

Extracurricular activities before and after Kentucky's thrilling 98-95 Auburn last Saturday—the 26th consecutive win the Wildcats have racked up in their home finale-were a mixture of traditions,

Prior to the contest, the 24,174 on hand witnessed a pair of age-old UK customs: UK senior Derrick Miller hurling himself through

a large paper hoop bearing his likeness; then another tear-jerking rendention of "My Old Kentucky Home," given this year by Othello

Pumphrey of the Lexington Symphony.

The estimated 20,000 that stuck around after the game, however, were treated to something new. As part of his expanded post-game radio show—complete with several commercial breaks and also taped for delayed telecast by the UK TV Network—Wildcat coach Rick Pitino, with the assistance of radio play-by-play voice Cawood Ledford, handed out team awards as voted on by the UK coaching staff.

The awards presentation is usually reserved for Kentucky's basketball awards banquet following the season, but Pitino said he wanted to change the format so that more fans

could witness the proceedings.

In previous years, awards have almost always been distributed evenly among team members, sort of a share-the-wealth philosophy. Not so this year, as five UK players took home all the hardware—headed by junior center Reggie Hanson who earned a team-high four trophies. Sophomore forwards Deron Feldhaus and John Pelphrey won three

awards each. Miller and sophomore Richie Farmer won one each. UK's assistant coaches even got in on the act. Pitino awarded his four citing their endless hours reviewing video-tape and work on the practice floor.

Pitino's 'Cats have chance to go out with a bang

Two more games and Kentucky basket-ball fans can begin focusing on a) the Kentucky baseball season, b) the Wildcat football spring practice, or c) Wildcat basketball recruiting for next season. Such is the way of life in the Bluegrass

Each of the above will have his/her followers, but there are a pair of hardwood events left before putting the sneakers up with the mothballs for a few months.

Kentucky concluded its home schedule Saturday with a victory not unlike most of the 13 others this season, a cliff-hanger to

the end.

It wasn't supposed to be this way. Kentucky was supposed to maul the Tigers, a team that was picked to fight UK for the cellar position of the SEC.

In the end, the two are battling it out,

but for the No. 4 spot in the league. So, in the end, Kentucky won its final home game the same way it won most of the others, with determination and hustle to

the very end in a tight contest.

The 98-95 victory capped a perfect 9-0 league mark at home, a feat most everyone thought impossible back in early January. The victory also insured UK of avoiding

a second straight losing season, another mission most thought impossible. I know the Wildcats' gung ho, supercharged Rick Pitino would cringe at the thought of using the term "avoiding a second straight losing season" because he doesn't believe in negatives, but Rick, old buddy, it got pret-ty negative around this place the past several months. Hard times were knocking

A win in either game and UK would begin another long string of winning seasons. Over the past half-century, UK has suffered only three non-winning seasons, two were 13-13 slates in 1967 and 1974, the other a 13-19 slate last season.

On Wednesday, UK goes to Ole Miss, which has been one of the league's major

finish as high as third in the SEC by some preseason publications, the Rebels have suffered from a rugged pre-conference schedule and several untimely injuries

Still, Ed Murphy has a great player in Gerald Glass to develop his game plan around and this will be the Ole Miss ver-

sion of senior night in Oxford.

Add the road factor and UK's chances of pulling an upset are not very bright. UK's won only once on the road this season and that came at Florida where most everyone else has enjoyed like success.

On paper, an upset victory in South Bend sounds almost as ridiculous, but there could be a remote possibility. First of all, Notre Dame's NCAA dreams are

on the bubble, so to speak.

Digger Phelps' hopes of being invited to the big show were dealt two serious setbacks recently. After getting a monumental boost by shocking Syracuse on the road, the Irish were upset at home by DePaul and then lost to Georgia Tech. The Irish find themselves in almost a

else situation the rest of the way Which brings us to this weekend.

First, Notre Dame hosts top-ranked Missouri on Saturday. Two nights later, the Irish close their home season with UK Kentucky could benefit either way. If

Notre Dame beats Missouri, the Irish could be celebrating too quickly when a 14-13 or 15-12 non-ranked UK comes in.
On the other hand, if Notre Dame loses

to Missouri, the Irish could be depressed from blowing their NCAA slot.

Either way, UK has everything to gain not nothing to lose in this one. Plus, it will be Kentucky's only nationally-televised game of the year, so to speak.

SportsChannel America, which has

rights to Notre Dame games, plans to televise the game on a tape-delayed basis all across the country. It's no big deal for the Irish, but to the young Wildcats who have fought their hearts out, well, it could just been the extra edge needed to cap off an unbelievable comeback

recruiting trip to eastern Kentucky.

Pitino was to fly by helicopter to Paintsville and take in the Feds Creek-Johnson Central game. His aim was to take a look at hot-shooting guard Jody Thompson, a youngster who some say may be the state's purest shooter since the days of ex-Wildcat

Troy McKinley.

For the past few weeks, Pitino has been lamenting the loss of departing senior Derrick Miller and the lack of people to take

his place from three-point range next year.

Problem is, even if someone is out there to fill the bill, UK has no scholarship available because the NCAA-imposed limit (three) has been used by Jamal Mashburn, Gimel Martinez and Carlos Toomer.

But reports out of eastern Kentucky has it that Thompson would be more than

willing to walk on at UK this fall if he is promised a scholarship for the remaining three years

Lately, Thompson has been attracting lots of attention, and from some big-name schools like Louisville, Ohio State and a

So Friday night was the first time Pitino had a chance to watch the youngster in person since the opening recruiting period started in late February.

Pitino accomplished his mission, but it wasn't without an obstactle. His helicopter began icing up and was forced to cut the began tenig up and was forced to cut in the trip short. The aborted trip ended at the airport in Mt. Sterling—Pitino thought it was "Mt. Pilot"—where the party borrows a car for the rest of the trip.

The good news is that, according to our reports, both Pitino and Thompson were

happy about the eastern Kentucky trip.

Thompson scored 31 points and indications are that Pitino was more than

Insiders tell us that Thompson—who was on hand for the UK-Auburn game—most likely will announce his intention to attend UK on Monday, Feb. 26 (this issue of TCP actually went to press on Sunday evening).



