

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS FOR WHICH MURAL PAINTERS ARE ELIGIBLE

A position as Supervisor of Indian Education in Mural Painting and Fine Arts, paying a salary of \$3,800 a year, and a position as Assistant Supervisor of Indian Education in Mural Painting and Fine Arts, paying \$2,300 per year, are announced by the United States Civil Service Commission. Applicants must be citizens of the United States. Social Security Building - Mural Awards. A jury consisting of Edward Biberman, Kindred McLeary, Franklin Watkins and Marguerite Zorach, after reviewing the work of 375 painters, awarded the commission to execute fresco murals for the main lobby of the Social Security Building in Washington to Ben Shahn of Hightstown, New Jersey. The jury further recommended that on account of the quality of their sketches submitted in the corridor competition, Philip Guston should be invited to submit sketches for the auditorium and Seymour Fogel to submit sketches for the Independence Avenue Lobby. A jury consisting of Ralph Stackpole, Chaim Gross and William McVey, awarded the commissions for two sculptures for the auditorium of the new Social Security Building in Washington to Robert Cronbach after examining 308 entries.
