I am submitting herewith the Financial Report of the University of Kentucky for the ten months ended April 30, 1961. This report contains a balance sheet and related financial statements which present a complete financial picture of the period for all funds of the University.

The Current General Fund budgetary operations for the period reflect income realized for educational and general purposes in the amount of \$17,386,389.46 or 98.5% of the budget estimate of \$17,650,880.09. The expenditures, including encumbrances outstanding amount to \$14,021,803.67. This represents 81.4% of the total Current General Fund Appropriations of \$17,213,511.99.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the report was authorized received and put to record.

D. Sale of \$300,000 of University of Kentucky Bonds Dated April 1, 1960, Approved.

The Presiding Officer then reminded the members of the Board that, at the regular meeting held on December 13, 1960, a Resolution had been adopted, authorizing the issuance of \$300,000 principal amount of "University of Kentucky Housing Bonds of 1960", to provide the cost (not otherwise provided) of two new buildings for housing approximately 96 male students (including dining and other appurtenant facilities) currently under construction upon the campus of the University, and authorizing the execution of a Trust Indenture for the security thereof. Thereafter, at a regular meeting of the Board on April 4, 1961, it was resolved and agreed that bids for the purchasing of said bonds, or for the purchasing of one or more of the blocks thereof as provided in the University's Loan Agreement with Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government, be opened and considered upon the occasion of this meeting. He exhibited to the Board a signed copy of a short form of "Notice of Sale of Bonds," together with affidavits from employees of The Bond Buyer, New York City, and The Courier-Journal, Louisville, Kentucky, showing publication thereof in said respective newspapers on May 17, 1961. He also exhibited a longer form of "Official Statement of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky", together with appropriate financial information concerning the University, all of which he reported had been furnished in mimeographed form to all interested parties upon request.

On motion of Board Member J. Stephen Watkins, seconded by Board Member Ralph J. Angelucci, and unanimously adopted, it was ordered that these instruments be preserved by the Secretary as permanent records of the University and of the Board of Trustees relating to the proper public solicitation of purchase bids, but without reproducing the same as parts of the minutes of the meeting.

The Presiding Officer then announced that the time established for the opening and consideration of bids for the purchasing of said bonds had arrived and that the bidding was closed. The Secretary then reported that the only bid received had been a bid of Housing & Home Finance Agency of the United States Government.

It was noted that in conformity with the University's Loan Agreement this bid offered to purchase the entire bond issue, or such lesser amount of the bonds as might be awarded to it if a better bid or bids should be received in conformity with the prescribed terms and conditions, such bid being at a price of par or face value plus accrued interest, upon condition that all bonds awarded to said Housing & Home Finance Agency be caused to bear interest at the rate of three and one-eighth per cent (3-1/8%) per annum.

The Presiding Officer then inquired whether it might be possible that other bidders were outside the meeting room waiting for an opportunity to be heard, but upon investigation by the Secretary it was determined that this was not the case.

Thereupon Board Member J. Stephen Watkins introduced and moved immediate adoption of a Resolution, as follows:

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNI-VERSITY OF KENTUCKY ACCEPTING THE BEST AND ONLY BID RECEIVED FOR THE PURCHASING OF \$300,000.00 "UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY HOUSING BONDS OF 1960," AS AUTHORIZED BY A RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES ON DECEMBER 13, 1960, AND ESTABLISHING THE INTEREST COUPON RATE MADE APPLICABLE TO SAID BONDS.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY HEREBY RESOLVES, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. It is hereby determined and declared that the best and only bid received prior to 11:00 A.M., Eastern Standard Time, on May 31, 1961, for the purchasing of all or any part of the \$300,000.00 "University of Kentucky Housing bonds of 1960", as authorized by a Resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees on December 13, 1960, was and is the bid of the Housing & Home Finance Agency of the United States Government, offering to purchase the entire Bond issue at par or face value, plus accrued interest to delivery, upon condition that the same be caused to bear interest from their date until paid at a single uniform interest rate of three and one-eighth per cent (3-1/8%) per annum. Said bid is found to be in conformity with the University's Loan Agreement with said Housing and Home Finance Agency, and is hereby accepted in the name and on behalf of the University of Kentucky. Said bid, together with this resolution of acceptance, shall constitute a firm contract for the purchasing and selling of said entire Bond issue.

Section 2. Said Bonds shall bear interest from their date until paid at a single uniform interest rate of three and one-eighth per cent (3-1/8%) per annum, and the printer may be instructed to proceed accordingly.

