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## **MAJOR ACHIEVEMENT**

For five pupils of Bat 'Cat skipper Keith Madison, right, the road to the major leagues has included stops at UK

University of Kentucky head baseball coach Keith Madison has developed a tradition of molding young men into outstanding individuals and professional baseball players. In his 13 years as head coach, Madison has

had 43 players sign professional contracts after playing at Kentucky. Twenty-one former Wildcats are active in professional baseball this year with five having made it to the majorleague level.

In fact, except for the University of Florida, Kentucky has more players in the majors than any other school in the Southeastern Confer-

But Madison doesn't take the credit for the

But Madison doesn't date the credit for the fortune of his former players.

"We have been blessed with young men who want to excel," he said, "and because of this

want to excer, the sand, and because of mise we have been able, as coaches, to help them become major-league level prospects."

Jim Leyritz, Paul Kilgus, Jeff Parrett, Jack Savage and Terry Shumpert honed their skills at UK and credit Madison and his program for their progress to the majors

And why did Kilgus choose UK?

"I was impressed with the coaching staff and the program," Kilgus, the left-handed hurler who was traded this year from the Chicago Cubs to the Toronto Blue Jays, said. "Another reason I came to Kentucky was I thought it would be fun to play for a friend on and off the field, and coach Madison seem-

ed like he could be a friend."

"Paul is one of the best starting pitchers we've had at Kentucky," Madison said of Kilgus, who holds the UK career record for

most innings pitched (300½) and shutouts (4).
"He was a classic overchiever who wasn't recruited that heavily out of high school, but

he came here and gained some strength and speed on his fastball."
"He teaches you a lot of the little things that

make you a great pitcher," Minnesota Twins pitcher Jack Savage said. "He taught me mind control and discipline." Savage came to UK as a starter, but Madison

moved him to the bullpen after his sophomore

"It made a big differnce in Jack's develop-ment," Madison said. "It made him a much more confident pitcher. It appeared he threw harder out of the bullpen.'

The Louisville native, who played at UK from 1983-85, holds the school single-season record for saves (7) and is fifth for pitching

appearances (21) in a single-season.

"All the workouts coach Madison conducted were just like the ones I have had in the ma-

But what brings these talented players to the University of Kentucky, a school better known for producing basketball players?

Shumpert, the star-ting second baseman for the Kansas City Royals for part of this year before an injury ended his season, said he came to UK because he knew he would face some of the best college play-

ers in the nation.
"The Southeastern Conference is very competitive," Shum-pert said. "I wanted experience against top college teams."

One of six baseball

All-Americas at UK, Shumpert was recruited by many colleges out of high school as a basketball player,

Pitcher Jeff Parrett, traded from the Phils to the Braves late this season, has enjoyed the most bigleague success of these five ex-Bat 'Cats.



but decided to play baseball at UK because Madison is a "nice guy, and my mom liked him

"Terry has tremendous speed and is a great defensive player," Madison said. New York Yankee third baseman Jim

Leyritz, who had been recruited by UK, came Leyritz, who had oeen recruited by UK, cather to Madison after his senior year in high school and asked for some advice. Madison suggested that Leyritz attend Middle Georgia for his first two years to gain experience and maturity. "Jim's an extremely versatile player," Madison said. "He's a natural hitter who hits the ball hard."

UK also helped prepare Atlanta Braves pit-

cher Jeff Parrett for professional baseball.
"I felt the experience he gained playing in the SEC helped him early in the minors," Madison said. "He had the jump on the others because he faced some of the best players in the country while playing at Kentucky

Parrett said playing against top teams in the SEC definitely helped him prepare for the

The Lexington native, who began his professional career with the Milwaukee Brewers, has continued to work hard even though he

has been in The Show for several years.
"The thing that impresses me the most about Jeff is that he still has great work habits," Madison said. "Many players that have been to the majors tend to stop working. Every winter when the team works out, he's always

there working with us."

Parrett is UK's fourth career leader in strike outs with 176.

"Pitching consists of constant adjustments," Parrett said. "Coach Madison taught me how to make those adjustments and it made me

more of a fine-tuned pitcher."

Tom Browning of the Cincinnati Reds and Rob Murphy of the Boston Red Sox are players who never played an inning at UK, but got to the big leagues with help from Madison.

Back in 1982, Madison took his Wildcats

to play Tennessee Wesleyan, where Browning mowed them down.

Madison was so impressed that he called Chet Montgomery, a scout for the Reds, to tell

him about Browning. The Reds picked him up in the ninth round of the 1982 June draft. "He deserves all the credit," Madison said. "He's a tremedous competitor with the best ball control of any pitcher I've seen. It gives me a great deal of satisfaction to see someone

# UK drops 35-29 SEC opener

## Dropped passes, brilliant play by Ole Miss' Luke send Curry's 'Cats to fourth consecutive defeat

Kentucky entered its second season and literally dropped a 35-29 decision to Mississippi in Oxford.

Statistics after the Southeastern Conference showdown revealed Wildcat receivers dropped nine passes. But for most of the day the game securely belonged in the Rebels' hands

Ole Miss took advantage of UK's butter fingers and other mistakes, thus keeping pace in the SEC title chase. The Rebels jumped out to 21-7 and 35-14 leads and evened the

league slate at 1-1 despite a UK comeback. "Had we not given the cheap one up, the blindside (hit) with the ball going into the end zone, it might have been a different story Wildcat head coach Bill Curry said. "The other reality is that we continue to dig ourselves into deep holes and fight back." Kentucky drops to 0-1 in the league and 1-4

overall, losing four consecutive games after an opening-season win against Central Michigan. The 'Cats try to regroup this week and get ready for Homecoming festivities and

a date with Mississippi State.

