It is located in the heart of the rugged mountains of North Carolina. It stands at an elevation of twenty-seven hundred feet above sea level in the midst of hundreds of acres of virgin forest. Among the many things to be found upon its grounds hibrary, garage, athletic field, tennis and volley ball courts, a swimming and boating lake, miles of rhod-endron and laurel bordering trails for hiking and horseback riding. 
