



she could be recognized as one of the best forwards in the country."

Another potential All-American is junior point guard Sandy Harding, a 5-foot firecracker who could be the best point guard in the nation. She has few peers in terms of ballhandling and quickness and her experience as a two-year starter should strengthen her leadership role on the court.

"If Sandy were 5-7, she'd be on every All-America team in the country," Hall said. "In reality, the only time her lack of size hurts is when someone posts her up, and that doesn't happen very often. Her assets greatly outweigh her lack of size."

Harding tied with Georgia's Teresa Edwards last year as the SEC's top assists player with an average of 6.3. Her 81.1 percent free throw shooting ranked her second in the league. She led the Lady Kats in minutes played (33.8) and was second in steals (52).

Hall could be content with two All-America-caliber players in her lineup, but she feels she may have three with a healthy Bebe Croley on the squad. Croley made everyone's first-team All-America list as a senior in high school, and was living up to expectations when a stress fracture sidelined her 12 games into the season. At that point, Kentucky had a 10-2 record and No. 12 national ranking. But Croley missed 12 games as Kentucky stumbled to a 16-12 season.

Hall feels the healthy return of the 5-10 guard could make Kentucky a major force in the tough Southeastern Conference.

"Having her back at full strength could make all the difference in the world," Hall said. "She has unlimited potential. She's fast, quick, a great jumper and a very unselfish player. Her outside shooting has improved, too."

Croley gained important experience during the summer when she toured Europe and Taiwan with the USA Select Team. She can contribute

either at the No. 2 guard spot or as a small forward, but will likely be used more at guard this season. As a freshman, she averaged 7.1 points and 4.1 rebounds.

The other two returning starters will be relied upon to dominate the boards and give the Lady Kats the strong inside game they must have to compete in the SEC. Karen Mosley is a 6-3 forward/center who has started for two seasons while Debbie Miller is a 6-1 center who started last year as a sophomore. Mosley averaged 12.9 points and 6.9 rebounds while Miller pitched in 7.1 points and 5.4 rebounds.



All-America candidate Leslie Nichols "Karen is a finesse player," Hall says. "She's an excellent leaper and a good shooter. She needs to be more physical on the boards to improve our rebounding.

"Debbie is strong, she gets good positioning and has good timing. We'll be expecting a lot more scoring out of her this year."

Melanie Warren, a 6-6 junior center, could be a key reserve for the Lady Kats after doubling her playing time last season.

Overall, Hall says, the Lady Kats should be a stronger rebounding team and will enjoy more depth and experience. But a question mark is shooting. Last year Kentucky hit only 46.4 percent of its shots, the worst shooting performance by a UK team since Hall's arrival in 1980.

"I hope the problem was the lighter ball," Hall said, "and I hope that we have adjusted to it now."

Hall said that UK will look to a bench it can depend on immediately. Sophomores Michele Pennie, Laurie Hudgens and Monique Tarantini, and senior Shelly Miller all made great gains in improvement toward the end of last season, she said. Pennie progressed gradually throughout last year while rehabilitating a left knee that had undergone extensive surgery. She was used at both guard and small forward. Hudgens, a top substitute at forward throughout the year, finished strong and had 10 points and 15 rebounds in UK's final game. Shelly Miller, playing her first varsity basketball season last year after attending Penn State on a volleyball scholarship, also ended the season impressively, and had eight points and 10 rebounds in the final game.

Tarantini, an exceptional outside shooter, will be depended on to give Kentucky a weapon against zone defenses.

Freshmen Whitaker and Shrum lend additional depth to the squad.

"For the first time, I'm going to have two good point guards," Hall said of Whitaker and Harding. "Jodie's quick, a great ballhandler and she has that drive to win. She's a great competitor and all-around athlete."

Shrum has a lot of natural ability that will develop through experience, Hall said. "She can shoot, rebound and play the transition game. She's similar to Laurie Hudgens. She's a competitor and she'll surprise some people."



Dr. Otis A. Singletary

President, University of Kentucky

The University of
Kentucky has made great
strides toward academic excellence since Dr. Otis A.
Singletary assumed the office
of president in August, 1969.

Two professional schools—dentistry and pharmacy—have been ranked among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history and mathematics have gained national attention. The UK library now ranks among the best in the Southwest and a large portion of the worldwide research related to tobacco and health is now done at UK.

