

In fact, the Wildcats have won five of six since than dark Sunday afternoon. And the 76-65 loss to Ole Miss wasn't all that big a major upset considering that Ole Miss has been giving most everyone on the SEC fits. been giving most everyone on the SEC fits

Still, make no mistake that the loss in Oxs, and still is a bitter pill for Sutton

But the past is history just like the so-called January slump which regained its reputation in 1987, thanks to a so-so 6-4 mark after a fine 6-2 December.

Now, Kentucky is beginning to put all the pieces together.

In other words, the Big Blue is finding

ays, as in teamwork, to win. Against Auburn, senior James Blackmon

played the finest game of his career.

That victory wasn't a shocker, but when the 'Cats left Tuscaloosa Saturday by upending SEC leader Alabama, Kentucky had issued notice to the remainder of the league that the

Big Blue is alive and well.

And yes, the 'Cats will show up in Atlanta next month.

In most everyone's book, the top three teams in the SEC are Alabama, Florida and Auburn. Kentucky has proven its worth against two of the three and will have a chance to make even bigger waves this Saturday when UK takes on SEC co-leader Florida in Gainesville.

First, Kentucky will entertain Tennessee Wednesday night and this one should be a

Hoping to get revenge for an embarrassing 75-68 loss in Knoxville last month, Kentucky can keep its drive alive to finish in the league's top four and a respectable seed in the NCAA tournament next month.

While Tennessee is still recuperating from the persistent rumors that Vols' coach Don DeVoe won't be around when the new 25,000-seat arena opens next season, the Vols have done anything but die.

After UT athletics director Doug Dickey announced at a press conference last week that DeVoe's status won't be reviewed before the end of next season, the Vols promptly hit the floor and turned back Vanderbilt in overtime and gave the LSU Tigers the scare of their lives before losing in the final minute

in Baton Rouge.

Although the Vols are in ninth place with a 4-8 record, the Big Orange is capable of winning any time out. Only problem is that the Vols have not been very impressive on the

road in the last couple years.

Last season, Tennessee lost all nine road games in the conference, and hasn't fared much better this season, although the Vols did break the string earlier this season by upsetting Vandy in Nashville. The Vols' four league wins are home court wins over Kentucky, Mississippi State and Vanderbilt and the road win at Nashville.

To keep in perspective the importance of the upset over Kentucky in Knoxville, it's necessary to point out that Mississippi State

has won only one league game all season. And you can imagine how the folks in Nashville are feeling since Vandy would be in third place with a 7-4 record had C. M. Newton's club won those two against

Tennessee. Tennessee has been playing a lot of people close, but DeVoe hasn't found the right combination with All-America Tony White. Things don't get any easier for the Vols. After a visit to Lexington, Tennessee returns home but has to face two of the league's toughest, Auburn and Florida before.

hitting the road again to Starkville and and Tuscaloosa.

Tennessee won't finish last in the SEC because Mississippi State is 1-11 and probably won't win another game unless it is the one against the Vols. Depending on how the Vols fight back, Tennessee could finish as high as fifth or as low as No. 9.

As we said in this space a week ago, each and every game appears to be the biggest one of the season. That's the why it is when you find yourself in a win-or-else situation with

While any hopes of winning a league title would have to come under the "miracle" category, this Kentucky team has proven something I didn't think possible—that is to beat a legitimate Top Ten team on the road. After the horrendous 35-point loss at home

to LSU, the Wildcats' worksheet showed a 9-5 mark and the appearance of a disappointing future with three of their next five SEC games on the road.

But a funny thing happened. Once again. Kentucky apparently likes playing on the

road better than Rupp Arena.
First the 'Cats upended a good Vanderbilt team 71-65, but lost to Ole Miss. Those of

little faith (tsk, tsk) were throwing in the towel after a very lackluster 50-36 ho-hummer over Mississippi State at home. With Auburn coming to town in hopes of

making atonement for an earlier loss in Tiger-town, Kentucky fans were ready to take another lumping like the likes of earlier duels with Alabama and LSU.

Kentucky simply turned the other cheek, put on a dazzling exhibition of play and then held on for dear life. The die-hards cheered up but it wasn't until the 'Cats delivered a knock-out punch to Alabama in Tuscaloosa that the fair-weather fans came home to roost

can be a factor in upcoming post season play Heaven forbid, but there are some who believe the 'Cats can actually win a couple

games in the big one.

With that in mind, let's take a peak at what lies ahead.

In addition to home court games with Tennessee, Vanderbilt and Ole Miss, the 'Cats

will also host Oklahoma on March 1.

After Wednesday's battle with the Vols,
Kentucky will hit the road for one of the league's top games at Gainesville. After this week, the 'Cats have only two road games

left—at LSU and Georgia.

Both were considered "sure" losses before last Saturday, but UK is finding the road more

Through Kentucky's first six league road contests, the Wildcats own a fine 4-2 mark. Ironically, the only road losses came at the hands of No. 8 Ole Miss and No. 9

If the Wildcats play the remainder of their schedule (and that's a big if with this team), UK could go 3-0 at home. And then if UK should win one of the three road contests, the Wildats would compile a 11-7 league mark and that should be good enough for a third-place

12-6 mark which probably would not move UK up to No. 2, but would give the 'Cats a solid No. 3 finish.

Now if one of those upsets should come

at Gainesville, then the knees at the top (specifically Alabama and Florida) could

begin knocking just a tad.