UT's Vols survive UK 102-100

'Cats rally to cut 21-point deficit to two, can't pull off repeat of earlier come-from-behind win over UT

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — They came, they

saw, they almost conquered.

The battling Wildcats of Rick Pitino, encouraged by an estimated 5,000 UK fans who trailed a stream of blue down the 170-mile stretch of 1-75 from Lexington to Knoxville, fought valiantly from 19 points down at halftime—and 18 down as late as the 7:45 mark of the second half—before losing to Tennessee 102-100 before 20,251 fans in

Thompson-Boling Arena.

The orange-clad Vols owned the Wildcats during the latter part of the first half, but Pitino's band of seven iron men put on a patented second-half run that cut a 58-39 Vol

During that spurt, Kentucky got three-pointers from Richie Farmer, John Pelphrey and Reggie Hanson as the Wildcats finished

and Regger Hamson as the Whocas infinished with 26 such attempts, breaking a record of 24 set 11 days earlier by LSU.

Then the Wildeats cut the lead to 100-98 on a short jump shot by Hanson with 1:18 to play. The junior center from Somerset, fould on the play, bounced his free throw off the front of the rim.

Hanson had a chance to tie the score at 0:32, missing the front end of a one-and-one. Greg Bell hit two free throws 10 seconds later and UT was able to run out the clock after Hanson scored inside with 0:07 remaining

"Reggie was nearly exhausted," Pitino said of Hanson, who led UK scorers with 22 points and seven rebounds. "I told him it was a real accomplishment just to hit the rim (on

Hanson played all but one minute of the fast-paced game. Derrick Miller logged 38, Deron Feldhaus 36, Pelphrey 33 and Sean Woods 26 minutes.
"In the NBA, you learn how to lose and

go on to the next game," said Pitino, who coached the New York Knicks the last two seasons. "For the first time in my life, I can honestly say losing doesn't come easy, but to a certain extent I can accept a loss because of how my team performed

of now my team performed:
"With this style of play if you don't have
10 guys, it's not ineffective. It's kind of
bordering on the impossible."
He promised help is on the way and the
Wildcats soon would have the needed person-

Wildcats soon would have the needed personnel to fit into his general scheme of things.

The two teams fought evenly in the early going. The Vols jumped to a 12-2 lead, but UK fought back twice to take four-point. leads. The score was tied at 35-35 with 6:31 remaining in the first half when Tennessee scored 12 unanswered points. Jeff Brassow hit an inside shot for UK, but UT scored eight more unanswered points to lead 55-37 with two minutes remaining in the half.

A layup by Pelphrey was countered by Vol freshman Allan Houston, who hit three of four free-throw attempts for the 58-39 UT margin at halftime.

The Vols went ahead 60-39 on a Reese dunk at the start of the second half and led by 21 on two other occasions before the Wildcats made their big run.

The Wildcats fell to 13-12 overall, 9-7 in

the SEC, dropping to fifth place, a half-game behind Tennessee (14-10 overall, 9-6 in the SEC). The loss was their ninth in 10 games

UK-UT ITEMS NOT TO GO UNNOTICED

■The win for Tennessee unknotted the long series between the two schools in Knoxville. The Vols now hold a 36-35 advantage over Kentucky in K-town. The Wildcats still lead the overall series, which began in 1910, 111-56.

■ Former Wildcat player Eric Manuel, who transferred to Hiwassee College—a two-year school Madisonville, Tenn., about 70 miles from Knoxville—last season after the NCAA ruled him ineligible to play for UK, was among the 20,251 in

In an earlier game in Rupp, UK came from a 15-point deficit to defeat the Vols 95-83.

"I reminded the players on the bench, we aren't going to have another Lexingon," Vol coach Wade Houston said, referring to that game. "We were going to fight through the screens to prevent the three-point baskets. Whatever, it took we weren't going to quit."

Bell led UT scorers with 29 points; also
in double figures were Ian Lockhart (21),
Houston (20) and Reese (18). Joining Hanson in double figures for UK were Feldhaus,

20, and Miller and Pelphrey, 18 each.
In addition to his usual contributions on offense, Miller limited Houston to 0-for-4 from the floor in the second half.

Houston more when we came back on them, Miller said. "He's such a great player— probably the best young player in the con-ference. At the end I had no legs from play-ing defense, and from trying to deny him the ball, so I tried to be careful to take no bad

UK outlasts Auburn 98-95

'Senior Night' begins and ends in celebration; 'Cats pull out the broom with 9 SEC wins in Rupp

It wasn't so much Big Blue as a big boo-hoo Saturday afternoon as the tears flowed at Rupp Arena. Derrick "Deke" Miller brought out the hankies in the beginning and played a key role in the end as Kentucky edged out Auburn, 98-95.

However, the lone senior's home swan song almost turned into an ugly duckling before a crowd of 24,174. In fact, it was almost a big boo-boo in the last frantic seconds. At least this is what UK coach Rick Pitino thought after seeing Auburn guard Ronnie Battle pump in a long jumper with 14 seconds left to make it 96-95, UK.

Or was it a three-point shot, thus tying the

score at 96-96 as the scoreboard said?
Pitino looked at the officials to hold up both arms—the signal for a three-point goal—and was relieved when they didn't. But then you could have wrapped him in a straight jacket at what happened next.

UK point guard Sean Woods knew it was a three-point shot. He took the in-bounds pass and, much to Pitino's consternation, sailed down the floor. Like a good point guard is supposed to, he had glanced at Battle's feet instead of at the officials and saw the shot as

He acted like a man possesed...with winning. He caught John Pelphrey out of the corner of his eye and hit him. Pelphrey then hit the short six-foot shot from the baseline. UK led 98 95 with four seconds left

"I'm supposed to look at things like that," Woods said in explanation of his mad dash down the floor. "He (Battle) was well beyond the line. In a crucial part of the game a good oint guard is supposed to look at things like

Forward Deron Feldhaus, located just a few feet away from Battle, concurred.

"I clearly saw it as a three-pointer," Feldhaus said. "For sure."