Billy Brewer's Ole Miss club enters this week's TBS nationally-televised game at Georgia with a 4-1 mark. In that contest Brewer will be looking for his 10lst victory

## Luke too tough to tackle

Mississippi starting quarterback Tom Luke had a sensational afternoon. The 6-foot-1, 195-pound sophomore signal caller rushed for 82 yards on 12 carries and threw for 132 yards on a eight-of-16 afternoon. Throughout the day Luke used counter plays to slip by and over UK's interior defense, avoiding all would-be tackles behind the line of

And it was Luke's cool hand that erased a advantage by the visitors.

Kentucky scored on its second series of the game, an eight-play, 64-yard drive. Al Baker, who led his team in rushing (69 yards on 13 carries) and pass receiving (48 yards on seven receptions), scored from the four with 9:21 remaining in the first quarter. Mike Thomas' 24-vard run set up Baker's off-tackle scoring

Ole Miss, which early muffed a 42-yard field goal attempt on its initial series, got on track late in the first quarter. Inside the UK two, Maurice Shaw took a

handoff from Luke, and scored early in the second period. One play earlier, Ed Thigpen apparently fumbled inside the UK five. Officials, though, said the whistle had blown before Thigpen was stripped of the ball.

Shaw's touchdown celebration dance drew the ire of one offical and cost the Rebels an unsportsman-like penalty. Starting from its 44 on the next series, UK couldn't capitalize as the 'Cats' offense was shut down for the rest of the first half

Kentucky should have taken a note or two from the Rebels, because Brewer's club was able to take advantage of good field position with 4:11 remaining

One play after taking over at the UK 47, Luke, with enough time to hum a few verses of Dixie, spotted split end Derrick Owens for a 33-yard gain. And on the next play Randy Baldwin broke loose for a 15-yard touchdown

Three plays...47 yards...14-7 in favor of Ole iss. Sounds too easy.

Both teams couldn't muster a first down on their opening second-half drives. But thanks to the play of the special teams the Rebels more than threatened on its next possession.

Ole Miss punt returner Vincent Brownlee took a Bill Hawk line-drive boot and ducked in and around Wildcat paws before being stopped after a 58-yard return. And from the UK 23, Ole Miss needed only six plays, the final on a Thigpen one yard TD, to go ahead

## 'Cats close to 21-14, but...

Starting from the UK 20, Smith directed an 11-play, 80-yard touchdown drive. The sophomore quarterback making his first collegiate start connected on five of six pass during the drive. His strike to tight end Rodney Jackson for 20 yards pushed the 'Cats into Ole Miss territory (UM 43). Smith then opted for short passes to his backs, Baker (I3 and three yards) and Craig Walker (five

With a second-down-and-seven situation at the UM 13, Smith crossed up the Mississip pi defense with a quarterback draw. A hole opened as Smith headed for paydirt with his fist clinched and UK's second score.

"Overall, I'm very proud of his courage and very proud of his work," Curry said of Smith's performance, 25 of 42 and one touchdown through the air. And unlike his '90 debut at Rutgers, there were no interceptions

## ...Rebs go on another 14-0 tear

Luke again answered with positive plays. He converted five first downs on an 80-yard, 10-play scoring march, reclaiming Ole Miss' 14-point cushion. From the UK 43, the Rebels faced a third-seven situation. However, a Luke-Jeffery Holder 17-yard connection took care of matters

From the 21, Luke called an option, these days a dirty word to UK defensive coordinator Larry New and the 'Cat defense. And they weren't smiling after Baldwin's 21-yard touchdown scamper. His second rushing TD pushed the Rebs ahead 28-14 as the horn ending the third quarter blared throughout Vaught-Hemingway Stadium.

That's not the only sound that rang on the

Following John Bolden's dropped pass mid-way through the final period, Smith, from the UK 24, went back to pass. This time inside linebacker Pete Harris' vibrating hit separated the ball from Smith's grasp. The ball sailed into the end zone where Shawn Cobb recovered. Brian Lee's extra point gave UM its biggest lead 35-14 with 8:59 left.

Smith's 25-yard pass to a diving Phil Logan in the end zone closed the count to 35-21. Extremely accurate was the best way to describe Wildcat signal caller on this drive, completing eight of nine passes

With the balance of UK's coverage team with the balance of OK's coverage team weighed heavily to the left, Doug Pelfrey, kicked the ball to the right side. The onside try went four-yards before proceeding to spin like a toy top. With Pelfrey nearby the twirling ball, Ole Miss' Camp Roberts couldn't resist. He tried to pick the ball up and run, but Pelfrey alertly wrestled the pigskin into

In this instance, Robert's curiosity kept the 'Cats' optimisim alive.

UK drove to the Ole Miss 1 with :05 left. On a sweep right, Baker crossed the goal line untouched. Next, Curry said afterwards he decided to go for two because he was told that at least one second remained. (Note: TV replay showed when Baker crossed the goal line one second was left on the scoreboard.)

The game ended on a successful two-point

conversion—a Smith to Neil Page pass.

Kentucky outscored Ole Miss 14-7 in the fourth period, giving the UK head coach reason to be optimistic. "We're becoming a fourth-quarter team, ever so slightly," Curry We are finding some champions in ou ranks. We're finding some people who can deliver when the chips are down." Said Smith about the comeback: "It was

too little too late."

I'd give my right arm and left one if everyone doing like Al.'

Afterwards, Baker was asked if he would welcome a switch to tailback. Baker said he wouldn't. "At fullback you're like five yards back, at tailback you're eight yards back," Baker, describing the difference between the two positions, said. "It seems like you have to run a lot faster just to make up that yar dage behind the line. I like the fullback posi-

Both Freddie Maggard and Joel Mazzella had consecutive game strings snap-ped as Wildcat starters. Maggard, whose right shoulder was injured at North Carolina, had started in 15 consecutive games at the quarter-back slot while Mazzella, a standout UK of-fensive guard, saw his 24-game streak come to an end. Union County product Bill Hulette started in place of Mazzella.

