Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees, University of Kentucky, Tuesday, March 16, 1971

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in regular session at 2:00 p.m. (Eastern Standard Time) on Tuesday, March 16, 1971 in Room E on the 18th floor of the Patterson Office Tower on the campus of the University with the following members present: Governor Louie B. Nunn, Mr. Jesse Alverson, Mr. Thomas Bell, former Governor Albert B. Chandler, Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mrs. Robert O. Clark, Mr. Eugene Goss, Dr. N. N. Nicholas, Mr. James H. Pence, non-voting faculty member, Dr. Robert W. Rudd, and non-voting student member, Mr. Stephen Bright. Absent from the meeting were Mrs. Rexford S. Blazer, Mr. Wendell P. Butler, Mr. Richard Cooper, Mr. George W. Griffin, Mr. J. Robert Miller, Mr. Floyd H. Wright, and non-voting faculty member, Dr. Paul Sears. Members of the administration present were: Vice Presidents Alvin L. Morris, Lewis W. Cochran, A. D. Albright, Glenwood L. Creech, Stanley Wall, Peter P. Bosomworth, and Lawrence E. Forgy; Dr. Donald B. Clapp, Budget Director; and Mr. John C. Darsie, Legal Counsel. Representatives of the various news media were also in attendance.

A. Meeting Opened

Governor Nunn, as Chairman called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. The invocation was pronounced by Mr. Clay. Mrs. Clark, serving as Temporary Secretary in the absence of Mrs. Blazer, the regular Secretary, reported a quorum present and the meeting was declared officially open for the conduct of business at 2:00 p.m.

B. Minutes Approved

On motion by Governor Chandler, seconded by Mr. Goss, and passed, the reading of the Minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with and the Minutes were approved as published.

C. Resolution Constituting Second Amendment to Series A and Series B Resolution Authorizing \$12,200,000 University of Kentucky Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A and \$4,489,000 University of Kentucky Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series B

Mr. Forgy explained that in connection with the authorized issue of \$12,200,000 of University of Kentucky Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A, due to the lapse of time in issuing such bonds, \$75,000 of same would fall due on May 1, 1971 and that due to the nearness of such date it

was inadvisable to offer such \$75,000 of bonds for sale and that the Official Statement disseminated among prospective purchasers had not offered such bonds for sale. He further stated that due to such lapse of time there would be funds available from such bond issue which could be used in connection with the construction of community college facilities in Madisonville, Kentucky, and that the resolution authorizing such bonds should be amended to specifically provide that part of the proceeds of such bond issue could be used for such purpose. Prospective bidders for such bonds had been advised that the resolution authorizing such bonds would be amended to permit this. He further stated that an interest payment would fall due on May 1, 1971 and that it would be advantageous for such bonds to not be delivered until that date with the result that it was advisable that the maturity date of April 14, 1971 of \$11,811,000 of Revenue Bond Anticipation (Renewal) Notes be extended from April 14, 1971 to May 5, 1971 by the execution of an agreement to this effect with the holder of all such Notes, Chemical Bank, New York, New York, which was agreeable to such extension, the interest rate during such extended period to be at 4 3/4%, the same rate which such Notes bear to maturity. He finally stated that due to amendments to the Internal Revenue Code and regulations and rulings thereunder since the original authorization of such bonds, it would be well to amend the resolution authorizing such bonds to provide that nothing would be done which would make such bonds arbitrage bonds within the meaning of the Internal Revenue Code and regulations and rulings thereunder,

Thereupon, Mr. Goss introduced, caused to be read and moved the immediate adoption of a resolution entitled:

A RESOLUTION Constituting a Second Amendment to and Amending as Previously Clarified and Amended "A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$12,200,000 COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDU-CATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES A, AND \$4,489,000 COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES B, OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY

AND

IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SAID BONDS, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE, JOINTLY WITH THE STATE PROPERTY AND BUILDINGS COMMISSION OF KENTUCKY, AND SUBJECT TO THE APPROVAL AND CONCURRENCE OF SAID COMMISSION, OF REVENUE BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN THE MANNER AUTHORIZED BY KRS 56.513, THE SAME TO BE PAYABLE (A) AS TO PRINCIPAL SOLELY FROM THE PROCEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES A AND B, HEREIN AUTHORIZED, WHEN SAID BONDS ARE SOLD AND DELIVERED (OR FROM THE PROCEEDS OF RENEWAL NOTES OR IN PART FROM THE SOURCE HEREIN PROVIDED THEREFOR), AND (B) AS TO INTEREST FROM THE SOURCES HEREIN PROVIDED THEREFOR; AND REQUESTING APPROVAL AND CONCURRENCE OF SAID COMMISSION,"

a true copy of which was presented to the meeting at which such resolution was proposed and a true copy of which is attached to these Minutes. The motion for the adoption of said resolution was seconded by Mr. Clay. After full discussion, the Chairman put the question, and upon call of the roll, the vote was recorded as follows:

Voting "Aye": Governor Nunn, Mr. Alverson, Mr. Bell, Mr. Chandler, Mr. Clay, Mrs. Clark, Mr. Goss. Dr. Nicholas, and Mr. Pence.

Voting "Nay": None.

D. Committee Appointments

Governor Nunn made the following committee appointments:

Finance Committee:

Mr. Albert G. Clay to replace Mr. Robert Hillenmeyer Mr. George Griffin named chairman to replace Mr. Hillenmeyer

Student Code Revision Committee:

Mr. Thomas Bell to replace Mr. Hillenmeyer Mr. Eugene Goss added to the committee

Hearing Committee:

Mr. James Pence to replace Mr. Hillenmeyer Mrs. Robert Clark added to the committee

E. Resolution Adopted on Mr. Hillenmeyer and Mr. Miller

At the request of Governor Nunn, Dr. Alvin L. Morris read resolutions expressing appreciation for the services rendered to the Board of Trustees and to the University of Kentucky by Mr. Hillenmeyer and Mr. Milner, whose terms expired December 31, 1970. Copies of the two resolutions appear at the end of the Minutes.

On motion by Mr. Bell, seconded by Dr. Nicholas, and passed, the resolution on Mr. Hillenmeyer was adopted, ordered spread upon the Minutes of the meeting and copies transmitted to Mr. Hillenmeyer. Governor Chandler moved, seconded by Mr. Pence, and passed, that the resolution on Mr. Milner be adopted, spread upon the Minutes of the meeting and copies transmitted to Mr. Milner.

F. President's Report to the Trustees

Governor Nunn explained that President Singletary was unable to attend the meeting as he was in Chicago at the meeting of the American Association for Higher Education. The Board of Trustees is proud that President Singletary is a member of the Board of Directors of this group which is the largest organization in the country of persons in the field of higher education. He said that Vice President Alvin L. Morris was representing President Singletary at the meeting.

Calling the Board's attention to PR 1, President's Report to the Trustees, Governor Nunn recommended that the Board members read the report at their leisure. He then called for a motion for acceptance of the report as submitted. The motion was made, seconded, and passed, and the report was ordered filed.

G. Recommendations of the President (PR 2)

Determining that there were no changes in PR 2, Recommendations of the President, since distribution to the Board members prior to the meeting, Governor Nunn called for a motion for approval. The motion that PR 2 be approved as a whole and made an official part of the Minutes of the meeting was made by Mr. Clay, seconded by Dr. Nicholas, and passed without dissent. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

H. Budget Revisions for 1970-71 (PR 4)

There being no questions relative to the recommended budget revisions for 1970-71 as contained in PR 4, on motion by Mr. Goss, seconded by Mrs. Clark, and passed, the budget revisions in PR 4 were authorized and approved as presented. (See PR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

I. Proposed Amendment to Section IV of the Governing Regulations (PR 5)

The next item on the agenda was a recommendation that the Board of Trustees receive for study and consideration and action in April a proposed amendment to Section IV of the Governing Regulations which would extend voting privileges to certain ex officio members of the University Senate.

