ActOut Play

Rebecca Basham, a Kentucky native, received the Michael Kanin National Student Play Writing Award for her play, Lot's Daughters. The play is a three act drama, described by its creator as "a drama about acceptance and love".

ActOut is proud to present this play, opening in January at the Lex Arts Center in downtown Lexington, across from the Central Library. Marcus Roland will be making his directing debut with this production; he has previously stared in three ActOut plays.

The play takes place in Appalachia in 1944. Waincey Cobb joins the Navy and worried about leaving his sister, Gertie, alone in the hills. He marries Susannah Hicks in part to provide company for Gertie. While he is in Korea, Gertie and Susannah fall in love.

"Gertie experiences the harshest realities of life and love in a backwoods community where right and wrong, sinfulness and righteousness are rigidly defined by the community's church and preacher", says Basham.

"Trapped by the ignorance and prejudice of her own community, as well as her own uncertainties about life, Gertie faces love, treachery and heartbreak on her journey towards adulthood."

Performances will be on Fridays 1/5/07 and 1/12/07 at 8 PM, and on Saturdays 1/6/07 and 1/13/07 at 2 PM and 8 PM. Tickets can be purchased at the LexArts box office. Student and senior tickets are \$12 and general admission is \$18.

Midwest Bisexual Lesbian Gay Transgender Ally College Conference Feb 16 - 18, 2007

University of Minnesota

The University of Minnesota Queer Student Cultural Center and GLBTA Programs Office will host the Midwest Bisexual Lesbian Gay Transgender Ally (GLBTA) College Conference that starts on Friday, Feb. 16, and goes through Sunday, Feb. 18. The conference will include keynote addresses by GLBTA activists and artists, along with workshops focused on a variety of GLBTA-related issues. Comedian Margaret Cho will headline conference entertainment. Registration is \$50. and ist due by Friday, January 19.

The Conference, also known as "Alphabet Soup 2007", is the largest regional gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender and ally college conference in the nation. This is the first year that the University of Minnesota, Twin Cities, has hosted the event. The annual conference promotes leadership, activism, networking, diversity, health, empowerment, and even entertainment and laughter, among gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, and allied students, staff, and faculty from across the United States and Canada.

Organizers use the term "alphabet soup communities" to describe the diverse population of people who will attend the conference. The focus will be on issues and experiences people face rather than labels. About 1,500 people are expected to attend the conference, now in its 15th year.


Audience members are invited to sing their favorite songs; bring your own or use one of the songs on the CDs we have there. Friends and other audience members will be encouraged to tip.

Q: What is the Kentucky Fairness Alliance doing in preparation for the coming legislative season?

A: KFA has already carefully studied the prefiled bills, begun to anticipate bills that legislators are sure to file, and created strategy.

Q: What bills are on the plate for this legislative season?

So far, the most detrimental one is Stan Lee's Ban on Equal Healthcare. Titled BR 102, the bill seeks to prohibit institutions of higher education from offering domestic partner benefits to its employees. On the other hand, KFA is supporting Mike Cherry's School Bullying Bill. BR 326 provides a path to stop bullying in school. This bill is of particular interest as teenagers within the LBTG community frequently suffer from prolonged, undue bullying. As of this moment, neither a Statewide Fairness Bill nor an Anti-Fairness bill has been filed; however, KFA expects different legislators will file both by early February. Another bill that KFA hopes to see come to light is the Designated Visitor bill, which allows any hospital patient over the age of 18 to create a list of people who are to be treated as blood relations and allowed entrance.

Q: What strategy is KFA employing this year?

A: The answer is quite simple: lobbying. KFA has already been in contact with profairness legislators, but beyond those communications, KFA is planning a huge rally. The rally will take place February 22nd in Frankfort. People will convene at 8 a.m. to start lobbying face-to-face with legislators. Later, KFA has reserved the rotunda for a full-scale rally between 1 and 2 p.m. KFA hopes to attract between 200 and 500 people to the rotunda that day.

Q: How can the average person who has never lobbied before get involved?

A: Another simple answer: Go to Frankfort February 22nd. Lobbying is not just for the

rich, educated individual. It is for every concerned citizen. One must never forget that a legislator needs and wants to hear from his or her constituents. Your voice does matter.

Q: What if a person is intimidated because he or she does not know how to lobby?