Section 3. Said Housing and Home Finance Agency, by a letter dated December 2, 1960, signed by its Regional Administrator and addressed to the Vice President of the University for Business Administration, having requested the University to issue these Bonds in denominations of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) each with semiannual interest coupons attached, in the event the Government became the purchaser thereof, the Vice-President for Business Administration, or the Municipal Bond Attorneys employed to prepare and approve the Bonds, may give proper instructions to the printer without further action on the part of this Board.

Section 4. This Resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption.

The motion to adopt the Resolution was seconded by Board Member Ralph J. Angelucci, and said motion having been duly considered, the Presiding Officer put the question of the adoption of said Resolution, and the following voted:

Voting "Aye": Harper Gatton, Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci, Dr. H.B. Murray, Dr. R. W. Bushart, W.F. Foster, Dr. Paul B. Hall, Floyd H. Wright, J. Stephen Watkins.

Voting "Nay": None.

Whereupon the Presiding Officer declared the said motion duly carried and said Resolution adopted.

E. Contract between the University of Kentucky and the State Board of Education Approved.

Mr. Peterson presented a contract between the University of Kentucky and the State Board of Education, Bureau of Vocational Rehabilitation, for a staff training program for vocational rehabilitation personnel. He stated that, through a misunderstanding, the contract was not approved and submitted to the Board prior to the performance of the staff training program and that he now recommended that the contract be approved nunc pro tunc.

The Board members, understanding the nature of the contract, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, approved the Agreement-Contract nunc pro tunc.

F. Contract for Joint Ownership of H. P. Real Silver 15th Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted a contract for the developing, promoting, testing and breeding of H. P. Real Silver 15th, registration No. 11239174 with the Salmon Corporation d/b/a Mereworth Farm, Fayette County, Ky., C.B. Billington, Paducah, Ky., and Brownell Combs, Fayette County, Ky. The contract provides for the University jointly purchasing 1/4 interest in the registered Hereford bull referred to for the sum of \$1,700.00. He reported that this bull was purchased January 17, 1961, for \$6,800.00.

Mr. Peterson stated that the proposed contract provides for the following conditions:

- 1. That the University shall keep, maintain, feed, and care for this bull and shall bear all expenses for this animal.
- 2. That the University shall manage and supervise this animal.
- 3. That neither the University of Kentucky nor any of its officers, agents or employees shall be liable or responsible for any injury to or death of this bull or any heifer or cow being bred to this bull.
- 4. In addition to the University's having the right to collect semen at any time, it may also breed by natural service each year not more than 15 heifers or cows in the aggregate.
- 5. The University agrees to retain its undivided one-fourth interest in the bull for a period of not less than three years unless the bull becomes infertile, diseased or dies.
- 6. In the event any party to this contract desires to sell its interest the remaining parties shall have first refusal.

- 7. The Salmon Corporation agrees to breed by artificial insemination H.P. Real Silver 15th to approximately 25 of its grade heifers or cows during the 1961 breeding season. The University shall then be allowed to purchase at the market price the steer progeny of such breeding immediately following the weaning of these animals. The University may select the animals which it deems suitable to purchase for experimental purposes.
- 8. The University shall cause the steers which are purchased from the Corporation to be subject to maintenance performance tests and following the completion of the full testing period shall cause the steers to be slaughtered and complete information of this experiment shall be recorded and made available to all parties to this contract.

Mr. Peterson stated that this was an effort to perform jointly under joint agreement and recommended that the contract be approved and authorized executed.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contractual arrangements were approved and the contract authorized executed.

G. Lease with Alpha Gamma Rho Building and Realty Company Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted a lease between the University of Kentucky and the Alpha Gamma Rho Building and Realty Company whereby the party of the second part leases a house and lot known as 700 Woodland Avenue, same to be used as a fraternity house by the Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity. Mr. Peterson explained that the house had been constructed under a contractual lease arrangement and that the Alpha Gamma Rho Building and Realty Company will pay a stipulated rental adequate to service bond issue of \$150,000, retire the debt and keep the property insured. He stated that the lease was for a period of four years, subject to renewal for extended terms when the rent is paid.

Members of the Board, being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, approved the lease and authorized the same executed.

H. Air Force R.O.T.C. Flight Training and Army R.O.T.C. Flight Training Contracts Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted contracts for Air Force R.O.T.C. flight training and Army R.O.T.C. flight training for the fiscal year 1961-62. He stated that these contracts are identical to existing contracts, that the University's interest has been fully protected, and that adequate insurance is now being carried and will continue to be carried to protect the University's interest and the students involved. He recommended that contracts for flight training program be approved and authorized executed.

