UK boasts of environmental progress

Targets: Mercury, hazardous waste, recycling

UK recently touted its efforts to remove mercury from its wastewater, reduce its flow of hazardous waste and recycle more of its garbage.

more of its garbage.
Three UK officials discussed
UK's efforts to reduce its negative
environmental impacts Wednesday, as part of the Division of
Emergency and Environmental
Management Conference.

"UK has come a long way in a relatively short period of time," said Woody Bottom, UK's manag-er of environmental protection.

Bottom's presentation de-tailed UK's attempts to remove mercury from the wastewater that UK discharges to Lexing-

ton's sewers.

UK's wastewater eventually reaches streams and rivers in the area, after being treated and purified by the city. Yet mercury is difficult to remove at treatment plants, making prevention important.

Mercury has been linked to serious health effects, including damage to the brain, nervous system and kidneys.

Mercury in UK's wastewater comes primarily from research

buildings like the Chem-Phys Building, the Medical Center and dental clinics, Bottom said.

UK has worked to reduce its UK has worked to reduce its of the control of the c

id waste last year, said Tom Gregory, UK's recycling coordinator.

That is about 19 million pounds of garbage, or the weight of 4,750 Ford Explorers.

UK is aiming to recycle more of the garbage it produces. Last year UK recycled 1,485 tons, 16 percent of the total waste produced. UK students recycled about 13 of those tons.

Recycling costs UK about \$2375.000 per year, Gregory said.

Harry Enoch, director of environmental heaith and safety, said UK has saved money by improving its handling of hazardous wastes.

wastes UK recycles paper, card-board, scrap metal, plastics, old appliances, batteries, paint, wood and other material. The Environmental Quality Management Center, located near

tify, combine and treat hazardous materials more effectively.

The center has helped reduce hazardous wastes by about one third, allowing UK to save \$250,000 last year.

UK's production of hazardous materials peaked in the early 99s, when it produced 272,000 pounds a year. Disposal cost \$259,000

'90s, when it pussesses year. Disposal cost \$29,000.

One fourth of UK's hazardous waste is toxic to human and animals. Enoch said.

Despite the improvements, UK still has work to do. he said.

"There are dozens of environmental issues at the University of Kentucky which need to be addressed," Enoch said.

Campus military custodian recounts his war years

"He's an institution": Vietnam, Korea vet enjoys work with ROTC

When turmoil erupted in Vietnam, he was there. Wirl Auterson, UK's military property custodian for the Army and Air Force ROTC, served in the Army during the Korean and Vietnam wars.

"You don't forget things like that," he said. "I thought it was my patriotic duty... My other brother was in the National Guard. (My brothers) told me I could never make it because I was real skinny, about 130 pounds."

But Auterson ignored their advice. "I thought I had something to prove, so I asked for infantry, I got it," he said.

Shortly after enlisting, Auterson was shipped to Korea.
"I was infantry for the first 28 months. Then in 1954, I went into supply. Logistics as they call it," he said.

"You get all the supplies that units need, from the water to the ammo to whatever they sleep in, "Auterson continued in the military after Korea and was present for duty during the Vietnam War.

But the time he spent there and his memories are kept inside.

"The first time I went to Vietnam I can't talk about because it was a classified tour," he said.

Auterson returned to Vietnam in 1969 where he stayed for a year.
He received medals for his service but remains humble about his achievements.
"I won a few, but I'd just assume not talk about it."

"The proudest thing I am of
my medals is my good conduct.
You only get one every three
years and I got one for every
three years I was there," he said.

"I thought I'd come here and finish my degree. Instead, I just decided to work."

Anti-terrorism pioneer will talk about Sept. 11

Before Sept. 11, Danny Coulson had begun the United States fight against terrorism.

Coulson, the founder and former director of the FBI's Anti-Terrorism Task Force, will speak on campus about how Sept. 11 has redirected that fight.

Despite the military effort, he said terrorism will never be completely eradicated. "We will never erase
terrorism. We even grow terrorism here in our own country...
There will always be some degree of terrorism in the world.

Since the attacks, some universities have considered tracing the attendance of their international students and the government has considered stricter immigration laws.

