College Students Are Pessimistic Concerning War

College students have little hope of either a speedy end to the Korean war or of peace with Russia and the United States according to a student opinion poll taken recently by the Associated Collegiate Press.

Students across the gation were asked, "Do you think the Korean war will be over within you months?" Results of the survey were; yes-5 per cent; no-82 per cent; no opinion—10 per cent; and others—5 per cent.

In the same poll, students were also asked, "How do you fell about chances for a peaceful settlement of differences between Russia and the United States?" Answers were: chances are good—3 per cent; chances are fair—27 per cent; chances are pood—4 per cent; no chances—12 per cent; no opinion—4 per cent.


For a stronger student government, we advocate more student interest.

Library Lacks Space For Typing Facilities

"We just don't have enough room in the library for all the things we need," Dr. Lawrence S. Thompson, Girector of University Libraries, explained today in response to the question of why there is no place in the building where a student may use his own typewriter to fulful!

Dr. Thompson said there would be no way to really relieve the situation until the University receives an appropriation for the construction of a library annex behind the

"Although the request has beer made for this appropriation, it will be a long time before we can hop for the funds," Dr. Thompson said "since we are ninth on the list of

"Until that time, the library will just have to do the best it can with the space available," he said. We are practically bursting at the seams, he continued, because we have no storage space at all.

To give some idea of the pressing need for space, he said that within the next two months over 100,000 seldom used volumes will be moved from the library to storage quarters on the top floor of the Maintenance Building.

Dr. Thompson said he realized the serious need for a typing -room in the library, but that it was impossible to have one under the present conditions. But he did offer some alternatives. He said Room 411 is open to students who wish to use their typewriters, but once again

If you need to type in the library, then go to the Circulation Desk, Dr, Thompson said, and inquire about the possibilities there. If Room 114 is not available it might be possible to type in one of the cubicles located in the stacks.

A few years ago several tables were located in the foyer of the library and it was possible to type there but they were returned to the stacks. Since the return of these tables there are now 79 study desks in the book stacks.

Dr. Thompson said he realizes the inadequacy of the situation but that he is waiting for the day when and if the appropriation for the library annex comes through.


