February 22nd, 1915.—The magnificent portrait of George Washington was unveiled in the Hall of Fame before a large audience, gathered there to see and pay tribute to this portrait restored by the famous artist, Prof. Pasquale Farina, of the Art Gallery of Philadelphia. It was originally painted from Stuart's Landsdown portrait of Washington, in Philadelphia, by Oliver Frazer, of Lexington, Ky., in 1834. It was bought by the State at that time, and until the Old Capitol was abandoned by the State as a Capitol, hung above and behind the Speaker's chair of the House of Representatives. There it was left, broken and marred, and ruined by dust, time and neglect, as were the portraits of Boone, a fancy sketch, General LaFayette's portrait, Governor Isaac Shelby, President

William Henry Harrison, and the magnificent portrait of Henry Clay. The State Historical Society, through the kindness of George A. Lewis, was able to secure these treasureful works of art from the State Board of Control. The society had the portraits cleaned, regilded and put in the present order, in the Hall of Fame; except Washington's, which was sent to Philadelphia to be restored. It is now one of the classics in painting and is regarded as one of, if not the most splendid portraits of Washington in America.