It still figures to be a two-horse race for the top spot between Alabama and Florida and can you imagine the last time the Florida Gators were cheering for a Kentucky basket-

ball team prior to last Saturday?
Well, you can rest assured Wimp Sanderson will return the favor this Saturday when the 'Cats try to upset Florida. Media types in Florida are playing this up as the biggest

ame in recent memory for any Gator fan. For the Gators to have a shot at the league crown, a victory this Saturday is a must for Florida since the Gators cannot afford to drop

a game off the pace.

Both Alabama and Florida have three road games left, but the schedule favors, ever-so-slightly, the Crimson Tide because the final game of the season has Florida going against the Tide in Tuscaloosa.

Florida's two other road trips are at Tennessee and Vanderbilt while Alabama's road contests are at Vanderbilt, LSU and Auburn.

Bama's biggest challenge is staying even till the season finale because three of Bama's next four games are on the road before concluding the season with three of four at home.

Florida, meanwhile, plays three games at home this week winding up with UK on Saturday. Then the big crunch arrives as the Gators must wind up the SEC slate with three straight road contests-at Tennessee, Vander-

bilt and Alabama.

Norm Sloan certainly doesn't want to be in the position of trying to catch up on the road and that would be the situation the Gators would face if they stub their toes this

Alabama game.

Mentally, the Wildcat players were loose as a goose, fit as a fiddle. And it showed as Kentucky ousted No. 9 Alabama before a packed house in UA's Memorial Coliseum,

During practice Friday night in Tuscaloosa, Sutton, was kidding around with the Wildcat players. Sure, UK worked on

some particular plays for the Alabama.

a) A free throw shooting contest pitting NBC's Bucky Walters against Richard Madison and NBC's Tom Hammond taking on Derrick Miller.
b) Another free throw shooting ex-

hibition as seniors James Blackmon and Paul Andrews picked sides. Not only did the two upperclassmen pick their respective team-mates, but most of UK's traveling party as mates, but most of OK's travening party as well. Some of those picked to try their luck at the charity stripe included superfan Steve Rardin, along with WKYT's Rob Bromley and 101 president Van Florence.

And c) Sutton asked everyone to come out to midcourt and watch Irv Thomas and Steve Bruce give their best imitations of the Wildcat head coach.

While the Wildcats were facing a team which had humiliated them by 14 points last

which had numinated their by 14 points are month at Rupp Arena, perhaps Sutton used a little psychology on his pupils, enabiling his team to be relaxed the next day.
"Coach Sutton has so many great qualities as a basketball coach," said James Dickey minutes after UK knocked off the SEC leaders. "One of them is having the great feeling about practices at different times. Sometimes he'll come on the court and he'll just *junk* our practice schedule and go with what he would call a 'gut feeling.' That's

what he did last evening (Friday).
"We felt like one of the things that really helped us, as far as this game, was a win against Auburn at home (75-71). That gave us a lot of momentum. Our players came in with a lot of confidence and they were

## Recruit Jerry Bell Is 'Into Football'

Bell, 6-3, 262 Pounds, Decides On 'Cats

When it comes time to beat a few football prospects out of the recruiting bushes it always seems like Wildcat coaches are looking for "Mr. Big". You know, that big dude which can set anchor on either side of the line of scrimmage.

Kentucky desperately needs to sign some of these men to keep up with the Joneses of the SEC. If not, then the Wildcats will continue to get pushed around by the Alabamas, Auburns, Georgias, LSUs and the rest of the bullies on the block.

What the 'Cats could use is another recruit like a Mike Pfeifer or a Dermontti Dawson. That is, a person who is big in stature

and can be a positive factor in the trenches. However, throw in a guy whose emotional level cranks up a notch when someone out of the blue mentions "Big Oranage," "L-S-U" or "How bout them Dawgs," You know the type, someone like former Wildeat Cam Jeobbs whe history of the state Jacobs who thrived on excitement and enthusiasm while in a UK

Meet Louisvile DeSales two-year all-stater Jerry Bell. . what the Wildcats have been searching for. You can't miss him-6-foot-3, 262 pounds. And most of all, according to his high school coach Don Hettich, Jerry Bell is "into football. He's an extremely intense young man when he lines up for 48 minutes."

Last week Bell verbally committed to Jerry Claiborne's Wildcat

program. If things go as planned he'll make it official when he signs

the dotted line sometime this week.

Whether on the field or in the recruiting wars, Kentucky always has a fight on its hand when battling against the nation's premier ision I programs

But it was Kentucky who landed Bell, not tradition-rich Michigan or '86 Sugar Bowl champion Tennessee, the other two schools previously in hot pursuit of his services. According to Bell, UK's

previously in not pursuit of his services. According to Bell, OK's program compared favorably to the nation's best.

"I wanted to play in the SEC," Bell said, reflecting back on his decision. "Kentucky is just lacking a few positions that's keeping them from competing in the SEC or in the country. Hopefully, I can be a factor in (helping) them go to a bowl game. I've been to places like Michigan and I think Kentucky's program is second to one in the country.

So, after he returned from his official visit to Michigan (three

weeks ago) it was then he felt destined to join the Big Blue.

"I was really impressed with both of their programs," Bell said about his recent visits to Ann Arbor and Knoxville. "I liked the people there and the coaches, but I had a feeling deep inside that kept telling me Kentucky was the best place for me.

"Some places you op and you feel like you're an extreme to the

"Some places you go and you feel like you're an outcast. At Kentucky I felt like I was just 'one of the guys."