Pitino jumped all over Woods when the 'Cats huddled after a UK timeout with three seconds left. "He started chewing us out," Feldhaus said. "He asked us what we were

Woods bore the brunt of Pitino's ire

But then Woods mollified Pitino as he told him about seeing it as a three-point shot all the way. "Coach asked me why I pushed the ball up since we still had the lead, and I told him I thought it was a three," Woods said.

I was in the right and got fussed at"

Pitino later absolved Woods in the postgame individual awards ceremony at mid-court. "I called time out and asked Sean why he had done that and he said, 'Coach, the guy (Battle) made a three.' I looked up at the scoreboard and he was right.

'But I checked with the officials and they said no...there was no three. Sean actually made a very smart play. The players acted in-telligently making that transition." Auburn coach Tommy Joe Eagles, natural-

ly, saw it differently. He felt Battles had a clear three. It did happen right in front of him. "I will reserve final judgment until I see the game film," Eagles said. "We don't need to tarnish this game by controversy. I say it was a three-pointer. If I am wrong, I will

apologize..in writing."

Auburn still had three seconds left

AUBURN-KENTUCKY NOTES NOT TO GO UNNOTICED

Around 20,000 Wildcat fans remained to watch Rick Pitino present team awards during the coach's post-game show.

The next time Kentucky plays a Southeastern Conference game at Rupp Arena, it will put on the line an 11-game home-SEC winning streak

This contest pitted Cinderella against Cinderella. The Wildcat story is welldocumented—picked by many to finish ninth or 10th in the preseason SEC polls. Auburn, led by first-year coach Tommy Joe Eagles, was picked alongside UK in the conference cellar. Meanwhile, Auburn came into Lexington riding a four-game win ning streak, an 8-7 conference record, and 12-14 overall.

Everyone in Rupp Arena knew what Notre Dame had done to Syracuse the week before in three seconds. The Irish had won with a three-pointer at the buzzer. And they had gone the length of the floor to do so.

Eagles had wanted the Tigers to spread the floor and get the ball to Battle at the side for a three-pointer. Instead, Chris Brandt had to inbounds a 20-foot pass to Derrick Dennison Dennison dribbled the ball quickly over the mid-line but couldn't get a final shot off.

"I had told the team in the timeout to play their man and not help out," Pitino said. told them to not be afraid to make a steal.

Miller, the lanky 6-5 senior with the hippity-hop, then made his last move at Rupp. Dennison lost the dribble as Miller moved up to contest the Tiger.

The 'Cats seemed to have the game in hand

This was an afternoon of record deflections on the part of UK (it had a team record 45). It was a game of reflection for Auburn. They clawed back hard...just like the 'Cats have done all season.

Dennison's three-pointer and Battle's layup cut it to 92-90 with 1:16 to go. Pelphrey then canned a pair of free throws to make it 94-90 with 36 seconds left. But the Battle was intent on winning the war. He hit a threepointer with Miller hanging all over him and



UK'S GRIDIRON AMBASSADOR

In the second of TCP's two-part series, Bill Curry chats about things he can't control, ie,

bad recruiting info, being an ambassador and an opposing coach's wife's blueberry muffins

Valentines Day was an especially sweetheart of a day for Bill Curry. His Valentine cards were not your ordinary heart-shaped gifts. On Feb. 14, the new Kentucky football coach received 24 national letters of intent

Not bad for the new kid at school.

If these players can someday live up to their high school clippings in a Wildcat uniform then Curry and his staff will have signed an excellent first class. Meanwhile, only the stars above can foresee the stars on the original. the gridiron

Following is the second of a two-part series from Bill Curry's press conference on Feb. 14, his sweetest day thus far as Kentucky's head

MUSBURGER ON MT. RUSHMORE?

In last week's issue, Curry talked about the immense pressure on those 'true' freshmen playing Division I ball instead of getting situated and sitting out their first year.

He elaborated further on this predicament

"There are a few who will play, who will be ready to play, who are mature enough and will handle it," Curry said about UK's incom-ing freshmen. "But I don't know who they are. You (the media) don't know who they

are.
"Only God knows that. "What 17-year-old can run out there in front of a national TV audience, play in the Sugar Bowl and not be wasted by it, who knows? But there are some that can do it; there are some who are stars from day one. There are others who just can't handle it. They're not physically mature, they're not emotionally mature. I was one of those."

Curry, of course, played his college ball at Georgia Tech, where he lettered from 1962-64. Next, a bigger challenge awaited, because the Green Bay Packers picked Curry

in the 20th round.

His pro career was not typical of your average 20th round draft choice, however.

The former Packer center played on three NFL championships, and later participated in two Super Bowls with the Baltimore Colts, winning Super Bowl V in the final seconds over Dallas. And, Curry's progress on the field eventually led him to All-Pro honors in

He came a long ways during his days as a Ramblin' Wreck from Georgia Tech.

'I did not play much until my fourth year "I did not play much until my fourth year in college," Curry, a co-captain his senior year, said. "I was that slow maturing. Carolyn Curry (his wife) says she is still waiting for maturity to strike. Some of us just mature really slow. What happens, the way the rules are today, the ones who are getting to play a lot of times walk around like this (Curry creates a stone-faced look). They just can't believe it.

"The amount of studying they have to do; they have to go get tutored. They have to go be interviewed by Brent Musburger. This is like talking to Mt. Rushmore to them. You've got to visualize growing up in Timbuctoo, Ga., and all of a sudden there's Brent Musburger saying, 'Well, son, you're going to play in the national championship game. What do you think?' It just dawns on them.

'That's too much.'

Curry believes a redshirt season can have its drawbacks as well.

Meaning?
Those who don't get to play are the ones back in the dorm with a scowl etched firmly on their face.

'So the bus pulls off on Friday, going to Los Angeles, Birmingham or wherever we're going to play and there stands that guy," Curry, using an example, said about this no curry, using an example, said about this no-win dilemma. "He's just staring at the coach because he didn't get to go. He's not happy. "So they are all unhappy; the ones that are playing are unhappy and the ones who are not

playing are unhappy.
"So if we had a rule that none of 'em (true freshmen) could play it would be great. It really would."

That would be a great relief to Curry.

HOW BAD ARE THEY ...?