□Billy Brewer, who with the win has been on the winning side 100 times, has a 43-39-3 mark at Ole Miss. He was 38-24-2 at Southeastern Louisiana and 19-15-1 at Louisiana and 19-15-1 at Louisiana and 19-15-1 at Louisiana siana Tech. This is Brewer's 17th season as a college head coach







## Changing times, locker rooms and woman reporters

Amids all the yelling and just as the invitation process got in high gear, Claiborne spotted a young lady who was part of a television crew covering the event.

was part of a television crew covering the event.

The players, emerged in the happiness of the moment, had not begun to undress, but the newswoman promptly was asked to leave the room.

She should have stood her ground.

After that incident, I had in my desk a policy statement concerning the presence of women in men's locker rooms after a sporting event.

In essence, we were going to close the room and bring out players, in proper attire of course, that were requested by the media.

quested by the media.

During one period in Claiborne's eight-year (1982'289) reign as head coach, a woman reporter from Cincinnati covered Wildcat football games.

At the time, I had two offices, one in Memorial Coliseum, the other just across the hall from Claiborne in the Commonwealth Stadium football office complex.

Walk down the hall a few yards, turn left down

another hallway, go several more yards and you were at a door leading to the Wildcat locker room.

There also were two theater-type rooms in that area where players gathered on Sunday to watch films of the

game played the preceding day.

After each home game, the players would sing "On, On, UK," if they had won. Claiborne would say a few words and lead them in prayer. Then after the players had gone to their lockers, he would go around and shake each one's hand and perhaps have a word or two of congrapulation or condenders. gratulation or condolence

During that time, members of the media would be waiting patiently in the offensive film room, where Claiborne would be available for post-game comments. When he finished, the locker room would be thrown open to the media.

The newswoman from Cincinnati could have presented a problem, if she so desired, by insisting on equal rights; instead, she went to my office after the Claiborne conference and waited patiently while I tried to round up the player or players that she had requested.

When she was through with her interview(s), she would join her more fortunate male counterparts in the

Jerry Claiborne definitely was old-fashioned in his morals and mores, which of course should be taken as a compliment. Cliff Hagan also was adamant in his resolve to keep women out of the locker room, although I sometimes wondered if he wasn't just echoing the feelings of his coaches

(One must remember that football is the last vestige of man's crumbling macho empire, what with women driving 18-wheelers, roofing houses, paving highways and even fighting for their right to go to war as something other than nurses or clerics). Fran Curci, Wildcat football coach during the nine

years prior to Claiborne's reign, also had strong feelings about women in a football locker room, which seemed a little surprising in light of the fact that women were some of his stronger boosters among Wildcat fandom. My feelings were made known when I went from the Lexington Leader to UK as assistant sports information director in 1967 and opened the Stoll Field press box and the Memorial Coliseum press row to women

of course, there were few women covering men's sports at the time; in fact, I can remember only one such person covering for the *United Press* and another

stringing for an out-of-town publication.

That was long before women's lib began its strong move, and the women were not there to challenge any system, but to earn a livelihood.

But this is a new era, one of open-mindedness so to speak if late-night and some prime time TV shows are the criteria, and the long male-dominated sports world is having a hard time adjusting to the change.

The surprising element is that even some of the

younger coaches and athletic administrators, both male and female, still cling to the old-fashioned beliefs as they

jealously protect their turf.

The end result often is a paranoia that causes such locker room incidents as those currently involving women reporters covering the New England Patriots and

Cincinnati Bengals pro football teams.

UK dodged the bullet along those lines and had its paranoia alleviated in 1988 when the Southeastern Conference adopted an "equal access" policy after Roy Kramer, then-Vanderbilt athletics director and currently the SEC commissioner, refused to allow a female Atlanta Journal reporter into the Commodore locker room.

The SEC policy stipulated that the media could not enter the locker room until after a 25-minute "cooling off" period. Last year, only players who had been requested by the media remained in the locker room after

This year, the UK locker room has been closed at both home and away games. After the 25-minute period, requested players are taken to a designated area to be

"Wickliffe, with "Baby" Deweese and the best team in 1927, was still basketball-minded when Rollins came along. I saw him play in the Region One games and told Rupp about him as others did.

The year Rollins was chosen captain of the Wildcats, Rupp let it be known that he wanted (Ralph) Beard chosen as captain, but team members thought otherwise and chose Rollins. A few years later his kid brother (Phil) showed more natural talent than Kenny had and many thought he would go to UK. I knew that there was no love lost between Rupp and Kenny and predicted he would choose Murray. As you know, he went to Louisville, but Rupp's determination to get stars from down that way materialized in (Jim) King from Benton, (Adrian) Smith from Farmington, where my mail came

from, and still later (Stan) Key, from Calloway County.

"The best of them all to play in the Murray regional was (Joe) Fulks from Kuttawa. He played at Murray College and later the pros and still later made the Hall of lege and later the pros and still later made the Hall of Fame. As a high schooler, Fulks drew laughs when he made his first appearance on the college floor—had red spots on his legs from chicken pox, as I recall. He was killed after his pro life in a brawl.

"Rupp admitted years later that basketball had improved rapidly; and as he remarked to me afterwards that when we western Kentucky fans saw his Wildcats play in the archibiting game at Fulton, they not basketball fever.

All four know one player-6-foot-6 Tommy

Kleinschmidt of Chicago—who could fill the need.
"He's not Rick Mount but he certainly is one of the top shooters in Illinois," Steve Pappas, his coach at Gordon Tech High School, said. "He's a great shooter but he can also take the ball to the basket. He can get you a big rebound, too, because he's a very physical player."