Even during his sophomore year at DeSales, Kentucky assistant Bill Glaser had his eyes on Bell. And while UK already has two DeSale products on the team—Scott Endris and Tony Nash—it will even though his previous college exam scores currently aren't up to par

### **Needs To Pass College Exam**

To be eligible for a scholarship Bell must make a 15 on his ACT (though on a sliding scale a 14 is acceptable if he has a 2.1 GPA or higher) or 700 on the SAT (sliding rule applies here, too). However, the new addition to Prop 48—combining best scores of rom separate test sittings—gives Bell and all student-athletes a better

"I'm taking another ACT Saturday (Feb. 5) and I'm signed up for the SAT," Bell said. "I'm going to keep taking 'em and keep taking 'em until I get it. I've been taking the prep (ACT) courses and I feel real good about this next one."

Pressure sometimes plays a big role. Taking the test for the initial time, students sometimes are intimidated. They can become

frustrated when seeing a question they no nothing about. At age 17 or 18 they see a big part of their life go out the window because

f a low test score. Student-athletes, who wait till the last minute, are to blame. Beginning their junior year, students are advised to take the test as many times as they can. And when a senior takes the test, say in spring e or she faces a win-or-lose situation. Hey, when you have the

opportunity to take an ACT or SAT test during your junior year, especially with the new rule, do it!

Just ask Jerry Bell.

"I've talked to the guys who have taught me how to take it and they said there's stuff on there (tests) that you've never had. It's like they try to intimidate you to see how you can adjust during a test.

'They've got it set up to where there's enough on the test to where you can pass. What I did (previous two attempts) was I got in there and saw all this stuff I didn't know. I got so choked up and nervous that I couldn't figure out the stuff that I did know. Now, I'm learning how to put the things (questions) I don't know aside and take care of the ones I do know. Then I'll come back to the ones I'n

'They've already offered me a scholarship. . . He (Glaser) is pretty

confident that I'll pass.'

According Hettich, Bell is a good student and he, too, believes the senior will pass the test and be ready to suit up for the 'Cats next season. And if Bell is eligible to play in 1987, don't look for him to be redshirted.

Already one source close to the UK program has said, "He's

"Three progressions, the present distance for high school, the college line moved to the current NBA distance (23 feet) and leave the NBA line where it is," he said.

Russ Reed, E'town, who calls himself Roundball Fan Extraordinaire offered an extensive (two pages) examination of "the shot." Here are some pro and con highlights.

Pro: "Definitely has added excitement to the game. Has allowed some big men to become more active (in the offense). If the distance remains at present length, recruitment will change in favor of shooter."




Now, let's look at some of the players and what they have done this season. Here are some of the individual grades:

## High School Coach Talks Recruiting

Mac Barnes Says System Is Working

Mac Barnes, the 34-year-old head football coach at Meridian Mac Barnes, the 34-year-old head football coach at Meridian (Miss.) High School, is generally conceded to have the state's most successful prep program. Over the past nine years his teams have won 175 games, lost only 27 and tied one. Three times they have earned state championships. Some 55 of his players have signed college scholarships, over 20 of them with major schools. With national signing day scheduled for Feb. II, who better to discuss recruiting from the high school point of view than Barnes?

So, here's a question and answer session I had with Barnes.

Question: What sells a kid on going to a particular school?

Barnes: Well, I think first of all, and I used to not think this, they're looking for a chance to be on TV and a chance for exposure and a chance to possibly go on and play in the NFL. I didn't realize that at first. I used to think that was pretty farfetched. But right now you look at the number of kids in certain programs that are going into the NFL and the college coaches are selling this. Back in 1980, we had a coach from a school up North who came in and he talked to our kids about the number of kids from his school who had gone into the NFL. It elling them. "If you can play well hose." he taiked to our kids about the number of kids from his school who had gone into the NFL, telling them, "If you can play well here, your chances of going to the NFL are pretty good." I think that's a real factor. The second thing I think, are family ties or any lifestyle that child has grown up in, that a certain school has been dominant in. In other words, if his family has all gone to Ole Miss or Mississippi State or Southern, or wherever, that's a real factor in that kid choosing a school. Then I think more and more now that coaches are recruiting kids who have their occupation in mind. They're telling these kids we have "this type" school and I hear more and more of the kids talking about the school they're plann ing to major in, business for example, and when they go on cam pus they're talking to those teachers, really talking. I can still remember when Kermit (Kendrik, who plays safety for Alabama) was being recruited and the school bringing in a list of what percent of their college graduates and the average and minimum salary that they had when they graduated from the school.

Question: Almost every recruiter will tell you, in their public statements, that they always stress the opportunity for a kid to get a good education but you seemingly have listed that as third. What

Barnes: Now you asked me what the kid thought. I think that the exposure that they will get playing football is as dominant a factor as anything. I think that obviously if there is a difference in education that would be a factor. I think that's the reason, comin education that would be a factor. I think that's the reason, combined with exposure, that the kids are looking at the major colleges over the small colleges. I think you'll agree that there are a lot of small colleges that offer as good an education as the large ones, but they can't offer 50,000 or 60,000 fans, the TV and stufflike that. So I think that the education part of it to the kid, when you're talking a football scholarship, I believe that he looks by and large at his chances to be successful in playing, knowing that he's going to get a good education at whichever of the five schools he

Question: If you were a recruiter, then would you stress the point

Barnes: Yes, I would stress two primary points. The educational part of it, but I would also stress the athletic part of it because regardless of what is said, and I don't think the public realizes this, but you ask any college athlete and he will tell you that the amount of time he has to spend in athletics is phenominal.

Ouestion: Does the physical plant of a school enter in as a facor? For example, Alabama's new complex. Does that sell a kid? Barnes: No doubt! I think that's an absolute factor. I was watching SEC basketball and Joe Dean pointed out there isn't an SEC school that doesn't have a great basketball facility now. They couldn't get a basketball player to come there if they couldn't say they could play in front of 9,000 or 10,000 people. A gym that only has 4,000 people, well, you're not going to get a great player.

