8TH ANNUAL FALSIES AWARDS WILL HONOR ASHLEY KRUIZ

The Academy of Drag Arts and Sciences will bestow its Lifetime Achievement Award on Ashley Kruiz at the 8th annual Falsies Awards ceremony on Tuesday, April 6 at the Kentucky Theater in Lexington. The awards program spon-



sored by the Imperial Court of Kentucky traditionally attracts sellout crowds for an over-the-top evening featuring world-class entertainers and presentation of awards for Outstanding Achievement in Hair, Makeup, Costume, Dance, Dramatic Performance, Comedy, Bartending, DJ'ing and more.

Although based in Atlanta and beloved by audiences in Louisville and throughout the Southeast, Kruiz began her career performing for the Imperial Court of Kentucky, (then known as The Imperial Court of the Bluegrass Empire,) and has remained active with the organization throughout the years. Her numerous titles include Miss Kentucky America, Miss Tennessee Continental, Miss Hotlanta International, Miss Gay Orlando and Miss Gay National. She was first runner-up to Miss Gay

Hate Free Rally

On April 4th, the Coalition for Hate Free Lexington, Lexington-Fayette Urban Co. Human Rights Commission and the National Conference for Community and Justice (NCCJ) will hold a Hate Free Lexington Rally in downtown Lexington at Triangle Park from 4:30 p.m. until 6:30 p.m. This rally is commemorating the rally in November 2002 that protested the visit of Fred Phelps and is extending the concept to include all forms of hate. We want to have a large GLBT presence at this rally.

There will be entertainment including Mecca dancers, a step team, singing, speeches and more. The Hate-Free Zone Initiative will be unveiled during the rally as a next step in moving from a reactive mode to a proactive one in our community.

Posters will be distributed and pledges signed by area businesses and organizations to proudly declare their establishment as a "Hate Free Zone". These posters will help continue a broader dialogue in Lexington about ...continued on page 2



Lexington Lyons Levi/Leather Club



9 am March 16– Met at Pride Center, met several new people. Also discovered member of extended Pagan church family there; arranged to ride together for moral support.

9:30 – 10:30am – Drove to Frankfort, learned that the elevators in parking garage are numbered top to bottom, not bottom to top. No wonder things are done backwards there! Tunnel connects garage with Capitol, so at least we didn't get rained on. Went through checkpoint, provided ID. Security decided I was not an axe murderer and gave me a little yellow dot to wear. Onward through the tunnels, following our Fairness guide, till we reached the cafeteria.

10:45 – 11:15am Congregated in basement cafeteria with other rally participants, discovered mutual fandom connections (X-men, X-Files, Lord of the Rings, etc.). Felt my age when I had to explain that 'The New Mutants' was a precursor to 'Generation X' (sort of like explaining that Paul McCartney was in a band before Wings). Learned that Boom-Boom had been renamed Jubilee. Must admit I preferred Boom-Boom (I was a Welcome Back, Kotter fan).

11:15 am – Rally started. Fairness people handed out target signs and provided markers for us to add personal message. Sign did not stay on my back, eventually disappeared into crowd without me. Fairness bumper sticker on front remained due to superior monitoring.

The rally was great. I had been afraid I would wimp out and try to hide in the crowd. Instead, I thought I was wimping out because I couldn't shout or sing loud enough. Ernesto Scorsone, Martha Barnette, Katherine Goodman, and other leading lights of our community spoke.

Cynthia Cain of the Lexington UU church also spoke, flanked by several elderly people carrying the UU banner. I am often amazed at the number of seniors who are supportive. She told us of the two UU ministers in New York that have been charged with marrying same-sex couples. Gotta love those UUs! NY wants to levy all sorts of fines on them.

Wishing Chair led us in a sing-along of 'Higher Ground', followed by 'Chapel of Love'. It was lots of fun; I have enjoyed Kiya's music since I met her at UK. I wish I had brought my drum; we Pagans love a good sing-along. It was a great way to end the rally on a high note.

12:15 pm – Sent out into the Capitol with the suggestion that we speak to our senators and reps. Extended family member and I went in search of them. Unfortunately, it was the lunch hour and many of them were trying to grab something to eat before the afternoon session. They only had 8 more days to get through all the bills. Left messages scrawled in my execrable handwriting.

The only politico we were able to meet with in person was Ed Worley. He told us that 90% of the calls he received were in favor of the marriage amendment. He had to represent the will of the people, or he would be out of a job. This underlines the importance of calling in about important issues; call often, folks, especially since they have a toll-free number.

1:45 PM – Left the Capitol after getting turned around a time or two. It's a maze, folks, even with signs. Reminded me of my old Dungeons & Dragons days; I expected to be attacked by orcs (or at least giant rats) at every turn. Emerged into daylight at last, knowing I had fought the good fight. Unknown yet what treasure will be reaped.

Coming Home for Easter By Rev. Ken Waibel

Most of us have had the experience, positive or negative, of parents who tried to expose us to some form of religion. Well intentioned though they may have been, this experience is often tainted by their personal prejudices and the prejudices / misunderstandings of that religion or denomination. For us GLBT persons the "church" experience is often a very bad one, especially when that church loudly professes the "sin" of homosexuality. Religion becomes hate; Church becomes a pain and often God becomes invisible or the enemy.

