JULIAN M. CARROLL Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky

JULIAN MORTON CARROLL became Kentucky's 58th governor on December 28, 1974, succeeding Wendell H. Ford, who was elected to the U. S. Senate. Carroll then won a full four-year term in the 1975 general election.

Born in McCracken County in 1931,

Born in McCracken County in 1931, he attended Paducah Junior College after graduating from Heath High School. He was graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1954 and received his law degree from UK in 1956. Before becoming governor, Carroll served three years as lieutenant governor and ten years as a member of the Kentucky House of Representatives.

He is currently chairman of the National Governors' Association, the first Kentucky Governor to hold that post. He is an active member of the Optimist Club and a former Jaycee. He attained the highest office in Kentucky for laymen of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1966-77 when he was named moderator of the Kentucky Synod.

The Governor and his wife, Charlann, have four children.

JAMES G. AMATO Mayor Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government

JAMES C. AMATO took office as mayor on January 2, 1978. In doing so, he became the second mayor of the consolidated city and county governments.

A native of Lexington, Amato has been a practicing attorney since 1964. He is a member of the Fayette County Bar Association, the Kentucky Bar Association, and the Kentucky Law Enforcement. He formerly held positions as Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner for the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Director of Citizens for Judicial Improvement, Inc., Municipal Court Judge and City Prosecutor.

As chief executive of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government, the mayor is authorized to supervise, administer and control all departments of government.

The mayor is elected on a non-partisan ballot every four years. He is assisted principally by the Chief Administrative Officer and commissioners of the six departments.

University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis A. Singletary University of Kentucky President

Now in his ninth year as president of the University of Kentucky, DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY is a Mississippian whose route to the Bluegrass State curled through Louisiana, Texas, North Carolina and Washington, D. C.

He came to Lexington from a position as University of Texas vice-chancellor for academic affairs. Previously, in Washington, he had been director of the U.S. Job Corps in the early stages of its development before moving to the American Council on Education as vice-president. He had gone to the capital in 1964 after three years as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

The UNC appointment terminated Dr. Singletary's first association with the University of Texas, this a seven-year stay that saw him, as a young historian, rise rapidly in rank from instructor to full professor and begin the shift to administrative work, first as associate dean and later as assistant to the president.

The Kentucky president, and his wife the former Gloria Walton, met when both were students at Millsaps College. He later earned master's and doctoral degrees at Louisiana State. The Single-tarys have two daughters, Bonnie and Kendall, and a son, Scott.

Cliff Hagan Director of Athletics

"I've been preparing for this all my life," CLIFF HAGAN said before taking over as athletics director at the University of Kentucky in 1975. Hagan succeeded Harry Lancaster as director after serving as assistant director for three years.

Hagan's path to the athletics directorship began in Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points in leading Owensboro to victory over Lafayette in the championship game of the 1949 high school tournament.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in

the national tournament.

Under his leadership, the UK athletics department continues to develop success in all areas of endeavor including a strong dedication to the academic wellbeing of the athletes.





JOE B. HALL

LEONARD HAMILTON is beginning his fifth year at Kentucky after serving three years as assistant coach at Austin Peay. An outstanding recruiter with seemingly tireless energy, Hamilton has contributed heavily to maintaining a high level of young talent at UK. Specializing in coaching defense, Hamilton has had a positive impact on Wildcat defensive

JOE DEAN, JR., played against the Wildcats for three years at Mississippi State University, before serving as Bulldog assistant coach while earning a masters degree in physical education. An outstanding student, Dean was named to the 1976 Academic All-SEC second team. A native of Baton Rouge,

Joe B. Hall University of Kentucky Wildcats Head Basketball Coach

JOE B. HALL is beginning his seventh season as mentor of the Wildcats, coming off a year in which his senior dominated team captured the 1978 NCAA Championship. Since becoming head coach in 1972, succeeding the legendary Adolph F. Rupp, Hall has accumulated a record of 135 wins against 42 losses. His eleven year coaching record stands at 211-98. Broken down, it shows a 57-50 five year mark at Regis College, a 19-6 record at Central Missouri, and a 135-42 record at UK.

Hall became Rupp's top assistant in 1969 when Harry C. Lancaster was named athletics director. His record as freshmen coach was 60-15, including an undefeated (22-0) season (1971-72) which resulted in the Kittens being crowned National Freshmen Champions by Basketball News.

