With all of the channels targeted for different groups and ethnicities that are available through Insight cable, I wondered why there isn't a channel for the GLBT community. I enjoy BET as much as the next person although, being a white male, I am probably not their target audience. And, I would probably enjoy Telemundo much more if my Spanish speaking ability was more fluent.

There is a channel, however, that I have previously enjoyed that is not offered in Lexington. The LOGO channel is available through many satellite cable providers, but currently not through Insight. If you are not familiar with what they offer, check out www.logoonline.com. On this website you can see a complete schedule of their programming.

The shows that I have watched are not only entertaining but also informative and deal with daily issues of the GLBT community. Some examples:

Noah's Ark, a wonderful series about gay men of color.

A comedy series featuring gay and lesbian comedians.

News programs that focus on gay issues around the world.

"New, Now, Next" a music video show featuring gay artists and music for and from our culture.

Sordid Lives is currently being made into a series to be shown this fall. Many of the same actors will be in the series including Leslie Jordan who played "Brother Boy".

`If you go to www.logoonline.com you can vote for your favorite gay themed films. They keep a running list of the 50 top films as rated by the viewers and then show the favorites on their channel.

I have called Insight to request that this channel be added to their list of channels available but they tell me that not enough people have expressed an interest in LOGO.



Claire, meanwhile, is infatuated with a respectable young lady and wants to enlist the jealous Anna's help for an assignation. As the two women exchange barbs and take turns taunting Anna's hapless Scottish parlor maid, Claire's young inamorata suddenly appears, setting off a crisis that puts both the valuable emerald and the women's futures at risk. This documentary examines a shameful and hidden part of our History by revisiting three of the communities that forcibly expelled their entire African American populations in early 20th Century.



BFCK and KEF say, "Let's Rally"

Bluegrass Fairness of Central Kentucky and the Kentucky Equality Federation recently joined forces to create "Equality. Fairness. Nothing More; Nothing Less.", a lobby/rally day in Frankfort on February 12th.

The day will begin in room 466 of the Capitol Building Annex at 8:30 a.m. with some opening comments and lobby training. People will be given packets of appropriate information so that they can lobby their respective legislators on the issues of domestic partner benefits at public universities, the anti-bullying bill. and the hospital designee bill.

The event will culminate in a rally in the Rotunda from 1 to 2. The rally will focus on the fight to maintain domestic partner benefits at universities and will feature various speakers, including

Senator Scorsone.

Organizers are preparing by doing phone banks, researching issues and talking points, sending blast emails, and identifying people who will be willing to lobby their legislators in person.

Of course, this day cannot take place without the help of volunteers. We need people to make phone calls, to lobby, to provide transportation, and to pass out flyers and brochures. For more info call Bluegrass Fairness at 859-951-4450.



Legislative Update:

House Bill 55 would revoke public universities' ability to provide domestic partner benefits. Richard Henderson of Jeffersonville and Ancel Smith of Leburn. both Democratic representatives, proposed the bill and were joined by 16 co-sponsors.

While the bill has yet to be sent to a committee, we hope to see it assigned to the Health and Welfare committee. This committee allowed a similar bill to "die" last year (it was never sent to the floor for discussion or voted on). If assigned to this committee, there is a good chance that it will be allowed to die again. If not, Gov. Beshear has promised to veto it. We expect this bill to be our biggest fight.

The House Education Committee unanimously approved a anti-bullying bill. Senate president David Williams, Rcontinued on page 13

Burkesville, is leading the charge against the bill by claiming that it could lead to gay curriculum taught in schools. We do not see any correlation between legislation that makes schools create policies against bullying and the teaching of homosexual curriculum. The bill does not even include language concerning sexual orientation protections. While we find Williams' assertions absurd and homophobic, many senators will agree with him and we do not expect the bill to get out of the Senate.

Mary Lou Marzian, D-Louisville, prefiled the Hospital Designee Bill. This bill would allow anyone 18 and older to designate a non-blood relative as having hospital room access. Hospitals would no longer be allowed to keep domestic partners out of hospital rooms if the patient gives them access. We would hear no more horror stories of partners sitting in the waiting room while their loved ones die alone or with unwanted blood relations.

Senator Scorsone, D-Lexington, in conjunction with Rep. Stein, D-Lexington, and Rep. Marzian filed the statewide Fairness Bill. We hope this bill will pass, but we expect it to suffer a similar fate this year as it has in all previous attempts. We will focus our energies on House Bill 55 because we believe we can defeat it.

African American History Month Audre Lorde

Audre Lorde was born on February 18, 1934 in New York City. She was the daughter of Grenadian immigrants of West Indian descent who settled in Harlem. She did not learn to speak until the age of 5 -- and learned to read at the same time. From that beginning, she went on to become a writer who's works have been translated into a coordinate.

into seven foreign languages.

Lorde graduated Hunter College in 1959, where she later held the prestigious post of Thomas Hunter Chair of Literature. During graduate school she supported herself by working odd jobs: factory worker, ghost writer, social worker, X-ray technician, and medical clerk. She earned her master's degree in library science from Columbia University in 1961. She worked as a librarian and married Edward Ashley Rollins with whom she had two children, Elizabeth and Johnathon, before they divorced.

Lorde considered 1968 to be the turning point of her life. She left her job as head librarian at the University of New York to become a lecturer and creative writer. She received a National Endowment for the Arts grant, and accepted a poet-in-residence position at Tougaloo College in Jackson, Mississippi. While there, she met Frances Clayton, a white professor of psychology. They were partners until 1989.

The civil rights movement was at its height in 1968, creating an atmosphere that reinforced Lorde's commitment to being a writer dedicated to using her skills in the many struggles against injustice. It was at Tougaloo that Lorde published her first volume of poetry, The First Cities.