A: We will give people the tools they need to lobby. We have already scheduled several lobby trainings around the state. The first training will be Wednesday January 10 from 6 to 7:30 pm in the basement of the Central Public Library in downtown Lexington. KFA lobbyist Wes Wright will instruct people on the proper way to lobby and insure that every person feels comfortable approaching a legislator. There is free parking in the Library garage.

Q: Even if a person learns to lobby, why should he or she do so?

A: The primary reason can be summed up in the idea of strength in numbers. Legislators respond with greater emphasis when a larger number of people contact them regarding a certain issue. If we all go to Frankfort on February 22nd and show that the GLBT community is substantialand it demands equal protections under the law, the legislators will sit up and take notice.

Never forget that your vote counts just as much as anyone else's, and every legislator wants as many votes as he or she can get. In fact, your presence in Frankfort is often more persuasive than that of a professional lobbyist. The paycheck of a professional lobbyist depends on his or her continued on page 12

lobbying strongly. Your presence as an unpaid constituent demonstrates a strong commitment to the issues at hand.

Q: If someone really wanted to participate but just could not go to Frankfort, what could he or she do?

A: There are many ways to get involved to help promote GLBT rights:

- 1. Volunteer for a local chapter. There are currently very strong chapters in the Bluegrass Region, Madison County, and Northern Kentucky. All three chapters consistently scout out new volunteers and steering committee members to help out with various events.
- 2. Donate money to KFA. It takes money to keep this program alive and healthy.
- 3. Purchase KFA merchandise. See website below.
- 4. Call or write your legislator directly. If you are unsure of who to contact in Frankfort, representatives of KFA will gladly help you find that person.
- Q: Where would someone find information on how to do those things?
- A: The fastest way is by going to www.kentuckyfairness.org. The website contains contact information for all

the chapters as well as ways to donate money and to purchase merchandise. In addition, people can send e-mails to info@kentuckyfairness.org, call 1-866-205-3239, or write to Kentucky Fairness Alliance, PO Box 1280, Frankfort, Kentucky 40602.

THE ADVOCATE'S PEOPLE OF THE YEAR

Biological Exuberance **Animal Homosexuality and Natural Diversity** By Bruce Bagemihl reviewed by mary crone

This is in some ways a book review of Biological Exuberance, and in part an article based on the book. There are 750 pages to peruse, but you do not have to read the whole book to enjoy the authors point of view about homosexuality in animals and the reluctance of many scientists to recognize this form of diversity.

One of the beliefs used in arguments against homosexuality is that it is "unnatural." In Biological Exuberance, Bruce Gagemihl presents a comprehensive overview of homosexual attraction and behavior as well as some information on gender flexibility in the animal kingdom based on scientific observation and research. He discusses how scientists have been observing homosexual behavior in animals for a century but have labeled it as deviant or simply found ways of denying what they saw. Bagemihl reviews a large amount of research and demonstrates that homosexuality is not only natural, it is abundant in nature.

It seems that we have not known much about same sex behavior and bonding among animals until recently. Quite a bit of attention was given to the two male penguins raising a baby together, for example. But there have been a great many observations made over the years. Gagemihl includes some quotations from scientific articles written over one hundred years ago.

One such article published in 1896 was entitled "Sexual Perversion in Male Beetles." A drawing included in this article of two male beetles copulating, is one of the first scientific illustrations of animal homosexual behavior to be published. Often, observations have been accompanied by negative labels (bizarre, abnormal, etc) and/or have been explained away (not enough males or females, practice for heterosexuality, etc.) Seeing everything through a heterosexual lens has been

pervasive in western scientific community. It is rare but occasionally an author recognizes that they may be biased. One man observing birds in 1909 writes: "From a distance this might be mistaken for fighting, but perverted sexuality is the real keynote...sexual perversion, as one calls it - a term which serves to save one the trouble of thinking..."

Even up to 1997, articles can be found using terms such as strange, bizarre, deviant, abnormal, anomalous and perverse to describe homosexual behaviors. In 1987 W. J. Tennent published an article about Mazarine Blue butterflies entitled "A Note on the Apparent Lowering of Moral Standards in the Ledidoptera." He observed and reported the mating of male butterflies - and interpreted that activity as a lowering of moral standards. I wonder if morally upright butterflies discriminate against their "abnormal" brothers. And does this mean there will be blue butterflys in hell?