If Curry ever were asked to do a monologue on the Tonight Show, the first joke he might try would be: "I never knew Acme Recruiting Service could be that bad..."

Altogether now: "How bad is it?"

They 'rrrre so bad 'they don't even know what school a my greet to."

what school a guy goes to.' Folks, he's not laughing.

Again, Curry says there are some highly respectable organizations that make their living touting high school players. "There are some very good ones who have been around for a lot of years and really do have a grasp on the national scene.'

Then there are those who couldn't tell the difference between a quarterback and a nickel back. "They call up some guy who lives in Coon Holler, Ga., and they say, 'Do you got any good players?" They say, 'Yeah, we've got a giant lineman here."

So they get his name misspelled. His size is wrong. They say he's a great student and he isn't. They don't know what they're writing, and they're putting out ratings and selling these sheets of theirs. There are some really poor ones.'

RECRUITS GOOD 'NUFF FOR 'BAMA

When asked if many of UK's latest recruits would have been welcomed at Alabama, Curry proudly nodded with a positive reply. "I'd be delighted to have 'em," he said.

"There are some people on here (list of Wildcat signees) that we would have been thrilled to death, I mean a bunch of 'em, to recruit to the University of Alabama or Georgia Tech.

Curry confirmed that while at Alabama he was interested in UK's latest signees. The 'Bama staff, according to Curry, figured it

couldn't have been a factor with some of the future 'Cats due to the prospects' strong ties in the surrounding area.

THE AMBASSADOR

Should a recruit's decision ever be primarly

Should a recruit's decision ever be primarly based on who is the head coach?

"My daughter just graduated from college in May and my son just started college in August. We were really anxious for them to pick a school. My son wants to play football; he's a walk-on football player. We didn't want him to pick a coach, but he did (George Welch). But he also happened to pick a very

good school (Virginia)."

Did Billy consider Dad as his next coach? "At first, he picked his dad, but his mom rejected that. She said, 'No, you're not playing for him.' That's the truth. She said that would be too hard on all of us. He would like

to be here, but...
"You just can't rule the coach out because the coach is the ambassador. He's the one who walks into the living room. I think it

would be good if you could.
"We tell all the people we recruit: 'You should look at the school as if you weren't going to play football because you may not. going to play looted because you may not. You may walk in front of a truck and tear your ankle up. Heaven forbid we pray that doesn't happen. But, be sure you'll be at a school where you're going to be happy."

"The other thing is, funny things happen to coaches on the way to anything," Curry said, chuckling along with the media.

WELCH & BLUEBERRIES

Curry learned a recuiting tactic that he witnessed in his own backyard from Welch. Sandra Welch, the wife of Virginia's head coach, that is.

"Sandra essentially recruited both my children," Curry said with a broad smile. "That's what happened. She uses blueberry

UK athletics department: Let the good times roll

Newton, Pitino, others preserving tradition

The innovations that C.M. Newton, Rick Pitino & Co. have brought to University of Kentucky basketball extend beyond the playing floor, creating an excitement that exceeds the bounds of wins and losses.

First and foremost, of course, is the style, flair and competitive nature of a young but experienced coach who has captured the imagination of all persons involved

in Wildcat basketball.

Putting aside such fan-pleasing antics as standing up to the likes of finger-pointing, chair-throwing Bobby Knight, LSU's "Rev." Dale Brown and others who specialize in attacking the Wildcats, Pitino is to be commended also for giving more than lip service to the UK tradition.

Joe B. Hall was a good keeper of the tradition in the manner of successfully succeeding a legend—Adolph Rupp—and doing his utmost to protect the program against ever-increasing pressures from both within and outside of the university

Hall is to be remembered for many things on the promotional side, including "Senior Night," the "Sixth Man," "Big Blue," and "Fan of the Year," most instituted during the reign of former athletics director Cliff Hagan, who originated the constumed Wildcat mascot.

Eddie Sutton, who spoke reverently of "Mr. Rupp," and UK basketball—"I would have crawled all the way from Arkansas"—gave UK a winning slate, but he also stepped on some traditional toes, switching shoe companies, taking over the roundball calendar business, etc. before the walls came tumbling around him.

However, there remained in effect for many years an unwritten rule—the retiring of jerseys/numbers—that had been in effect since some members of the "Fabulous Five" were involved in the gambling scandals of the 1950s and since Linville Puckett, a member of the undefeated 1954 Wildcat team, had his jersey/number? 'unretired" after a difference of opinion with Rupp the

In fact, Rupp was so embittered by the involvement of some of his boys in the scandals that he had them removed from the Memorial Colisem "Wall of Fame," where pictures of past Olympians, Hall-of-Fame members, All-American and All-SEC performers are

Those pictures were returned to the wall after Rupp and the players made their peace a quarter-century later, but the matter of singling out one player or members of a particular team for special recognition remained a relic

There were special team and individual recognitions at games during the reigns of Harry Lancaster and Hagan, but no further moves toward the retiring of any jerseys but no furtner moves toward the retiring of any Jerseys were made until two years ago, when the university retired the jersey of Dan Issel, UK's all-time leading men's scorer and the person whose 53 points vs. Ole Miss broke Hagan's UK single-season record of 51 set against Temple in 1953.

The ceremony, held just before tipoff of the UK-Louisville game, was such a closely guarded secret that

Louisville game, was such a closely guarded secret that the Issel family was neither notified of the plans nor invited to the game as guests of the university.

Issel, who was doing color for the UK TV Network during that game, was definitely surprised, but he also was disappointed that members of his family were not present. It seems that wife Sherry, a former Wildcat cheerleader who attended most of the home. cheerleader who attended most of the home

games, had other plans that could have been easily changed for such an auspicious occasion.

Also honored at center-court during games that season were Basil Hayden, UK's first All-American, and Cawood Ledford, longtime radio "Voice of the Wildcats," on calling his 1,000th Big Blue game.

No one doubts that Issel deserves such an honor, but how about all those other fine players who contributed so much to the Wildcat tradition during the years before and after Hagan, Frank Ramsey, and Lou Tsioropoulos led the 1954 team to an undefeated season?