A popular personality on the clinic and convention circuits, Hall also has had much international exposure. In addition to the Globetrotters tour in 1951, and the "Down Under" tour in 1974, he has helped conduct basketball clinics for the U. S. Army in Anchorage and Fairbanks, Alaska (1968) and at Ramstein Air Base in Frankfurt, Germany and the RAF Base at Mildenhall, England in 1975. He also was Olympic Trials coach under Hank Iba at the Air Force Academy in July 1972 and was a member of the 1976 Olympic Basketball Committee. In 1978 he coached the U.S.A. team that hosted the first International Invitational Tournament.

philosophy. A native of Gastonia, N. C., he lettered three years in football and twice in basketball. An outstanding collegiate player, he starred at Gaston Community College in Dallas, N. C., and at University of Tennessee-Martin. He is married to the former Claudette Hale. They have a son, Lenny, 7.

DICK PARSONS

DICK PARSONS, in his seventh year as Joe B. Hall's No. 1 assistant, returned to the University as baseball coach in 1969. Before giving up his position to join the basketball staff on a full time basis, he molded a baseball team (1971) which established or tied 15 school records. He is a graduate of UK where he played guard under former Coach Adolph F. Rupp.

Parsons came to the University in 1958 after an outstanding career as a four-sports star at Harlan High School, where he had a three-year basketball scoring total of 1,276 points.

He was a two-time (1960-61) recipient of the coveted A. B. Chandler award, given annually for the player best exemplifying the qualities of leadership, scholarship, character and ability. Only four other Wildcats have twice been so honored since the award was originated in 1951.

He is married to the former Celia Cawood of Harlan. They have a daughter, Kathy, and a son, Ed.





FRANK HAM Assistant Director of Athletics

FRANK HAM became Assistant Director of Athletics in July 1975 soon after Cliff Hagan succeeded Harry C. Lancaster as Director of Athletics.

A native of Scranton, Pa., Ham came to the University in 1969 as Administrative Assistant to football coach John Ray, and was reassigned to the Athletic Director's staff in 1972 when Ray resigned.

SUSAN FEAMSTER Assistant Director of Athletics

SUE FEAMSTER joined the athletics association July 1 with the merger of the men's and women's programs. Feamster had been the director of women's athletics prior to her appointment as assistant director of athletics.

A native of Frankfort, she came to the

While in college she earned letters in tennis, field hockey, basketball and track from Indiana University and Kentucky State University, where she earned her B.S. degree and graduated with honors.

Public Donations To Build Museum To House Memorabilia

Adjacent to the entrance to Rupp Arena in the Lexington Center will be located the Adolph F. Rupp-UK Basketball Museum.

The purpose of the museum is to relive some of the past Wildcat teams' exploits and those of its great players. Included in the museum will be photographs, trophies, tape recordings, films and other memorabilia reflecting on past Kentucky teams.

"We have a unique opportunity to perpetuate the legend of the late Adolph Rupp and the rich basketball tradition that has been established by the University of Kentucky," commented DeWitt Hisle, chairman of the museum. "The museum will give basketball fans every where a fascinating insight into what this game has meant to followers of the UK Wildcats."

Rupp coached teams compiled an 880-190 record. He guided the Wildcats to four NCAA titles, an NIT championship and 27 SEC crowns.

The museum will cover Kentucky basketball teams from the first season in 1903, when the team recorded a 1-2 record, through the most recently completed season.

A small theatre area will be located

in the museum and used to show films on the changing style of basketball over the past 75 years.

The material found in the museum is coming from the official archives of UK, Memorial Coliseum, the family of the late Adolph Rupp and from the public.

"Obviously one of the major advantages we have in establishing this mus-


eum is the fact that we can build it around a central figure, the late Adolph Rupp, whose 41 seasons as UK head coach resulted in some of the greatest accomplishments in the history of collegiate basketball," said Charles Atcher, archivist of the University of Kentucky.

Atcher says one of the guiding principles in planning for the Rupp-UK Basketball Museum is that the museum will show the continuing history of basketball at UK, which means the museum will be capable of expanding to display accomplishments of future teams.

The UK tradition is being continued by Joe B. Hall who replaced Rupp as head coach beginning with the 1972-73 season. In six years, Hall has led the Cats to four SEC championships, an NIT championship, the 1978 NCAA title and an overall 135-42 record.

Costing an approximate \$200,000, the projects' funding will come from tax-deductible donations from the public. Operation of the museum will be funded by a small admission charge, "not to exceed \$1," according to Hisle.