Members of the Board being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contracts for Air Force R.O.T.C. Flight Training and Army R.O.T.C. Flight Training were approved and authorized executed.

I. Contract with Armed Forces Institute Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted a negotiated contract with the United States Armed Forces Institute, DA-47-043 IE-946. He stated that the contract is the same that has been in existence for several years for correspondence courses to be taken in the University of Kentucky by the Armed Forces, and stipulates the charges for specific courses as outlined in the University catalog. He stated that the contract is a routine matter and the charges involved are the same as those in the University catalog having heretofore been approved by the Board, and he recommended that the contract be approved and authorized executed.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was approved and authorized executed.

J. Contract between the University of Kentucky Medical Center and the Nazareth Literary and Benevolent Institutions, Inc., Doing Business as St. Joseph Hospital.

Mr. Peterson submitted Agreement between the University of Kentucky and the St. Joseph Hospital, Lexington, Ky. He stated that the purpose of the contract was to assure that the University Hospital would have doctors serving as internes and residents for the portion of the fiscal year that it will be operating during the year 1961-62. This Agreement develops a cooperative program whereby the St. Joseph Hospital will pay internes and residents for the time they will spend in that hospital and the University will pay internes and residents for the time that they spend in the University Hospital. He recommended that the contract be authorized and approved.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was approved and authorized executed.

K. Contracts Approved in Food Service Vending.

Mr. Peterson submitted formal agreement with the Henderson Creamery Company, 120 First Street, Henderson, Ky., to provide certain food service vending for the Northwest Extension Center; agreement with Valley Canteen, Inc., 913 Thirteenth Street, Ashland, Ky., for food service vending for Ashland Extension Center; agreement with Steve Napier, doing business as Napier Music Company, Cumberland, Harlan County, Ky., for food service vending for the Southeast Extension Center; and agreement with the Canteen Service Company, Inc., 1216 Diamond Avenue, Evansville, Indiana, for food service vending for the Northwest Extension Center. He stated that these agreements become effective July 1, 1961, and continue from year to year until notice to terminate is given by either party. There are provisions in the contracts indemnifying and saving harmless the University against all liability, loss, etc., as well as provision requiring the vendor to carry certain liability

insurance. The centracts provide for rate of compensation to the University. Mr. Peterson recommended that they be approved.

L. Injuries.

Mr. Peterson read the following letter:

We have the following accident cases which have been referred through the department heads with the recommendations that they be considered by the Board of Trustees and the expenses involved be approved for payment. The cases are as follows:

1. Milton Noble, an employee of Robinson Substation, Quicksand, Kentucky.

Mr. Noble was injured on December 6, 1960, while working in the warehouse at the Robinson Substation Farm. He was cutting a wooden shim when the knife slipped, cutting his left hand. The wound required five stitches. Mr. Noble received emergency and further treatment from Dr. Price Sewell, Jackson, Kentucky. The following bill has been received and is recommended for payment:

2. Harold Moberly, an employee of the Agricultural Experiment Station

Mr. Moberly was injured on December 8, 1960, while working in the Carpenter Shop, Farm Service Center. He fell from a loft to the floor below, a distance of eight feet, injuring his back. He reported to the Health Service for treatment, but did not respond to heat lamp treatment given there. He then went to Dr. Robert M. Sirkle, who sent him to Central Baptist Hospital for X-rays. After reading the X-rays, Dr. Sirkle referred the patient to Dr. G. M. Gumbert, Jr., a specialist. Dr. Gumbert made X-rays and used physical therapy. The following charges have been rendered and are recommended for payment:

While transferring concentrated H₂SO₄ from beaker to graduated cylinder, a droplet of the acid splashed into the right eye. The following charge has been received from Dr. Walter Frey, Lexington, Kentucky, and is recommended for payment:

5. Odie McDonald, an employee of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

Mr. McDonald, while working on the UK Mercer Farm, Beef Cattle Section, Harrodsburg, Kentucky, on February 16, 1961, received a deep cut in his left forefinger while sawing down trees. Stitches were taken and two X-rays made, which indicated a chipped bone. The following bill has been rendered by Dr. Bacon R. Moore, and is recommended for payment:

6. Harold Moberly, an employee of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

Mr. Moberly was injured on March 3, 1961, while working as a carpenter's helper at Poultry House on Poultry Farm. He was putting up new rafters when the rafters fell on him, knocking him down and pinning him against other wood. He was sent to the Good Samaritan Hospital for X-ray and observation. The following charge has been rendered and is recommended for payment:

If in order, please present these accident cases for consideration by the Board of Trustees. My recommendation is that approval

be given to pay the respective charges made for services rendered in these accident cases, on the usual condition that the University assumes no responsibility of negligence in connection with these accidents, and that such approval establishes no precedent.