On motion by Dr. Nicholas, seconded by Mr. Bell, and passed unanimously, the recommendation in PR 5 was approved. (See PR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Investment Committee Report

Governor Nunn asked if the Investment Committee wished to make a report and Mr. Clay, chairman of the committee, indicated that the committee was carrying out the Board's instructions to invest in a more careful manner and was meeting monthly. The committee, however, had nothing special to report to the Board at this time.

K. Medical Center Committee Report

Governor Chandler indicated that the Medical Center Committee had met on the morning of March 16. As a result of this meeting, he reported to the Board of Trustees that 100 students had been accepted for admission to the College of Medicine for next year and that there were 40 names on a waiting list. He said 100 was the maximum enrollment with the present facilities and that great care had been used in selecting those admitted and those placed on the waiting list from approximately 1,300 applications received. In answer to a question by Governor Nunn relative to the proportion of students admitted who received degrees, Dr. Bosomworth replied that the national average was 10 percent attrition and the average at the University of Kentucky was 3 to 4 percent.

L. Interim Financial Report Accepted (FCR 1)

Mr. Clay presented the Finance Committee report in the absence of Mr. Griffin and moved that the interim financial report covering the seven months' period ending January 31, 1971 be accepted and put to record. His motion was seconded by Mr. Goss, and passed, with all present voting "aye". (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

M. Appropriation to Cover Conversion of Electrical Distribution System (FCR 4)

Mr. Clay moved adoption of the recommendation in FCR 4 relative to the appropriation of \$1,500,000 to cover the replacement of two boilers and steam lines in the Upper Street heating plant and the conversion of the Electrical Distribution System from 4KV to 12KV. His motion was seconded by Mr. Goss, and passed. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Hearing Committee Report

Mr. Bell said the Hearing Committee had received a request from two

students, Mr. Terry Fox and Mr. Tom Bowden, for permission to appear before the Board of Trustees in order to request that the Board of Trustees "resolve and order that no allotment shall be made of University funds for the publication of any campus newspaper". On Monday, March 15, Mr. Fox and Mr. Bowden appeared before the committee and presented a written statement, copies of which were distributed to those at the Board meeting and mailed to those not present. It was the committee's decision that they be permitted to appear before the Board of Trustees and Mr. Bell so moved. His motion was seconded by Mr. Goss. Governor Chandler said it was his understanding that a committee was presently conducting a study of campus-wide student publications (the Kernel, the Kentuckian, and the Kentucky Review) and he moved to amend Mr. Bell's motion to suspend the hearing pending receipt of the committee's report. Governor Chandler's motion was seconded by Mr. Clay, and passed without dissent. Governor Nunn then called for the vote on the original motion as amended which carried by majority of those present and voting.

O. Resolution Presented by Mr. Bright

Governor Nunn recognized Mr. Bright, non-voting student member, who said he wished to put forward a resolution, a copy of which had been transmitted to the Board members in advance of the meeting and a copy of which appears at the end of the Minutes. Mr. Bright read a statement in support of the resolution. Some excerpts from the statement are included at the end of the Minutes. At the conclusion of his remarks, Mr. Bright moved adoption of his resolution. Governor Nunn called for a second to his motion. Since no second was forthcoming, Governor Nunn declared the motion dead for lack of a second.

P. Resolution Adopted on Basketball Team

Mr. Clay commended the coaches and members of the basketball team for having won the Southeastern Conference championship and moved that the Board of Trustees adopt a resolution of commendation to be delivered to them prior to the first round game against Western Kentucky University in the NCAA Mid-East Regional Tournament at Athens, Georgia. His motion was seconded by Dr. Nicholas, and without dissent it was so ordered. A copy of the resolution appears at the end of the Minutes.

Q. Resolution Accepting the Successful Bid on \$12,125,000 of University of Kentucky Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A

Thereupon, the bids which had been received for the \$12,125,000 of

University of Kentucky Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A, dated May 1, 1969, were opened, fully considered and the best bid determined. Bids were submitted by (1) Lehman Brothers Inc., Phelps, Fenn & Co., Bear, Stearns & Co., Account Managers and Associates; (2) Smith, Barney & Co. Inc., Halsey, Stuart & Co. Inc. (Joint Managers); and (3) Blyth & Co. Inc. and Associates In Association with The First Boston Corporation, Drexel Firestone Incorporated and Salmon Brothers and Associates. Copies of the said bids are attached to the Minutes.

Thereupon, Mr. Clay introduced, caused to be read and moved the immediate adoption of a resolution entitled:

A RESOLUTION ACCEPTING THE SUCCESSFUL BID ON \$12,125,000 OF UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES A,

a true copy of which was presented to the meeting at which such resolution was proposed and a true copy of which is attached to these Minutes. The motion on the adoption of said resolution was seconded by Mr. Clay. After full discussion, the Chairman put the question, and upon call of the roll, the vote was recorded as follows:

Voting "Aye": Governor Nunn, Mr. Alverson, Mr. Bell, Mr. Chandler, Mr. Clay, Mrs. Clark, Mr. Goss, Dr. Nicholas, and Mr. Pence.

Voting "Nay": None.

The Chairman then announced that the resolution had been duly adopted and was in full force and effect.

R. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business to come before the meeting, on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the meeting adjourned at 2:59 p.m.

A RESOLUTION Constituting a Second Amendment to and Amending as Previously Clarified and Amended "A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$12,200,000 COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES A, AND \$4,489,000 COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES B, OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY AND

IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SAID BONDS, AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE, JOINTLY WITH THE STATE PROPERTY AND BUILDINGS COMMISSION OF KENTUCKY, AND SUBJECT TO THE APPROVAL AND CONCURRENCE OF SAID COMMISSION, OF REVENUE BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN THE MANNER AUTHORIZED BY KRS 56.513, THE SAME TO BE PAYABLE (A) AS TO PRINCIPAL SOLELY FROM THE PROCEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDUCATIONAL BUILDING REVENUE BONDS, SERIES A AND B, HEREIN AUTHORIZED, WHEN SAID BONDS ARE SOLD AND DELIVERED (OR FROM THE PROCEEDS OF RENEWAL NOTES OR IN PART FROM THE SOURCE HEREIN PROVIDED THEREFOR; AND REQUESTING APPROVAL AND CONCURRENCE OF SAID COMMISSION."

WHEREAS, due to the passage of time events have transpired which make it advisable and for the best interests of the Board of Trustees that the Resolution adopted on May 6, 1969, the title of which was hereinbefore quoted in the title of this Resolution, as same was clarified by a resolution adopted on May 5, 1970, and same was amended by a resolution adopted on November 17, 1970, (such Resolution, as so clarified and amended, hereinafter being referred to sometimes as the Series A and Series B Resolution), be amended,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky hereby resolves as follows:

ARTICLE I.

