I am extremely sorry to have delayed sending Stoyke's Appendix to Cranmer so long: but you will now find it accompanied by two or three very curious additions.

In the entire new Transcript which I send of Num. VIII. you will see several lines and words scored beneath in red ink. These are the <sup>corrections</sup> ~~alterations~~, interlineations, and additions <sup>upon the Proclamation</sup> which appear in the hand-writing of King Henry the 8<sup>th</sup> himself. ~~Whether you will be so good as to point them out by Stiles with a short note~~ Not having the complete book at hand I do not know whether Stoyke has noticed <sup>these variations</sup> himself. If he has not, ~~Stiles and a short note here would be the best way of pointing them out, should~~ ~~and the learned Delegates~~ Stiles and a short note would be sufficient to point so curious a circumstance out.

In Num. IX. you will find at least half of Bishop Fisher's letter, ~~and that a very curious one~~ <sup>singularly -</sup> ~~has been omitted~~ <sup>is</sup>: as well as the first Part of Num. XVIII. ~~has also been omitted~~: ~~by the person whom Stoyke suppl~~ <sup>and</sup> ~~with~~ <sup>at the end</sup> a very large Portion of Cardinal Pole's Instructions in 1571.