Kleinschmidt turned heads last season when he scored

27 points against powerful Chicago Martin Luther King High School in the Class AA title game. He averaged 32

points in the class AA title game. He averaged 3: points in the tournament.

Gordon Tech went 27-3 his sophomore year when he played with an all-senior squad. Last year was supposed to be a rebuilding season but Kleinschmidt led his team

"Our team probably plays the toughest schedule in the state," Pappas said. "Tommy made his mark at the state tournament last year and then punctuated it at the Nike

The 200-pound Kleinschmidt averaged 28.3 points, 8.2 rebounds, 4.3 assists and three steals per game last season; still, some recruiting analysts questioned his

athletic ability and foot speed.
"That really lit a fire under Tommy," Pappas said. "He may look a step slow but he's not. He went on a conditioning binge before the Nike Camp and went in there and kicked butt.

there and kicked butt.
"He showed everyone that he could shoot, rebound and guard people. Everybody has looked for flaws in Tommy's game just like they did with Larry Bird. But athletically Tommy can hold his own. He's got a quick first step and has a knack for being in the right place all the time. He's rarely out of position."

Pappas says his standout can handle the ball well, is an excellent passer and is extremely intelligent on the court

"He can run and press, too," Pappas said. "We average 84 points per game and he likes that style of play. Going to a school like Kentucky would be an easy transition."

Kleinschmidt is scheduled to visit UK this weekend, taking in the UK-Mississippi State football game, Keeneland and Midnight Madness.

However, he is more concerned with playing time and who he'll be playing with than anything else.

"He's looking for a place that fits his needs," Pappas said. "He has a strong attraction to all four programs and coaches

"He's a smart kid. He knows the rosters of the teams recruiting him. He's not afraid to compete but he also wants to know where he stands going into college." Kentucky coach Rick Pitino left no doubts how he

feels about Kleinschmidt when UK made its home visit

"Rick said he's looking at Tommy as one of his top five players (in 1991-92)," Pappas said. "This kid will be a factor his freshman year. Rick said he's physically ready to play in the Southeastern Conference now. And


he's just going to grow and develop more."

He's also used to playing strong competition. One of his friends is 6-9 Juwan Howard, considered one of the nation's five top prep players by many. Another is 6-8

quirements, has impressed Pitino and his staff with his desire to improve.

"Tom plays a lot of basketball but he also goes that extra yard," Pappas said. "Whether he plays ping-pong or basketball, his teams have been winners since he was in the seventh grade. He's just a great competitor."

This year Kleinschmidt has two goals—help his team win a state championship and be the Illinois "Player of the Year." That's why Pappas is glad his star plans to make his college choice in November after completing

his campus visits.
"He'll definitely sign in November because that will be the best thing for him," Pappas said. "That will allow him to enjoy his senior year. That's a luxury he's not had for two years.

"He has a chance to shatter a number of school records here. There are some very lofty plateaus for him to attain. There's not a lot he can improve on this year. He just needs a career-best year.

"The great ones go out each day and work to make themselves better. That's what he'll do, too, and why he is such a great player."

Pappas, though, knows Kleinschmidt may have trouble handling one task.

"The most difficult thing he is going to have to do is say no to three outstanding coaches and programs," Pap-pas said. "That's going to be hard on him because he really likes all four places. It's a decision that won't be easy to make but Tom and his family will sort it all out and make the right decision. I have no doubts about

WHEN HIS SON was young, Tom Kleinschmidt often took him to high school basketball games he officiated in the Chicago area.

That's when Tommy Kleinschmidt got to see current National Basketball Association stars Isiah Thomas and Mark Aguirre perform.

However, the lather didn't think basketball would be his son's best sport. He thought it would be baseball. "I was grooming him as a baseball player," Tom Kleinschmidt said. "He was a catcher and pitcher and I thought he would be drafted (by a major league team).

But 6-6 Tommy Kleinschmidt also can hit the threepoint shot, rebound, pass and play defense, and is now ranked as one of the nation's top high school seniors. He's also being recruited by schools from coast-to-coast. Kleinschmidt's father, who works for the Wall Street Journal, says the final decision on a college will be up

Journal, says the final decision on a college will be up to the player. The family doesn't favor hometown DePaul or Michigan State, where Tommy's sister attends, over the other two in Kleinschmidt's Final Four.
"It's going to be his decision," Tom Kleinschmidt said.
"I got that straight with him early. But he had the same thing from grammar school to high school. He had nine high schools he could have gone to, but he picked the one furthest away from our home.

## Curry: Tough times separate those who want to be winners from those who don't

## **UK** coach says competition might lead to personnel changes in coming weeks

Football is a team game. Football games are won, and lost, as a team. But when there are individual breakdowns among players and/or coaches during the course of a game, the team is in trouble.

That from UK head coach Bill Curry Sunday, Oct. 7, the day after his Wildcats came up on the short end of a 35-29 decision against Ole Miss in Oxford.

"What we're dealing with with our foot-ball team is crystalizing," Curry said. "It's becoming very, very clear that there's begin-ning to be a separation between the players who really understand what we are seeking here and the ones who don't.

"And what we're trying to do is for everybody to take responsibility for his ac-tions, his unit and his team. If you accept your individual responsibilities, beginning with the head coach, and each position coach accepts his responsibility and each player accepts his responsibility and the leadership begins to emerge on the team, then you're moving toward consistency.

"And you're always either moving toward winning or toward losing. You're never anywhere in between. And we're moving toward winning.

Curry said his team was on the losing end at Ole Miss because of a number of individual breakdowns-penalties, blown coverages, missed assignments, etc.-that had not been much of a problem in earlier

'The kind of game that occured yester day is very disappointing in technical details that have not been a problem for us," Curry said. "Those things are technical details that should not be happening this far along in the season. And those cost us the football game. along with a fine performance by a very good Mississippi football team."