UK Cheerleaders Work Hard To Give Quality Performances

"The cheerleaders are part of the entire entertainment package." That is how Lynn Williams, cheerleading advisor and an Associate Dean of Students at UK, describes the purpose of cheerleaders.

describes the purpose of cheerleaders. "At a UK basketball game," he continues, "there are the teams involved, Big Blue, Boo Blue, the band, the announcer, and the whole array of activities that mold into a game experience."

The cheerleaders are partly responsible for the emotional involvement of the fans. They chose their routines according to game's situation and the crowd's disposition in an effort to create as much support for the Wildcats as possible.

To be able to perform their routines expertly and to effectively orchestrate the excitement, the cheerleaders spend countless hours in physical conditioning and rehearsals.

Ten days prior to a collegiate cheer-leading camp that they attend in August, they begin three sessions of practice per day. Each session lasts $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours. They go to camp for a week and return to more three-a-day workouts, trying to perfect the timing and appearance of their routines. After classes begin, the practices change to one $2\frac{1}{2}$ hour session per day until after the second home football game. For the remainder of the year, they practice two nights per week.

There are 12 cheerleaders that comprise the squad, six men and six women and the Wildcat. To be eligible, a student must have completed 12 hours of study with a C average, however, it is rare that a cheerleader has less than a B average because there is so much time involved that those that tryout are usually excellent students.

Tryouts are held in the spring after three nightly clinics taught by senior cheerleaders. A participant must attend two nights of clinics in order to tryout. Two nights are then used for tryouts with ten men and ten girls chosen to be finalists.

The finalists are judged on a 100 point system involving six categories—appearance, personal interview with each judge, a pompon routine, an original cheer, three basic double stunts where each contestant teams with a boy, and three basic jumps. The men are judged on appearance, gymnastics, double stunts,

an interview, and physical coordination, strength and ability. The Wildcat is chosen in separate competition. The Wildcat officially is a cheerleader and attends all the rehearsals and must be able to substitute in routines such as pyramids.

The physical conditioning required is tremendous. Personal weight is checked every two weeks and all is done that is possible to keep the students able to perform the difficult tumbles, leaps, summersaults, and flips that are used. For example, at practice when the Wildcat is not participating, he runs 5-10 miles. The others run and lift weights throughout the year to stay in shape.

Having been on the squad does not guarantee that a cheerleader will repeat however, experience makes the veterans more skillful. Everyone must tryout annually. There are nine new members

We work harder... to make you happy on this year's squad. All but three are new. Seven of the members taught in clinics sponsored by one of three national cheerleading associations and gained a large amount of experience during the summer.

One of the associations, the International Cheerleading Foundation, sponsors an annual competition for the 151 Division I colleges in the NCAA with the top five finalists competing for the best in the nation on national television. Kentucky and four other Southeastern Confernce schools finished in this year's top ten. The Wildcat cheerleaders finished eighth.

Scholarships are not available for cheerleaders and part of their adult supervision is voluntarily contributed. Sandy Rice, a Lexington resident, with years of experience in cheerleading, choreographs the dance routines as well as contributes creative ideas and practical suggestions.

New routines require about two weeks to perfect and are practiced on gymnastics mats and with numerous spotters (catchers) available for safety. Besides the construction of a routine, the cheerleaders must consider the time it takes to perform it since timeouts are 60 seconds in length.

The cheerleaders often rehearse with the drum section of the band so that the cheers and the music are coordinated. During a basketball game, whether the activity for the timeout is to be a cheer or a routine such as a pyramid is determined by the cheerleader captains. If they feel a pyramid is needed, they point to the band and it will play the fight song while the pyramid is constructed. If a cheer is needed, they don't point at the band and they do the cheer without music.



While the UK band plays the fight song, the cheerleaders entertain the fans with a pyramid. Such formations take two weeks or more practice to perfect in order that they can be constructed safely.

DeVoe's five seasons at Tech produced an 88-45 record and, along with an NIT title, the Gobblers earned a bid to the NCAA in 1975-76, DeVoes' last year.


At Wyoming, DeVoe took a team that had won only five WAC games in three previous years, and led the Buffaloes to a 17-10 record. His 1977-78 club, troubled by ineligibilities and injuries, fell to 12-15.




DR. JACK E. REESE Chancellor




Vet of Year Award Goes to UK Doctor

It may come as a shock to many Kentuckians who believe theirs is the garden spot of the world and that a fellow tasting the waters of Boone Creek would never want to live anywhere else, but there's a University of Kentucky professor in veterinary science who misses "more than anything" the corn country and flatlands of his native Nebraska.

