Resolutions In Memory Of Professor Enoch Grehan

Presented to the Faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences, January 3, 1988

Sixer this Faculty was last in session, one of its most be-loved members has died, Professor Enoch Grehan who passed away satinday. December 11, 1987.

Professor Grehan labored for the University to the very last, for he discharged his duries to the full, even on the day of his death. Professor Grehan lived his long life of usefulness in the county where he was born, Fayette, Kentucky. 