Question: The weight rooms, athletic dorms, all these things are

Barnes: Certainly. I tell you what. They'll even look at the uniforms. You just can't imagine. You take a kid who comes from

a poor situation at home and the chance to go eat at a great dining facility, get all the food he wants, well, it's amazing to me the in fluence it has on a high school athlete.

Question: Mac, how much cheating is going on?

Barnes: I don't know. I'm like so many other people in that you hear all these things and so forth. I'm concerned that first of all that the high school athlete hears so much about it that he's expecting it and that it's just almost to the point that the high school athlete initiate it. I don't high that the high school athlete initiates it. I don't think that there's any college coach that want to cheat. I can't say any. I'd say the vast majority of them want to to cheat. I can't say any. I'd say the vast majority of them want to stay away from it as much as possible. But there's always that case of what to do you do when you know of an alumnus offering a kid or giving a kid something. What do you do? But I'm afraid there is cheating taking place. I can't tell you how much, but it concerns me and I think it concerns the college coaches. The ones I've talked to are frustrated at the recruiting process. I can't really tell you how much of it is going on, but I believe it goes on.

Question: Has anyone ever offered to lay anything on you-either a coach or an alumnus-if you'll influence a kid to go to their

Barnes: No, and I think that's an area that I get most upset with Barries: No, and I think that's an area that I get most upset when. We've had kids who said they were going to a certain school and at the last minute they would change their mind and all over the state people would say, "Well, the rumor was that you told him to do this or that." I stay out of it. I don't have any ties to any school. I want our kids to go to a good school and I get upset when ar alumnus says Barnes didn't want him to go here or there. The only thing I do is keep my office open. If they want to talk I stress to them the importance of handling the recruiting situation. You see kids when they get into it, it's all exciting. The toughest thing I've ever seen is when a kid had three or four places he liked and not be able to those other three coaches that he was going there. I tell them this is going to be hard to tell those coaches who have become

good friends with you. You like the school but you can't give any reason except you like the other school better. They say, "Well, I'll handle that." but it is still one of the toughest things a kid has

Question: Finally, Mac, is the system working?
Barnes: By and large, yes, and I'd say the biggest flaws in it are that there are a lot of college fans who live and breath college foot-

## 'Cats Climb Into Third Place

## Davender's Heroics Spell

A month ago Alabama's stock soared to great heights in the Southeastern Conference race after a 69-55 victory over Kentucky in Rupp Arena. Prior to last Saturday, Alabama was leading the SEC with a 10-1 slate and only seven games remaining.

Already many hoop experts were conceding the regular season title to the Crimson Tide. That was before Eddie Sutton's 'Cats did an upset number on Wimp Sanderson's ballelish. Numbers is eating for the consort beging of LIK's 70-69 victory compiled.

Shallclub. Now there is a tie for the top spot because of UK's 70-69 victory, compiled with Florida's easy win against Mississippi State.

After Saturday's play both the Gators and Tide own 10-2 league marks.

Ed Davender's 28th and 29th points of the day, on a 10-foot jumper with six seconds

, enabled the Wildcats to claim a slim one-point margin. 'Bama had one last try, but Derrick McKey's 18-footer was off the mark, ending one of the year's most exciting ballgame

Kentucky, 14-6, 7-5 in league play, was led by Davender's hot hand. Despite picking up his third and four fouls early in the second half, the junior playmaker kept his cool ring the heat of the battle.

With 14:46 remaining and the count 47-44 in favor of the Tide, Davender picked up his third personal. Eighteen seconds later the UK junior was issued his fourth foul. Now Kentucky's hot hand in the first half (nine of 11 from the field, 18 points) was on the bench. His seat on the sidelines, however, wasn't occupied for very long as he checked back in minutes later.

"He (Eddie Sutton) knew I wanted to play," said Davender. "He knew that I would go through the game and not try to get my fifth foul. I think I did a pretty good job; they would try to isolate me a couple of times, go one-on-one and post me up. I just tried to work around it."

And Sutton's response?

"I felt like we had to put him back in," said the UK coach. "because at the time we were down by six or seven points. I felt like we just couldn't let them get ahead in double figures. We might not ever had a chance to catch up.

"I told him, when he went back in, 'if he had to give up a basket go ahead and give it up, but don't pick up your fifth foul"

Davender's three-point connection at the 10:33 mark pulled UK to within four, 53-49.

And it was down the stretch when he scored six of UK's final nine points, including his thrilling bucket in the final seconds.

### Down To The Wire

The wierd part about Kentucky's 14th win of the season was that the 'Cats trailed six, 69-63, with only 1:23 left to play. Wonder what was going through the Wildcats

minds?
"We knew we could (still) win because our ballclub was a bit quicker," said Richard Madison. "We pressed them fullcourt and just fought hard."

Following two free throws by Davender, making the score 69-65 with 1:09 left, Kentucky's defense was waiting for "Bama to inbound the ball. UK's Rex Chapman stole it past the midcourt line and proceeded to fire the round object to James Blackmon underneath, who laid it in while at the same time being fouled by Jim Farmer.
"Towards the end we were trying to put a lot of pressure on them," said Blackmon.
"Bey made a bin steal and I was intereath for the ball because he's a great passer.

"Rex made a big steal and I was just ready for the ball because he's a great passer. Fortunately, the ref called a foul."

Blackmon pulled his team within one, 69-68, by canning the free throw. What once seemed like a sure thing for the Crimson Tide had now developed into a white-knuckler between the two teams with only 50 seconds left.

