WHAT DRIVERS SHOULD KNOW

From Eugene Stuart, secretary-manager of the Louisville Auto-mobile Club there has been received a copy of a Motor Vehicle Operator's manual published by the Department of Revenue of the state government and now being distributed by automobile data. Mr. Stuart recipies

Operator's manual published by the Department of Revenue the state government and now being distributed by automobile clubs. Mr. Stuart writes:

"There has been a need for a digest of the motor vehicle laws of Kentucky and just very recently the Department of Revenue has issued this publication." Mr. Stuart is recommending to Mayor W. H. Hansen of the Kentucky Highway Partol that enough copies he issued to supply one to each citizen receiving a drivers' license. The pamphlet contains "What every Driver Should Know" to obtain a Kentucky motor vehicle operator's license. Licenses can not be obtained in Kentucky by those who are under 16 years of age, whose license has been taken away or suspended within the year, by insame persons, habitual drunkards or drug addites or those having dangerous weaknesses.

It is pointed out that in case of accident the driver should stop at once and give all possible help to anyone who is burt and give at report as soon as possible to a police station if any one is hurt or if as much as \$50 damage is done to either car or both.

The present law provides that no driver must drive at a greater speed than is reasonable and prudent and it is explained that drivingat a speed of more than 45 miles an hour is considered unreasonable and dangerous and that where congested areas in business sections of cities and towns are passed speed should not exceed 25 miles an hour.

The state and towns are passed speed should not exceed 25 miles and hour. It is against the law to pass a car on a hill or curve where the driver's view is obstructed, when approaching a bridge or where official signs are in place dicesting traffic to keep to the right.
