THE BEGINNING by Jim Christiansen

It's not easy for gay people to meet and make friends with other gays in an area as conservative and isolated as Central Kentucky. There are, however, a few paths, and one of them is through the Lexington Gay Services Organization.

I'll never forget attending my first 650 function in February of last year. It was a general business meeting, which at the time were being held at the American Orthodox Church on American Avenue. I was very nervous because although I had been out of the closet for several months I had been living at home with my family. My new job moved me from Brooklyn, New York to Danville, Kentucky. I was living on my own now in Kentucky, and this was my chance to sample gay life as I chose. (continued on page 8)

NEW YORK - Science has made a remarkably rapid advance toward understanding AIDS, raising hopes that the deadly and mysterious disease will be conquered, researchers say.

The work has become more urgent each day. It is estimated that as many as 300,000 people have been infected, and one researcher expects 40,000 new

cases in the next two years.

On Thursday, researchers at the National Cancer Institute and Massachusetts General Hospital announced that they had found an antibody that neutralized the retrovirus thought to cause AIDS--an encouraging step in the search for a vaccine.

'There has been more progress with this virus than with any other retrovirus in a short period of time," said Dr. James Curran, director of AIDS activities at the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta. (continued on page 8)





Our meeting place appeared dark and empty on my approach. "Fine," I thought to myself, "so there really are no gay people outside of New York City." At this point I was ready to turn around, but decided to continue on just to see if the door was open. What did I have to lose? I found the door unlocked and entered the forlorn structure illuminated only by a dim light coming from around a corner at the far end of the chapel. I followed the light rounding the corner and climbed a flight of stairs up one floor. There in the loft were a dozen or so people crowding around a little space-heater and talking quietly.* I looked around and they all looked at me, (a new face), and I managed to smile and say, "I guess I'm in the right

That was the beginning.

I rarely attend the business meetings anymore, but still see just about everyone from my initial meeting on a regular basis. At that meeting I learned about the various functions that GSO supports and sponsors, and over the past year I've gotten involved with a few that specifically interested me like camping and volleyball. Other GSO functions range from bridge to bowling, to brunch on Sundays. I just follow the newsletter calendar to keep up to date.

650's diverse activities reflect its diverse membership. Members include homebodies and party monsters, intellectuals and dreamers. Meeting and getting to know these different types has broadened my thinking and understanding of gay life--not just in Kentucky, but universally. Retroviruses that have been known for some time to cause cancer and other illnesses in animals, have only recently become appreciated as important causes of disease in man.

Last year, researchers at the National Cancer Institute and the Pasteur Institute in Paris reported independently that they had found retroviruses that appeared to cause acquired immune

deficiency syndrome, or AIDS. Now, Curran said, "AIDS is reasonably well understood. The virus has been discovered, and progress in understanding the mechanism of the virus and the genetic code of the virus is proceeding very rapidly."
In recent weeks, these advances have

reported:

-Scientists have found that a chemical used in many spermicide creams and gels on the market can kill the AIDS virus in the laboratory.

-Researchers have identified the exact spot where the AIDS virus latches on to certain white blood cells of the immune system, thus weakening

the body's defenses against disease.

-At least two anti-viral drugs have been found to be effective against AIDS, again based on laboratory tests. Human tests with one of the drugs, suramin, have begun, and tests with a second, ribavirin, are scheduled to begin very

-The entire complement of the AIDS virus' genes has been isolated and deciphered and can now be

produced in large quantities for study.

-A test that detects antibodies to the AIDS virus and thus can identify people exposed to the virus and screen blood for evidence of the virus will be licensed by the government for general use

in a matter of weeks or months.

That good news has been tempered, however, by ominous findings concerning the spread and nature

of the illness.

On Friday, Curran said he thought that about 300,000 people had already been infected with the virus thought to cause AIDS.

Dr. Thomas Quinn of the National Institutes of Health used a study by Curran and others to predict 40,000 cases of AIDS in the United States during

the next two years.

three-fourths Nearly of the people contracted AIDS before 1983 have died, and the number of cases in 1984 was up 74 percent over the

previous year, the CDC reported in November.
AIDS has struck 8,057 people and claimed 3,863

lives since June 1, 1981, the CDC said on Jan. 28. Researchers have also found that the AIDS virus can infect the brains of its victims, causing

progressive degeneration of the brain.