Once again, Curry shot down the theory

that Kentucky does not have enough horses to get the job done. He said the Wildcats have enough good players to be competitive, but those players just haven't been consistent for long stretches of time

"People like Randy Holleran and Al Baker are demonstrating that they fully understand exactly what we want," Curry said. "What we want is 60 minutes of the best you've got all the time. And that's what we get from them. There are others but I point those two out because they are senior leaders.

"I think those two (Holleran and Baker) qualify for all the all-star, all-SEC, All-American things that are selected, although we are not into pushing individuals for awards. Those two men stand out. There are others that are trying to reach that level,

some of 'em are young guys.
"What we're trying to build is a team that understands totally individual responsibili-ty for your actions, including preparation. We've talked about this, that we've learned a lot about preparing. But what we haven't done is go out in front of a national TV audience and/or a stadium full of people that are hostile, and for us or all the things a stadium represents, and not be distracted by anything and just press on with the busin at hand, take advantage of our opportunities and win the football game."

Curry paused, then said he expects that to happen in the very near future.

"That will happen soon," Curry said. "It will happen this week (against Mississippi State) if we just keep improving. But we've got to continue to get people to join the responsible group, join the winners on the earn. We're not giving up on anybody.
"Winners think about what they want to

happen. Losers think about what they don't want to happen. It's what goes on in your mind that controls how you play. This is basic coaching 101, but that's really where we are with our team. We have plenty of good players to be competitive. I don't like the notion of people writing or saying that we don't have enough good players. We have enough good players to be competitive. We just need all the good players to be good players all of the time."

·Curry said that as the season has progressed competition for playing time has increased, something that could result in several personnel changes in the coming

weeks.
"Personnel changes in that more people have earned the right to play," Curry said, citing flanker Brian Evans, split end Neal Clark, fullback Terry Samuels, offensive guard Bill Hulette, defensive tackle Brad Shuford, strike Jim Graves and defensive end Eugene McClellan as examples of players who have been winning battles for rever playing time.

more playing time.

The result is that the 'Cats are develop-

ing more depth.
"The reason deep teams play so well is "The reason deep teams piay so well is not necessarily because they play a whole lot of players," Curry said, "it's because the guy doesn't want to go out of the game. If he ever does he might not get back in. At Notre Dame, if you leave the field you may never go back on the field because the guy behind you is just as good as you are. That's what death does, is promote competition. what depth does, is promote competition. And we're getting some of that on our team

•Some people called UK's last two scores against Ole Miss, which cut a 21-point Rebel dvantage to the final six-point margin in the closing seconds, meaningless, "ceremonial' touchdowns.

Curry didn't agree

"Well, if you give up, they're ceremonial touchdowns," the UK coach said. "But if you never give up, every touchdown counts the same as all the rest. If you've conceded the game, there is such a thing as a ceremonial touchdown. But since we never concede then there is no such thing. We're still thinking we're going to win if there's a tick left on the clock and we're down by 14, because that has happened. And it happens every year, but only to the ones that expect to win."

\*Like it or not, Curry said Freddie Maggard, the starter at quarterback before separating his shoulder in the loss to North Carolina, may return to the practice field this week

Maggard was injured in the Sept. 22 ame, and has been held out of practice the

"I don't have any idea whether he should (return to practice) or not," Curry said, "but

I know good and well there's going to be hell to pay if we try to keep him off the field. "He's like a caged wildcat. He's a tough son-of-a-gun. We even had rumors that he was sneaking around throwing around the dorm before he was supposed to. And I wouldn't doubt it a bit. He's tough."

genteel, the ACC.
Suddenly we had an empty house on the block and no one to fill it. Miami didn't want the SEC and the SEC apparently didn't want Miami.

There wasn't anyone left but South Carolina and so the conference took them, pretending the Gamecocks had

been a first choice all along.

Everyone who believes that stand up and then go sit with Mr. Barnum.

Conference expansion has been a turf war from the

Dr. Gerald Turner of Ole Miss, chairman of the ex-

pansion committee, told us that months ago.
"We want to dominate our part of the country," he "We want to dominate our part of the country," he said. "We don't want to have to compete for media attention and TV in the Southeast."

That's why losing Florida State hurt so badly. The ACC was once a string of schools up and down the East Coast. Now it has Georgia Tech in Atlanta and Florida State in Tallahassee. The SEC has to share newspaper space and television time in our area's biggest city and in our league's most populated state.

It smarts.

The conference took in Arkansas to ease the way for Texas and Texas A&M even though those two rejected the offer. The SEC at least got the big name school in Arkansas, even if they didn't get any major population centers. The Hogs' reputation in football and basketball is the highest and their record of compliance with NCAA rules in spotless. Arkansas shares borders with

Mississippi, Tennessee and Louisiana and the natural rivalries are obvious.

What did the SEC get when they added South

Carolina?

They got a beautiful state that geographically fits. It borders on Tennessee and Georgia. Its stadium is lovely and its fans enthusiastic. I've broadcast several games

there and enjoyed every one of them.

What the SEC did not get was something they said at the front end the league wanted—a team attractive to TV in order to enhance the conference image and television package. You don't go big time by stealing a Metro Con-

ference team.

Frankly put, the Gamecocks are not a TV draw. Not like Texas would have been. Or Texas A&M. Or Florida State. Or Miami. As far as TV is concerned, you might as well have added Tulane or Memphis State.

The only thing South Carolina does for the SEC is make it number 12 so the league can be split into divisions and have a big money championship playoff.

If the other schools mentioned had opted for the SEC, South Carolina would still be in the Metro trying hard to talk the ACC into taking them back.

talk the ACC into taking them back.