Again, UK pressed. This time, however, Alabama's Michael Ansley, UA's worst free throw shooter (65.8 percent) among its starters this season, was sent to the line after Chapman was whistled for reaching in. With the pressure on, Ansley attempt caromed off the rim. Blackmon alertly tapped the ball to Cedric Jenkins who secured position. The scoreboard told the story—Alabama 69, UK 68; Time: 44 seconds left. Kentucky then ran off 28 seconds before calling timeout.

What was its strategy?

"Well, the opportunity was there for me," said UK's Davender. "The play was designed for Rex to clear through and if I could take my man (Terry Coner) to go ahead and take him. If not, then dish it out to Rex."

After taking a pass from Jenkins, Davender went to his left and fired up a 10-footer with Coner's outstretched hands in his face. Davender's shot comfortably swished through the twine with six seconds left.
"His defense wasn't bad," noted Davender, "there was no question about that. "I had

to alter it a little bit because I felt like McKey or Ansley would come out of nowhere and swat it. Our big guys kept them occupied and I just had the opportunity to get the

But wait! Alabama still had the chance to spoil UK's party. With five seconds left Sanderson's troops frantically signaled for a timeout.

Mark Gottfried inbounded the pass to Terry Coner, who called for another timeout at midcourt with only three ticks left.

Everyone in Memorial Coliseum knew that McKey, in all likelihood, would get the final shot. And why not. . . all he had done during the afternoon was score 20 points and snare eight rebounds, both high marks for the home team.

## Wildcat James Blackmon Continues Torrid Offensive Pace By Scoring Career-High Of 27 Points As Kentucky Holds Off Furious Auburn Rally To Post 75-71 Victory

Against Mississippi State James Blackmon had one of his finest games in a Wildcat uniform. The Marion, Ind., native scored 18 points at the offensive end and played some gritty man-to-man defense on the other end.

What could he possibly do for an encore?

Well, try this on for size—27 points, four rebounds, three steals, two assists and again, some heads up defense for 38 minutes as Kentucky outlasted visiting Auburn last Wednesday evening, 75-71.

"I'm proud of this guy," said Eddie Sutton in reference to Blackmon. "He's one of our two seniors. I was happy to see him really bust out tonight and have a great offensive ballgame. But he's been playing well in practice and that's always a good barometer."

Auburn, which trailed at halftime 46-31, made a late stab at the 'Cats and almost pulled it out in the final seconds.

Down by two with less than 10 seconds remaining, sophomore Aundrae Davis misfired on a three-pointer. Rex Chapman then dished off a pass to Blackmon who in turn laid it in as the final buzzer signaled the end of the contest.

"If they (UK) were in a zone," said Auburn's Sonny Smith, "we were going to look for the three. If it wasn't there we were going to dump it inside and try and tie the game. If they were in man (defense) we were going to go for two because we didn't think we could get the three with only one three-point shooter in the game. "What our problem was, and what helped Kentucky win, was the fact that they had fouls to give (called for only three in second half). We're trying to run wide so they wouldn't catch us and they didn't foul us."

Sutton said that the reason UK didn't foul was because he thought the officials might call an intentional infraction, thus giving Auburn two shots instead of inbounding the ball. Kentucky had a chance to almost clinch the victory with 26 seconds left. However, Ed Davender missed the front end of a one-and-one opportunity and Auburn regained possession.

possession.

Once getting past the midcourt stripe, the Tigers alertly called a timeout (16 seconds left). With UK showing a zone defense, Smith's crew went for the win instead of the tie. Its decision, though, that didn't pan out.

"We were trying to run away from the foul and score the three on the dribble," said a dejected Auburn coach afterwards. "We didn't get a good shot, but it was not executed exactly the way we wanted."

Auburn was led by Frank Ford and Mike Jones with 18 points apiece. Ford's familiar backcourt mate, Gerald White, was hobbled with an injury and didn't even dress out for the game. Johnny Lynn started in his spot and scored two points in 11 minutes of action.

Besides Blackmon's career-high effort, Rex Chapman and Richard Madison had stellar performances for the Wildcats. Chapman scored 18 points and dished out seven assists while Madison made his impact from underneath, scoring most of his 13 points on short turnaround jumpers

### **UK Builds Early Cushion But Tigers Claw Back Into Contest**

Auburn's Chris Morris broke the scoring ice by hitting one of two free throws as the

Tigers grabbed a 1-0 lead.

Auburn, needing a win to secure its strong grip on third place, found itself behind 15-5 at the 15:00 minute mark. Many 'Cats contributed to the early runout. During this spree Davender had five, Blackmon had four, and Madison and Chapman chipped in with these anglese.

But it was the Chapman-to-Davender connection, which scored UK's 14th and 15th points, AND which turned on the hometown faithfuls gathered at Rupp Arena.

While going for a loose ball near midcourt, Chapman somehow flicked the ball behind his back toward his team's goal. Davender took the 'desperation assist' and laid it in. By this time Smith had seen enough and called a timeout.

But if he only knew what was going to happen in the next few minutes.

At one point Blackmon connected on two straight three-pointers to open the gap from 19-7 to 25-8. UK's biggest lead of the night came when Rob Lock's third try was successful following a Madison miss. Lock's triple putback gave UK a 36-18 lead with 6:23 left in the half.

By the time the dust had settled at the end of the first half, Kentucky had built a comfortable 46-31 lead.

Auburn didn't waste any time in catching up. In fact, at the 13:13 mark in the second half the Tigers only trailed by four, 54-50. Ford and Moore, who were held to six and four points respectively during the first 20 minutes of play, led the AU's second-half

They combined for 13 of AU's initial 19 second-half tallies. But it was Chapman, Lock and Blackmon who got the 'Cats back on track.

