#### Is That Blue Cap A Sign Of Martyrdom?

A Sign Of Martyrdom?

The following letter was received yesterday from Douglas Smith, editor of The Arkansas Praweler, University of Arkansas publication:

"I have just been reading a recent issue of your paper containing a discussion of the freshman cap problem, and it occurred to me that you might be interested in knowing what happened to that practice here.

"Arkansas was for many years notorious for its hazing, and a story of one of our fraternity initiations made Esquire only two or three years ago. Not only were freshmen required to belabor freshmen with boards for any violation of the many freshman rules.' As usual, the so-called tradition became dominated by the

so-called tradition became dominated by the tough guys.

"Widespread resentment, together with what I like to think was a more intelligent student body, created passive resistance among the freshmen which grew rapidly. Two years ago the freshmen which grew rapidly. Two years ago the freshmen like, the nature of which I leave to your imagination, was voted down and the numer of green caps at that time amounted to less than a hundred. This year there has been no hazing of freshmen whatever. In addition, the editorial policy of the paper has been nowald complete abolition of hazing including that in fractricties as well as in so-called pep groups. We have made a great deal of progress.
"I am informed that hazing has practically become a thing of the past in the entire Southwest except, of course, in the fresh water colleges."

seems that there should be some discussion of

students before that time.

personal opinions of The Kersel editor:

"On the University of Kentucky campus, there 
has also been a marked decrease in hazing within 
the last few years, but we can't agree that the 
practice of wearing freshman caps comes under 
the category of hazing. Particularly is that true 
on this campus where there is no 'discipline 
committee' which enforces freshman rules with 
a board.

committee which enforces freshman rules with a board.

"Hazing necessarily implies harshness, and we can't see that a freshman cap works any hardships on the wearer, especially when the rule is enforced by student sentiment rather than so-called tough guys. If the rule is allowed to continue, and it does not have the support of a majority of the students, then it will fall into the hands of these toughtes and the result will be a martyred complex among the freshmen.

"If, on the other hand, the majority of students feel as I do, that the freshman cap establishes a kind of common bond between the lower-classmen, that it creates and furthers a certain amount of school spirit resulting from the friend-day rivalry, that it is something to keep and prize as one would his high school diploma, then a discipline committee would be as useless as it would be harmful. Perhaps this is mere dribble or rank sentimentality—either of which is pretty much in disrepute at the present time—but we still think a certain amount is necessary for a well-rounded student."


