


CONGRATULATIONS!

busy year traveling all over the country. Its been a real good year for me so far — and the rest should be just as good. Tell everyone hello.

Linda Kilheffer, Khanjunpur Mission, via Jaypurhat, Bogra Dist., Bangladesh

Our clinic here in Khanjunpur has been running well with local staff. We have three paramedics and two nurse-midwives besides me. A Japanese doctor comes two days a week to do small operations here, consult on difficult patients and carry on vaccination programs in villages. I get called for some interesting and difficult home deliveries sometimes, and oh how I wish Dr. Gilbert was here. Ever try to do a vacuum extraction and maintain sterile technique at the same time while the patient is lying on a mud floor? Ever tried to manage a patient with obstructed labor while the family members are giving her some medicine from a herbal doctor every half hour (and you have no idea what's in the medicine)? Ever taken a hemorrhaging patient with a retained placenta five miles by ox cart over bumpy roads (with IV running) to the hospital and then have the family refuse to let the doctor touch the patient because he's a man? These are all difficult and scary cases — I've had to rely on God because of my own incapabilities — and He has never proven less than completely reliable. I must give this testimony if I'm to talk at all about the work I'm involved in. Last month I had three breech deliveries in a row. The only other breech delivery I ever had in my life was one at FNS as a student with Dr. Gilbert standing behind me, Cindy Kauffman beside me and Carolyn Miller guiding my hands. With the base established here we decided it was time to reach out to some other villages. A village health committee was formed. Representatives of the villagers were asked what they wanted in the way of health care — they said they wanted treatment available when they were sick, in their own villages rather than having to always go to the clinic. We decided to train volunteers from different villages in preventative health, nutrition, sanitation and the treatment of basic illnesses. We provide the training, medicines at cost, and field supervision. Eight villages sent trainees. My job was translating a course into Bengali, planning lessons and teaching. It was fun and time consuming and new for me. The basic training is finished and each trainee received a certificate and their first box of basic medicines. I'm real proud of them. They've begun seeing and treating patients now. Nancy O'Donnell (a nurse who worked on med-surg) has married a medical technologist, Steve Swanson, and has come to Bangladesh. They live at a mission hospital 45 minutes from me! How exciting!


RESPIRATORY THERAPY WEEK