Section 2.02 of such Series A and Series B Resolution as clarified is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 2.02. Said Series A Bonds are being issued for the purpose of paying the costs (to the extent not otherwise provided) of reconstructing,

erecting and completing one or more educational buildings with necessary appurtenances in the establishment of a Community College at or near 109 East Broadway, in Louisville, Kentucky, which is known as the Jefferson Community College, of erecting and completing one or more educational buildings with necessary appurtenances in the establishment of a Community College in or adjacent to the City of Hazard, in Perry County, Kentucky, and in the establishment of a Community College in or adjacent to the City of Maysville, in Mason County, Kentucky, of erecting and completing one or more educational buildings with necessary appurtenances in the establishment of a new Community College plant on the new campus in or adjacent to the City of Ashland, in Boyd County, Kentucky, of erecting and completing one or more educational buildings and necessary appurtenances at the existing Community Colleges in or adjacent to the City of Elizabethtown, in Hardin County, Kentucky, in or adjacent to Henderson, in Henderson County, Kentucky, in or adjacent to Prestonsburg, in Floyd County, Kentucky, in or adjacent to Hopkinsville, in Christian County, Kentucky, in or adjacent to Somerset, in Pulaski County, Kentucky, in or adjacent to Cumberland, in Harlan County, Kentucky, and in or adjacent to Madisonville, in Hopkins County, Kentucky, in erecting and completing one or more prefabricated and movable academic buildings which may be used at any Community College and which may be moved from one Community College to any other or others, and in reimbursing for funds advanced in connection with completing the educational buildings at Hopkinsville and Somerset, Kentucky. With reference to the aforesaid prefabricated and movable educational

buildings, it is covenanted that although such prefabricated and movable buildings are intended to be such as may be moved from Community College to Community College as the needs arise, nevertheless, the same, at whatsoever Community College the same may be located on a temporary basis from time to time, shall at all times continue to constitute parts of said 'Community Colleges Educational Buildings Project,' during the useful life thereof. Such Series A Bonds are also issued to pay the costs of structures, works and facilities which are necessary for the operation of the foregoing, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, those furnishing steam and chilled water directly or pursuant to a written contract with another governmental agency."

ARTICLE II.

The first literary paragraph of Section 2.15 of such Series A and Series B Resolution is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Section 2.15. The Series A Bonds, with the exception of Bonds numbered 1 through 15 in the face amount of \$75,000, maturing May 1, 1971, and the Series B Bonds shall be offered at a public sale or public sales upon sealed bids. The Secretary of the Board is hereby authorized and directed to cause an appropriate form or forms of a notice or notices of sale of such Series A Bonds and Series B Bonds to be published in The Louisville Courier-Journal, a legal newspaper published in the City of Louisville, Kentucky, which will afford state-wide notice of the sale, and in The Daily Bond Buyer, a financial journal published in the City of New York, New York, which is a publication having general circulation

among bond buyers, and said newspaper and financial journal are hereby declared to be qualified to publish such notices for the Board of Trustees within the meaning and provisions of KRS Chapter 424. Such notice or notices shall be published in said newspaper and financial journal at least once and shall appear not less than seven days nor more than twenty-one days prior to the scheduled date of sale of said Bonds. Such notice or notices shall be in the customary form and shall specify that sealed competitive proposals for the purchase of such Series A Bonds and Series B Bonds shall be received at a designated place and until some day and hour when the Board, or its Executive Committee (which is hereby expressly authorized to act in receiving, considering and accepting or rejecting purchase bids), will be in session. If any action authorized by the foregoing provisions has already been taken, same is hereby authorized, ratified and confirmed.

ARTICLE III.

There is hereby added to such Series A and Series B Resolution, in ARTICLE IV, a new Section 4.05, reading as follows:

"Section 4.05. Neither the Board nor the Trustee shall use or permit the use of the proceeds of such Series A or Series B Bonds nor any monies on deposit in any fund provided for under the Resolution or the Series A Resolution and the Series B Resolution or any fund established in connection with the Project, as to which fund they have the control of same, to be used in any manner which will cause the Bonds to become arbitrage bonds within the meaning of Section 103(d) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or any regulations (temporary or permanent) of the United States Treasury Department interpreting the same.

ARTICLE IV.

This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky recognizes and pays tribute to:

ROBERT H. HILLENMEYER

distinguished graduate of the University, loyal alumnus, and dedicated member of this Board for the past twelve years.

The Univeristy of Kentucky early recognized the talents and abilities of Mr. Hillenmeyer for he was selected as the 1943 recipient of the Sullivan Award, the greatest honor which this institution can bestow upon a graduating senior. After serving as a Captain in the United States Army in the European Theater Operation, Mr. Hillenmeyer was associated with the Connecticut Mutual Life Insurance Company in Cincinnati from 1946 until 1950, when he returned to Lexington to become a partner in Hillenmeyer Nurseries.

Originally appointed as an alumnus member of the Board of Trustees in January 1959, Mr. Hillenmeyer was reappointed for two successive terms. He served as a member of its Executive Committee from August 1961 until February 1971. Always willing to give unselfishly of his time and talents, Mr. Hillenmeyer was active on many other committees of the Board, including the Finance Committee of which he was chairman.

Because of the remarkable empathy which he had for all segments of the University community, he was particularly effective in interpreting the University to the public. In turn, his understanding and knowledge of the world outside academe enabled him to be equally adept at interpreting the public's reaction to the academic world.

Mr. Hillenmeyer was a second generation member of the Board following his father, Mr. Louis Edward Hillenmeyer, who was a member from 1924 through 1942. At the time of the elder Mr. Hillenmeyer's death in 1965, the Board passed a Resolution which said in part, "In defining a University, President McVey said first of all that it is 'a place, a spirit', and it was uniquely to higher education in this place—in Lexington, in Fayette County, in the Commonwealth—and to the spirit of the University of Kentucky that Mr. Hillenmeyer gave a life—long allegiance." What better tribute could this Board of Trustees pay to Mr. Robert Hillenmeyer than to say, "Like father, like son", for he too has given a life—long allegiance to this institution.

Now, therefore, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, recognizing the great debt which it and the institution it serves owe to Mr. Hillenmeyer, expresses its deep gratitude and thanks for his dedicated service and directs that this Resolution be spread upon the Minutes of the Board and copies transmitted to Mr. Hillenmeyer.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky meeting in regular session on Tuesday, March 16, 1971 recognizes a retiring member:

B. HUDSON MILNER

for his distinguished service on the Board during the period from January 1967 through December 1970.

A native of Louisville, graduate of Princeton University with an A.B. degree, holder of the LL.B. degree from the University of Louisville, practicing attorney from 1940 to 1957, and now president of the Louisville Gas and Electric Company, Mr. Milner brought a keen intellect and a wealth of knowledge of business and economic conditions to the deliberations of the Board of Trustees. His dual role as a member of the Board of Trustees of the University of Louisville during part of his tenure on the Board of the University of Kentucky enabled him to be of invaluable assistance during the period when negotiations were being carried on relative to a possible merger of these two institutions.

A man of proven ability in the business world, Mr. Milner contributes generously of his time and talents to the cultural and civic affairs of his community and of the Commonwealth. His presence on the Board of Trustees has been most beneficial to this institution and his sound advice and good judgment will be missed.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES

March 16, 1971

1. 120 DOCTORS RETURN HERE FOR REFRESHER COURSE

About 120 family physicians have gone back to school—some after being away from the classroom 30 to 40 years—at the Medical Center. They pursued an intensive, weeklong course to prepare for a certification exam to be given February 27-28 by the American Board of Family Practice. Those who pass the exam become specialists in family practice—a specialty created two years ago to upgrade and expand the country's dwindling number of family doctors. "It was a most enthusiastic group," said Dr. Frank Lemon, associate dean for continuing education. "After a full day's work, we told them we'd have more at night—if they wanted it," he said. "And about 85 or 90 started coming back." The doctors spent a half or full day in various fields, including surgery, cardiology, pediatrics, obstetrics and gynecology, public health, psychiatry and general medical problems. Then there were nightly "bull sessions." The medical faculty did most of the teaching, supplemented by doctors from the University of Louisville and elsewhere. Lemon estimated half the doctors were from Kentucky, the rest from Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Florida. He said some doctors didn't plan to take the two-day exam, but were here just for a general refresher course.

2. FORMER DEAN OF MEN LEAVES \$103,000 TO UNIVERSITY

University students a decade from now will benefit from a perpetual scholarship fund currently valued at \$103,000 and created by a former dean of men. Dr. T. T. Jones, who served the University for 45 years as professor and head of the Department of Ancient Languages and as dean of men, stipulated in his will that the University create the T. T. Jones Memorial Scholarship Fund for sophomore, junior and senior students. The dean was explicit in his desired use of the gift by instructing University officials not to divide the fund into scholarships until 1981. During this tenyear period, income from the trust will be added to the principal. Afterwards, the will reads, one-fourth of the income-based on its value during the 11th year-will be accumulated and added to the principal. The remaining three-fourths of the income is to be divided into scholarships. The Manchester native also requested that the scholarships be given in \$200, \$300 and \$400 sums each year, and preferably to Kentuckians from the Southeastern section of the Commonwealth.

