UK and the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government teamed up this week for their annual Martin Luther King Day celebration at Heritage Hall by invitting Vivian to speak and lead a peace march through the city.

As a former top aid to King, Vivian is considered to be one of the architects of non-violent civil rights activism in America.

Before King had graduated from college, Vivian had already staged his first peaceful protest in Peoria, Ill., which led to the end of segregated seating and discrimination against blacks in public buildings in ecty.

Vivian's visit is quite timely, civic leaders say. It will come almost three months after a white police officer shot and killed 18-year-old Tony Sullivan

WORLD U.N leader may withdraw peacekeepers

SARAJEVA Bosnia-Herzegovina — U.N. Secretary-General Boutros Boutros-Ghali headed to the Bosnian capital yesterday to discuss whether to pull U.N. peackeepers out of the country. His trip came as Serb forces pressed deeper into the U.N.-declared "safe area" of Bihac, the last Muslim stronghold in northern Bosnia, which was packed with 70,000 residents and refugees.

The "absolute rock-bottom" conditions for keeping the 24,000 peackeepers in Bosnia are a nationwide truce and an end to harassment and detention of U.N. troops, said Michael Williams, a U.N. spokesman in Zagreb, Croatia.

Officials gather for AIDS summit

PARIS — Delegates from 42 nations, gathering for the first political summit on AIDS, hope to correct an imbalance that channels more than 90 percent of AIDS funding to wealthy nations that have only a fraction of the victims.







Schedule too many hours? Forget to enroll in that math class? Don't fret, Add/Drop began at 7 a.m. this morning and will continue daily until Dec. 31.

The Add/Drop procedure began early this year and Assistant Registrar Lisa Collins said this is the first time students have been able to register for class this far in advance.

Black Holes and Quantum Mechanics: Trouble on the Horizon?

The two most profound theories in modern physics are general relativity, which describes gravitation and cosmology, and quantum mechanics, which describes the behavior of matter on atomic and subatomic scales. The concepts used in these theories are very different, and it is not ent.rely clear that they are consistent. These vague difficulties become concrete and acute when one tries to construct a conscrete and acute when one tries to construct a consistient picture for the behavior of black holes, because both theories have something to say about the behavior of these weird objects, and what they say appears on the face of it to be contradictory. The essential elements of this paradox, and its proposed resolution, can be conveyed with simple pictures and words.





The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services reported that of the 38,184 AIDS deaths in 1993, more than 40,000 were "men who have sex with mien," about 22,000 were intravenous drug users and 4,600 rever gays who also use IV drugs.

Only 6,589 of the deaths were heterosexuals, and according to a footnote to that figure, many of these were heterosexuals who have sex with injected drug users, bisexuals and admirtedly infected armines.
