"Are there any rooms available for next weekend?" asks the voice on the

Coal might be Kentucky see in the hole, but nothing, with the possible exception of Keeneland, seems to bring more people into Lexington than UK football games. And more people mean more money.

Ed Sturgeon, research manager for the Lexington Chamber of Commerce, said for each home game played at Commonwealth Stadium, visitors (people not from Fayette County) spend about \$740,000 in Lexington Excluding game tickets, people spend most of their money on rood and lodging, Lodging tallied \$53,200 of the average while the food bill totaled \$391,300.





FRANKFORT— The time of decision is nearing for former Republican Gov. Jouic Num, who says he will disclose about mid-December whether he will become a gubernatorial candidate next year. From all indications at the moment, the signs are go. Earlier this year. Nums friends and supporters financed surveys and polis to assess his standing with the electorate.

UK students who give blood receive full coverage by the blood center. Donation of one pint will guarantee the blood needs (with no limit on amount of blood needs) of the donor and spouse, parents and dependent siblings.

The Blood Center is working to meet the essential daily supply, about 125 to 135 pints per day. When this is not met people often are on a waiting list to receive blood. The shortage can reach the point of blood going only to emergency cases, and sometimes not all of them can be helped.

The UK hospital is the biggest user in the community, serving 40 county areas plus UK students. If 20 percent of the UK students donate blood to the center, there will be enough blood to over all UK students.

That situation has prompted even more pressure on Nunn, who said in an interview that "there is a lot of encouragement. I'm waiting to see how widespread it is."

But Nunn, who was governor from 1967 to 1971, seems at first glance to be vulnerable on an issue that has come to the forefront of both national and state politics: the backlash gainst taxes.

It was under his administration that the Legislature pushed through a 2-cent sales tax increase that has made the state levy 5 cents and this after the customary promise of all gubernatorial candidates not to do so.
