The Council on Postsecondary Educa-tion vowed to make improvements to pro-posed Kentucky campus crime reporting regulations after hearing testimony Tues-day from the parents of a student who died in a 1998 arson fire at Murray State

University.

mitted in only very limited circumstances, to prevent a suspect from fleeing or de-stroying evidence.

The real world: Model pharmacy designed to help students prepare for the work force

Students at the College of Pharmacy will be able to gain real-world experience and never have to leave the classroom by working at the new model Rite Aid pharmacy recently donated by the Rite Aid Corporation.

The model pharmacy was dedicated Nov. 9 and is designed like a real Rite Aid pharmacy to provide students with hands-on experience in a retail pharmacy setting. The pharmacy enables the College of Pharmacy to teach prescription processing, quality control, quality improvement strategies and appropriate super-

vision of technical personnel.

Patrick Roberts, a pharmacy senior, says students are gaining valuable experience by working in the model pharmacy.

"It's great real-world experience," Roberts said. "This program is giving UK pharmacy graduates a big advantage when they go looking for a job in the pharmaceutical market and they can say that they have this experience.

Gore contests Florida certification in court



Did he really win?

Although Texas Gov. George W. Bush declared presidential victory Sun day night, Vice President Al Gore continues to fight the results.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Al Gore's lawyers contested the certification of Florida's election in court Monday, seeking an order to have him, not George W. Bush, declared winner of the state and therefore the presidency.

Servetary of State Katherine Harris and election commissioners of misconduct for disallowing votes that night have overcome Bush's 507-vote lead, Gore, speaking publicly, urged the court to look at the challenges raised in his lawsuit and "do the right thing."

But Republicans said Gore was needlessly dragging out the contest and complicating the presidential transition.

"We can't continue to hold the process up while he is in denial," said Rep. J.C. Watts, R. Colla.

Gore's challenge to the results in Palm Beach, Nassau and Mami-Dade counties was assigned to Circuit Judge N. Sanders Sauls, known for his swift action, and he held a hearing Monday afternoon.

Sauls ordered Gorés lawyers to provide the Bush team with material on its evidence and witness list within two days and gave Bush's lawyers two days to respond.

Exhibiting a folksy demeanor, he told the lawyers he understood their difficulty trying to get the case resolved before the Dec. 12 deadline for selection of electors.

UK tenure process called into question

Goring, who has taught property law at
UK since 1994, is appealing the denial.
Law students are appealing too. Students have circulated petitions and written

letters to campaign for Goring's tenure. Now law students are waiting for the appeal to filter through Chancellor Elisabeth Zinser's office. Sylvia Williams, an assistant to Zinser, said in a phone interview with the Kernel last Monday that nothing new had come up. "Professor Darlene) Goring is getting the guidance she needs, and she is pursing options available to her for further review," Williams said.

Dusing, along with other students, believes the tenure process used by the law school is flawed. Michael Kennedy, president of UK's Chapter of the American Association of University Professors, also thinks the process used to grant tenure is flawed.

The current process existing for the granting of tenure under the rules of the

law school and University starts with a re-port generated by the committee of tenure promotion, which then goes to the tenure faculty, which meets and makes a recom-mendation to the dean. Based on the faculty recommendation and report of the tenure promotion committee and the full tenure flie, the dean has the option to make a rec-ommendation to the chancellor to see if it should occur.

nie, the dean has the option to make a recommendation to the chancellor to see if it should occur. Kennedy said this current system changed from the way it used to be. He believes the existing system entalis major flaws for granting tenure and hopes these inconsistencies receive corrective measures. He also said that in the "not too distant" past, a dean disapproving of a tenure promotion was required to submit the documents about that particular person to an Academic Area Committee of faculty, as well as the chancellor for examination.

"The dean's negative recommendation counted, but he or she could not block the review process from proceeding."

Kennedy said.

Kennedy said UK administration altered the process somewhere along the way, and it became codified into University Regulations. He said he disagrees with the current process, blaming administration mostly, but also AAUP and the University Senate Council for failing to recognize the changes in the procedures.

Though unfamiliar with Goring's case, Kennedy said their organization works to the said Goring hash content to the AbUP for assistance, but he welcomes her to do so. "UK-AAUP tries to protect to protect cacdemic freedom and the tenure process for all faculty, regardless of their membership in UK-AAUP." he said.

Kennedy hopes UK-AAUP can help correct these inconsistencies, and welcomes anyone concerned to join in. "UK-AAUP creatingly supports any initiative, by students and anyone else, who want to repair the procedure."

Supreme Court accepts Bush appeal WASHINGTON — The U.S. Supreme Court stepped into the overtime struggle for the White House on Friday, agreeing to consider George W. Bush's appeal against the hand recounting of ballots in Florida. The secretary of state said she was prepared to certify the election Sunday night, regardless. Acting just as final votes were being tailled, the court ordered lawyers for Bush and Al Gore to "brief and argue" their cases next week. The court's action could mean that the closest presidential contest in 124 years will not be settled before early December, nearly a month after Americans deadlocked Nov. 7.

Cheney says condition wouldn't hinder WASHINGTON — Told by doctors his heart condition would not impair his ability to serve as vice president, Dick Cheney left the hospital Friday with a prescription for a blood thinner and advice to take the weekend off before returning to a "full, normal, active life." Cheney said he and George W. Bush talked by phone and chatted about this health, but spent a fot of time talking about Florida, "which is what we usually talk about these days." Asked whether he had given any thought to asking Bush to replace him on the GOP ticket, the 59-year-old Republican vice presidential candidate replied, "No. Not yet."