Let it be said, though, that Dr. T. W. Swerczek's abiding love for his native state doesn't mean he has no affection for the Bluegrass of Kentucky. And the University and the Kentucky horse industry are enriched because he and his colleagues were alert in the laboratory working one late winter's day.


It was Swerczek's vigilance that earlier this year led to the detection and isolation of a strain of contagious equine metritis (CEM) in horses that resulted in the quarantine of five stallions and 22 mares on 14 Bluegrass horse farms, keeping the disease from spreading and possibly saving the industry.

For his contributions, Swerczek was given the Veterinarian of the Year Award for 1978.

CEM had been reported for the first time last year in thoroughbred horses in England and later in France, Ireland and Australia.

Swerczek was familiar with the disease, but there was an unfamiliar strain that had to be isolated and identified before efforts could be made to treat it and a test created to readily detect it. He and his colleagues then developed a blood test that was accepted by the state and the industry that saved valuable time and went a long way toward what will be an eventual lifting of the ban on the shipment of thoroughbred breeding stock out of Kentucky.

In addition to his duties as a researcher, he's a full professor working with graduate students who are dedicated to the same goals.

Until the recent past, Tom Swerczek spent his vacations on the family farm near Cedar Rapids, Nebraska, helping bring in the corn crop. His parents still live on the place, and a younger brother is coming along who eventually will take over the farm's operation so that the land will be in the family for some time yet.

Swerczek, wife Mary Ann and their three children live in the Mt. Vernon subdivision, only a shadow's cast from the UK campus. Come another winter of discontent similar to the two previous performances, he can trudge within minutes to his office laboratory in the Animal Pathology Building near the Albert B. Chandler Medical Center.

Sports has always been a big thing in Swerczek's life—he got through college partly on athletic scholarships—and he figures there's no better place than Kentucky to follow his favorites, the Kentucky Wildcats and the Cincinnati Reds.

Swerczek has on display a number of pathologic specimens in his office, all firmly encased, and he hopes someday to have a Museum of Pathologic Specimens at the University. As a veterinarian (D.V.M., Kansas State, 1964; Ph.D., Connecticut, 1969), he could go the route of private practice, and very likely make more money, but he wouldn't have as much fun, and there wouldn't be the elation of discovery, as in the CEM triumph.



The Cats had dropped five games in a row to UT before gaining two consecutive wins over the Volunteers.


"This is a first for us," said James Lee





Arena Information

FIRST AID

The University of Kentucky and the Lexington Center provide for your convenience and welfare, a First Aid Station on the Purple Concourse. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at the First Aid Station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to an usher. For University of Kentucky events, all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call, at the UK Public Assistance station located on the purple concourse between sections 30 and 31. For all other events in Rupp Arena all physicians are requested to leave their name, seat location and any other information required to locate them if they receive an emergency telephone call at the First Aid Room located on the purple concourse between sections 33 and 34. In the event of an emergency, you will be notified at your seat. In order that the activities and program in Rupp Arena not be disrupted, paging over the public address system is not possible.

CARDIAC CARE

In cooperation with the University Medical Service, the University of Kentucky provides a cardiac resuscitation program at all UK basketball games.

LOST AND FOUND

Lost and found articles should be reported or turned in to an usher or a security officer. You may wish to write to the director of arena security and describe lost articles which will be returned if found.

NO HORNS

Horns are not permitted in Rupp Arena and will be picked up at the entrances. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

GATE INFORMATION

Rupp Arena will normally open one hour prior to any scheduled event. Please do not leave the arena until the conclusion of an event or game or at half-time if you plan to re-enter. No "Passout" tickets will be issued and you will not be permitted to re-enter.

COURT REGULATIONS

Spectators must keep off the court at all times. Spectators must use the arena stairs and vomities. There are no public facilities located on the arena floor level. Public facilities in Rupp Arena are located on the entry concourse level. You will find all refreshment stands, drinking fountains, public telephones, restrooms, vending machines and first aid on the concourse level.

LIQUORS

Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the arena as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type, bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chest, and any object related to above. Arena personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

PUBLIC ADDRESS

Messages for the public address announcer are acceptable only in emergencies and must be approved by the Sports Information Director at University of Kentucky basketball events.


SIGNS


- (1) Winning or losing, an athletic team of the University of Kentucky will have our continued and wholehearted support.
