The Committee, meeting under the chairmanship of Owen D. Young, of the General Electric Co., took no action at its first session but is expected to make its recommendations public some time before Feb. 1, when the plan is scheduled to go into operation on a "broad, demo-ratic basis."

War Manpower Chief Paul V. McNutt, who acts with the advice of the Secretaries of War and Navy, said in announcing the composition of the committee.

"The new committee now meeting will provide invaluable connsel not only in developing these rules and regulations but also in determining policies to insure adequately trained specialists for war industries and essential civilian activities. Their assistance in working out procedures and regulations whereby institutions of higher education will be able to provide a flow of civilian specialists will be an all-imporfant part of the work of this committee."