Barak, Arafat agree to security pact

Barak, Arafat agree to security pact JREUSALEM — The Israeli and Palestinian leaders spoke by phone Friday for the first time in nearly a month — with Russia's president serving as middleman. Their agreement to renew security coordination was quickly undercut, however, by deadly clashes and rocket attacks in the West Bank and Gaza Strip. Three Palestinians were killed by Israeli fire, Palestinian doctors said, and an Israeli motorist was shot and killed in a roadside ambush. In the Gaza Strip town of Khan Yunis, Palestinian gummen fired at Israeli troops from behind walls of sandbags, drawing return fire and prompting an exchange of anti-tank missiles, the army said.



Quincy Carter's future in NFL and at UGA in doubt

Quincy questioned: Quarterback is still considering leaving Georgia for the NFL despite a lackluster and injury-plagued season in Athens

ATHENS. Ga.— If Quincy Carter's thumb doesn't heal within the next two weeks, he may have played his last game at quarterback for the Georgia Bulldogs.

Georgia coach Jim Donnas asys a decision could be made in the next couple of weeks on whether or not Carter, a junior, will forgo his senior year and make himself eligible for the NFL draft in April.

That was just the start to a sub-par season for Carter. In seven games he completed 91-of-183 passes for 1,250 yards, 10 interceptions and six touchdowns.
Last year, Carter was 216-of-380 for 2,713 yards, six interceptions and 17 touchdowns. Such numbers led to discussions of him going pro early.
However, this year's statistics brought about the ire of several Georgia alumni, fans and media.
Many believe Carter, who played pro basseball for two years before errolling at Georgia, will opt to leave even though is draft status has likely dropped severely.

An increase in funding will bring \$18 million to the state for educational programs earmarked by the 2000 General Assembly. According to the Council on Postsecondary Education, \$1 million will be used specifically for adult illieracy. A program that currently serves some 50,000 people is expected to serve at least 300,000 people within the span of 10 years.

We at the Kernel feel that this is a huge step in the right direction toward increasing literacy in Kentucky. The goal the Council has undertaken is a challenge that will rean various rewards and

Literacy can be a devastating factor in family life as well as mental health and well-being. Council President Gordon Davies has high hopes and for the new plan and was quoted saying "we will have to be able to say that Kentuckians are leading better lives because of ever efforts."

The Council on Postsecondary Education is using the money in a way that is beneficial to the entire population of Kentucky. Helping others learn to read as well deferring §1.5 million for grants, GEDs, tuition discounts and tax credits will also help overcome the illiterate plague that has held Kentucky captive for so long.

Many counties will benefit from increased funding to assist with solving the multiple problems associated with illiteracy.

An example of this is seen in Filliot County.

With 6,500 people in residence, Elliot County is one of Kentucky's poorest counties and has the highest unemployment rate: 12 percent. However, the adult education program boasts 214 students, one of the state's top performers.

This plan of action has shed new light on solving the problems so often overlooked in this state. While we understand that not all problems can be solved at one time, the Kernel staff would like to congratulate the council on a job well done.

Playing a game: Napster sells soul to save self

The Napster revolution is dead. The vision of founder Shawn Fanning has been supplanted by the pontificating corporate bullshit of men like Napster CEO Hank Barry.

Faceless bureaucrats and soulless lawyers have turned a once proud and defiant company into a whimpering sellout.

I am referring, of course, to Napster's recent agreement with the European publishing conglomerate Bertelsmann AG. Bertelsmann owns BMG Records, which in turn represents a broad range of clients, including Christina Aguilera and Dave which in turn represents a broad range of clients, including and the constant of the profits will go back to the profits will go back to the profits will go back to the record companies and artists that own the copyrights, with Napster keeping any extra income. Bertelsmann has also agreed to lend Napster a substantial amount of money and, in turn, will receive an option to buy a large stake in the music-sharing service.

Napster was forced to choose between its founding principles of open and free distribution of music and its desire, as a business, to make a profit. The once

To begin with, the newly formed consortium is going to find it rather difficult to demand money for something that ing to find it rather difficult to de-mand money for something that was previously free. Napster users defend their free music with a fervor matched only by the relationship of ILR Students to their free printing, in Ives. Thirty-eight million Napster users and an entire generation of music lovers have gotten accus-tomed to not paying for music. They are not going to hand over \$20 a month so easily. Companies, Napster also has to companies, Napster also has to centralize its distribution system and store copyrighted materials on servers, which will be con-trolled by the music groups. This would eliminate the cur-rent peer-to-peer networking sys-tem, under which users down-load songs directly from other Napster users. Such an action of community between music pi-rates that accounts for so much of

the company's popularity. It will also preclude users from taking advantage of the diverse volume of MP3s that currently is available. By giving the corporate Big Five music groups — BMG, Sony, Universal, EMI and Warner Music Group — an opportunity to control the content of music programming, the availability of esoteric music will

availability of esoteric music will naturally decrease. If the Napster deal goes through, the corporate music complex will move to standardize the content, while also working to reassume control over new artists and to revive their powers of monopoly.

And finally, this deal is dependent on the shaky supposition that Bertelsmann will be able to use its position to force the other four main record labels to reach an accord as well. Without such an accord as well. Without such an apreement, Napster will be having to establish a double standard for MP3s from BMG records. In what could best be described as a technological nightmare, Napster would have to remove only BMG MP3s from illegal distribution and set up a separate service that will offer them only

to paying customers. The other companies could also set up rival sites of their own, creating anarchistic conditions, as users would be forced to pay subscriptions to numerous sites just to get music from different producers.