Scientists have also found subtle differences between an AIDS virus identified by Dr. Robert Gallo of the National Cancer Institute in Bethesda, Md., and his colleagues and an AIDS virus identified at the Pasteur Institute in France.



ADVICE FROM A COMPUTER

HOW CAN YOUNG GAY'S MEET The following is from the Consumer Information Service Network. The article is part of a Computer Forum, discussing Human Sexuality.

QUESTION: How do you go about meeting a lesbian close to your own age... with the same ideals for a relationship? I'm looking for someone who isn't just looking for a sexual experience, but a romantic, loving relationship. I really don't know where to even start. Is it possible to find out if someone you're attracted to is a lesbian without being rude or presumptuous? Is there any way other than going to a gay bar (which I am too young to do anyway)? I know it must sound silly for someone my age to be looking for a fulfilling relationship, but many people my age have such a relationship. Only they have it easy: they are heterosexual. Is there perhaps a support group for gay teens?

ANSWER: This question was referred to human sexuality consultant Dr. Fred Wetendarp

Dr. Westendarp answers as follows:

As you are discovering, young gays have unique problems.

Meeting gay peers is often difficult, since many gay youth are not able or willing to identify themselves as gay.

to conform to "expected" Intense pressure behaviors is applied in an almost automatic fashion by friends, family, school, and society in general.

In addition, young gays are seldom exposed to the wealth of valuable information available about

homosexuality.

Nor are they encouraged to seek positive role

models in older gays. As a consequence, many gay youth spend years in ignorance and fear, denial, loneliness and turmoil.

Times Are Changing
However, this situation is slowly changing.

More and more gay youth like yourself are finding the knowledge, courage and support necessary to experience themselves as lovable and capable people.

Here are some of the signs of change:

>> Gay youth groups now exist in many large metropolitan areas, and offer support and social opportunities.

>> Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays, a national group, now has chapters in most major cities, and offers support, encouragement and

counseling for parents and friends of gay people.

>> A multitude of church groups, representing major denomination, provide worship and healthy social opportunities for gay people.

>> Most university campuses have a chapter of the national student group, the Lesbian and Gay Academic Union.

>> Several large national periodicals provide news coverage and political awareness for gays, and their classified ads offer an opportunity to seek pen-pals or potential friends in one's own city.

>> Gay hotlines in most cities can provide information about local opportunities, such as outdoor groups. volunteer openings, rap groups, bands and choruses, and special situations.

Reaching Out

Reaching out to other people for love and support is a lifelong task faced by all people, whether gay or not.

Fear of rejection keeps many of us form reaching

Our relationship with ourselves is the key to all our other relationships, and is the place to start in our quest for relationships with others.

To the extent that you feel bad about yourself. you hide yourself form others, and thereby cripple your relationships.

How To Improve Your Relationship With Yourself Here are some suggestions for improving your relationship with yourself:

>> Keep your agreements! Both those you make with yourself, and those you make with others.
>> Be honest! At times this can be painful.

However we must speak our truth if we are to remain whole and of high integrity.

>> Keep fit! A proper diet, plenty of exercise, avoiding smoking, alcohol and drugs, and always

using your seat belt is a good place to start.

>> And if you are gay: Develop a strong and positive self image by reading about gays, socializing with self respecting gay people, seeking counseling—or whatever it takes!

In his book intitled Loving Someone Gay (Signet, 1977, p. 146), Dr. Don Clark sums up this

philosophy nicely:

"If you would find a lover (or friend), first make yourself into the kind of person you want your lover to be."

DRUG REPORTEDLY AIDING RECOVERY OF AIDS VICTIM

The following is an Associated Press article:

NEW YORK--In experimental drug that reproduction of the virus thought to cause AIDS has caused the infectious agent to nearly disappear in the blood of a young male hemophiliac, researchers said yesterday.

The patient's treatment with the drug HPA 23 was discontinued a year ago, and he is alive and well enough to return to school, said Jean Claude Chermann of the Pasteur Institute in Paris, who led

the research.