It is very sad to admit that we GLBT persons are not the first victims of wellintentioned churchgoers. Over the millennia most religions seemed to choose a common enemy - a certain "immoral" person or tribe - that becomes the evil outsiders that are not welcome. For the Hebrews it was the Gentiles, for Jesus' own people it was the Romans and Samaritans. Later in history as the Christian tribe split into factions they began finger pointing at one another declaring the other to be "excommunicated" and not welcome at the table. Very "righteous" groups said that "all people were equally loved in the sight of God" and then closed the doors to Blacks and refused to allow women full participation in worship. Modern Christian denominations are certainly not the only religious groups that have chosen to exclude. Thankfully some things have changed in modern times. Sadly it seems that a new enemy has been chosen.

In this new millennium it is more important than ever for those of us who are religious minded to stand up and declare that the extreme right wing does not speak for us and that even well intentioned church leaders do not speak for all of its membership. Regardless of background or religious foundation we know our own personal holiness and dignity in the eyes of the Eternal One.

Separating ourselves from church - refusing to go at all - only furthers the misconception that we don't belong there. If our church leaders and membership see the wonderful families that we are, the great commitment of love that we are willing to make, and the depth of our Spirituality then they will come to understand the error of their ways. "Come home for Easter."

On Grieving by Kelly O'Ferrell

"Grief is a most peculiar thing; we're so helpless in the face of it. It's like a window that will simply open of its own accord. The room grows cold, and we can do nothing but shiver. But it opens a little less each time, and a little less; and one day we wonder what has become of it." Memoirs of a Geisha

By the time you read this article it will be three years since she left. I know, you can't be thinking anything I haven't thought before - "Good Lord! Get OVER it! It's been three years, for Pete's sake, let it go; move on; GET ON WITH YOUR LIFE!!" That's why I'm writing this article. Not to say that I'm not getting over it, but to say that, for me, grief has been about more than "getting over it". It's like the ocean waves that lift me up and down. When I forget to go with the flow, it's like a roller coaster that jerks me from side to side until I am gently reminded, "It's time for the ride to come in for the night and for me to get off of it until tomorrow."

I remember right after she left that some of my friends were also in shock. It made them aware that it really can happen and to be mindful of their relationships. And I saw from the inside something I had heard about - that my grief went on while their lives went on. While I sat in this house, went to work, hung out with them - even dated - I still saw their lives going on and yet, somehow, I felt stuck in this feeling, that moment, those words. Every now and then, even now, alone in my house, I find myself staring around the room remembering - things, times, her. Then, I get up and go on.

I was sitting in a room full of people who I have known now for 11 years. I don't know most of their last names or where they work, but I know some of the

most intimate details of their lives. I sat there in peace one Saturday morning. I had on the jeans I've owned forever - the ones with the hole in the knee. I remember playing with the fabric around the hole, listening to people talk. My fingers were drawing a pattern on my jeans and I began to realize something. There's a rhododendron bush in my back yard and when Tam and I moved into the house, the backyard needed some work, so we enlisted some help. In the process, the rhododendron bush ended up with a big hole right in the middle of it.

My fingers were drawing the outline of the rhododendron and I that you'd never know there'd been a big hole cut in it. Over the last three years, it's filled in. It's as if the entire bush spent the last three years helping fill in that one spot. If you look deep enough, which I have done, you can see exactly where the limbs were cut.

I knew in that moment, that my life has no more been in limbo than the rhododendron has been. I've spent the last three years filling in my life. I've kept my house and my dog Lucy happy and healthy, dated some, changed jobs a couple of times, increased my income, made new friends, stayed tight with my old ones.

I remember about a year or so after she left, I was missing - something. Unfortunately, I was also dating someone. I say "unfortunately" because it couldn't have been pleasant for the woman I was dating. We had some fun times, but the hole that was there when we met just three months after "she" left simply became all she was dating after a while. That time taught me that people in pain may not always make the best decisions. But, if we don't die as a result of a decision, we will live through it.

Anyway, I remember feeling that heaviness. I asked myself - "Kelly, what are you missing? Are you really missing her? After all this time, do you ...continued next page

want her back?" And I heard, "No, I don't want her back". And in that moment I knew that what I wanted was how I felt when I was with her. I want that comfort, love, ease, laughter, looking forward to seeing her, loving to hang out with her year after year, telling her everything, not being afraid of her anger or mine because nobody was going anywhere, laughing at ourselves, talking about hard stuff, hearing her voice on the phone, or looking up at work and seeing her unexpectedly walking towards me. I miss how I felt when I was with her. There was a rhythm to my life like the ocean tide.

It is true - grief is like a window that opens before I know it. I feel the cold air blowing across my skin and realize that I am back there again. Today, a new experience can slam a window open - like on New Year's Eve. A woman I was dating simply went for a walk with a new friend of hers and I didn't know it until I went looking for her to hang out with. Suddenly I couldn't separate her and her friend from "them". All I could hear in my body was, "I've had an affair"; all I felt was the shear agony of those first few days three years ago. It took a couple of days for me to come back fully to the present.

The window opens less and less. Sometimes I get up and close it because I do not want to feel it. Sometimes I just sit there and live my life with it open and eventually I realize that it's closed again. More often than not, I am happy and content. Grief takes time - I do not know how much. It's been three years and I still miss many things. I was driving to work this week and a disco song came on the radio and I instantly remembered our drive back from Cleveland. OH when we went to the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame. We'd bought a couple of disco CD's and had the most fun singing and dancing on the way home. And the wave washes over me.
