HUGS of the Bible



Two films by African American Lesbian film maker Yvonne Welbon will be shown on Thursday, Nov. 9th at the Central Library Theater followed by a discussion with the film maker and a reception. Diversity Films, The Humanitarium: Center for Culture & Diversity, and the University of Ky. Women's Studies Program are sponsoring this event. Some additional films and discussions will take place on UK campus

The featured film on Thursday will be Living With Pride: Ruth Ellis @ 100 and will be shown second at 7:30. The film has received audience accolades for best documentary at both the San Francisco and Los Angeles Film Festivals. It is particularly fitting to be able to see this film just a month after Ruth passed away in her home in Detroit.

Born July 23, 1899, in Springfield, Illinois, Ruth Ellis was the oldest "out" African American lesbian known when Welbon undertook the project of making a film about her life. Ms. Ellis was considered a national treasure among the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender community, known as much for her energy as for her deep commitment to human rights. Author Alice Walker called her a woman of "power, audacity, and joy."

Film maker Welbon uses interviews, photographs, archival footage, and dramatize recreations to create a touching portrait of Ruth Ellis. The extensive interviews with Ruth are particularly enchanting. As a child, Ellis lived through the race riots of 1908 in Springfield that resulted in the formation of the NAACP.

As an adult in the middle part of the century Ellis lived with her companion of over 34 year, Cecilene "Babe" Franklin in Detroit Michigan. They provided a meeting place for the African American gay community in their home. (Many gay bars discriminated against African Americans at that time.) An entrepreneur, Ruth was the first woman to own her own printing business in Detroit and taught herself photography

When Welbon searched for archival footage of black gay and lesbians from the 1940' through the 1970's, she found none. "I made my own" she says, using actors to recreate what Ellis and her friends (most still closeted) told her about those days.

By 1979 many of Ruth's contemporaries had passed away and she was living a more isolated existence in a senior citizens building. When a young woman came to teach the residents self-defense, Ruth, then 80 years old, decided to take another leap of faith. She invited the young woman to dinner, and came out to her. This young Lesbian was charmed by Ruth and promptly introduced her to the post Stonewall community of gays and lesbians in the area.

In her 80's and 90's Ruth Ellis became a treasured member of the national LBGT community, traveling to many women's music festivals and sharing her history and her spirit with younger generations. Yvonne Welbon captures the wonder of Ellis's life story and her ongoing ability to live with Pride.

Before this film, we will be showing another of Welbon's documentaries at 6:45, Remembering Wei Yifang, Remembering Myself. This autobiographic documentary charts the influence of the filmmaker's sixyear experience as an African American woman in Taiwan. Wei Yifang, Yvonne's Chinese persona, finds Taiwan to be a "racism-free zone".

Welbon juxtaposes her experience with that of her grandmother who immigrated from Honduras to work in South Dakota in the1940's, facing american racism that had not not previously been part of her life. Linking their stories with that of earlier women in their family, the richly textured memoir blends dramatic sequences with documentary footage.

Variety magazine comments: "Yvonne Welbon's pungent commentary on racism and self-realization sings with ideas. Welbon as a creator shows purpose and ability."

The Women's Studies Program will be showing two other of Welbon's documentaries on Monday, Nov. 6 at 7:30 p.m. at the Young Library Auditorium

"Missing Relations" is an experimental dramatic documentary which explores loss and denial in an African American family through the filmmaker's story of her kidnapped twin sisters, erased from family history for 24 years.

"Sisters in the Life: First Love" is a dramatic documentary/narrative starring Donna Rose, a thirtysomething black lesbian. It is based, in part, on welbon's first experience with love as a fourteen-year-old.

On Friday November 10 at Noon in Student Center Room 206, Yvonne Welbon will present "The History of African-American Women Filmmakers", a talk and video presentation. The public is invited to attend.

Election Confusion?? Here are Jeff's Picks by Jeff Jones

Based upon my years of following local campaigns, elected officials, and voting records on GLBT issues, GLSO has asked me who I feel are the best choices in the upcoming Nov. 7 election. These are again my personal choices and do not reflect the views of GLSO or any other of the groups with which I am affiliated.

I have chosen the following candidates based on these criteria: public policy statements about GLBT issues, voting records where applicable, ability to win, and voter education materials from the Fairness website (http://www.fairness99.org).