Against Auburn's sticky man-to-man defense Chapman pumped some life back into the 'Cats' attack with a three-pointer (57-50). With the score 57-52, Lock rejected a Moore impact. Moore jumper. Later the 6-10 red head would tip in a Davender miss to propel UK further ahead, 61-54.

Then came Blackmon's turn

His pair of three-points bombs late in the game enabled UK to fend off its feline friends, or so it thought. After his second three of the half gave UK a 71-58 lead with 6:39 remaining, Auburn then relied on some persistent defensive pressure.

Kentucky was not out of the woods by any means. It paid off as the 'Cats were outscored in the final 6.39, 13-4. Kentucky's final two field goals came on a driving, dipsy-doodle lay-in by Chapman (4:58) and Blackmon's dunk at the buzzer. And while Kentucky was kept at bay, Auburn was catching up. The big play which changed the momentum over to the Tigers' side was when a madexchange for a loose ball resulted in a layup by Terrance Howard, making the count 73-66. Add a dunk by Howard and a three-pointer by Ford and just like that the Tigers were within an old-fashioned two-pointer.

Controlling possession and down by only two, Moore decided to try his luck at tying the game. His 10-footer, however, hit off the back of the rim. "Behind 73-71 we were exactly where we wanted to be," said Smith, "getting the ball inside to Moore. It was the dead spot in the zone but we didn't score."

Kentucky grabbed the defensive board and Davender was then fouled by Ford with 26 seconds left in the contest.

"Tm in much better shape now than I ever was in college," said former UK basketball player Bo Lanter, who can often be found wowing the ladies at a local athletic facility. "Lifting weights and running has helped me tremendously. We didn't do that much in college while I was there. That came much later

### **Big-Time Names Often Play In Pickup Games**

Many claim the pickup games at the Sports World Center, aja-

cent to the Lexington Athletic Club, involves much better competi-tion than some high school or collegiate games in the area. For example, such Kentucky basketball notables as Dwane Casey, Bret Bearup, Dicky Beal, Lanter, Charles Hurt, Derrick Hord, Roger Harden and Rick Robey have frequented the club of late, in-

Roger Harden and Rick Robey have frequented the club of late, involving themselves in a little five-on-five or four-on-four.

Their competition includes Lexington natives who played elsewhere and have returned home. Former Lexington Lafayette and Cincinnati star Junior Johnson is a member at a local club. Ex-Lafayette star Tony Wilson, who played at Western Kentucky University, along with former Transylvania University stars Andre Flynn and Larry Kopczyk and ex-Eastern Kentucky University players Johnny DeCamillis and Dexter Santos.

Some former UK players are members on an Amateur Athletics Union team sponsored by a national organization. Doug Foley, an operations manager at a local club, calls the team the best amateur squad in Kentucky. It includes Bearup, Hord, Hurt, Beal and Robey, amongst others

Even further adding to the prestige of local clubs, is the fact that both Kyle Macy, who plays profesionally with the Indianapolis Pacers, and Harden will conduct summer basketball camps at local

"It's a great place to work out," said Lanter. "If I had done this in college, there's no telling what kind of shape I'd have been in now. I didn't start working out until a couple of years ago."

Ex-football stars like receiver Rick Massie, Todd Shadowen, Ran-dy Jenkins, Mike Shutt, George Adams, Joe Federspiel and Frank Hare also pump iron at the club, and ex-baseball player Greg Meadeors is a full-time employee there. Even Rick McMackin, who practiced with the team as a walk-on last season, likes to take on the big boys at the local clubs.

And even ole blue eyes himself, UK radio announcer Ralph Hacker, is a member of a local athletic club.

"We have a pretty good University of Kentucky clientele here," said Foley, who works at one of the local clubs. "It's great that these guys like to stay in good shape. It certainly doesn't hurt our business any to have them working out here."

Beal and Massie did most of the scoring in their respective contests. Beal ran faster dribbling the basketball upcourt than I did chasing after him. And when he did stop and pump, nobody could even match

It was a good learning experience for me.

The former athletes who do play with AAU teams or in industrial leagues, whatever, see their skills erode over the years. But, two or three years out of college, they're still pretty good. It's a shame that as soon as these guys graduate everybody forgets about them. Tell me, how many people do you think would attend a pickup basketball game between some of these former players? It's like that


when you graduate. Everybody forgets about you.

The fact that Kentucky plays in one of the premier football con

ferences in the country didn't hurt either.
"I wanted to play in the SEC," said Holleran, now a redshirt freshman, who was accustomed to playing in front of crowds in excess of 10,000 in his high school days. "It's the best conference in the nation. I also felt, looking at my position of linebacker, that

I would get a better chance of playing a lot sooner.

"The academic (opportunity) was also a real big influence in my decision. My parents were real high on the CATS (Center for Academic and Tutorial Services) center. UK has one of the best

academic programs and they make you become a good student."
From the time he decided to become a Wildcat, Holleran knew
he would have to endure the customary procedure of sitting out a
season in order to redshirt. Like most UK freshman, Holleran had to adjust to not playing football for a year, but he says it will pro-

bably be to his advantage in the future.
"It was tough," Holleran said, of being out of action. "In high school, you're used to being one of the better players. Then all the sudden you have to sit out a year. Sometimes you get down on yourself, thinking you're able to play. But I think it will help me

in the long run."

In UK's wide-tackle-six defensive scheme, Holleran will be competing for playing time at linebacker, where Kentucky lost stan dout Larry Smith and Don Yarano to graduation, but returns Jeff Kremer and Chris Chenault.

