

Community Plan for Junior Extension Work

HOW TO USE THIS PLAN OF WORK

If the community is unorganized for extension work with boys and girls it should be the duty of any public-spirited citizen to call upon the county agent and home demonstration agent to inaugurate the work in that community. Details of organization plans are given in circular No. 117, "A Manual on Junior Agricultural Clubs." When a Junior Club leader has been selected a conference should be called, attended by the county agent, home demonstration agent, Junior Club leader and other interested persons for the purpose of formulating a community plan of work for the Junior Agricultural Club. Each person should be acquainted with all club literature and especially with the Club Manual, Circular No. 117. The county agent and home demonstration agent should act as advisors in recommending the amount and kind of work which should be undertaken and in each case suggest the best methods for accomplishing the work planned. Such a conference should be called each year, preferably in November, following the organization of the Junior Club. Clubs already organized should follow these same general suggestions. Other meetings may be necessary to outline the details of the work planned. The club leader, county agent or home demonstration agent will call such meetings when the necessity arises. The officers of the Junior Club should always be included in these conferences and in so far as practical responsibility should be placed on the club members. The business of the Junior Club organization is to develop leadership, and to make rural life more attractive and interesting for young people thru proper encouragement of appropriate economic, social and educational achievements.