"We stopped here because we did not know how to evaluate the treatment," Chermann said. The drug is now being given to 34 people with acquired immune deficiency syndrome to help researchers evaluate it, he said.

Chermann's remarks came at a day long AIDS symposium in New York sponsored by the Scientists Institute for Public Information and the AIDS Medical Foundation.

At the symposium, Luc Montagnier, another Pasteur Institute researcher, said there were now at least two known classes of AIDS viruses.

The viruses are different enough that it might be difficult to make a single vaccine to protect

against both of them, Montagnier said. He said studies of the genetic material had finally shown that the AIDS virus isolated at the Pasteur Institute and the AIDS virus isolated about the same time at the U.S. National Cancer Institute were indeed the same virus.

Studies with the experimental French drug described by Chermann follow reports of at least two potential anti-AIDS agents identified in the

United States.

A drug called suramin has shown some ability to fight AIDS in initial tests and is now being given to AIDS patients at various hospitals in an expanded experimetal trial, officials at the National Institutes of Health say.

TV TAKING HOMOSEXUALITY OUT OF THE CLOSET

Two new network comedies have been announced that will have gay characters. NBC's comedy, "Sara", stars Geena Davis as a San Francisco Bronson Pinchot plays Dennis Kemper, another lawyer in the office who is openly gay, much to the disgust of a macho member of the firm named Marty Lang (played by Bill Maher). The two characters will be seen in conflict, but the sympathy will be with the gay character. Producer Gary David Goldberg said he would try to avoid the

danger of using Dennis for an "easy laugh." In ABC's sitcom, Patty Duke Astin plays the first woman president of the United States, a job she gets by being vice president when the president is incapacitated. "Hail to the Chief" is a bizarre comedy, according to Astin, but the gay character (one of her Secret Service quards) is treated well.

Although the viruses are essentially identical. the subtle genetic differences between them could complicate the search for a vaccine, Gallo said.

Furthermore, the interpretation of the impending AIDS antibody test will be difficult, because the test will not be 100 percent accurate, Curran said.

"The tests look quite good as diagnostic tests go," he said. But "literally thousands of laboratories must become competent in performing the test," and mistakes are quite likely, he said.

Curran thinks that a vaccine won't be developed

soon, but he is encouraged by progress toward anti-viral drugs that can fight AIDS.

"Anti-viral therapy will be at least of equal importance as a vaccine," he said, but "it's going to take more brainstorming and more drugs and more

people working on it yet."

"The availability of the antibody test has made us aware that the iceberg we've all talked about is quite large," Curran said. "The problem is indeed

a serious one."

The person I have chosen is kind, devoted to me, works hard and has a beautiful character. We can have a good life together. I am sad that you refuse to meet this splended individual. I'm sure you would like him-her. Everyone does.

You have given me more than 30 years of love and quidance. I need you more now than ever. If you should decide to lock me out of your lives, please know that I am still your child and I will always love you. -Outsider, U.S.A.

Dear Outsider: Your pain comes through loud and clear. Thousands (maybe millions) of readers will identify with you. I hope your letter does some good.

In June of 1984 the Houston City Council passed a 'gay rights' ordinance, prohibiting discrimination against homosexuals in the city's hirings, firings and promotions. In a special election, forced by residents' petitions in response to the city council decision, the ordinance was overturned with 82 percent of the voters casting ballots against the ordinance and only 18 percent voting in favor.

Houston voters also rejected a second resolution which would have added "sexual orientation" to the city's affirmative-action list, by the same 82 to 18 percent margin. Opponents of the two resolutions included the Houston Chamber of Commerce, the Ku Klux Klan and a coalition of black

ministers.

City council member John Goodner, leader of the opposition, said the vote was "a clear signal that the gay community is going to have to observe some restrictions in their activities if they want to live in peaceful coexistence with their neighbors."

Mayor Kathy Whitmire, the most vocal supporter of the ordinance said she felt the voters were misled into believing that the election was a referendum on homosexual lifestyles and gay political power, and that she was disappointed by the election's results. "I continue to be convinced that the majority of the people in Houston do not believe in discrimination," she said, and added that her administration would "still certainly make it our practice to be fair."