Dr. Hall asked if the University carries Workmen's Compensation. He was advised that it has been the policy of the University to carry its own workmen's compensation and to take care of injuries as they occur, and that the experience of the past twenty years indicates that the University has had a great saving financially in handling injuries under its existing policy.

Mr. Peterson then recommended that the invoices for services in connection with Milton Noble, Harold Moberly, Adren McCord, Ben Culbertson and Odie McDonald be approved for payment, without admitting negligence or liability on the part of the University.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the University Board of Trustees authorized payment of claims referred to in the letter above copied, with the expressed understanding that the University does not admit negligence in relation to any claim involved herein named, and neither does it admit liability in any case herein named.

M. Timber, Robinson Forest, Sale Approved.

Mr. Peterson recommended that the Board grant authority to advertise for the sale of 750,000 board feet of timber according to a master cutting schedule in the Laurel Block of Robinson Forest. He stated that it was necessary to our forest management program to set up specifications relating to the cutting and removing of timber. He also reported to the Board that there is in existence a contract of several years' standing giving an individual first refusal of cutting of timber but that he was of the opinion that the provision is of no effect and he desired to advertise for the sale of the timber in order to establish a fair basis.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the request was granted and the sale authorized.

N. Surplus Property Disposal Approved.

Mr. Peterson reported that from time to time the University has surplus property to dispose of and he desired to bring this before the Board in order to have a record to go into the Minutes. He read a list of surplus property as follows:

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the degree to which each is entitled was authorized, and approved subject to recommendation of the University Faculty, and President Dickey was authorized to confer the degrees at the June Commencement.

P. Major Medical Insurance Program Approved.

President Dickey presented a Major Medical Insurance proposal which had been evaluated by the Employees Insurance Committee. He stated that the insurance committee had received from various underwriters major medical expense coverage proposals. The Employees Insurance Committee submitted its proposal and recommended that the proposal submitted by the Teachers Insurance Annuity Association of America be accepted and that the same be approved and authorized presented to the eligible group of University employees. President Dickey presented a list of questions and answers in connection with the Major Medical Insurance program. He presented Dr. Ralph R. Pickett,

Chairman of the Employees Insurance Committee and asked Dr. Pickett to give any further information he thought necessary. Dr. Pickett further explained the program.

Members of the Board of Trustees discussed the proposal briefly and expressed delight that a major medical insurance proposal would be submitted to the University staff, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, authorized the plan accepted, and directed that the employees of the University be given an opportunity to accept and participate in the plan.

Q. Consultative Services Approved.

Dr. J. R. Meadow, Acting Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, presented through Dr. Dickey a request that Dr. Willis A. Sutton, Jr., and Dr. Sidney J. Kaplan be granted permission to do consultative work for the State Commission on Human Rights. He stated that the amount of time involved would not require more than one to two weeks of work, which work would be done mainly during the interim between semesters in June. The fee involved would not exceed \$400.00 and the work to be done would not interfere with the regular duties of Dr. Sutton and Dr. Kaplan. The President recommended that the request be granted.

President Dickey also submitted a recommendation from Dr. J. R. Meadow, Acting Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, that Dr. Wendell C. DeMarcus, of the Physics Department, be given permission to act as consultant for the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission on classified work. He stated that Dr. DeMarcus did not know his duties but that his compensation would approximate \$12.00 per hour and would not exceed eight hours of his time during any week.

President Dickey also presented a request and recommendation from Dr. William A. Seay, Acting Dean and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, that Dr. James R. Rooney be permitted to act as consultant to the Pathology Division of the United States Army Chemical Corps, Biological Laboratories, Fort Detrick, Maryland.

President Dickey recommended that the requests be granted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, permission was granted for consultative services by the persons recommended.

R. Admission Fee, Kentucky Life Museum, Approved.

President Dickey read the following letter:

April 22, 1961

President Frank G. Dickey Administration Building University of Kentucky

Dear Dr. Dickey:

Reference is made to a conversation which we had some weeks ago regarding charging persons who come to see Waveland and the

University's Kentucky Life Museum.

Recently, I have investigated the matter of charging and have learned that the leading museum directors are of the opinion that a charge, even though nominal, should be made. The directors feel that the public has greater respect for museums that charge, except in certain unusual cases, than those which do not. Moreover, charging keeps away a certain undesirable element, causes visitors to feel that they are really getting something, as well as provides funds which most museums sorely need.