Carolina is not a very good football team by SEC standards. It wasn't until 1979 they won more than seven games. Its best season was 1984 when they went 10-2. It was just last Saturday, at this writing, that Georgia Tech beat them. They are also a school that has been in constant trouble with the NCAA. Drugs, steroids, and a coach's embarrassing personal life have generated more

ink than their accomplishments.

What the SEC did, in fact was almost forced to do, was take in another school seemingly perennially destin-ed for the league's second division as Arkansas seems

destined for the top of the pile.

However, even freshmen are graded periodically, so here goes:

## QUARTERBACK

"T." Incomplete due to a shoulder injury that sidelined Freddie Maggard for last week's Ole Miss game at Oxford. The junior from Cumberland was starting to get the grasp of the new offense when a shoulder went out at Chapel Hill; however, the interceptions he threw against Rutgers in the Meadowlands were real downers for the team.

Untested Brad Smith has been in some extremely tough situations and was not impressive. However, he did lead the Wildcats to a nice game-tying drive against North Carolina. For the past two years, Smith has shown promise and he had his turn as a starter against the Rebels. Meanwhile, Ryan Hockman remains in the wines.

### RUNNING BACKS

"B". Although there are no true home run hitters out of the backfield, the performances of Al Baker, Craig Walker, Terry Samuels and Mike Thomas, who missed the first three games with an injury, are creditable, if not spectacular.

Because of the nature of this position, it's hard to get a realistic picture simply from the standpoint that most backs are only as good as their offensive line.

The return of Thomas to full strength would be a shot in the arm for the offense because the New Jersey native is a tough runner who can pick up third-down yardage. It's also a reflection of his character that he has rehabed an injured knee to the point where he's back in the lineup.

The defection of Eric Carter, who looked impressive during the spring, was a setback. They say speed kills and there's just not enough of it here.

### OFFENSIVE LINE

A disappointing "C2". Before the season started the consensus was that this experienced line would be a team strength. However, the ground game has sputtered and the unit has given up too many costly sacks.

the unit has given up too many costly sacks.

To the line's credit it's still adjusting to the new offensive system and has been placed in bad situations for pass protection when UK has fallen behind. The guess here is that improvement should come with each game. The loss of veteran Mike Nord also has hurt.

### RECEIVERS

A disappointing "D". Dropped passes, just like last season, have definitely hurt the offense. UK lacks a deep burner who can cause havoe in opposing secondaries; in addition, most defenses are not concerned about getting beat deep. John Bolden is a talented receiver. Phil Logan, Steve Phillips, Neal Clark and Kurt Johnson are capable, but must give better performances to get a passing grade.

It's also noteworthy that UK quarterbacks and receivers have not communicated well on some long third-down situations that have cropped up this season. Some of the passes thrown weren't close to picking up first-down yardage.



## That describes UK offensive tackle Greg Lahr—on the gridiron and off

Greg Lahr was all business as he entered the E.J. Nutter training facility at the University of Kentucky.

But then businesss is what he majors in when he's not trying to root some monstrous 290-pound defensive tackle out of his hole. At 6-5 and 273 pounds, it's root the hog out

or die trying for this highly intense competitor.
Add smart after the word intense. Greg Lahr is not your typical college ath-

Last year he compiled a 3.76 grade-point average in business to earn second team GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America honors. Which is intimidation of a different sort than

he learns on the gridiron Lahr smiled, sort of. He was in a good mood. After all, it was Wednesday and almost

time to put his game face on.
"I'm starting to feel real good," Lahr said.
"It's close to Saturday. And close to a date

with Ole Miss.' Graduate assistant Harold Etheridge toss-

ed a sheaf of papers in Lahr's lap and left.
The papers had a lot of Xs and Os on them.

It looked...well, difficult.
"It's just a test of all the defenses we think Ole Miss is going to run," Lahr explained.
"We have to go and fill it out tonight and hand
it back in. We're questioned on some things."
Lahr certainly would be a fellow to score

high on these too. As offensive line coach Rick Rhoades com-mented earlier this year in a quick synopsis of his brainy lineman: "Greg Lahr is probably

of his brainy lineman: "Greg Lahr is probably smarter than the coaches." And, while Rhoades may or may not have been kidding, he could be right. But Lahr doesn't particularly care to hear it. All kiddin', aside, he says: "You can't say

that.

But doesn't it take a certain intelligence to

play this game?
"Well, you have to be fairly intelligent to figure out all the blocking schemes and where you are going," Lahr admitted. "It does take a bit of insight."

Technique is the hardest thing to learn, says the man who has spent a good part of his life in the trenches

Lahr said the catchword is precise

"You get a little off and you find you don't get where you are supposed to be quick enough," Lahr said. "It puts you at a disadvantage in making a block."

Lahr, a junior, has heard the whispers...the endoes around the classroom. They are routine now

"Sometimes you get that feeling when you walk into a class for the first time," he said.

"From students and teachers included. They don't feel like you are an adequate student."

But it didn't take Lahr long to convince them. He dotted his Is and crossed his Ts and didn't seal. "Con with A. And he dear," here didn't spell 'Cat with a K. And he doesn't beat on his chest Tarzan-style as he enters his classrooms

"Some of my teachers, after a couple of weeks or the first test would say: 'You really changed what I had felt my feelings were about athletes in class, "Lahr said.

Lahr paused in thought.

"I don't know if this was from previous experience or from a stereotype," he continued. "I assume it was from a stereotype."

Lahr said he began applying himself to the books in his last two years at Pickerington (Ohio) High School. He said he realized he had better push academics into high gear because he had no idea what college would

Last year's Academic All-America accolade was the result of the big push.

"It made me feel good being named to the team," Lahr said. this year I kind of want to be recognized on the football field instead of everybody saying: 'Oh,there's Lahr, he's one of those smart guys who happens play football. want to be recog-nized more as a

football player."
That would be hard not to do. Lahr has been something special since he was the only true freshman to play for the Wildcats in 1988.