3. SPANISH DEPARTMENT IS GROWING--A REPORT

The University rapidly is becoming a national center for graduate students in Spanish, granting more doctorates in Spanish than any other U.S. university during the 1969-70 school year. This fact was cited in the January issue of "Modern Language Journal," which pointed out that UK conferred 14 doctorates, Yale and Texas each had seven, Florida State was next with five, Illinois, Missouri and Arizona had four each, and Wisconsin, Tulane, Florida and Michigan each granted three. Approximately 70 graduate students currently are working toward higher degrees in Spanish, according to Dr. W. C. McCrary, chairman of the Department of Spanish and Italian Languages and Literatures. "A large number of young men and women who are finishing degrees at prestigious universities now want to come here as faculty members in Spanish," Dr. McCrary said. He said the department receives applications from students all over the country--not just from the South--including Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, and the far West." The annual UK Foreign Language Conference is considered the best in the country by other academicians, Dr. McCrary said. Dr. Joseph Jones, chairman of the department's library committee, said the UK Library was given "very liberal funds" to double or possibly even triple library holdings in Spanish scholarly works. He said the library is "more than adequate in all areas, though we are particularly proud of the number of books added to the rare books collection, especially the 18th century books.'

Dr. Alberta Server, an emeritus member of the department, has given a large amount of money to the library in memory of her mother. Known as the Wilson Mexicana Fund, Dr. Jones explained that "we have bought several unique early Mexican books and manuscripts with money from this fund." He also pointed to UK's Latin America program as being helpful. The department was revitalized in 1967 when Dr. John E. Keller came from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, to serve as chairman. Dr. McCrary and another professor, Dr. Daniel R. Reedy, and Dr. Joseph R. Jones and Dr. Margaret E. W. Jones, associate professors, also came with him from Chapel Hill, along with 25 graduate students. They joined Dr. Gerardo Saenz, already a member of the faculty. Since 1967, Dr. Michael Impey, a specialist in Italian and Rumanian languages and assistant professor, and instructor Peter Broad, now completing his doctorate at Johns Hopkins University, also joined the department.

4. THREE AGENCIES BENEFIT FROM BEST FUND

A fund of \$270 contributed in honor of Dr. Harry Best, emeritus professor of sociology, on the occasion of his 90th birthday in December has been donated to three agencies designated by Dr. Best. They are: the Blue Grass Association for Mental Retardation, Kentucky Society for the Prevention of Blindness, and a student emergency loan fund in the Department of Sociology, to be known as the Harry Best fund. The money was donated by friends and colleagues of Dr. Best, according to Dr. A. Lee Coleman, professor of sociology. "Dr. Best had a lifelong interest in handicapped persons and had written many books and papers concerning them," said Dr. Coleman.

5. 104TH COMMENCEMENT SET FOR MAY 8

Commencement exercises this year will differ from the 103 previous graduation ceremonies. Dr. Hubert Henderson, chairman of the commencement committee, said one major change in commencement involving the 1971 exercises will be the time. It will be held at 4 p.m. Saturday (May 8) in Memorial Coliseum. Formerly, commencement exercises were held on the Monday following exam week. Dr. Henderson pointed out that the changes were made at the expressed concern of President Otis Singletary "to make commencement more personal and meaningful." Dr. Henderson said "Dr. Singletary feels commencement should be more convenient for parents to attend. He also wanted to reduce the two-to-three-day wait for seniors who have finished examinations, but must wait until the following week to return home." The committee also recommended that the ceremony be shortened. Dr. Henderson said, "we are urging individual colleges to have separate ceremonies, where individual achievements are recognized and certificates presented to each candidate. "Because of the size of the graduating class, it is impossible to score and compile final grades for seniors in time to present the actual diplomas," Dr. Henderson explained. Graduating seniors have not been given diplomas at commencement exercises for nearly decade.

The change in the date of the exercises from Monday to Saturday also made it necessary to eliminate the traditional Baccalaureate service. "We are encouraging students to attend the local church or campus chapel which they frequented during their four years of college," Dr. Henderson said. "Breaking down the graduating class into smaller groups according to colleges and place of worship should make commencement a memorable and personal experience for both students and parents." The Coliseum exercises will include the presentation of hoods and diplomas to doctoral candidates, he noted. An additional change in the 104th commencement is that graduating seniors will not be required to pick up guest tickets. "Anyone wishing to attend graduation is welcome," Dr. Henderson said.

6. GIFT ENHANCES NEWBORN INTENSIVE CARE UNIT

A recent gift of \$1,000 will allow the Medical Center to expand its Intensive Care Nursery for high-risk newborn infants, said Dr. Peter P. Bosomworth, vice president. The gift was from the estate of Katharine McC. Winn, whose husband was a 1912 UK graduate. Designated as a memorial to her husband's parents, native Kentuckians William Winn and Caroline Hord Winn, the gift will finance special diagnostic equipment used in the care of premature and high-risk newborns. The proposed additional space in the nursery will be named the Winn Room and will expand current facilities to care for 26 infants. During 1970, specially trained nurses and a physician treated 350 premature infants and newborns with critical problems from all areas of Kentucky. "The addition of equipment and the increase in facilities is a most important advance in this critical patient care program," said Dr. Bosomworth.

7. ENGINEERS DEVELOP PORTABLE WATER PURIFICATION SYSTEM

A project being carried on by the Department of Chemical Engineering for the U.S. Army Medical Research and Development Command is aimed at removing, by flotation, a froth that contains silt and other pollutant particles in water. Washing water from the Kentucky River is an essential part of the development of a new water treatment unit. About 200 gallons of untreated water is collected from the river once or twice a week and is treated in a pilot-plant-scale unit. Dr. Robert B. Grieves, chairman of the department, explains that the untreated water is mixed with a chemical, cetyldimethylbenzylammonium chloride, the first of three steps in water purification. It is called flotation because the chemical collects particles and floats them away with the help of aeration. Most untreated water contains microscopic particles which settle as silt to the bottom of a container.

Assisting Dr. Grieves are two seniors majoring in chemical engineering, Parvin Latta, Waverly, and Jerry Bewley, Elizabethtown. Both have been selected by Dean Robert M. Drake Jr. for honors in the Dean's Scholars program. The objective is a portable model of a water purification plant that would serve an Army unit of company size. This amount of water would be sufficient to the needs of about 100 to 150 men for the purposes of drinking, cooking and medical uses, Dr. Grieves said. It would be mounted in a van, complete with pumps and electric power generated by a gasoline engine.

8. COLLEGE OF EDUCATION TO CONDUCT READING INSTITUTE

Kentucky's 20 two-year colleges will benefit from a \$30,000 grant awarded the College of Education for a Reading and Study Skills Institute for Junior College Teachers. The grant from the U.S. Office of Education will fund a four-week institute for 27 teachers May 31-June 25, at Somerset Community College, according to an announcement by U.S. Senator John Sherman Cooper. Directors of the institute are Dr. Collins Burnett, chairman of the Department of Higher and Adult Education, and Dr. Earl Rankin, professor of reading in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction. The 27 participants will be selected by the presidents of the private junior colleges and by Dr. Stanley Wall, vice president for community colleges. The participants will live in Somerset during the institute, where Dr. Roscoe Kelly, director of Somerset Community College, will be institute host.