One of Gagemihl's first assertions is that "homosexuality" does not only refer to overt sex acts but includes numerous and diverse activities. He divides animal homosexual behaviors into five categories: courtship, affection, sex, pair-bonding, and parenting (touches that are not explicitly sexual are classified as affectionate). He uses these categories throughout the book to show how different species display one or several forms of behaviors from the different categories.

In most species the same courtship behaviors are used in homosexual and heterosexual interactions. In some cases, same sex courtship includes only some of the behaviors commonly found in heterosexual courtship. One common difference is that courting and sexual activity is more often reciprocal in same sex couples. Instead of a male feeding a female, for example, two same sex animals will feed each other. From my point of view, I would say that homosexual behavior goes hand in hand with a looser and more continued on next page

creative experience and expression of gender. (Well, flipper in flipper? Nose in?)

In a few species, there are behaviors that are found only in homosexual interactions. Male Ostriches perform a "pirouette dance" only when courting another male. Female Rhesus Macaques engage in a "hide and seek" courtship game only when courting another female.

Same sex couples (and groups) of many species find ways to be mutually sexual. Grey Whales, Manatees, many primates, and some birds will mutually stimulate each other's genitals in a variety of ways. Some species have been creative in their sexual behavior, such as female dolphins that blow water at each others genitals.

Bagemihl also discusses gender identity in animals but we will save that for another newsletter. In summery, the fact that homosexual behavior is widespread in the animal kingdom affirms that it is normal part of nature- including human nature. Queerness is part of the wonderfully diverse world in which we live.

Get Used to It

Same-gender sex in animals rarely makes headlines. The organizers of a "Against Nature?" exhibition at the Norwegian Natural History Museum of the University of Oslo hope to call attention to the often ignored subject.

"People always come up with the argument that homosexuality is somehow against nature. And that's not true," said Petter Bøckman, the academic advisor for the exhibit. Through models, photos, texts, and specimens ranging in size from tiny insects to enormous sperm whales, visitors can learn about same sex sexual expression in animals.

Scientists have observed homosexual behavior in 1,500 animal species, said Bøckman. Take, for instance, bonobos, one of our closest relatives and perhaps the most well-known homosexual animals. "They're known to be rampantly bisexual," he said.



Killer whales, bottlenose dolphins, West Indian manatees, and giraffes have allmale orgies. Among black-headed gulls, scientists estimate that one in ten pairs is comprised of two females. Same-sex penguin couples have been known to have long relationships and raise chicks.

Homosexuality is most widespread among animals with a complex herd life. It functions as a kind of social glue for bonobos, who use sex to diffuse conflict—a marked difference from other primates that solve conflicts with violence. Homosexuality also plays a social role among other male animals, such as big horn sheep and lions.

Researchers are not sure of the advantage is, if any, of homosexual behavior among dragonflies, scarab beetles, or, as observed at least once, two male octopuses of different species. Bøckman and others at

the museum hope the exhibition will help break a long-held taboo against talking about, and publishing on, the subject.

The exhibition is long overdue, said Joan Roughgarden, a biologist at Stanford University and author of Evolution's Rainbow: Diversity, Gender and Sexuality in Nature and People. She points out that in the U.S., museums, nature shows, introductory biology courses, and even peer-reviewed journals often shy away from mentioning homosexuality in the animal kingdom. "They're not painting an accurate picture of life in the animal kingdom," she said.

Roughgarden said the exhibition could help bring the phenomenon out of the closet. "I hope this is only the beginning," she said.

if I needed a ride. I ended up at his house where I was relieved of my sexual frustration and was \$50 richer. I street hustler was born.

I became the movie star of the street hustlers over the next several years. As soon as I made my appearance on the block, the cars would line up like they were at a fast food drive through. I felt like I was providing an important service, I was allowing my customers to drink from the fountain of youth.

I know that some people will read this article and think that I was just some kid that was being exploited and used by a bunch of old perverts, but I'm here to tell you that you can't exploit the willing. I never had a bad experience as a street hustler. The vast majority of my customers were like fathers to me, they were always willing to be a part of my life whenever I needed them. I have absolutely no regrets about my life as a street hustler.