Dr. Singletary had previously served as chancellor at the University of North Carolina, at Greensboro, executive vice chancellor for academics affairs in the University of Texas system and director for the Job Corps for the Office of Economic Opportunity. He holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

In the 14 years he has been president, the University has grown to more than 23,400 students on the Lexington campus and about 21,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research insitutions in the country.

A native of Gulfport, Miss., Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa Senate.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

Cliff Hagan began his 10th year as University of Kentucky athletics director on July 1, overseeing an overall UK program that continues in high gear with several major projects in various stages of planning, construction and completion.

The completed projects include:

A beautiful recruitingentertaining lounge and two large storage rooms in the Football Offices complex at Commonwealth Stadium.

Replacement of 120 yards of turf and the addition of 40 more yards of turf on one of the main practice fields at Shively Sports

A new weight room in Memorial Coliseum.

New dressing facilities for women at Shively Sports Center.

New computerized program for the Ticket Office.

Other major projects include:

A \$5 million-plus natatorium to be named after former Wildcat athletics director Harry C. Lancaster.

A new four-court indoor tennis facility.

A new practice complex at Shively Sports Center.

men's basketball championship held at Rupp Arena under UK sponsorship was declared a smashing success, but there was no rest for the UK athletic administrators as they immediately began preparations for the men's Southeastern Conference basketball tournament and the women's "Final Four" basketball championship games to be held in Rupp Arena next spring.

On the personal side, Hagan has received the following honors:

1965—Herbert Hoover Boys Club organized in Owensboro and named Cliff Hagan Boys Club of America.

1978—First UK player installed in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

On the "games" side of the ledger, highlights last school year included a second straight bowl appearance for the football team and advancement to the "Final 16" by the men's basketball team.

It took Terry Hall less than five years to become the winningest coach in Kentucky women's basketball history. And as she enters her sixth year, she guides a program that continues to take great pride in its reputation as one of the best in the country. Her five UK squads have won an impressive 70 percent of their games and averaged 21 wins per season in the process. Three of those teams advanced to the national playoffs. One captured the Southeastern Conference championship. All have been in the Top 20.

Hall's success is not unique to Kentucky, however. In 11 years of collegiate coaching, her teams have known only winning seasons. Her career record is 196-104, with a 103-44 mark at Kentucky. She previously coached for one season at Eastern Kentucky and for five seasons at

Louisville.

Hall began to establish Kentucky as a national contender in her first season as Lady Kats coach. That year the

team won the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference and Hall was named KWIC Coach of the Year. The Lady Kats advanced to the final round of 16 in the AIAW National tournament and completed the 1980-81 season with a 25-6 record. In 1981-82, women's basketball joined the NCAA and Hall's Lady Kats won the Southeastern Conference title and advanced to the Midwest Regional finals before falling to eventual national champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor.

The 1982-83 team rose to new heights as the Lady Kats were ranked fourth nationally and set a new women's basketball attendance record — 10,622 vs. Old Dominion in UK's Memorial Coliseum. The team was upset by Indiana in the first round of the playoffs, but finished with a 23-5 record.

In 1983-84, Hall had a very young and inexperienced team that was challenged with the fourth toughest schedule in the nation. The Lady Kats earned respect from their opponents despite their up-and-down season and finished 15-13.

Last year's squad again faced the fourth toughest schedule in the nation, and with the graduation of two key starters, expectations were not extremely high for Hall's young squad. Still, they came roaring out at the start of the season and owned an 11-3 record and No. 12 national ranking by the end of December. Before the season ended at 16-12, they had stunned four Top 20 opponents and proven they could play with any team in the nation.

Hall still has strong ties to her native Salem, Ind. Her parents, Henry and Lucille Hall, and her sister Judy Catlett still live in Salem. Hall's other sister,

Mardee McNay, lives in nearby Columbus, Ind. A graduate of Indiana State in 1966, Hall studied Health and P.E. while starring in basketball, field hockey and volleyball. She was honored with the "I" Women Award in 1965 and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.









CINDY NOBLE

Assistant Coach Tennessee, 1983



Cindy Noble's experience as a great player at all levels of competition make her an exciting addition to the Lady Kats staff. A two-time Olympian, Cindy joined the University of Kentucky for her first coaching job in August.

A native of Clarksburg, Ohio, Cindy began an outstanding playing career at Frankfort-Adena High School, where she earned All-America honors and was named the Outstanding Athlete in Ohio. She went on to similar glory at the University of Tennessee, where she earned Kodak All-America honors before graduating in 1983.