"I feel I can play this year," says Holleran, who sports a crew cut hairstyle. "I think I've improved and learned a lot from last year. But it's too early to project how much time I will get. Hopefully, I can get stronger and faster in order to play so the coaches can count on me

What the UK defensive coaches see in Holleran is a linebacker with a lot of promise. At 6-foot-one and 235 pounds, he has the ability to read plays and move to the football.
"I feel I read well and fill the holes," Holleran said. "I'm not

extremely fast but I can get to the football. I think I've got a knack of knowing where the ball is pretty well. That's one of my stronger

Although Kentucky could manage only a .500 record last season, Holleran believes there is room for optimism in 1987.



Sutton Upset With Rebels' Rejection Of UK Proposal To Move Game Back One Day; Is All For Doubleheader at Indy By Nick Nicholas

Last Tuesday, prior to Kentucky's second meeting of the year with the Auburn Tigers, Eddie Sutton on hand at Wildcat Lodge for his weekly press con-ference. Here are some leftover tidbits

More and more, television networks control schedules of teams even more than do the institutions. Take Kentucky for example. Is it fair, especially to the players?

"It makes it very difficult on the players," said Sutton. "But at the same time, when you have chance to play a national game, it helps you (school) in many ways. It helps you in recruiting. It gives your fans in Washington D.C. or Los Angeles or New York City or Detroit a chance to see the Wildcats play. Plus, it puts a lot of money in the bank, which helps some of the non-revenue sports, lady sports which don't really draw that much

basketball team here at the University of Ken-tucky to do that. It's unfair to the players when they have to play back-to-back like that. I was disappointed when Mississippi wouldn't change the game to Friday and give us that

Gentlemen's agreement? Recently, the Gentlemen's agreement? Recently, the University of Kentucky, through the voice of athletics director Cliff Hagan, asked the University of Mississippi if it would reschedule its game with the 'Cats from Saturday, Feb. 28 to Friday, Feb. 27. UK requested this change because it plays Oklahoma on national TV (CBS) on Sunday

However, since Ole Miss hosts Auburn on Feb. 25 (Wed.), the Rebels felt they might be at a disadvantage, having one less day to get ready for the Wildcats.

Mississippi revoked on the idea and the

game is still scheduled for Feb. 28.

"We had a gentlemen's agreement, I thought," said Sutton. "We helped Auburn when they went to the Cotton Bowl (last season Kentucky OK'd a date change with the

Sutton said the agreement was "that anytime we could, we would move a game back so we would have a day between to help our league. I really believe that.
"We made a request to the University of

Mississippi and they rejected the request and said they didn't want to change the game."

Murphy's law: Mississippi basketball coach Ed Murphy, whose team recently improved its SEC slate to 5-5 with back-to-back wins over Tennessee, said he was thinking of his players when the Rebs declined to move their date with UK

What's your reaction, Eddie?

"I can understand his reasoning—that he has that extra day to prepare for the Wildcats," said Sutton. "(But) they could have moved their game from Wednesday back to Tuesday, which I'm not sure would have been that big of deal. They play on Saturday (at Georgia, Feb. 21) and that would give them Sunday and Monday to prepare. They

could then play the game on Tuesday (Auburn) and play us on Friday.
"They didn't like that gameplan.

"I haven't talked to anybody, 'Mr. Hagan did all the communicating." Sutton said he still would have agreed if their roles would have been reversed.

"I will always try to help anyone in that



## Keeping In Touch With In-State Talent

UK's Priority Is Landing Bluegrass Boys

Kentucky Coach Jerry Claiborne likes to recruit homegrown talent. He believes in-state players take more pride in playing for the Wildcats and has done all he could since coming to UK to keep the best Kentucky high school prospects in the state.

This year Kentucky has more Division I prospects than normal. Recruiters from all across the nation have regularly visited prospects in the Bluegrass. However, it looks like Claiborne again has succeeded in selling the in-state players



With less than one week to the national signing date Claiborne had committments from 12 of the state's prep

Two of the state's top high school football players ing back William Dishman of Lexington Bryan Station and lineman Jerry Bell of DeSales — both announced last week they would sign with Kentucky this week.

they would sign with Kentucky this week.

The 6-3, 255-pound Bell picked the Wildcats over Tennessee and Michigan. UK coaches think Bell could become a standout lineman in the Southeastern Conference.

"I just think Kentucky will be the best place for me," said Bell, an All-State defensive lineman. "I really like the program Coach (Jerry) Claiborne has at Kentucky and the things he is doing."

Bell, never, seriously, considered, Louisville, He, said.

Bell never seriously considered Louisville. He said, "Louisville was too close to home. They are also an independent and I didn't like that."

Kentucky has recruited Bell, who has a 2.5 grade-point average, since his sophomore year. He moves well for a 255-pound lineman and has excellent upper body strength. He loves contact and is an intense competitor.

Bell played tight end or fullback in goal-line situations for DeSales last year but will be a defensive tackle or guard at

State pride certainly played a role in his decision to stay in

the Bluegrass.

"If I can help Kentucky be a better team, then that's what I want to do," said Bell, who had also been recruited by Alabama and UCLA. "There's no sense in having all the good players in Kentucky leave the state. If that happens, Kentucky can never do much. The best players should stay close to home."

Obviously Dishman agreed. The 6-0, 195-pound Dishman rushed for 1,568 yards on 156 carries in 1986 and gained over 100 yards each game for Bryan Station. He rushed for almost 3,500 yards in his three-year career.

Bryan Station Coach Steve Parker thinks Dishman, who

runs the 40-yard dash in 4.6 seconds, is the best running back he has ever coached and compares him to former UK stan-dout George Adams.

