OCLC ILL - 1 MILLIONTH MARK

According to Wilson Library Bulletin (February, 1981, p. 406),

"Late last year libraries subscribing to OCLC services reached the first million mark in online interlibrary loans when the Belk Library at Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina entered data to borrow a journal from the University of Kentucky. OCLC's interlibrary loan subsystem began operation in April 1979, and it took the 2,300 libraries in the computerized network just twenty months to surpass one million interlibrary loans using the utility's library-to-library communication system. Belk Library, a member of SOLINET, does more than 100 interlibrary loan transactions a month on OCLC."