In the meantime, she was also establishing herself as a great international competitor. She was selected to the 1979 World University squad, the 1980 Olympic team, the 1983 Pan American team and the 1984 Olympic squad. She also played professional basketball for one year in Italy and for two years in Japan.

One of Cindy's major assignments at UK naturally will be the development of post players.

SUE STANLEY

Trainer Ohio State 1979

Sue joined the UK training staff in 1982 after serving for one year as Co-Ordinator of Sports Medicine for the Department of Intramural/Recreational Services at East Carolina University. Sue graduated from Ohio State University, where she earned a degree in Physical Education in 1979 after serving for four years as a student trainer. She was a graduate assistant at Purdue University, where she earned her Masters Degree in Physical Fitness and Exercise Physiology in 1981.

A native of Smithville, Ohio, Sue is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association.



DONNA MURPHY

Assistant Coach Morehead State, 1980



Donna Murphy joined the Lady Kats program in June, giving Coach Hall's staff an experienced coach and recruiter, as well as an accomplished player who is highly-regarded throughout the state. A former assistant coach at Memphis State and Florida, Donna achieved legendary status in Kentucky as a player at Newport Public High and at Morehead State University.

A native of Newport, Ky., Donna had a brilliant high school career and was honored as the state's first "Miss Basketball" in 1976. She went on to star at Morehead, where she earned All-America honors while virtually rewriting the record books of both MSU and the Ohio Valley Conference. Following her graduation in 1980, she was the first forward drafted in the now-defunct Women's Basketball League, and played for one year with the St. Louis Streaks.

Donna then continued her education at the University of Cincinnati, where she served as a graduate assistant coach in basketball and track. After one year at UC, she returned to Morehead, where she was an assistant in basketball while completing her degree in higher education. She then served as an assistant for two years at Memphis State, before accepting a position at the University of Florida.

PAT ETCHEBERRY

Strength Coach Kentucky (1968)



A former Olympian, Pat was named full-time strength coach in 1984 after serving on a part-time basis as both strength coach since 1973 and track coach since 1982. Last year, Coach Terry Hall asked him to take over the Lady Kats' preseason conditioning program. A native of Chile, which he represented (javelin) in the 1964 Olympics, he is a former South American Games record-holder in the javelin and was a participant in the 1967 and 1971 Pan American Games. He captured the Southeastern Conference title while performing for Kentucky in 1966. He holds a Masters Degree from Georgetown College.

Director Kentucky (1951)

Came to UK as assistant to Ken Kuhn in May, 1967, after eight years as general reporter and five years as sports editor of The Lexington Leader; named director two years later. After overseas service with the Marines in WWII, attended Kentucky Wesleyan College (catcher Panthers baseball team one year). Bachelor's at UK '51. News editor The Mountain Eagle, Whitesburg, 1951-52; The Hazard Herald, 1952-53; Columbia University (American Press Institute Seminar 1967). Former Kentucky area correspondent Time-Life-Fortune magazines; former KY editor Religious News Service, Tobacco Magazine.

He served as manager of the 1968 NCAA Mid-East Regionals Basketball Tournament and has served as media host and SID for various other regionals and the 1985 "Final Four'




Assistant Director Auburn (1978)





n honorable mention All-American and a two-time All-Southeastern Conference performer, Leslie has already established herself as one of Kentucky's all-time greats. She has led the Lady Kats in scoring, rebounding, field goal percentage and steals for two consecutive seasons, and is ranked fourth on the Lady Kats' all-time scoring list with 1,312 career points. She needs just 287 points to pass Pam Browning and become the second all-time scorer in Lady Kat basketball history. And with an average of 437 points a year so far, that does seem likely to happen.

Leslie is rated as one of the Top 12 players in the country by Women's Basketball Yearbook and it's easy to see why. The versatile left-hander possesses all the classic skills of a great basketball player, and has put that talent to work against some of the top teams and players in the country. The NCAA ranked Kentucky's schedule fourth toughest in the country last year, and Leslie still managed to rank third in the SEC in scoring (18.4), fifth in rebounding (9.1), fifth in free throw percentage (78.1) and fifth in steals (2.7). Only once in 27 games last season and only three times in the last two years has Leslie failed to score in double figures. She led Kentucky in scoring 16 times last season and in rebounding 18 times. Her best game was a 30-point, 13-rebound effort in a UK upset win over national runner-up Georgia. She was named Most Valuable Player of the Lady Kats Dial Classic and was named to the all-tournament squad of N.C. State's C.Q. Data Systems Tournament.







egarded as one of the most exciting players in the country, Sandy has finally convinced the skeptics who thought she might be too small to play college basketball. She not only plays it, but plays it perhaps as well as any point guard in the country. While numbers can't really describe Sandy's contributions, they do compare favorably to those of the nation's other top point guards. As a freshman, she was second in the SEC in assists and No. 1 among collegiate freshmen in that category. Last season she tied with Georgia's Theresa Edwards as the SEC's top assists player with an average of 6.3, which also ranked her 30th in the country. She was second in the SEC in free throw percentage at 81.1. She also shot well from the field, averaging 8.4 points on 46.4 percent shooting. And she is an outstanding defensive player as well.