Coulson said it is not unreasonable for universities to keep
track of their international students, but said it is important for
the country to keep bringing internationals to learn about the
United States. "Freedom sells itself. If
they are exposed to freedom they will see
what free people can accomplish," he
said.

Still, he said immigration laws must change and there must be broader interaction between the FBI and the Immigration and Naturalization Services.
"There has to be some control over the people who come here," he said.

University Senate will correct two-year old mistake Monday

The mistake — a failure to require civil engineering students to earn C's or higher in their core courses — was dis-

their core courses — was discovered last spring.
Even though the mistake had gone unnoticed, most students knew of the require-

had gone unnoticed, most students knew of the requirement.

Most learned by speaking with other engineering students or their advisers, said Matthew Baber, a pre-civil engineering sophomore.

I think it is a fair standard, Baber said.

In addition to word-of-mouth, the requirement was printed in most materials. "(It) was listed on our Web site and in all literature distributed by the department to students on the subject of engineering standing," said George Blandford, director of undergraduate studies, a civil engi-

neering professor and Senate member.

The C grade requirement is in addition to other requirements in addition to other requirements students must meet to be accepted as students with engineering standing, the second level of admission to the College of Engineering. The first is pre-engineering. Bedie completing 45 hours of courses, they must also earn a 275 grade-point average in what are called their core courses. The proposal to be addressed by the Senate is to add the requirement that students earn a C or higher in those courses.

A professor of one of the consequence of t

a C or higher in those courses.
A professor of one of the courses said the grade requirement is reasonable.
If you could not get a C in those (classes), it would be hard to do civil engineering, said Tim P. Gorringe, a physics professor.
Gorringe said he thinks a C is necessary because civil engineering is based on mechanics, and physics is an introduction to mechanics.

32,000 prescribed antibiotics

WASHINGTON — Some 32,000 people have been prescribed antibiotics in the anthrax crisis, 5,000 of whom really needed them and thus must take the pills a full 60 days, health officials said Thursday. Medical authorities said in new guidelines that merely finding traces of anthrax clinging to surfaces does not warrant closing buildings or prescribing antibiotics.

Mortgage rates drop to 30 year low

Mortgage rates drop to 3U year low WASHINGTON — Mortgage rates dipped this week to the lowest level in 30 years of record keeping, helping to spur a further boom in mortgage refinancing. Rates for 30-year mortgages dropped to 6.45 percent, down from 6.56 percent the previous week, according to a nationwide survey released Thursday by Freddie Mac. The mortgage company said the latest decline pushed 30-year mortgages to their lowest level since it began conducting its nationwide survey in 1971. It marked the 13th consecutive week that 30-year mortgages have been under 7 percent.

Bush hesitant about smallpox vaccine

President Bush, on a visit to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta, expressed reservations about vaccinating all Americans against smallpox. The disease has been eradicated but could return in an act of bioterporism. He noted that the vaccine occasionally has fatal side effects. "I would be deeply concerned about a vaccination program that would cause people to lose their lives," said Bush, who has asked Congress for a half billion dollars to stockpile the vaccine.



However, in a couple of places, she states that the Persian Gulf War only lasted 96 hours or a few days. This isn't entirely accurate. It was almost eight months from the moment Iraq invaded Kuwait before the cease-fire was declared. The coalition began air combat operations on Jan. 16, 1991, and the U.S. Marines fought a significant battle against Iraqi troops in Saudi Arabia several weeks before the U.S.-led invasion of Kuwait and Iraq happened. The ground war lasted "only 96 hours," but I'm sure for those troops that never came back or saw their buddies hurt or killed, that time was long enough. The United States lost about 15 aircraft as well, and some of those guys and many are still flying in that hostile environment as part of the no-fly zone patrol. Lichenstein wrote a fine article, but I just wanted to make these points for those of us who are too young to remember these events clearly.

On Veteran's Day, which is Sunday, let's all think of the sacrifices made, in the past and in the present, by the men and women of our armed forces so that we may all have the freedoms and rights we take so much pleasure in exercising. And if you know someone in the military, make a point to say thanks for their service.