9. TWO UNDERGRADUATES NAMED WOODROW WILSON FELLOWS

Two University seniors were among the three Kentuckians named Woodrow Wilson Fellows in late February. Dr. William S. Ward, professor of English and chairman of the Wilson committee, said the students are William H. Jansen, an anthropology student, and John S. Nelson, a student of political theory, both of Lexington. Two other seniors also were named finalists. They are Anne A. Davis, Frankfort, philosophy, and Robert C. Perry, Paducah, political science. More than 10,000 college seniors through the U.S. were nominated by their professors for the 1971-72 competition.

10. 46 KENTUCKY STATIONS FEATURE "SPOTLIGHT ON UK"

Currently, 46 radio stations throughout the Commonwealth are broadcasting a weekly radio program called "Spotlight on UK," produced by the Department of Public Relations. The program, short and fast paced, sometimes features a student or a faculty member's personal accomplishments. It may spotlight a college or a department, or talk about some interesting aspect of the University. UK also makes a regular TV appearance on Lexington's Channel 18. Subjects featured on the half-hour program have included academic freedom, the first comprehensive map of the Kingdom of Sikkim, made by a UK geographer, a program of seasonal music with the University's Collegium Musicum, and a discussion of the state of America's economy with Dean Charles Haywood of the College of Business and Economics. In addition to Channel 18, the programs usually are broadcast by the State Educational Television Network and occasionally by other stations.

11. WILL LEAVE \$20,000 TO MEDICAL CENTER

The College of Medicine has been named a beneficiary in the will of the late Virginia Duke Kelley of Lexington. The \$20,000 cash bequest was announced by Philip J. Brunskill, director of development. It will be used for research in the field of cancer. A native of Lexington, Miss Kelley was the daughter of Dr. Thomas Duke and Mary Kerr Kelley. She died December 31, 1970, at her home in Daytona Beach, Fla. Majoring in journalism, Miss Kelley graduated from the University in 1926, receiving the BA degree. A year later she was awarded the MA in education. She taught French and literature at Lexington Junior High School, serving as an educator in the Lexington school system for seven years.

12. RECEIVE \$10,000 FROM GEN'L. JACKSON ESTATE

The University has been named the recipient of a \$10,000 unrestricted bequest in memory of one of its alumni--Major General Stonewall Jackson. The memorial to her husband was detailed in the will of Dorothy F. Jackson, late of Plattsburgh, N.Y. Gen. Jackson, a native of Arlington (Carlisle county), was a member of the class of 1914. A U.S. Army career officer, Gen. Jackson was an assistant professor of military science and tactics at Cornell University, 1924-28. At the outbreak of World War II, he was named brigadier general and was assistant commander of the 88th division at Camp Gruber, Okla. In 1943, he was promoted to major general. In October of that year, he died in Camp Polk Station Hospital, La., from injuries received in a plane crash while inspecting the maneuvers of his division.

13. THE ROWLAND FAMILY IS A UNIVERSITY FAMILY

The Rowland family of Daviess county is in every sense of the word a University family. Mrs. Rachael Rowland Wallace, who recently retired as extension clothing specialist in the College of Home Economics after serving the University for over 30 years, is one of eight children—six of whom have graduated from the University. Their father was Dewitt Rowland. "Five members of my family—three of my brothers, a sister and I—graduated from the College of Agriculture," Mrs. Wallace said, "and at one time, all five were working in Extension. Someone said it must have been a record." Her brother, A. W. Rowland, is county agent for Muhlenberg county. Her uncle was Russell Hunt, who was until his death a tobacco specialist for the University. Mrs. Wallace's ties with the University go even farther, since her husband, Allen W. Wallace, is a research specialist in the Department of Agronomy.

Working mainly in the area of clothing and textiles, Mrs. Wallace noted that more technological changes have been made in textiles in the last several years than in almost the entire history of the industry. She began her career with the University as a home demonstration agent in Murray. After 15 years in Calloway county she came to Lexington, where she was in charge of training county home economics agents. Her work at the University has brought her much recognition. She was named outstanding home demonstration agent of the year while serving in Murray and most recently received the outstanding employee—alumnus award from the College of Agriculture. She also was recognized for meritorious service by Epsilon Sigma Phi, honorary fraternity for Extension employees.

14. COLLEGE OF PHARMACY FETES PREPHARMACY ADVISORS

The College of Pharmacy has launched an annual conference designed to acquaint prepharmacy advisors in colleges throughout the state with the pharmacy curriculum and the opportunities for students in the profession. Dean Joseph V. Swintosky said purposes of the conference are "not only to provide conferees with the latest changes in the pharmacy curriculum, especially the prepharmacy portion, but also to provide a means of communication by which difficulties in transferring of certain courses may be resolved to the satisfaction of the students and the schools involved." At the recent conference in Lexington, Dr. James Doluisio cussed "Opportunities in Pharmacy," and Prof. Richard Doughty talked about the "Kentucky Pharmacy Program." An informal discussion of prerequisites and equivalent courses was conducted by Dr. Howard Hopkins, assistant dean for instruction. Jerry Booher of the Admissions Office discussed admission procedures and Dr. Patrick DeLuca provided a summary of the college's recruitment efforts.

15. ADMISSIONS OFFICE PLANS OPEN HOUSE EVENTS

University officials--both administrative staff and faculty--will be calling on the people of the Commonwealth this spring. In the next few months, four open houses are scheduled across the state. Larry Dykes, associate director of admissions, said the informal sessions "provide an opportunity for all Kentuckians to meet and question University officials concerning any area of the state-supported institution." The open houses are set for the Louisville area on April 6 at the Executive Inn. Northern Kentuckians and residents of the Greater Cincinnati area may attend the April 8 open house to be held at the President Motor Inn, Ft. Mitchell. The Lexington office and Henderson Community College will co-sponsor an open house at the Student Center on March 23. All high school juniors and seniors in Henderson, Daviess, Union and Webster counties are being invited. Dykes said this is a tentative date and the exact time and place will be announced later.

16. INDUSTRIAL COAL CONFERENCE BEGINS APRIL 6

Sulfur oxide, one of the principal air pollution villains, will be examined during the tenth annual Industrial Coal Conference April 6-8, sponsored by the University in cooperation with the Kentucky and National coal associations, the National Association of Power Engines and the Kentucky Department of Mines and Minerals. The conference is for "those concerned with the efficient production and use of coal." Problems relative "to heating or power plant equipment, coal and ash-handling equipment and the economics of operations" will be discussed. Joe Creason, Louisville newspaper columnist, will be the speaker at the banquet meeting April 7. Fred Luigart Jr., president of the Kentucky Coal Association, will preside. The conference's 20-member planning committee was headed by Ted D. Haley, professor of civil engineering, and Orville W. Stewart, professor of mechanical engineering.

17. SOMERSET COLLEGE BUILDING CABLE TV TIE-IN

A special line to carry TV programs from Somerset Community College to subscribers of a local cable company will be installed soon, Ken Bean, coordinator of community services at the school, said. "Although the project is rather expensive," Shed Glass of the cable company said, "we feel that a line directly to the college's production facilities will provide a quality source of locally-originated television programs which will be relative to the needs and interests of our community." Bean said the college television studios can become a forum for the discussion of various civic problems. "We visualize programs conducted by the Chamber of Commerce, the Jaycees, and other civic clubs, as well as telecasts featuring talent from the various school systems in the area and the Somerset Area Vocational School." The college will be one of the few educational institutions with access to the local channel of cable TV operations.

18. CLOSED CIRCUIT TV PROGRAM AIMED AT LAWYERS

A closed circuit television program dealing with improvements in legal services was shown at 10 Kentucky locations last Thursday. Time and money record systems that have raised attorney income in Kentucky by 25 per cent was one of the features in the 90-minute program. Seven institutions in the Community College System telecast the program, in addition to Eastern Kentucky University, Western Kentucky University and a showing on campus at the Classroom building. Community colleges featuring the program were Ashland, Elizabethtown, Hazard, Hopkinsville, Jefferson, Paducah and Somerset.