It would be presumptious for one person to try to

It would be presumptious for one person to try to compile a list of those deserving to be singled out for special jersey-retiring recognition. Surely "Cotton" Nash, the "Fiddlin' Five," "Rupp's Runts," Kevin Grevey and the 1975 NCAA runnerup, Kyle Macy and the 1978 NCAA champions and the 1984 "Final Four" team as

Newton also wants to utilize the unused portion of Wildcat Lodge, space that was created by an NCAA edict several years ago, as a site for display of UK memorabilia

Along that line, he doesn't want to take away from a long-proposed downtown museum, which never got

beyond the committee stage.

Newton also talked about retiring more jerseys in the future, going back as far as Aggie Sale and LeRoy

There is also Pitino's current desire to remove the 13-year-old floor in Rupp Arena, and replace it with a floor that is more Kentucky than Carolina blue.

Let the good times roll.

In discussing these developments with Newton prior to the recent UK-Tennessee game in Knoxville, he reflected that upon returning to his alma mater in his present capacity he felt that it was losing the tradition of Kentucky basketball.

He said the developments that have taken place this season have been a family effort more than a one- or two-person effort. In addition to Pitino, he gave credit to UK sports information director Chris Cameron and noted that for the past six months associate athletics director Gene DeFilippo has been working on the organization of a traveling UK basketball museum.

For the student in question, we review just a wee bit of history. When the Wildcats mentioned earlier were involved in the gambling scandals and the university ruled out of action for one year by the NCAA and the SEC, Tennessee was the only school to vote in UK's favor. Not long thereafter, when the Vols had the same kind of pro-blem with player involvement in gambling, the university repaid UT's previous kindness by inviting the Vols to participate in the UKIT. No other SEC team ever has played in that tournament

While Pitino downplayed the intensity of the UK-UT rivalry before and after the recent shootout in Knoxville, Vol coach Wade Houston said he was aware of the tradition because of close proximity (Louisville Cardinals coach the past 13 years) and that he felt it was a great

Houston especially noted the large number of UK fans in attendance at the game, which was impossible when the Vols played their games in the old Stokely Center. When the Vols left that field house, much of the homecourt advantage remained behind, which is exactly what happened when UK moved to Rupp Arena. Of course, it's still extremely difficult to win on the road in the SEC, whatever the reasons.

With the current all-out attack on the SEC officiating fraternity, I'll risk the ire of many fans from both sides by saying that from my seat on press row at the end of

as a graduate assistant coach under Jerry Claiborne. He primarily had worked with receivers. In his new position, he will have no on-the-field coaching responsibilities.



Hall: Nothing could have meant more to me

He grew up in Kentucky, followed University of Kentucky basketball from the time he was knee high and even kept a scrapbook of all the All-Americans at

That's how deep Joe B. Hall's roots run at Kentucky. No one cares more about the UK basketball program than Hall, who compiled a 297-100 mark in 13 seasons as the UK coach from 1973-85.

Hall bleeds blue. Always has and always will. And he's not ashamed of that, either.

"I always put the program first," Hall said. "That made any decisions I had to make easy. Putting the program first was a guideline I had that made everything

Hall's Wildcats won the NCAA championship in 1978. They were runners-up in 1975 and reached the Final Four in 1984. Eight times in his 13-year tenure UK won the Southeastern Conference championship.

His teams were 20-9 in NCAA Tournament play and

Hall still ranks as the ninth winningest coach in NCAA

What makes his record even more remarkable, though,

is that he had to follow the legency of Adolph Rupp.
"Time takes a toll on all of us but few people are successful replacing a legency," LSU coach Dale Brown said. "Joe did about as effective a job as anybody has ever done. Very few follow a legend successfully but he And he's not received enough credit for doing i

UK officials, though, helped remedy that problem Feb. UK officials, though, helped remedy that problem Feb. 15. Before the UK-LSU game they retired jerseys honoring Hall and Rupp. The jerseys now are hung from the Rupp Arena rafters along with 14 other jerseys of players UK had previously retired.

Hall knew nothing about the honor until it was announced. He walked to midcourt smiling and waving to the crowd but it was obvious it was an emotional time

"I don't know of anything that could have been done that would have meant more to me," Hall said. "It wouldn't have meant as much if you had given me a million dollars

"Nothing could mean more to me than to be recognized by the University of Kentucky like that. It was such a

nice gesture and thought.
"I don't know anyone who has had a closer relation ship with the university than me. I went to school there, played there one year and coached for 20 years. Who else fits that?"

Hall was the caretaker of the UK program when Rupp was forced to retire. He drove himself hard to succeed because he knew what Kentucky basketball meant to fans

from border to border in the Bluegrass.

Many, though, questioned his coaching style and success. No matter what he did it wasn't enough. He was often criticized during UK's championship season and anytime the Cats lost in the NCAA fingers were pointed at Hall."

I never worried about what others thought," Hall said. "In my life what is important is how I felt about myself. I don't have a big ego. I cared about UK and I worked hard. As far as caring about the program and being a conscientious representative of the university I always did the best I could."

Ironically, Hall was honored on a night when the cur rent UK team upset LSU in Rupp Arena and was cheered from start to finish despite a 12-10 record. For

years LSU used to try and upset UK when Hall was coaching and the 'Cats were crucified under Hall if they

lost 10 or more games.

"The ropes come out sometime for everyone," Hall said. "I can remember when Dean Smith was hung in effigy at North Carolina and look what he's done. It's the nature of the beast. If you stump your toe, you are in

for it. That's just part of coaching.
"But the expectations of the fans are what makes Kentucky basketball great. They do not accept anything but the best and that's good for the program even if it can be tough on the coach.

Even when the criticism stung, though, Hall never considered leaving UK. He had no intentions of leaving

"I had no place to go after I became the coach at Kentucky," he said. "I didn't try to sell myself to the world. I knew when my tenure at Kentucky was over, no matter when that was, that I would not go some place else to coach. Coaching at Kentucky is the pinnacle of college coaching. My focus has always been right here.
"Kentucky was my home. I wasn't going to pack up

and leave. That probably added as much pressure as anything during my tenure. No matter what was said or

written I was going to stay at Kentucky."

Many unfavorable things were written about Hall. It

Many untavorable things were written about Hall. It became fashionable for state and national columnists to trash Joe Hall and downplay any success he had.