Her spectacular style of play and constant high level of intensity make Sandy fun to watch, but it is her leadership qualities and knack for coming up with the clutch plays that make her so invaluable to the Kentucky team. 

strong, physical player, Debbie should benefit a great deal from a sophomore year in which she started 27 of 28 games against the fourth toughest schedule in the country. emorial Coliseum is the proud home of one of the richest basketball traditions in the world. The historic old Coliseum was the host site for 24 Wildcat basketball teams that yielded two national champions and 16 Southeastern Conference champions.

The Lady Kats hope to continue with similar glory. Since the Wildcats moved downtown to 23,000-seat Rupp Arena in 1976, the Coliseum has been the exclusive home of the Lady Kats. Throughout their years in Memorial Coliseum, Lady Kats have proudly carried on that

tradition, adding an SEC title of their own in 1982 and compiling a 127-40 record in 10 seasons there.

The highlight of the Lady Kats' era in Memorial Coliseum came on Feb. 5, 1983. On that cold Saturday night, 10,622 enthusiastic fans filed into the 11,500-seat gymnasium to watch Kentucky upset fifthranked Old Dominion. That crowd constituted the largest crowd to have ever watched a women's college basketball game in America. Iowa broke the record last season with an amazing attendance of 22,000, but Kentuckians will long

remember the excitement of that evening. The Lady Kats were ranked fourth nationally after the Old Dominion victory, and in their three remaining home games that season they averaged 7,600 fans.

Just as their male counterparts did before them, the Lady Kats have made Memorial Coliseum the home of a winning, high-class program. They have compiled a 117-35 record in 10 seasons at home, and extended a home-court winning streak to 31 games before losing to Memphis State midway through the 1981-82 season.

Plans for construction of the Coliseum began in 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University and recommended a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health services, our physical education and our


The Coliseum was completed in 1950 at a cost of \$3,925,000. The huge building was dedicated to serve as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict. The Coliseum covers an entire city block and has as much space as a seven-story office building. Situated along the Avenue of Champions, Memorial Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games and Athletic Department offices, but also serves as the site of other sporting events, as well as concerts and lectures.





A STATE OF THE STA

CAMPUS

he University of Kentucky's 716-acre campus is located south of downtown Lexington, Ky., which has a population of approximately one-quarter million people. There are approximately 200 buildings and other structures, walks, malls, gardens, playing fields, recreation space and parking areas on campus.

Academic Program

The University has 17 academic colleges: Arts and Sciences . . . Agriculture . . . Engineering . . . Business and Economics . . . Education . . . Home Economics . . . Library Science ... Social Work . . . Architecture . . . Communications . . . Fine Arts . . . Law . . . Medicine . . . Dentistry . . . Nursing Allied Health Professions Pharmacy.

Research

The University Library system contains approximately 1.7 million volumes and ranks 13th in the nation in microform holdings.

Among the major areas of research at the University are energy, engineering, medical (especially cancer research on the aging) and agriculture (especially in tobacco and equine).

Faculty

UK's faculty numbers 1,430 on the Lexington campus. Including a graduate family of approximately 950.

Student Body

Enrollment on UK's Lexington campus is more than 23,000. The students come from every county in Kentucky and 48 other states and the District of Columbia and 78 foreign countries.

Approximately 5,400 students live in UK's resident halls with another 1,156 students in UK's 25 fraternities and 17 sororities.

Alumni


The University has approximately 70,000 alumni around the world with more than 22,500 of them paid members of UK's Alumni Association. There are 65 alumni clubs across the na-

s across the nation, with 34 of them in Kentucky and 31 outside the state from California to New York.

Community Colleges

The Lexington campus also is headquarters for UK's Community College System. UK has 13 of these two-year colleges across the state with colleges—Medicine, Dentistry, Nursing, Pharmacy, and Allied Health Professions—have more than 2,000 students pursuing bachelor, master's and doctoral degrees in health-related fields.