I am only listing Fayette County candidates in contested races. Fortunately some of our elected officials with the strongest voting records on GLBT issues are unopposed in the general election. I am biased in my choices against third party candidates unless: a) there are no other decent candidates in the race from a major party (pure protest vote) or b) they are in a race where they have a reasonable chance of winning.

Clarifying Some Positions:

(1) Baesler's previous record on GLBT issues while in Congress was poor, but he appears to have educated himself greatly since then. He has publicly expressed support for an inclusive hate crimes law and overall appears more sympathetic.

(2) Damron and Hoffman have poor voting records on GLBT issues. They did vote to support HIV/AIDS funding. I give them an edge over their unknown Republican challengers because Democrat-controlled committees have shown themselves to generally be more favorable to GLBT issues.

(3) Duncan's positions on GLBT issues are unknown. His challenger, Stan Lee, however, is the chosen successor and ideological heir to Stan Cave, the most anti-gay legislator from Fayette County.

(4) Wigginton voiced his support in the Lexington Herald-Leader for vigorous enforcement of the ordinance while his opponent, Lonny Demaree, viewed the ordinance as unnecessary.

(5) Mitchell voted against the Fairness Ordinance but did support a resolution opposing the anti-gay HB 485. Mitchell says he supports job protections but not housing protections. His challenger, Dale Edinger, Jr., is on record with a number of anti-gay editorials and says the ordinance is redundant. So, Mitchell is probably a better choice than his opponent. (6) Fogle and his opponent Larry

(6) Fogle and his opponent Larry Ashlock are both supportive and good guys. Fogle, however, put his neck on the line for our communities with his vote for the Fairness Ordinance. I feel he deserves our communities' support in return.

6th District City Council Race Important for GLBT Community

Al Mitchell, the incumbent 6th District City Council member, voted in the minority against last years successful Lexington Fairness Ordinance. Mr. Mitchell stated in an October 14th Herald Leader interview that he would try to repeal the Fairness Ordinance if he is re-elected.

Dale Edinger, Jr., running against Mitchell in the 6th District, said in the same Herald Leader Interview that he thought Federal and State laws covered such discrimination and that a local ordinance is therefore redundant. In conversations with Mr. Edinger since that interview, he has said that based on what he now understands, he "doesn't know why he wouldn't be supportive, of the Fairness Ordinance.

Mr Edinger appears to be a compassionate, reasonable and fair-minded individual. He talks with ease about knowing gay people as friends and neighbors. He describes himself as a blue-collar family man who wants to eliminate waste in the city budget and bring back tax dollars to our neighborhoods. He is also critical of the current City Council's lack of support of the efforts of the Ethics Commission.

The neighborhood of the 6th District are the Meadows, Deep Springs, Rockwood, Hi Acres, Warrenbton, Hermitage Hills, Lex. Manor, Johnson Heights and Eastland. I encourage all Fairness minded people in the 6th City Council District to support Dale Edinger.



GLSEN, The Gay Lesbian Straight Educators Network, is all about bringing teachers, schools, parents, students and communities together in the fight to end anti-gay harassment and discrimination. We all know that middle and high schools are difficult for students who are perceived to be gay. Too often the results of harassment include teen dropouts, suicide, drug use

Starting GLSEN-KY is my way of using what I know to do some good. It is a result of the harassment my son had to endure at Somerset High School based on his perceived sexual orientation. We begged School Administrators to take action against the students harassing Brad. After three written death threats and the school's continued lack of response, we decided it was up to us. We got the second ever Office For Civil Rights "Commitment to Resolve" signed by a School District.

We did not feel this was enough, since the OCR "Commitment" would expire one day. We are currently in a Federal Civil Lawsuit with the District and with several specific employees of the district. We hope that by taking it into the legal system, the school administrators and teachers will come to understand the seriousness of this issue.

GLSEN-KY is currently building a coalition with other groups across the state to work towards making changes in our schools. We want to reach a variety of people who can help us in this work. We are willing to go into the schools and educate teachers and administrators about the effects of harassment and their responsibility to stop it. Our basic

message is that the hate, harassment and discrimination must stop.

In October we kicked off our membership drive. There is strength in numbers and we would love to have you join us. Memberships are as follows: \$15.00 Member (limited income), \$35.00 Member, \$50.00 Household \$100.00 and up. Ten dollars of each membership donation is sent to GLSEN National and the rest stays with the Chapter that collects it.

The National GLSEN money helps the chapters with brochures, grants and much more. Each Chapter uses it's money for keeping the Chapter alive. It may be used for office supplies, printing, transportation of it's members to other important meetings, etc.