Maybe it had something to do with the fact that Hall played no favorites. He treated media members from New York, Louisville and Atlanta just as he did those from Somerset, Danville and Elizabethtown. The bigtime columnists and reporters often resented that.

His accomplishments on the floor were never enough

"I often wondered why so many writers thought Joe's record was not of the same caliber as Adolph's," Katharine Hall, Joe's wife, said. "It wasn't baffling but it was bothersome."

Even UK, though, had not publicly recognized Hall for his contributions until last week. But from day one

for his contributions until last week. But from day one new UK coach Pitino had praised Hall for the battles he fought after following Rupp and the success he had.

"Rick doesn't feel in competition with anybody and I never did, either," Hall said. "He's a class person. He knows he has the ability to stand the test of time and is not frightened by anyone's reputation. He'll make his own reputation and not do it by stepping on anyone But. own reputation and not do it by stepping on anyone. But I really appreciate all the kind things he's said about

And anyone who follows Kentucky basketball should

appreciate what this man did and applaud the honor Kentucky bestowed upon him last week because it was

UK NOTES AND QUOTES:

Don't expect Rick Pitino and his staff to have their recruiting influenced by All-America teams or Mr. Basketball selections.

"We can't recruit somebody because he was Mr.

Basketball or not recruit somebody because he wasn't,"

UK assistant coach Ralph Willard said. "We recruit kids because they fit our style, are good students and are tough mentally and physically. If we are recruiting correctly we'll start when a kid is a freshman or sonhomore. We won't run out and recruit completely into sophomore. We won't run out and recruit somebody just because he became Mr. Basketball."

Pitino will also be sensitive about recruiting in-state players because of the pressure those players face at Kentucky. "Kids here face a lot of expectations and it does put a lot of pressure on when a Kentucky kid comes here," Willard said. "That can be a tough cross to bear. The best way to go about recruiting in-state players is to make sure they can really contribute. Otherwise, we

won't take an in-state player."

That should tell you how much UK thinks of Tollesboro guard Chris Harrison, who committed in November even though he's just a junior.

But Cutler had watched Piting work his magic in the


But Cutler had watched Pitino work his magic in the Big East and felt the new coach would motivate UK's returning players to a level none of us could imagine.

"He just goes straight ahead," said his

uncle, Richie Farmer. Farmer, Mr. Basketball of Kentucky two years ago, proceeded to chuckle at the thought of his tow-headed nephew driv-

Somehow, it made his afternoon, which was partially filled with interviews with ever-prying reporters, game films and a rugged workout.

As he slumped in his seat at Memorial Coliseum, his face, showing a few days stubble, brightened as he thought of little Iohn

Of little John Daniel and his favorite Christmas toy, a Nerf basketball complete with goal

"It's on the refriger-ator at the house," Richie said. "He's working on his moves right now."

He loves his nephew deeply. And he cheerfully admits he's helping the family spoil him rotten.

'We don't give him much of a chance,

Richie said. "He's the cutest baby in the world.

Richie Farmer was a three-time all-stater for the Tigers of Clay County. He was a legend in everybody's mind. And not without good reason.

He is the all-time scorer in state tournament history and was named Mr. Basketball following a senior season in which he

averaged 27.1 points, 8.7 assists and 6.4 rebounds a game He's Clay County's all-time leading scorer with 2,937 points. His jersey has

But he would love to see those records fall some day to his brother Russ' boy, John Daniel Farmer. "I told everyone when he was born that

that is the Farmer who is going to break the scoring records at Clay County," Richie said. "I hope that happens some

Richie paused before adding: "But even if it doesn't happen, he's still my nephew.. and I'll still love him."

Love is a four-letter word Richie and his family use a lot.

Few families have been closer than Richie, Russ, sister Rhonda and parents Richard and Virginia Farmer.

Today, as Richie was getting ready for

practice, his mother was shopping in Manchester, some 80 miles a way.

It is a clothing store co-owned by Richie's high school coach, the colorful and successful Bobby Keith. Or was she visting. No matter, everybody in Man-chester does both.

Baby John was crawling on the counter near the store's entrance. With that blond head and blue eyes he was the spitting image of Russ, his father.

age of Russ, his tatner.
Russ is 13 months younger than Richie.

Like his older brother, he was also a fine shooter. But he was an even better brother than he was a basketball player.

We were always together,' Richie. "Oh, we had our good days and

bad days. Some days we had fights. But we love each other a lot. We always played ball together and helped each other."

Russ, 19, has chosen ot to pursue basketball in college. He's a fulltime student at Sue Bennett College in London, Ky. and working after school and nights at Sham-rock Coal Company.

"I'm glad he is go-ing on and getting his education because that is most important,' Richie said.

Richie still sees Russ every day...and his sister, Rhonda too. Rhonda, 25, is a student at Eastern Ken-tucky University.

Richie averaged just nine minutes in 27 games for the troubled 'Cats. He averaged 3.1 points per game and made only 23 of 82 field goals (28 percent).

Oh, he had his moments. He had 15 points against Western Carolina, then back-to-back 12-point nights against Bowling Green and Marshall in the UKIT.

But then his playing time dwindled. After 12 minutes of PT against Indiana, he played sparingly.

His highlight film was the final seconds against Ole Miss. Farmer fed LeRon Ellis inside, got the ball back and hit a 21-footer that gave UK a 70-69 win.

Farmer also faced rumors that he was so homesick he was going to return home. For good. But he says that this was all media exaggeration.
"It wasn't as bad as everybody let on,"

Richie said. "Sure, I missed my family, but it wasn't like everybody let on. I was

just trying to adjust."

Today coach Keith and his parents see a "new" Richie, so to speak, when he comes home

Not that his parents see much of him. He's still the same old Richie in that he grabs his gun the minute he comes home. Then it's off to meet some of his friends, like Charlie House and Kevin Rice, and

then on to his favorite sport—hunting.
"We don't see that much of him, he disappears," Virginia Farmer said.