"He runs a lot like George did," said Parker, a former UK gridder who has sent Marc Logan, Cornell Burbage, Dermontti Dawson and Edgar Shearer to play for Claiborne.
"He looks for the end zone every time he runs.

"He's bigger and stronger than any back I have coached. I think he is one of the top 10 running backs in the country." Georgia, Florida, Michigan State, Michigan, Louisville, Eastern, Western and Morehead all tried to recruit the

## What A Difference A Month Makes

'Cats Peaking In Time For Tounament?

A little over a month ago, when Kentucky was preparing to play Alabama for the first time, the 'Cats were riding high-a 7overall, 1-1 in league play. UK had breezed through the non-conference part of it's schedule with six wins and only one defeat. all of which was culminated Dec. 27 in Louisville when Eddie Sutton's club destroyed Denny Crum's Cards 85-51 on national

Everybody was expecting great things from Kentucky.

At the time, Sutton tried to warn everyone, tried to tell people that UK wasn't yet a Top Twenty team. He tried to impress on

everyone that his club was young and would have its ups and downs Every time Sutton's mouth flew open, it seemed, the word "incon-

"I keep saying, 'Be patient, we're gonna be up and down,' " Sutton said. "It's gonna be that type of season. We're not gonna be overpowering. I think a lot of false alarms went out after we beat Louisville like we did, and that was a fluke-to beat 'em by 34

"I think everybody got the idea, 'Well, it's gonna be a tough season.' Then we beat Louisville and everybody gets their optimism up. We're gonna be a good basketball team on given nights, but on other evenings we're not gonna play that well. I think that's already been established."

Some people, though, were slow to be persuaded. UK lost to Georgia in Freedom Hall to open the 18-game SEC slate, but then bounced back to beat highly-ranked Auburn on the Tigers' home ourt. A lot of people were talking SEC title.

Then it happened. The Wildcats' inexperience started to show.

### Cats Took Lumps Early In SEC Play. . .

The Crimson Tide rolled into Rupp Arena and handed Kentucky it's worst defeat ever (to that point) in Rupp, pounding the 'Cats by 14. UK then traveled to Knoxville, only to come back home on the short end of a seven-point loss to Tennessee. And after a pair of wins over Florida and lowly Mississippi State, the wheels came completely off the Wildcat wagon—a 35-point pasting at the hands of LSU, a team which occupied the basketball basement in the SEC at the time. Worst of all, it happened at home.

Kentucky set a lot of records that day, Jan. 18, losing a home game by the widest margin in 50 years. The 25 percent shooting mark was the lowest total ever turned in by a Kentucky team, at least since statisticians started keeping such records. The 26 tur-novers represented the most miscues Kentucky had committed in

But much more important than any trivial shooting percentage or turnover statistic, was the effort put out by the men in Blue. For the first time in recent memory, maybe ever, the Wildcats quit. Ac-tually folded up their tents and just went through the motions for

much of the second half of the contest.

"I didn't bring any of our players to the press conference today because they don't deserve to come," Sutton said after the record-setting loss. "I wish I didn't have to come and face you folks. I've setting loss. "I wish I didn't have to come and face you folks. I've coached 30 years, and this is the most embarrassing game I've ever been a part of. And I apologize to all the great fans of Kentucky for the way we played this afternoon."

But just hours after the perhaps the most humiliating loss in the 84-year history of Kentucky basketball, Sutton began to put the 'Cats back on the right track. He called a 6:30 practice, not as punishment, but in an attempt to turn things around.

### .But May Have Things Turned Around

Whatever the coach said during that practice session, it worked. Since the LSU loss, Kentucky has won five times and lost just once. During that time, the 'Cats have upended three Top Twenty teams— Navy, Auburn and Alabama—and claimed two big SEC wins on the road—at Vanderbilt and at Alabama. Once in danger of not being invited to the NCAA tournament, Kentucky is now playing its best basketball of the season. And if UK can keep third place in the conference locked up, the 'Cats should be shoo-ins for the

In addition to erasing doubts of playing in the postseason, Ken

tucky's recent streak has also squelched rumors of dissention on the squad. While UK was busy losing four of 10 games in January, talk around Lexington had the players at each other's throats. Supposedly, the team had too many chiefs and not enough Indians. Word had it that one basketball wasn't enough to go around. If that was the case, things seem to have worked themselves out. In the las the case, timigs seem to have worked tientiselves out. In the last six games, three different players—James Blackmon, Rex Chapman and Ed Davender—have led the scoring parade. Against Auburn, Kentucky placed four players in double figures in scoring, and against Alabama, the 'Cats had three men in double digits. That, more than anything, may point to the fact that Kentucky

is finally beginning to grow up and mature as a ballclub. It looks like UK is tuning up to make a run at the NCAAs.

Winston Bennett, who has been a part of two clubs that made long runs in NCAA tournament play, said this year's team is starting to display signs of being ready to make some noise.

"I think that's one of the things you have to have if you're gonna go anywhere in the NCAA tournament, you're gonna have to have that great balance," Bennett said. "And the last couple of games, we've really been fortunate to have a balanced ballclub."

Richard Madison, who is finally making himself at home under the basket, says Kentucky *thinks* it can now play with anyone, something that wasn't necessarily the case when UK hooked up with Alabama the first time

Then we were young and inconsistent," Madison said after the game in Tuscaloosa. "We were forcing a lot of shots too early and we weren't taking our time on offense. Today, we recognized a lot of things and we ran our offense. We got a lot of shots we were

The game started in controversy at the 18:07 mark in the first half, UK's Charles Hurt fouled Auburn's Charles Barkley, and the burly forward retaliated by hitting Hurt in the back, Barkley was ejected from the game while Hurt stayed in. 