Lahr, who had shirted along with was suddenly forced into action when Mike Pfeifer and Tom Crum rine were injured was

designated backup the last six games

Lahr was literally, and figuratively, thrown into the Tigers' den his first game. It was at Baton Rouge, in "Death Valley," "Death Valley," home of the mighty Bayou Bengals of LSU

'They have a wild gang down there," Lahr noted. Lahr said he

played against a guy named Dunbar. As in first-team all-SEC defensive tackle Karl Dunbar. "All I remember was that he was big and fast," Lahr

said. "I didn't set the world afire."

That came later, Gator.

Lahr got a chance to show the right stuff against some pro-sized Florida Gators. He graded a career-high 92 percent against All-American Trace Armstrong (now with the NFL Chicago Bears) as the 'Cats lost a tough 24-19

"I think their entire defensive line went to the pros," Lahr said.

ahr was later named to the UKAA Honor Roll with a perfect 4.0 GPA in his initial semester at UK. As far as his football average, he graded out at 78.6. Not bad,

He still retains mixed emotions about not being redshirted.

"It was nice to play and be there for the big win over Georgia," Lahr said. "Also, a lot of those redshirt years they put you on the scout team and maybe instead of learning techniques you lose them...you get bad habits. But then you also get extra coaching. It all depends. I can't say which one was better or

Actually it was a moot question. He had

no choice. UK couldn't play with two offensive tackles the rest of the year. He had to play for the good of the team.

"It was nice in a way, having the other freshmen players look up to you and asking what it was like and stuff," Lahr recalled.
"It was a big deal the first few trips. The

hotels and everything. Now it's like a business trip. You go there and it's a good trip if you win. And a bad one if you lose.'

Lahr said redshirting also had another downside, too

"I'm going to graduate before them, my class," Lahr said. "For our senior year I won't be around. It has its pluses and minuses."

Last year Lahr played in all II UK games, retrieve the last year lahr played in all all UK games,

starting the last nine at left offensive tackle after Mike Nord hurt his knee.

In fact, it was in his first start—against Alabama—he enjoyed his finest 21/2 hours. But his grade was only 76 percent. He graded above 80 in four games, including 85 percent against the University of Cincinnati and 83 percent against Vandy.
"I thought I played better than that," Lahr

said of his debut against 'Bama.

Lahr said grades were handed down on the

basis of a "plus" for a block and a "minus" for not making one. But if you make the right

decision and no one is there you get a "U." Pluses and minuses are added up for a percentage.

"Well, that was a different policy they had last year," Lahr noted. "I don't want to talk about last year. But it was different."





presses 375 pounds, cleans 330 and squats 515. Speed is adequate. But how about those not-so-quick feet he has?

'Yes, I've tried to work on that," Lahr said. "I wrestle and I felt that would help my quickness. Some guys on the team said I would have had quicker feet by playing basketball. I don't know. There's no way of

Lahr has lost weight-from 288 to 273 since last summer. He feels quicker, if not lighter. Plus he feels working on his feet in practice sessions has helped.

"A lot of people say you are either born with quick feet or not," Lahr said. "That's true to an extent. You can always develop what you have.'

If an idle mind is a devil's workshop, as the saying goes, what does a fine mind like Lahr's do to help him on the field of battle?

"When you hear the play being called you automatically think of what it is in your mind," Lahr said.

"You talk to the lineman next to you so you both know what each other is doing. Once you get on the line you look at the defense. It will tell you who to block."

However, it is at this point that an offensive lineman's mind has to go blank. It must

sive lineman's mind has to go blank. It must lose its power. Or else.

"When you get down in your stance all you can worry about is coming off the ball," Lahr said. "If you think coming off the ball, that is when you are going to get knocked down. Or miss your block. You have to take a path when you come off the ball to hit people. You can't think too much or you'll get hurned." can't think too much or you'll get burned."

Last year Lahr was third among UK offen-

sive lineman with 14 Cat Paw awards for big plays. This year he is also third. But there is one difference.

Last year points were awarded for knockdowns and "pancake" blocks (where the offensive lineman flattens the defensive man on his back).

about that.

This year no one keeps track.

"We want to start establishing those," Lahr said. "But we are at the stage now where we just want to worry about improving our per-formance."

Lahr feels the team has been showing signs of finally getting there. The week layoff prior to the Ole Miss game helped.

But Lahr, a nononsense type, doesn't feel you can use the old crutch of learning a new system any more. He tossed his crutch away and began walking straight several weeks ago.
"You can only

say that after one or two games," Lahr said. "Then you can't say it any more because we have been doing this since spring practice. We should be

Lahr says he has no preference for either pass blocking or run blocking. Last spring

he was more consistent blocking for the run than blocking for the pass. But he says he doesn't worry about it.

Like his counterpart with the Cincinnati Bengals, perennial All-Pro Anthony Munoz, who anyone with a lick of sense will tell you

> is unquestionably the best offensive tackle the NFL has ever seen, Lahr gets paid off in "Ws." As in wins. "I like Munoz,"

Lahr said. "I like what he stands for. He's quiet, he's intelligent and he just goes about his job."

Strange but Lahr must have been looking through the same mirror.

When it comes to dicing up their defensive foes, Lahr and his offen-sive line mates sharpen their wea-pons by going to the movies.

Three times a

week they meet in a dormitory room to study the flicks. Some are "monstmovies. Some of the SEC's defensive kingpins are

huge. tendencies...to det ermine what kind of pass-rushers the opposi-tion has," he said. "I think watching films is more important for the defense than the offense. We have to do something whether we think the guy is going to do something or

Lahr said offensive linemen can't think about doing this or that on the field. Thinking, he says, is out.
"You have to set up the same way," Lahr

said, "like on a pass-blocking assignment. You set up to take away the worst thing he could do—like the inside move—whether you think he's going to go inside or not. You can't

Lahr, born in Columbus, Ohio, moved to nearby Pickerington at an early age. He began his sports career playing baseball and wrestling. Wrestling, to this day, still remains one of his loves.

of his loves.
"I had to quit playing football after the third grade because they had weight limits," Lahr recalls. "I was 115 pounds. The next year I was too heavy at 120 so I played soccer until I got into junior high."

