strongly about the effect the return of platoon football has had on scoring. "The players have more time to specialize in their skills," observes Ara, "and a coach can utilize completely the individual ability of his players. And we also have more players today, due to the increase in population. The players today are bigger, stronger and faster."

Dartmouth's Bob Blackman, who has had such distinguished success in the Ivy League, thinks scores have mounted because "we have been better able to anticipate what our opponents will do on defense than on offense. Most teams will stem from one basic defense. On the other hand, it is very easy for a team on offense to run from several different formations from which they had run the previous week, and to also put in several completely new plays that they haven't shown before. Coaches also feel freer to make a change in offense than on defense, on the theory that if you make a mistake on offense, you may lose five yards, but if you make a mistake on defense it may give your opponent six

Ohio State's Woody Hayes, master of the "Three-Yards-and-a-Cloud-of-Dust" school recognizes "that defensive trends have taken a great deal of our offensive initiative away from us. We are no longer able to grind it out on the ground; thus the need for a passing game arises, and the increased use of the passing game has made for more scoring. Also, we have gotten more plays per game by mixing it up more which in turn gives us more opportunities to score."

Dad may have courted Mom back when a buck was a buck and when one touchdown won a ball game, but no more. "We used to think 14 points," the coaches chorused, "would win a game, but now we know we need 21. And 28 to be sure."

Sounds like a good many Western Union operators may be accused of drinking before this season is history.





**OUTLOOK**—Former Wildcat Charlie McClendon starts his fifth year at the Louisiana State helm faced with a rebuilding job to some degree. Among the hands missing from the highly-successful 1965 unit, which wound up 8-3 overall after upsetting Arkansas in the Cotton Bowl, will be some 20 lettermen—including nine of 11 offensive starters. Only offensive unit returnees are strongback Billy Masters (6-5, 225) and 195-pound center Barry Wilson. The experts, however, pinpoint the Bengals as a distinct threat to National Champion Alabama in the '66 SEC race—forecasting a third place finish one point behind Ole Miss. The high finish prediction apparently is based in part on the return of 28 extensively-used lettermen and the prospect of a physically-fit quarterback named Norm Stokley. The SEC Sophomore of the Year injured a knee in the seventh game last season and underwent surgery in the off season. If he can go full speed, the Tiger offense could be hard to handle.

# A Greater Service to Kentucky— The Community College System!


The word for community colleges in the USA is "Go". Representing the fastest growing segment of American Education, community colleges, according to lay and professional leaders alike, are an answer to the problem of extending higher educational opportunity to more youth and adult citizens. Every major study report by national commissions and groups since World War II has strongly recommended the establishment and extension of community colleges across the nation.

Reaction to the recommendations has resulted in an average of 20 new community colleges per year. Last year, 50 new community colleges brought the total two-year institutions across the United States to approximately 780.

With the advent of the community college type of institution spreading throughout the country, we will soon find the majority of American students attending these two-year schools. This is the third stage in the development of American public education. The first lasted through the second half of the 19th century and the first decade of this centure when an eighth-grade education was the goal most parents set for their youngsters. During the era between world wars, aims generally were raised to include graduation from high school.

The third stage—education beyond the high school—has come to the fore in the last 20 years as the most dynamic force in American education. The community college is the most practical way to meet the increased expectations of parents and employers. Congressman Carl Perkins entered into the Congressional Record that the University of Kentucky is making great strides under Dr. John W. Oswald in bringing higher education to added thousands of young Kentuckians. Representative Perkins entered a news story from The Louisville Times into the Appendix of the Record. That story read:

"A Florida college administrator says the Kentucky system of community colleges is on its way to becoming one of the best in the Nation and a model for other States.

"Dr. Robert Wiegman, director of the Kellogg junior leadership program at the University of Florida, addressed some 300 delegates yesterday at a community college conference sponsored by the University of Kentucky. UK oversees the community colleges.

"Dr. Raymond Schultz of Florida State University praised the community college as offering a way to overcome the deficiencies of huge senior colleges. He said it offers a liberal education for students who do not plan to go on to a senior college as well as training students who do expect to transfer to one.

"Florida's community colleges had nearly 75,000 students last year, nearly two-thirds of its total college enrollment.

Associate degrees in nursing are offered at several of the community colleges. This young lady is from the Hopkinsville Community College.

"Wiegman noted that three factors indicate Kentucky's community college system is going to succeed:


"The commitment to the program by Dr. John W. Oswald, UK president.

"The selection of blue-ribbon people for advisory boards at each of the community colleges, bringing existing community leadership to bear on the problems they face.


"The imminent construction of community college service centers at each of the existing schools . . ."




Where farming dominates the economy, associate degrees are offered in agriculture. The picture was taken at Hopkinsville.