19. OHIO VALLEY GRANT BOOSTS UKRF AWARDS

During the period February 1-28, a total of 16 agreement awards was received by the University of Kentucky Research Foundation, amounting to \$1,318,731.88. Twenty-two grants received additional funds amounting to \$101,431.07. Two grants were decreased by \$2,522.03. Total agreement awards since July 1, 1970: \$9,398,775.14.

20. SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITIES OF FACULTY AND STAFF

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

I. Annual Meeting of the Senate of the Community College System Waived for 1971-72

Recommendation: that permission be granted to the Community College System to waive during 1971-72 the requirement in Section V of the Governing Regulations which requires that the Senate of the Community College System shall meet annually in regular session at a time and place designated in a call by the Vice President--Community College System.

Background: A waiver of the annual meeting of the Senate of the Community College System for the fiscal year 1971-72 will make it possible to allocate the money ordinarily budgeted for this meeting to various colleges in the system for non-recurring expenses during the year.

II. Patent Assignment

Recommendation: that authorization be given to the proper officials of the University of Kentucky Board of Trustees to execute an assignment on behalf of the Board of Trustees to The University of Kentucky Research Foundation of the following application for Letters Patent of the United States and the invention represented thereby: George S. Hurst, Norbert Thonnard and Karl A. Schneider, Serial #865,625, filed October 13, 1969.

Background: George S. Hurst, Norbert Thonnard and Karl A. Schneider have invented certain improvements in Method of and Apparatus for Applying Recorded Exposures of Ionizing Radiation. They have assigned their rights to the invention to the University. In accord with usual practice it is recommended that the University assign the patent to The University of Kentucky Research Foundation.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SECTION IV OF GOVERNING REGULATIONS

Recommendation: that the attached proposed amendment to Section IV of the Governing Regulations of the University (May 1970) be received for study and consideration and that this amendment of Section IV be approved at the April meeting of the Board of Trustees.

Background: The University Senate at its meeting on Monday, March 8, 1971, approved a recommendation relative to the right to vote for certain ex officio members of the Senate. Under present regulations ex officio members of the University Senate enjoy all the privileges of the elected members except the right to vote. Under the new recommendation the right to vote is extended to the Vice President of Academic Affairs, the Vice President of the Medical Center, the Vice President of the Community College System, Dean of the Graduate School, Dean of Undergraduate Studies, Deans of Colleges, and Director of Libraries. The status of the other ex officio members remains unchanged.

Implementation of the Senate's recommendation, transmitted to the Board through the president with his recommendation for approval, requires an amendment of Section IV of the governing regulations. A suitable amendment to effect this change in Senate membership is proposed on the next page.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SECTION IV OF THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS

(Underlining denotes additions; brackets denote deletions)

IV. THE UNIVERSITY SENATE (University System)

The University Senate shall be composed of both elected and ex officio membership.

The elected membership shall number 177, of which 160 members shall represent the faculty and 17 members shall represent the student body.

The elected faculty membership shall consist of and represent proportionately the members of the full-time teaching and/or research faculty with the rank of assistant professor or higher in the various colleges and the University Libraries, so that the total elected membership shall equal 160. Each elected faculty member shall serve for a term of three years and shall be eligible for re-election for a second consecutive term, but ineligible for further re-election until one year has elapsed. If a faculty member of the Senate should at any time during his term become ineligible to serve (e.g., by reason of assuming an administrative title, resignation or by official leave which precludes attendance) the administrative head of the group represented shall declare a vacancy and designate that member from the eligible faculty who at the last election received the next highest vote to serve for the duration of the elected faculty member's ineligibility.

The elected student membership shall consist of and represent the members of the full-time student body in the various colleges of the University System and the Student Body President. Each college shall be allotted one student representative. Students with no declared major shall be represented through the College of Arts and Sciences. Each elected student member shall be a junior, senior, graduate or professional student, and shall not be on either academic or disciplinary probation and shall serve for a term of one year and shall be eligible for re-election as often as he remains a full-time undergraduate, graduate, or professional student in the University System. If a student should at any time become ineligible to serve (e.g., by relinquishing his position as a full-time student, being placed on academic probation, or violating the Senate attendance regulations), the administrative head of the group represented shall declare a vacancy and designate that member from the eligible student body who at the last election received the next highest vote to serve for the duration of the elected student member's ineligibility.

[The ex officio membership shall include the President, all Vice Presidents, all Deans, Director of the Libraries, the Professor of Military Science, the Professor of Air Science, the faculty members of the Board of Trustees, and the chairmen of the several standing University Senate Committees, including Senate advisory committees, if not already members of the Senate. Other ex officio members may be added by the University Senate Council for the purpose of supplying information and viewpoints on problems considered by the Senate. Ex officio members shall enjoy all the privileges of the elected membership except the right to vote.]

The ex officio voting membership shall include the Vice President for Academic Affairs, Vice President for the Medical Center, Vice President - Community College System, Dean of the Graduate School and Coordinator of Research, Dean of Undergraduate Studies, Deans of the Colleges, and the Director of Libraries.

The ex officio non-voting membership shall include the President, all other Vice Presidents, Dean of Admissions and Registrar, Dean of University Extension, Dean of Students, Professor of Military Science, Professor of Aerospace Science, the faculty members of the Board of Trustees, and the Academic Ombudsman and the chairmen of the several standing University Senate Committees, including Senate advisory committees, if not already elected members of the Senate. Other ex officio members may be added by the University Senate Council for the purpose of supplying information and viewpoints on problems considered by the Senate. Ex officio members shall enjoy all the privileges of the elected membership except the right to vote.

APPROPRIATION TO COVER CONVERSION OF ELECTRICAL DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM

Recommendation: that the Board appropriate \$1,500,000 of general obligation bonds and University funds for replacement of two boilers and steam lines in the Upper Street heating plant and for the conversion of the Electrical Distribution System from 4KV to 12KV.

Background: Two of the six boilers in the Upper Street heating plant were installed in 1936 and are worn out. This project is critical for the heating of the central campus. The estimated cost to replace these boilers and install a 16 inch steam line to the Classroom - Office Complex is \$1,000,000. Further, the replacement of the boilers would solve the major problem of air polution the University presently has. The new boilers would save the University approximately \$150,000 in operating expenses by reducing the use of the electric boilers in the Patterson Office Tower and eliminating the need to operate the Reynolds heating plant.

The electrical project relates to an agreement with the Kentucky Utilities Company to convert the Electrical System from 4KV to 12KV by December 31, 1973. This conversion would expand cur electrical capacity for program and building expansion. The cost of this project is estimated to be \$500,000.

NEWS RELEASE 16 March 1971

Partial text of Student Body President Steve Bright's remarks to the UK Board of Trustees.

Gentlemen and ladies, I put this resolution forward not so much for success—although I do hope that it is given serious consideration—but more importantly because I think it is valuable to reflect on some fundamental questions raised by this resolution. I urge you to think about them for the next couple of weeks.

Another reason I put this resolution before you is, it sets a significant precedent of the student trustee not merely responding to the business of the day, but originating and putting forward proposals as well.

An additional reason is the culmination of my experience as a student here. I feel that I am in a unique position to report to you about the student body of this University. As I have indicated to you before, I have the utmost confidence in our students.

Additionally, I feel it is important that the University live with itself. Too often, I fear, it doesn't do that.

* * *

Bernadette Devlin observed after only a few hours in Kentucky that people here are more concerned about basketball than education. Sometimes I fear that, at worst, the university helps to satisfy the thirst for professional sports; at best, it serves the purpose of manufacturing clerks, accountants and lawyers for the state.

Everyday I see stickers reminding me that "Kentucky needs Rupp Arena." Everyday I see more pressing needs which the people who display those bumper stickers are completely unaware of.