Lahr was a three-year starter as an offen-sive guard and defensive tackle and an allstate selection his senior year. As for wrestling, he was 81-19 in four years as a heavy-weight and 34-2 his senior year. Half of his

wins were pins.

"A pin is like a good block because it is a one-on-one thing," Lahr said. "It gives you a good feeling. The same for a block where you knock a guy on his back.
"But there's one big difference. The match

is over when you pin a guy. But when you're blocking out there you have to go 79 more

Lahr, what else, takes a...well, business-like approach to his future. Right now he's taking some education courses along with the economics, accounting and management

stuff.
"Td like to be a coach...or well, business is interesting," he said. "Tll probably go to law school. I'd like to work with people."
Right now, though, his business is to work over people of the opposing defense. And he's doing it very well.

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
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



Kenny Rollins replaced Jack Tingle as UK captain due to Rupp's dissatisfaction with Tingle's leadership after the Wildcats (II-0) were upset by Oklahoma A&M 37-31 in the 1946 Sugar Bowl game. The players re-elected Rollins the following "Fabulous Five" year (1947-48), although Beard was All-America and a favorite of the media, the fans and Rupp.

My remembrances of the early days of the fried chicken ventures was that Colonel Sanders was there firstest with the mostest in herbs and spices, and the bestest in the promotions end with John Y. Jr. Minnie Pearl, the "Howdee" gal of Grand Ole Opry fame, and Press Maravich, the LSU basketball coach and father of "Pistol Pete," lent their names to similar ventures.

As you may recall, Maravich's outfit was called Maryland Fried Chicken, which should have been a success considering all the chickens that Purdue and Holly Farms produce in that state.

However, the failed friers that should be remembered most in this area came from the deep fat of Daniel Boone Fried Chicken, whose stockholders included many

investors (not this one) involved in Wildcat athletics. In its infancy, the firm purchased a full-page, four-color advertisement in the UK football program.

Pictured was a smiling John Ray, UK's football coach at the time, eating from a bucket of Daniel Boone Fried Chicken. That didn't sit too well with K-Man John Y. Jr. and some other UK types who were involved with the colonel and his franchises.

Throughout the years, Wildcat athletic types have been

involved in Kentucky Fried, with some making a ton of money while others wiped their tears with Daniel Boone stock certificates

process that started two years ago," Pappas said. "The family is really special and has handled all of this very well because it could have been a real ordeal."

"It's sad in a way that he just can't be a normal 17-year-old kid. But he can't be a regular teenager. The father, though, has been impressed with the recruiting process. He's seen no improper offers of money or gifts.

"We don't have any real horror stories," the father said. "We want everything above board and that's the way it has been. The schools would be ridiculous to of-fer anything. If they did, the kid would just want more

when he got to school. That's how trouble starts."
All Tommy Kleinschmidt wants is a chance to play something Pitino has assured him he'll get at Kentucky his freshman year because of his shooting ability.

"Kentucky definitely enhanced its chances with the me visit," Tom Kleinschmidt said. "Coach Pitino admitted UK had some problems and was not over them all yet. But he gave Tommy a better look at the program.

"Tommy is very dedicated and doesn't care what he has to do as long as his team wins. He just wants a chance to play and coach Pitino told him he was a priority for Kentucky and that he wanted him now."

CHRIS WEBBER, considered the nation's top basketball player by many recruiting analysts, still has not decided whether or not he will make an official visit to the University of Kentucky.

"Right now he's just sorting out what all the coaches said on their home visits," Kurt Keener, Webber's coach at Detroit Country Day, said. "He's not made a decision about where he'll visit, but I would say there is a good

The 6-foot-9 Webber, who averaged 24 points and 13 rebounds a game last year, has resisted UK's efforts to

visit during the current weekend, when he could watch Midnight Madness

"Chris is a very religious kid and Sunday is a church day for him and his family," Keener said. "Plus, we are a college prep school and there is a lot of pressure to be in school. He really doesn't want to miss a day of class.

Webber wouldn't mind having fewer questions, though, about his future

"There are a lot of rumors going around about who is out front to get Chris," Keener said. "He's getting a little tired of everybody asking him what he's going to do. "Just recently he took a date out to a movie. The guy sitting behind him recognized him, tapped him on the shoulder and asked where he was going to school as Chris tried to watch the movie."

"Overall he has handled it all well. He has had a lot of media exposure since his eighth-grade year, but it is

of media exposure since his eighth-grade year, but it is all wearing on him a little."

That's what happens when you are 6-9, can shoot from three-point range, have met all NCAA academic requirements and have great athletic skills.

"His skills are just unbelievable," Keener said. "He's been primarily a low post player for us but he has tremendous agility for a kid his size.

# Back Thru The Wildcat Years

## One Year Ago

Ken Willlis kicked four field goals, tying a school record set by his predecessor, Joey Worley, as Kentucky defeated Rutgers 33-26 at Commonwealth Stadium. Willis also added a trio of extra points to bring his scoring total on the night to 15 points, an all-time high for a Wildcat kicker. Worley had the previous record, scoring 14 points in a game three times

Freddie Maggard sparked UK's offense with 173 yards passing (14 of 22, no interceptions), including a 20-yard scoring toss to

tailback Al Baker. Fullback Andy Murray carried 16 times for 80 yards, including a one yard TD. Tailback Alfred Rawls gave UK its final score on a 69-yard run in the fourth