The Medical Center also has a 470-bed University Hospital as part of its teaching and service programs.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development. If a student likes music, for instance, the Concert and Lecture Series brings outstanding soloists and symphonies on campus. There are chamber music concerts and hard rock concerts, impromptu bluegrass groups and flute recitals. If one likes to participate, opportunities abound—there are several choral groups, a marching band, the symphony orchestra, the symphonic band-or there is always the guitar with a few friends under the trees. Whichever one chooses, at UK it's available—and there's someone to share it.

There are 22 national fraternities and 16 national sororities on campus. "Rush," or member recruitment, takes place before classes begin, and informally throughout the year.

In addition to supporting the various Wildcat and Lady Kat teams, men and women students take part as individuals or in groups in competitive sports and in intramural programs. The Seaton Center houses facilities in basketball, volleyball.



badminton, squash, wrestling, and table tennis. An Olympic-size swimming pool, tennis courts, and several sports fields are available to students.

A similar variety of opportunities in drama, student government, athletics, service organizations, and recreation, is available.

The city of Lexington also offers UK students much in the way of entertainment. Lexington has a Philharmonic Orchestra, Chamber Music Society, the Lexington Singers, a Council of Arts, and a local Ballet Company. WHAT IS CATS?

CATS is specifically the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services. It is a multipurpose academic facility. We are proud to be the first university in the nation to open an academic center for student-athletes. We, like all other universities, tell parents and recruits that the student-athlete's education is of utmost importance. The difference is that at the University of Kentucky we have made a sincere effort to provide the best possible educational environment, one that is conducive to academic success.

athletes with many advantages over the student-athletes at other universities. Examine the list below:

1. ADVISING—It is not unusual for freshmen student-athletes to be confused about courses, campus, or any number of academic procedures. In addition to our study center, the CATS facility houses the office of the Assistant Athletics Director for Academic Affairs, a full-time assistant, a Reading Coordinator and four Academic Graduate

2. STUDY SKILLS—CATS provides us with an area where we can conduct organized weekly study skills classes. Many schools give their student-athletes a crash course in study skills. This is not enough. We have a Freshman Orientation Handbook and Study Skills workbook that each freshman student-athlete receives. The student-athletes attend organized classes in CATS, where they learn to utilize proven classroom study skills and university resources.

3. STUDY HALL—Most major colleges have a required study hall for their freshmen student-athletes. These study halls are almost always in the evening after practice and are held in a campus facility borrowed by the Athletics Association. This is probably the time period least conducive to study or meeting with tutors.

NOT AT KENTUCKY!

The CATS facility not only provides us with our own large area for quiet study but is also equipped with tutoring and small group rooms. Our center was specifically designed to meet the study needs of student-athletes.


The CATS Center is open all day and until 10:00 each night. This

means that student-athletes at Kentucky are not restricted to attending required study hall in the evening. Our student-athletes can complete their study hall virtually any time of day. Research has shown that the best time to study is immediately after class. Our center provides the student-athletes the opportunity to study at that time. This is definitely a CATS advantage.


4. TUTORING—We have tutors available for any subject. Our tutors come from the University and the community. We utilize the services of professors, graduate students and graduates who are well-qualified. We screen our tutors and although we hire many more than we need, we develop a core list of those most effective with our students. This core group works closely with us and thus we are able to monitor the progress of the student-athletes more closely. CATS provides the proper atmosphere for tutoring. Soundproof rooms are available where the student and the tutor can meet. They don't have to worry about being bothered by others or bothering others while discussing important concepts. Our system is most conducive to learning.

5. **READING COMPONENT—** The reading program at CATS is designed to meet the needs of all studentathletes. Upon entering the University each student-athlete is given a reading test that measures that individual's strengths and weaknesses. Based upon the results, a studentathlete may be encouraged to participate in the reading program, which provides both individual and small-group tutoring in a variety of areas such as reading improvement and advanced vocabulary development. It is the goal of the reading program to provide student-athletes with tools necessary to become more effective readers and studiers.

WHY CATS?

All major colleges spend a lot of time, effort and **money** recruiting student-athletes. All coaches and athletics administrations express concern for the recruit's education. Most schools use athletic funds freely to build better athletic facilities to attract better athletes. The problem is that those same schools would find it unbearable to spend those same large sums on an academic facility. Our philosophy at the University of Kentucky is that colleges should be willing to provide funds not only to recruit the athletes and develop their physical talents, but also to afford the student-athlete every opportunity to succeed academically.