In 1976 a major book company published <u>Coal</u> which enabled Lorde to reach a larger audience. This was followed

in 1978 by <u>The Black Unicorn.</u> This volume, in which Lorde explored her African

heritage, is considered to be one of her greatest works. Poet and critic Adrienne Rich said of *The Black Unicorn*: "refusing to

be circumscribed by any simple identity, Audre Lorde writes as a Black woman, a mother, a daughter, a Lesbian, a feminist, a visionary;

poems of elemental wildness and healing, nightmare and lucidity."

In addition to poetry, Lorde was a powerful essayist, and is particularly remembered for The Cancer Journals (1980), in which she documents her fourteen year struggle with breast cancer. She wrote many essays about being a black woman in the feminist movement, including the compilations Sister Outsider and Uses of the Erotic. One of her most widely used quotations comes from the title of an essay in Sister Outsider "The Master's Tools Will Never Dismantle the Master's House".

Lorde confronted oppression in its many forms. She wrote of racism in the feminist movement, homophobia and sexism among African Americans, and of seeking common ground with all people willing to fight for justice. She wrote for women who had no voice of their own. She believed that many people are terrified to speak their own truths because they were taught to respect fear more than themselves. Lorde wrote particularly for women of color throughout the world because she saw that they did not have a public voice. She worked to provide avenues of expression for future generations of writers by cofounding (with Barbara Smith) Kitchen Table: Women of Color Press. She was at the center of the movement to preserve and celebrate African American culture. She frequently spoke up for GLBT rights.

In 1979 she was one of the featured speakers at the first national march for gay and lesbian liberation in DC.

Lorde was partners with Gloria Joseph, until her death from breast cancer on November 17, 1992 in St. Croix after a 14 year struggle with the disease.

Lorde received many awards and honors, including an American Book Award for A Burst of Light in 1989. She received the Walt Whitman Citation of Merit and was designated as the New York State poet for 1991-93. In his speech naming her as Poet Laureate, the Governor, Mario Cuomo, said: "She cries out ... as the voice of indignant humanity.

Audre Lorde is the voice of the eloquent outsider who speaks in a language that can reach and touch people everywhere."

Late in life, Audre Lorde was given the African name Gamba Adisa, meaning "Warrior: She Who Makes Her Meaning Clear". Her struggle against oppression on many fronts was expressed with a force and clarity that made her a respected voice for women, African Americans, and the Gay and Lesbian community. She is remembered for being a great warrior poet who valiantly fought many personal and political battles with her words.

The Transformation of Silence into Language and Action by Audre Lorde

This is a selection from her essay.

I have come to believe over and over again that what is most important to me must be spoken, made verbal and shared, even at the expense of having it bruised or misunderstood. ... that the speaking profits me beyond any other effect. In becoming forcibly and essentially aware of my mortality, and of what I wished and wanted for my life, what I most regretted were my silences. I began to recognize a source of power within myself that comes from the knowledge that while it is most desirable not to be afraid, learning to put fear into perspective gave me great strength...

I was going to die, if not sooner then later, whether or not I had ever spoken myself. My silences had not protected me. Your silence will not protect you...

And, of course, I am afraid because the transformation of silence into language and action is an act of self revelation, and that always seems fraught with danger. In the cause of silence, each of us draws the face of her own fear... fear of contempt, of

censure, of some judgment or recognition, of challenge, of annihilation. But most of all, I think we fear the visibility without which we cannot truly live.

Primarily for all of us, it is necessary to teach by living and speaking those truths which we believe and know beyond understanding. Because in this way alone we can survive, by taking part in a process of life that is creative and continuing, that is growth.

What do you need to say? What are the words you do not yet have?...

We can learn to work and speak when we are afraid in the same way we have learned to work and speak when we are tired. For we have been socialized to respect fear more that our own needs for language and definition, and while we wait in silence for that final luxury of fearlessness, the weight of the silence will choke us...

The fact that we are here and that I speak these words is an attempt to break that silence and bridge some of those differences between us, for it is not difference which immobilizes us, but silence. And there are so many silences to be broken.

Q: My boyfriend talks on his cell phone constantly. He even answered it last night during sex. What do you suggest I do?

A: Relax. It could be that he is just a busy guy and has a lot to take care of. Don't make a big deal of it. If you are beginning to feel threatened or neglected express your feelings to him and ask him to limit his time on the cell phone while the two of you are together and absolutely forbid him to bring it into the bedroom while you are having sex (assuming the bedroom where you are doing it). If that doesn't work, just ask him to switch it to vibrate and both of you enjoy the ride.

Q: My girlfriend and I have been together three weeks. I think she may be the one. However, her chronic halitosis is driving me crazy. How should I handle this?

A: If she really is the one, this will be a good opportunity to test the lines of communication between the two of you. Get the facts on what some of the causes of halitosis are. These could be anything from eating habits to a sinus infection or problems with the teeth and/or gums. Then, reassure her that you really are into her and you want to address an issue that you are bothered by. A mint on the pillow might not be a bad idea, either.

Q: My boyfriend has 2 small children that live with him. The problem is that I can't stand the little rugrats...but I love him and will make the sacrifice. We



have been seeing each other for 6 months. Should we move in together?

A: Are you sure you want to make this "sacrifice"? If you truly can't stand them then it will only get worse when you are with them all the time. Keep dating until you have found an affection for the children. I fear that, if you move in, you will become resentful of his children and he could become resentful toward you for not loving them as much as he does. Remember, Mommy Dearest didn't work for Joan and probably won't work for you, either.

Take Helena's advice at your own risk.


