Food for thought: Excerpts from The President's Chautauqua Speech

On August 14, 1936, President Franklin Delano Roose, speaking at Chautauqua, N. Y., said in part: "We are no isolationists except insofar as we seek to late ourselves completely from war."

"I have passed unnumbered hours, I shall pass unnumbered hours, thinking and planning how war may be kept from this nation."

"The Congress of the United States has given me certain authority to provide safeguards of American neutrality in case of war.

"Nevertheless—and I speak from a long experience—the effective maintenance of American neutrality depends today, as in the past, on the wisdom and determination of whoever at the moment occupy the offices of President and Secretary of State."

"I have seen war. I have seen war on land and sea. I have seen blood running from the wounded. I have seen men coughing up their gassed lungs. I have seen the dead in the mud. I have seen cities destroyed. I have seen two hundred limping, exhausted men come out of line—the survivors of a regiment of one thousand that went forward forty-eight the agony of mothers and wives."
