David Miller, associate dean for the College of Arts and Sciences, said a solid capital

campaign is key to reaching top 20 status.

"Unless the capital campaign is a big success, our chances of elevating the University's status are going to be severely limited." Miller said. "It costs a lot of money to play in the big leagues."

But board member Steven Reed, assistant U.S. attorney in Louisville, said the new chairperson will still work with President Wethington to meet the goals Wethington wants to achieve his last two years.

"The board must not assume that when it embarks on a search for a new president, President Wethington's remaining term in office is somehow lessened." Reed said.

TAIPEI. Taiwan — The earthquake that hit Taiwan before dawn Tuesday had a preliminary magnitude of 76 and was centered 90 miles south-southwest of Taipei, according to the U.S. National Earthquake Information Center. A government report said at least 60 people were killed and hundreds more injured. The quake wrecked the 78-room Sungshan Hotel in Taipei, collapsing the bottom three stories and setting the badly damaged top listing to one side. Rescuers said 131 persons were still trapped inside. though no deaths had been reported.

Hurricane Gert threatens Bermuda

HAMILTON, Bermuda — Police warned peo HAMILTON, Bermuda — Police warned peo-ple in low-lying areas to evacuate their homes yesterday and islanders rushed to stock up on-emergency supplies against Hurricane Gert, the biggest storm to threaten Bermuda in a decade. Hundreds of tourists fled the island and an al-ready struggling tourist industry began counting the cost. By late yesterday, Gert was 280 miles south-southeast of Bermuda and moving to the north-northwest at about 9 mph. Top sustained winds blew at 120 mph.

Forbes wants Ten Commandments up

WEST DES MOINES, Iowa — Publisher Steve Forbes said yesterday that the Ten Commandments should be posted in schools because they are "the foundation of our civilization." Forbes compared posting the commandments to the role played by religion in Muslim countries where religion permeates every phase of society. "If you went to, say, a country that has the Muslim religion and you go to a school you might expect to see the Koran there, you wouldn't be surprised," Forbes said. "It's part of their culture. It's the same thing here."

NATO, KLA agree on demilitarization

PRISTINA, Yugoslavia — Kosovo Liberation Army leaders and the NATO-led peace-keeping force signed an agreement late Meday on the demilitarization of the former rebel army and its transformation into a civilian corps, the KFOR allied force said in a statement. It announced: "The new civilian organization will have the full title of Kosovo Protection Corps. It will work under the direction of the special representatives of the (U.N.) secretary general" and operate under the supervision of the commander of KFOR.



We had extra space this year and the popularity of Ale-8 and the student demand for it justified having a whole cooler of it," said Jane Irwe, the supervisor of the Blazer Express grocery in Blazer Hall. "We began carrying Ale-8 a couple of years ago because students kept asking for it." King-Pow Teo, a civil engineering raduate student who is the student supervisor of Blazer Express, said that about 70 percent of the people who purchase drinks at the store buy Ale-8 One. "It sells real well and students buy it by the dozen." Teo added. Kim Robinson, the operations manager of the UK Bookstore, said that the drink sold really well there as well.

Robinson estimated that 30 percent of the store's beverage-buying customers bought Ale-8 One "It's a local drink, and a lot of the students are local and have grown up liking the drink." Robinson said. Only a small amount is in stock at the Corner Store in Common's Market on South Campus.

"We only carry a small amount of Ale-8 One because we don't have a lot of space and because of supply and demand," said Dewitt King, general mana ager of Common's Market. "We almost never sell more than 10 cases in two weeks time and that's not a whole lot. Evidently it's just more popular on North campus.



Legalizing more forms of gambling could hurt Kentucky

Governor Paul Patton has recently hired consultants to look at the potential effect of legalizing more forms of gambling in Kentucky. We hope these consultants are listening when we say that this is definitely a step in the wrong direction for the commonwealth.

Back in May, the governor, who has yet to endorse the idea, threw out the notion of building 12 to 14 land-based casinos throughout Kentucky.

"My objective is not to increase gambling." Patton said. "It's to recover, theoretically, the money that Kentuckians are spending? in surrounding states that have casinos, a figure he estimates at \$200 million a year.

Even though the intention might be to keep entertainment money within our borders, we are afraid that the effect may actually hinder, instead of help, in the long run.

Patton said that he wants to use gambling tax dollars to support horse racing or to fund specific programs, such as preserving natural areas.

For several years now, state governments have seen casinos and other forms of legalized gambling as the cash cow that will help alleviate financial woes. It's true that in the beginning, the influx of money that gambling brought helped, but there has to be a saturation point in the gambling industry. As more states hop on the gambling bandwagon as a revenue source, that day is probably just around the corner for many areas, including Kentucky. Think about it this way, a pie represents the amount of gambling dollars that will be spent. Each gambling place that opens up takes a chunk out of that pie. After while, if to many casinos, video lottery terminals, and other gambling outlets open up, there will only be crumbs left to fight over.

The blame for the film's faults lies squarely on the shoulders of director Sam Raimi. Cult-favorite Raimi (the Full Dead trilogy) just doesn't seem to know how to handle this kind of romantic film. He overemphasizes the sentiment and gives the climactic game's final moment an operatic, overly grandiose treatment full of unnecessary slow motion.

For Love of the Game doesn't capture the intricacies and rhythms of everyday baseball life as well as Bull Durham or the impact of the game on America as well as Field of Dreams. However, the film does capture the almost religious reverence and dedication of athletes who truly play just for the love of the game.