Have you been reading the series on the School of Biological Sciences in the last four issues of the Kentucky Kernel? If you haven't I strongly urge you to do so. The four articles constitute an excellent report of a regrettable situation. The articles are also an indication of the capabilities of our students. If you have read them you have noticed.

- a. That the Microbiology lab built in the 1930's--about 15 years before Memorial Coliseum was built--has not changed noticeably since then.
- b. That classrooms in the Funkhouser Building are subject to leaks every time it rains, and the basement floods.
- c. That the building's electrical capacity is not sufficient to meet the needs of modern equipment.
- d. That temperatures in excess of 100 degrees sometime result due to inadequate ventilation. This condition has on occasion resulted in animals in the building devouring each other for body moisture.
- e. That the Biology 200 laboratory has only 30 microscopes for 400 students.

Despite the concern over Rupp Arena, neither a new basketball palace nor a football stadium is needed like Library and Biology facilities, or for that matter, recreational facilities for those who play unstructured athletics for actual fun and fellowship.

I think it is important that the student be given a major participatory role in transforming Wildcat Country into a genuine academic community.

There is considerably strong rationale for providing for student participation:

Primarily, in a free society there is the belief that all those affected by a policy have an inalienable right to a voice in its formulation.

Secondly, there is a growing realization that bringing students up in a sterile world is not adequate preparation for the "real world". Giving the student some responsibility above the trivial level----and I mean giving this responsibility to every student, not three or four----would be experience which would provide the student with the most valuable kind of learning, learning by doing.

Additionally, if democracy is really as good as students are told it is since birth, maybe they should get a glimpse of it before they go to the polls and choose between interest groups.

The role of the student at the university gives him special and unique perspective and insight available to no one else.

* * *

In regard to the second provision of this resolution—a referendum on the code of student conduct—I put this suggestion forward as a reasonable method through which the Board can be held accountable for instances when it decides to enter into the realm of student behavior.

I have already repeatedly urged that the responsibility for the Code be returned to the Student Affairs Advisory Committee of the University Senate. I continue to hope that this will be done. Nevertheless, I feel it is important to adopt this resolution for any cases in the future when these matters are dealt with by the Board.

It is years past the time for the University to state honestly and straightforwardly that it is ready to abandon the outdated "in loco parentis" doctrine. It is in an insulting doctrine, which should be used only in cases in which the individuals involved do not have the mental capability of adequately taking care of themselves.

Let me make my motives here perfectly clear.

It is my heartfelt conviction that the present Student Code is illegitimate, unfair and unjust. It is drawn in consideration of political sentiment throughout the Commonwealth, not in consideration of the needs of the University of Kentucky. It exists in violation of

the inalienable right of free men and women to have a voice in matters of policy that affect them. All indications are that there is virtually no hope of it getting any better, but that is not really the issue.

I feel it is important to remove from the Code any shre d of legitimacy which it might now have.

A Student Code produced by a committee of legitimately chosen student representatives and faculty and administrative representatives, or a Code approved by a student referendum would have the legitimacy so woefully lacking in the present document.

I ask you, what possible justification is there for the Board dealing with the Code, but not other important areas such as University priorities, the curriculum, the caliber of teaching—the number of possibilities within this one category is infinite, the evaluation of students, requirements, and numerous: other issues of major importance?

Obviously, handling these problems would be a full-time job. But I am not suggesting that the Board should deal with these matters. It is more appropriate that these matters be dealt with by those who must cope with them every day—the students, faculty and administration. By the same token, it is more appropriate that the Code of Student Conduct be dealt with by the people most affected by it. Otherwise, I fear our Code will continue to be less and less relevant and appropriate to the needs and circumstances of our campus.

WHEREAS, Coach Adolph F. Rupp has been designated as Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year for the fourth year in succession, and

WHEREAS, the players and coaches through their individual skills and collective teamwork have drawn the favorable attention of millions of Americans, through the medium of television, to the Commonwealth of Kentucky and the University of Kentucky, and

WHEREAS, the team and coaches now are on the eve of a record 19th appearance in the National Collegiate Athletics Association tournament, now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the University expresses its feeling of deep pride and admiration in the team's performance to this point, and its assured confidence that the team and coaching staff will continue to reflect unbounded credit upon the University and the Commonwealth.

The Board of Trustees has, by Resolution, created its "Community College Educational Buildings Project," comprising all educational buildings now existing and hereafter erected, and appurtenances thereto, at all Community Colleges of the University which are specifically named in the Resolution and at all Community Colleges of the University which in the future, by a Series Resolution or a Supplemental Resolution, may be specifically added to and constituted a part of the Project, with the exception of housing buildings and facilities and all buildings exclusively for athletics, as distinguished from those that are, or may be, wholly or principally, for physical education, as is more specifically provided in such Resolution as clarified and amended, and has pledged the Revenues (a defined term) consisting of student registration fees imposed upon and collected from all students attending Community Colleges of the University which are parts or which may be made parts of the Project for the services furnished by such Project. The Bonds will constitute special obligations of the Board and have been authorized and will be issued pursuant to authority of Sections 162.340 et seq. and Sections 58.010 et seq. of the Kentucky Revised Statutes and the Series A and Series B Resolution as clarified and amended, duly adopted by the Board of Trustees. Such Series A Bonds will rank on a basis of parity as to security and source of payment with Series B Bonds in the face amount of \$4,489,000, which have been sold and will be delivered at or about the time of the delivery of the Series A Bonds, and with similar Series which may be issued in the future, subject to prescribed conditions and limitations, and will be additionally secured by a statutory mortgage lien upon all buildings and appurtenances thereto which are parts of the Project.

Use of the "Official Bid Form" is required. Bidders shall offer to purchase the entire \$12,125,000 of Series A Bonds at a price of not less than \$11,882,500 (98% of face amount), and may stipulate one or more interest coupon rates of their own choosing, subject to the following conditions: (1) each coupon rate shall be a multiple of 1/8 or 1/10 of 1%; (2) the difference between the highest coupon rate and the lowest coupon rate set forth in any bid shall not exceed two and one-half (2½) percentage points; (3) no more than ten (10) different coupon rates may be stipulated in any bid (but the same may be repeated); (4) only one coupon rate shall be stipulated for Bonds maturing on a single maturity date; (5) no bid shall propose more than one coupon rate for interest due on any Bond at any interest payment date; (6) no bid shall propose that any Bond bear interest otherwise than at a single rate from date to maturity nor shall supplementary coupons be permitted; and (7) no bid shall propose that any interest coupon be cancelled.

The Board of the University will furnish the executed Bonds, no-litigation certificate, and the unqualified approving legal opinion of Skaggs, Hays & Reed, Bond Counsel, Louisville, Kentucky. \$121,250 good faith deposit (certified or bank cashier's or bank treasurer's check, payable to the Treasurer of the Commonwealth of Kentucky) shall accompany each bid. Usual tax-exempt basis. Delivery will be made at the expense of the University at a bank or trust company in Chicago, Illinois, or New York, New York, within 60 days after the date of sale.

The right to reject bids and to waive informalities or irregularities deemed by the Board to be immaterial is expressly reserved.

WHEREAS, previously \$12,125,000 of University of Kentucky Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A, dated May 1, 1969, have been authorized, and

WHEREAS, a Notice of Sale of Bonds with reference to the sale of \$12,125,000 (all of such authorized issue with the exception of \$75,000 maturing on May 1, 1971) of such bonds has been duly published in The Bond Buyer, New York, New York, and in The Courier-Journal, Louisville, Kentucky, on March 5, 1971, and

WHEREAS, there has been distributed to prospective bidders for such bonds an Official Statement of the Board of Trustees relating to such bonds, and an Official Bid Form as to such bonds, and

WHEREAS, all bids received for such Series A Bonds have been opened and duly considered and are as follows:

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky hereby resolves as follows:

Section 1. That the publication of such Notice of Sale of Bonds and use of such Official Bid Form and such Official Statement are hereby authorized, ratified and approved. That the Chairman of the Board and/or President of the University are hereby authorized to indicate approval upon behalf of the Board on copies of such material, and the President and Treasurer are authorized to approve same pursuant to Section 2.15 of the Resolution authorizing the Series A and the Series B Bonds.