But she sees enough to know Richie and his

"He's real happy this year," Virginia said. "It's been a real turnaround."
The Farmers never

interfered last year with Richie's problems...if one can call them that. They let him work it out like

"If he could handle the problem we left it up to him,

Farmer said. "He never said anything. So we let him work it out

There is a new Richie Farmer out there. You won't find it by looking in the statistics, although they show a lot of improvement.

For example, his playing time is up to 18 minutes. He is averaging 7.5 points per game, has 30 steals, and 67 assists (through games of Feb. 7).

But it is a more confident Richie tak-ing the floor these days. Like the one that showed up against LSU. When starting point guard Sean Woods got into early foul trouble. 

For the SEC's sake, is at least one club NCAA-ready?

LSU, Georgia, 'Bama only real hopes

With the SEC basketball regular season now heading down the stretch toward post-season tournaments, the league for the most part has been a whipping boy for jokes regarding its strength this year. In fact, some have

said the league has been at its lowest point in years. But as SEC teams position themselves for post-season play, it just might be premature to speculate just how far some of them may go in NCAA Tournament action this month.

For example, LSU has been the conference focal point throughout the year with the Tigers consistently being rated in the Top 10. Although Dale Brown has had trouble finding the right chemistry at times, the Tigers certainly are a squad to be reckoned with once tournament time rolls around. The twin towers of Shaquille O'Neal and Stanley Roberts will give matchup problems for any team the Tigers will face and it's unlikely any team can stop LSU's All-America guard Chris Jackson

Another team that has had its share of ups and downs is Alabama. The Tide, picked by some media members to win the conference, is a prime example of a team that never is as bad as its worst game or as good as its best game. That theory was no more evident than a couple of weeks ago, when the Tide played its worst game of the year in a homecourt loss to Mississippi State, but bounced back to totally dominate Kentucky on that same floor a few nights later.

One of the knocks against the Tide is that it doesn't shoot well as a team, averaging in the 45 percent range. But keep in mind that once tournament play begins the teams start to feel the pressure and therefore shooting percentages usually are down. Thus, this factor may work in Alabama's favor.

The third SEC team to keep in mind is Georgia. Going into the final phase of the season, Hugh Durham has done another masterful job in making the Bulldogs a real force in the SEC race. Like Alabama, the 'Dogs have gone through periods of inconsistency, but recently have been one of the hottest teams in the league. They have been nearly invincible at home and have saved their best play for the end of the season. Durham has something he usually doesn't have and that's height. With 6-foot-II Alex Kessler and 6-10 Neville Austin along the front line to complement forward Marshall Wilson the Bulldogs

could be a tough team to handle in tournament action. Finally, let's not leave out the so-called also-rans such as Tennessee, Vanderbilt and Mississippi State. Although both Vandy and MSU have pretty much eliminated themselves lately, Eddie Fogler and Wade Houston have done fine jobs, respectively, at those schools. The Volunteers just might back-door themselves into the NCAA with a nice showing in the SEC tourament. The Vols are somewhat of a long shot but if they can get some good front line play from Ian Lockhart, Steve Rivers and Ronnie Reese to go with the likes of Allan Houston and Greg Bell, look out.

Southeastern Conference basketball was a big flop in last year's NCAA Tournament with no team winning a tournament game. But when you take into consideration coaches such as Dale Brown, Wimp Sanderson and Hugh Durham and put them in a tournament situation anything can happen. Each has proved himself in tournament play and either is capable of advancing a team in a tournament.

The SEC certainly hasn't been one of the toughest conferences in the country, but it has tremendous youth

and promise. LSU, Georgia and Alabama appear to be the early favorites to redeem the league's sub-par showing during the regular season. So don't be surprised if the SEC's reputation is uplifted by the time the NCAA Tournament is reduced to just the "Sweet 16." With a little luck, those three teams certainly are capable and have coaches who have been there in the past. For the SEC's sake, let's hope at least one can make it to the regional finals, if not all the way.



He seems like the perfect guy for Auburn, but as Sonny Smith can tell you, it is a difficult spot to sustain a winning tradition...

□Until a few weeks ago California had never won a game in UCLA's Pauley Pavilion. But the Bears upended the Bruins and in doing so established themselves not only as a contender for the Pac-10 title, but a team which will have to be given very serious NCAA tournament consideration. Quietly, coach Lou Campanelli has had a nice run at a school which was considered a basketball boneyard. I find it interesting that his name hasn't been included in the Virginia coaching rumor swirl.  \Box Let's pass along some kind words for coaches who are deserving.

Northwestern's Bill Foster carries bravely on in Evanston. While it is true the Wildcats are ticketed for their traditional spot looking all the way up the Big Ten standings, it is also a fact that things are better. Northwestern is competitive at home and its fans are very enthusiastic. But it is also true that losing is still predictable for a school which wants things both ways—Ivy League academic standards, but Big Ten paydays. Foster is a man who knows what it takes to build a successful program and it must be tough on him understanding that he just doesn't have the necessary tools to get it done

Last year I had occasion to see the Oregon Ducks play two games, an experience which couldn't be considered memorable. It was a bad team with a future which didn't appear much brighter. You can understand my surprise, then, when recently surveying the standings and noticing that coach Don Monson's team is above the .500 mark and has become a worthy foe at home. There's never been much doubt about Monson's sideline capabilities, but, like Foster, he's in a situation which doesn't allow much opportunity to build a powerhouse. The Ducks have made it exciting this year, though, and that's a tribute to him...

▶ I used to kid Southern Mississippi's M.K. Turk that he'd be smart to not join all the other big time coaches who make these off-season pilgrimages to New York for a day spent schmoozing with television executives and broadcasters. Instead, I suggested he come see me in Detroit sometime. He'd laugh and promise he was going to accept my offer. Then something happened. Southern Mississippi won the NIT and he told me that he now felt he didn't need to come to Detroit and could, instead, join the other coaches in New York. Well, okay. M.K. still does a tremendous job in a disadvantaged situation. At last look the Golden Eagles were 16-8 with a shot at the NCAA tournament and, at the very least, the NIT. That's quite an accomplishment because if you think



about it, how many great basketball players grow up dreaming of playing in Hattiesburg, Miss?...