Under the circumstances, therefore, I recommend that a charge be made of 50¢ for adults, 25¢ for school children and 35¢ per person (other than school children) in groups of ten or more. It is understood that the charge would not be made until after the opening of the slave quarters. My reasons for suggesting the low fees are because our museum is a part of the University (owned by the state) and the desire that as many as possible receive the educational benefits available.

In our conversation, you suggested that action would have to be taken by the University's Board of Trustees or by the Executive Committee. I request therefore that the matter be brought to the attention of one of these bodies at a time you deem desirable.

The President recommended approval, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the admission fees suggested were approved and authorized.

S. Free-Fee Scholarship Approved.

President Dickey stated that he desired to submit the name of Keum Sun Synn and recommended that she be granted a free-fee scholarship for the academic year 1961-62.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President.

T. Restricted Budgets Approved.

President Dickey submitted budgets for 1961-62 for Account 3234 and Account 3240, College of Commerce. He stated that the information for these budgets was not available at the time the University budget was presented. He stated that the money for Account 3234, in amount \$58,100, would be received from the Kentucky Department of Highways and the amount of money for Account 3240, \$5,225, would come from outside sources for publication cost.

The President stated that the budget for foreign agricultural contracts, amounting to \$22,800, would come from the Federal Government sponsoring foreign agricultural programs.

He submitted a recommendation to allocate from unappropriated funds \$600.00 for electrical engineering research work.

The President recommended that these budgets and budget adjustments be approved and, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the budgets submitted were approved and budget adjustments were authorized made.

U. Dr. S. O. Navarro Appointed Director of the University Computing Center.

President Dickey stated that Dr. John W. Hamblen would leave the University, and that he desired to recommend that Dr. S. O. Navarro be appointed director to replace Dr. Hamblen, effective September 15, and that Mr. Ron Cummings be named acting director from July 1 to September 15, 1961.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was concurred in.

V. Dr. Robert Goodpaster, Director, Ashland Center, Approved.

President Dickey stated that Dr. Clyde L. Orr, Director of the Ashland Center, had resigned to accept other employment and recommended that Dr. Robert Goodpaster be appointed Director of the Ashland Center. He gave the background of his training and employment record.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, Dr. Robert Goodpaster was approved as director of the Ashland Center.

W. Change-of-Work for Ben R. Simpson, Sr., Approved.

President Dickey submitted recommendation for change-of-work status for Ben R. Simpson, Sr., Power Plant Engineer. Mr. Simpson has been with the University 17 years and six months. He was born on April 14, 1896, and has requested, because of health conditions, that he be given change-of-work at this time. President Dickey concurred in the recommendation, and upon motion

duly made, seconded and carried, Ben R. Simpson, Sr., was given change-of-work June 1, 1961, at an annual salary of \$1,200.00. The change-of-work assignment is to clean and lubricate equipment in the heating plant as directed by the Chief Operating Engineer.

Upon motion made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was approved.

X. Change-of-Work for Dr. William D. Valleau Approved.

President Dickey recommended that change-of-work be given to Dr. William D. Valleau, Distinguished Professor of Plant Pathology, who has been with the Univerxity since August 13, 1919, a period of 41 years and ten months. Dr. Valleau was born February 17, 1891, and, under the present policy, is entitled to an annual salary of \$4,960.00. His change-of-work duties will be to continue studies of certain tobacco diseases and genetics of tobacco and to serve as consultant on various tobacco research projects.

Upon motion made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was approved.

Y. Change-of-Work for Amanda Helen Henry Approved.

President Dickey recommended change-of-work for Amanda Helen Henry, assistant in Animal Nutrition. Miss Henry has been with the University since October 1, 1918, a period of 42 years and seven months. She was born on March 7, 1891, and is entitled to a salary of \$2,017.50 per annum. Her change-of-work will be part-time service in Animal Nutrition laboratories; specifically, to conduct analyses of samples submitted by Meats Laboratory personnel for chemical analysis. Her change-of-work will be effective May 1, 1961.

Upon motion made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was approved.

Z. Change-of-Work for Marie R. Barkley.

President Dickey submitted recommendation for change-of-work status for Marie R. Barkley, Associate Professor, School of Home Economics, who has been with the University since September, 1925, a period of 35 years and ten months. She was born December 15, 1890, and is entitled to annual change-of-work salary of \$2,520.00. Her assignment of duties will be (1) to teach H.E. 517--Food for Special Occasions--on request, but not to exceed one semester a year; and (2) to take charge of Home Economics Alumnae files and promote more extensive contacts with these alumnae through personal letters, news bulletins and visitation.

Upon motion made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was approved.