Section 2. That the bid of Lehman Brothers Incorporated; Phelps, Fenn & Company; Bear, Stearns & Company, Account Managers and Associates for the sale of said \$12,125,000 of Series A Bonds, dated May 1, 1969, is hereby determined to be the highest and best bid for such bonds with the lowest average net interest cost and such bid is hereby accepted, the said bid being at a price of \$11,884,808.65 for all of such bonds plus accrued interest from November 1, 1970, with interest rates as follows:

That said Series A Bonds shall bear such interest rate(s) as hereinbefore set forth and as stipulated in such successful bid, such interest to accrue from November 1, 1970.

Section 3. That said Series A Bonds shall be delivered to such purchaser by the Treasurer or other proper officials of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky in accordance with the resolution authorizing such bonds upon the

payment of the purchase price for same.

Section 4. That the certified or bank cashier's or bank treasurer's check in the sum of \$121,250 submitted with the bid of the above identified purchaser, payable to the order of Treasurer of Commonwealth of Kentucky, shall be delivered into the custody of such Treasurer and the same shall be held uncashed until the bonds have been received from the printer, have been executed, and are tendered for delivery to the purchaser. When the purchaser accepts the said bonds and makes payment therefor, together with accrued interest in conformity with the accepted bid, such Treasurer is authorized and directed to deposit said check and credit same upon the accepted bid unless at the election of the purchaser such check is returned by such Treasurer to such purchaser upon payment in full of the purchase price with accrued interest to delivery.

Section 5. That the good-faith check or checks submitted with unsuccessful bids shall immediately be returned to the respective bidders.

Section 6. That the Chairman of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized to execute upon behalf of the Board an agreement between the Board, the State Property and Buildings Commission and Chemical Bank, New York, New York, substantially in the form presented to the meeting at which this resolution was proposed, and the Secretary is hereby authorized to attest such execution and affix the seal of the Board to such instrument. The effect of such instrument is to extend the maturity of \$11,811,000 of the Revenue Bond Anticipation (Renewal) Notes issued by the Board and the State Property and Buildings Commission of Kentucky in anticipation of the issuance by the Board of its Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A and Series B, from April 14, 1971, to May 5, 1971, such Notes to bear the same rate of interest during such extended period as they bear to the stated date of maturity, namely 4 3/4% per annum.

Section 7. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into as of the first day of April, 1971, between the Board of Trustees of University of Kentucky, hereinafter referred to sometimes as University, the State Property and Buildings Commission of Kentucky, hereinafter sometimes referred to as Commission, and Chemical Bank, New York, New York, sometimes herein referred to as Bank,

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, there are now outstanding \$16,300,000 of Revenue Bond Anticipation (Renewal) Notes, hereinafter sometimes referred to as Notes, of University and Commission, such Notes numbered 1 through 162 each in the denomination of \$100,000, in the total principal amount of \$16,200,000, and such Notes numbered 163 and 164, each in the denomination of \$50,000, in the face amount of \$100,000, bearing interest at the rate of 4 3/4% per annum, being held by Bank, and

WHEREAS, all of such Notes mature on April 14, 1971, pursuant to the resolution authorizing same, adopted by University on March 10, 1970, and the issuance of which was approved by Commission on March 26, 1970, and

WHEREAS, University will have \$4,489,000 available from the sale of \$4,489,000 of its Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bond, Series B, dated May 1, 1969, on April 14, 1971, to apply on

the payment of the principal of such Notes and desires to do this, and

WHEREAS, it is desirable and for the best interests of the University and the Commission that the University's Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A, dated May 1, 1969, not be delivered until after May 1, 1971, the next maturity date for interest and principal as to such Series A Bonds, and

WHEREAS, it is desirable and for the best interests of the University and the Commission that such Notes to the extent of \$4,489,000 be paid on April 14, 1971, but that with the consent of Bank \$11,811,000 of Notes held by it be renewed for the period of twenty-one days ending on May 5, 1971, pursuant to the authority given by KRS 56.513(2), with the same interest rate as such Notes bear prior to their maturity date.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises herein contained, it is agreed by and between University, Commission and Bank as follows:

1. Bank represents that it purchased all of such \$16,300,000 Notes hereinbefore described, which were delivered to it on April 13, 1970. Bank agrees that it will continue to own and hold \$11,811,000 of such Notes until same are paid on May 5, 1971. It consents and agrees that such \$11,811,000 Notes are hereby renewed

for such period of twenty-one days from April 14, 1971, to May 5, 1971, when they are to be paid, and that Bank shall continue to have all rights with respect to such Notes during such renewal period of twenty-one days which it had from April 13, 1970, and will have until April 14, 1971, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the right to receive payment of interest only at the rate of 4 3/4% per annum for such period of twenty-one days ending on May 5, 1971.

- 2. Bank shall have no right to receive any interest during such twenty-one day period at any greater rate than 4 3/4% per annum, but if for any reason such Notes are not paid on May 5, 1971, Bank shall be entitled thereafter to receive interest on the principal amount of such Notes and upon the amount of interest due and unpaid on May 5, 1971, at the rate of 7% per annum, until the payment of such Notes in full, both principal and interest.
 - 3. Without limiting any rights of Bank to obtain payment of the interest on such \$11,811,000 of Notes for such twenty-one day period and to obtain payment of such \$11,811,000 of principal, it is agreed by University and Commission that on April 14, 1971, Bank shall be paid the interest due on that date on all of such \$16,300,000 of Notes; on that same date it shall pay \$4,489,000 face amount of such Notes from the University of Kentucky Renewal Notes Payment Account, into which University agrees to cause to be paid by such date not less than such amount from the proceeds of such Series B Bonds; on May 5,

1971, University and Commission shall pay or cause to be paid to Bank the interest on such \$11,811,000 of Notes for such period of twenty-one days at the rate of 4 3/4% per annum and the \$11,811,000 principal of such Notes from the proceeds of the Consolidated Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A, of the University or Renewal Notes of the University and the Commission issued pursuant to KRS 56,513 or from other available sources,

Upon the payment of such \$4,489,000 face amount of Notes on April 14, 1971, \$4,450,000 of such Notes shall be cancelled and delivered to University and there shall be credited the payment of \$39,000 principal on another note (by making a written notation thereon to such effect) to be retained by Bank until the balance of the principal of such note is paid on May 5, 1971, at which time upon the payment thereof and all the interest due thereon and upon the payment of the principal of the entire balance of such Notes and all the interest due thereon they shall all be cancelled and delivered to University.

- 4. University and Commission may pay or cause to be paid to Bank \$11,811,000 in payment of the principal of such Notes prior to May 5, 1971, with interest at the rate of 4 3/4% per annum to the date of such payment of principal if, but only if, such earlier date is agreeable at the time to Bank.
- 5. On or prior to April 14, 1971, Bank shall be furnished an opinion of the firm of Skaggs, Hays & Reed, bond attorneys, of Louisville, Kentucky, to the effect that this Agreement is legal

and that Bank will have the rights which such Agreement provides that it shall have upon such \$11,811,000 of Notes being renewed as provided herein.

6. Such \$11,811,000 of Notes owned and held by Bank shall continue to have the same security and sources of payment after April 14, 1971, as they have had and will have prior to and until April 14, 1971, except as otherwise specifically provided herein.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Board of Trustees of University of
Kentucky, the State Property and Buildings Commission of Kentucky and
Chemical Bank have each executed this Agreement by their respective
appropriate officers, each being duly authorized to execute this
Agreement and the execution by each officer respectively being a
certification that he is authorized to execute this Agreement upon
behalf of the party for whom he executes same,
