#### GREAT GOD GOVERNMENT

Whether the economic, social, and political problems have become so complex and diverse that only the agency of government can find the proper solutions, we do not know. We do know that when we leave these ivy covered temple of theory, we will face a world of paradoxes.

These paradoxes abound in our national and international life. Looking through the kaleido scope of national and world affairs, we find that individuals and groups are still adhering to the principle of "survival of the fittest and the rest be dammed.

Industrialists pay starvation wages and expect their workers to buy back their goods at high prices. Bread lines form in New York and hogs are slaughtered in Iowa. Attorneys are paid millions to free their clients from relations ap-plied by duly elected authorities. Nations attempt to produce goods which they cannot eco-nomically do and are prevented from buying, by abnormal conditions, the things they require of a foreign market.

Law and government attempts to bring order out of this chaos. But governmental reforms is out of this chaos. But governmental reforms is contradictory, hodge podge, and the product of special interests pulling in opposite directions. Our future is mortgaged by politicians who are giving us no real value in return. Government has been reduced to a carcass exposed to the vultures. While one group takes what it wants to the detriment of the others, the others seek to writerate or mullify the work of the former genus. mitigate or nullify the work of the former group

If government must perform everything from the most menial of tasks to those formerly ascribed to Deity – then we might have a right to expect them to be done right. If it has become necessary for government to regulate our com-plex system in order to preserve freedom and justice — we have a right to demand that it be done by men of foresight and intelligence. We must of course, do our part.

#### HOUSEMOTHERS

An integral part of every smooth-functioning fraternity and sorority is the house mother. We find that housemothers are not required at many of the large universities throughout the country, and such was the case at the University of Kentucky until several years ago.

The University officials decided that each social organization which maintained a house,
should provide itself with a housemother, although many of them already were using the
plan. In the case of the fraternities, the house
manager had planned the meals, bought the
food and managed the house as a whole. However, a decided change for the better was noted
when the management we alread is the held. when the management was placed in the hands of an able supervisor who was acquainted with the work as a result of many years' experience. Now the housemother has grown to be an in-

Now the housemother has grown to be an in-dspensable part of the university, and recogni-tion should be given her. The Kentuckian will feature a page in the book this year, composed entirely of the housemothers on the campus. Another way in which appreciation of the serv-ices rendered by the housemothers could be shown, is the issuing of tickets to all athletic contests. These passes could be presented with the compliments of the University and the Ath-letic department, or could be purchased by the letic department, or could be purchased by the organizations themselves and given to the house-

It seems that the University should not object It seems that the University should not object to this plan of complimentary passes, but in the event they should, it would indeed be an affort to the housemothers and the organizations which they represent. The fraternity and sorority play a most important role in the life of the University, and there is no doubt concerning the role the housemother plays in the life of the organization.

Faculty members are given the privilege of buying season tickets to all athletic contests for a nominal sum, and therefore it seems only just that such a courtesy should be extended to the housemothers. The organizations will be glad to show their appreciation by purchasing such a ticket!

#### PETTY THIEVERY

"Honesty is the best policy." This adage has come down through the ages and despite the efforts of various eras replete with graft and cor-ruption it still exists as a respected saying and stands as a principle by which those who would succeed still pattern their lives.

However, it would appear that various mem-bers of the student body are either not desirous of success, have no respect for this ancient ad-vice or have not come in contact with its teachings. I refer to the widespread petty thievery which is taking place in various parts of the Uni-versity at the present time. Probably such an extensive amount of vandalism has not occurred many years past, certainly it was not so generally known if such did take place. Books are stolen, hats, coats, money of various denomina-tions; nothing seems to escape the eye of these petty thieves.

Most of the thievery has taken place in three general localities, and although the authorities in charge at those various places have attempted to stop it by various means, their efforts have met with little success. Those places where the most prevalent are the gymstealing has been most prevalent are the gymnasium locker rooms, the armory and the various dormitories. Only in one case, and there only by the imposition of the most rigorous discipline, has the thievery been stopped. Military students are required to stand inspection at the end of their class period and are not dismissed until the instructor has made sure that nothing is missing from the possession of any student. The

missing from the possession of any student. The necessity for the adoption of such a drastic measure is indeed deplorable.

To describe as disgusting, the general situation which exists, is to put it altogether too mildly. The fact that college students or even people of college age have no more respect for the possession of others than has been demonstrated is little short of revolting. It certainly forecasts a foomy picture of future vector risk

strated is little short of revolting. It certainly forecasts a gloomy picture of future society, picturing an age in which the policing of everything would be absolutely necessary. In presenting our criticism of the situation which exists The Kernel is attempting to accomplish a twofold purpose. Not only would we deplore existing conditions and prick the conscience, if possible, of those who are guilty, but we would constrain those honest students, and they are certainly in the prajority to be seen as the conscience. and they are certainly in the majority, to be ex ceedingly careful that they do not present op-portunities for those who cannot resist tempta-tion. In this particular, the honest students are partly to blame. They should take better care of their possessions in order that those who are of weak moral fibre may not have to attempt to resist that temptation which they have showr themselves altogether incapable of resisting.


