Dear Dr. Westcott,

I assure you you have quite mis-  
-understood my note - I knew perfectly well  
that Farrar & others were proceeding, or  
had proceeded, regularly to their degree: but  
what I meant, when I said that it was  
a "matter of course" for Head Masters to  
take the D. D. was this; that they take  
it, in many cases, not because of theo-  
-logical attainments or achievements, but  
because it is "expected" that they shall  
take it.

This always appeared to me slightly un-  
-worthy. Farrar, for example, would not have  
taken his D. D., probably, had he remained at  
Harrow: but he will take it now: why? His  
becoming a Head Master does not make him  
a better theologian or a better teacher of theo-  
-logy -

And that was what I meant when I  
said that I don't think Head Masters can be  
of much service to you in this matter. If Moss

or Vandy proceed to a B. D. every one will  
say "of course: their position requires  
it: it is the tradition of schools." But,  
if you can get men like L. Davis  
to proceed, then you will indeed  
have effected something: then I  
should be happy to offer myself  
as a candidate. But at present  
I don't think I should be doing  
the cause of theology any good;  
I should be spending money to no  
useful purpose; and I should  
be acting in a way rather  
conventional & therefore to me,  
just a little humiliating -