□I'm puzzled by the whole story at Drake. This is a school which made no secret of its ambition to be successful in basketball. Even in the Gary Garner days, there was a strong commitment on the school's part to make it happen on the hardwood. When Garner was broomed and Tom Abatamarco was hired it seemed like a good marriage—aggressive school, proven recruiter. 

NBA is next challenge for UK's Derrick Miller

Jack Givens, now a scout, says 'Deek' can make it

As Wildcat fans know, Derrick Miller's basketball

career at UK is about to come to an end.

After Miller plays his last game as a Wildcat when Kentucky visits Notre Dame on Monday, he will be

looking for an opportunity to play in the National Basketball Association next season. He knows it won't be

If Miller, whose hometown is Savannah, Ga., gets to play for the Atlanta Hawks in his home state, he'd be on cloud nine. Making it in the NBA is a big honor, but

donning a Hawks' uniform would be icing on the cake.

"That would be a dream come true," Miller said after a recent UK victory in Rupp Arena. "I watch the Hawks play all the time and I think in order for me to play in the NBA, I have to do a lot of off-season work, but I think the mentality is there. You know I think I can help them because one of their weakest spots right now is the shooting guard. That has been one of the things that has hurt them for a long time. But they have a great team.

It's a great city and I'd love to play for them."

Former UK star Jack Givens, scouting for the Orlando Magic, has said that Miller might be able to hook up with an NBA expansion team with his long-range bombing skills, especially if the 6-foot-5, 170-pound guard "bulks up" his skinny frame this summer.

However, another scout, who asked that his name not be used, expressed some doubt about Miller's NBA

Miller realizes making the NBA roster won't be a

piece of cake. He just wants a fair chance.

As one of the SEC's top players this season as he is hitting about 19 points a game, ranking among the top five scorers in the league. He is very pleased with the way his senior season has gone and he would like to be selected All-SEC, an honor he never has won.

"Right now I'm happy to be one of the top players in the SEC," he said. "That's something I've worked for the whole year. One of my goals was to stay here and try to accomplish that. Everybody has dreams of being All-SEC and making All-American. The thing that helped me from my freshman year to now is that I listen to people (for advice). I listen a lot."

DICKIE V: WHAT YOU SEE IS WHAT YOU GET

•When TV basketball analyst Dick Vitale was in the process of becoming the first cable sports star, he was making about \$60,000 for 60 events on ESPN. That was six years ago.

Since then, Vitale's stock has mushroomed. Today, it is reported that he earns \$450,000 a year from his TV contract with ABC and ESPN. That's not all as he also has other deals, giving him a total of nearly \$1 million a


"Some people think I'm too much," Vitale said in a recent USA Today interview, "but I'm like the guy in Broadcast News. My life has exceeded my dreams."

Refs should 'Get good or get gone'

Everyone who follows college basketball is aware of the escalating changes that are reducing the competition of speed, skill and the sharpness, conducted in a sport-smanlike manner, into roughneck, riotous communal

The men charged with the duty of controlling these fuming, seething situations are the referees and their aides, the umpires. They are regularly insulted, harried harassed, threatened and even attacked by this new wave of team followers. They are interrupted, vilified, denigrated, cursed and lied to by the coaches, who want all the calls to favor their teams.

The game officials are protected only by police assigned to them by the game manager. When they cannot control the players and the coaches, the fans and team followers sometimes burst into action, which al! the police cannot control, and riots erupt.

The chief cause of the trouble is the continual impressing of more size, speed, weight and jumping ability into the 50- x 94-foot floor space and the two 10-foot high baskets, the game's original design. With each increase in athleticism or pressure of personal criticism, more stress is compacted into an outgrown stressful

Unless we relieve the "Refs" of carrying the whole load, by assigning responsibility to the coaches for keeping order, we will need a tougher breed of man to

Doubts about the overall competence of the strained current SEC crews are league wide. Even editorials are being carried in major newspapers. The best refs work nearly every day we play. They are on the road or in the air constantly—with one umpire of little experience and one a rookie. The Nashville Tennesseean advised that steps be taken to upgrade the quality of SEC officiating

immeditely—and taken in public view.

Personally, I feel we are in a state of emergency. John Guthrie, who scouts for SEC-quality officials constantly and holds clinics for them, must accelerate the process. He needs to prepare at least a dozen new men capable of immediate placement, and to get tough with the ones

ow on hand who are not progressing. I offer a motto: Get good or get gone!

When the SEC began basketball in 1932-33 the referees were usually two outstanding high school coaches in the area of the home team, chosen by the coach for their knowledge of the rules and their ability to recruit. Generally, they worked well, but close calls

favored the home team. It was expected.

Coach Adolph Rupp, teacher of basketball to all schools that wanted to learn the game, along with Kentucky, taught referees too. He was the recommendation necessary for the Basketball Officials Association, and they were quite naturally grateful.

At that time the master referee was Bowser Chest of At that time the master referee was Bowser Chest of Nashville, Tenn. This great man taught the game, sportsmanship and proper conduct to the players by taking the time to explain penalities to them. Mr. Chest was in absolute control, as a professor in his lecture room, with quick, clear whistles and firm, fair decisions. Fortunate was the young referee trained by Mr. Chest. Not even Rupp challenged Chest.

Dan Tehan, the sheriff of Cincinnati, always ran the





whistle-blowers did a creditable job.

Mark you, I'm not saying a word about what happened at the other end, because my ringside, unobstructed view was in the limited area in my close range of vision.

My comment is that in most cases the officials officiate as good as the coaches coach and better than the radio and TV nnouncers and the fans officiate from their less-than-prime-time locations.

Do you realize how much schooling,

training and experience go into the production of an official on the Division 1 level? And yet we have fans from all walks of life who by their actions, thoughts and comments seem to know more about calling a game than do experienced persons who officiate two or three games a week.

Let's all rotate a few times. Let the radio and TV announcers and officials swap positions for a UK-LSU game; then choose three fans from a random drawing to exchange their seats for striped shirts at a UK-UT game.

Of course, we'll also have to swap money at the same time, with the radio/TV fees being exchanged for the officials' stipends, with the fans also receiv

ing officials' pay while the officials must pay for those three seats in the stands. Who is getting the short end of this stick?

THE MORE THINGS CHANGE...


